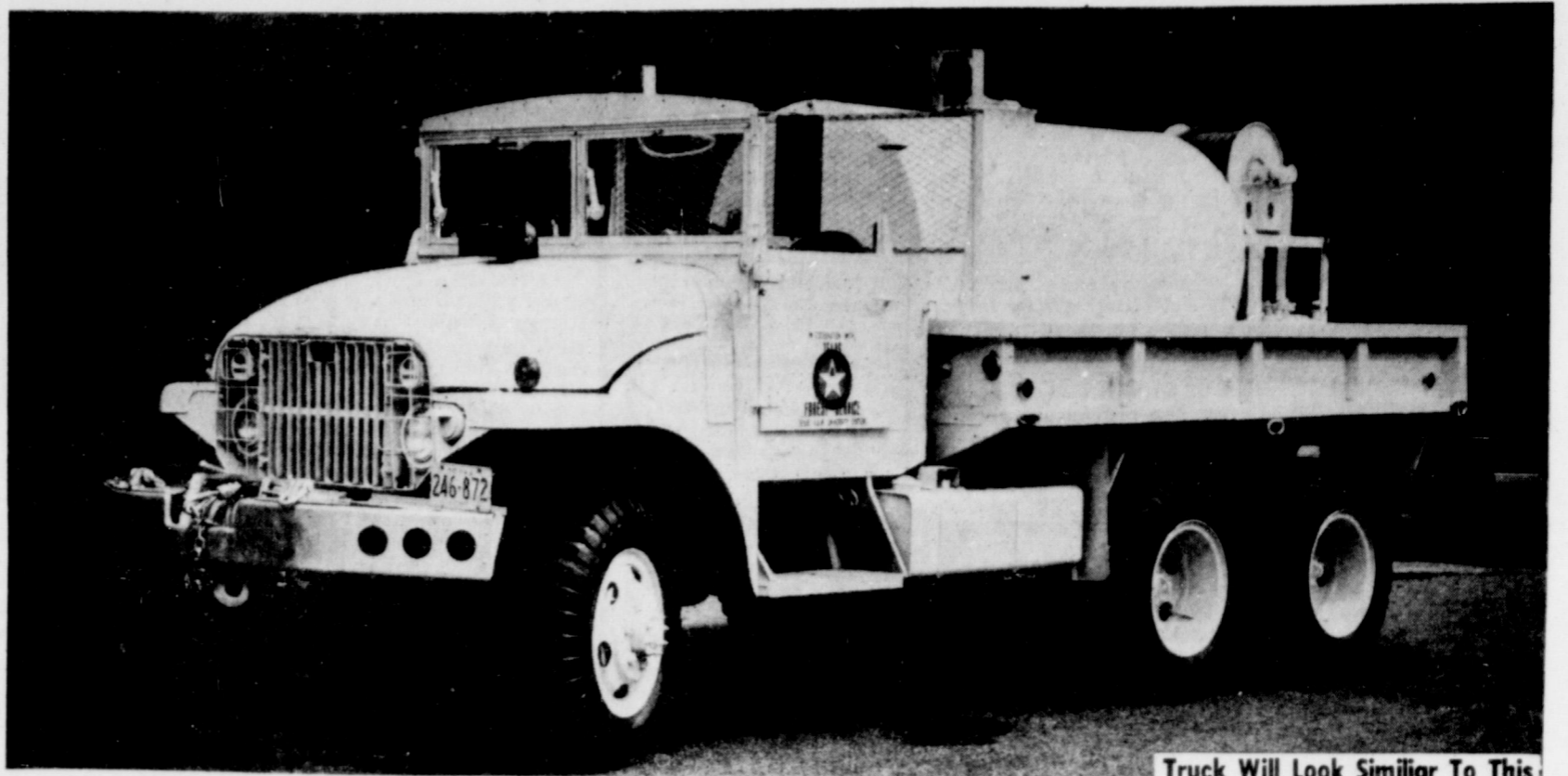
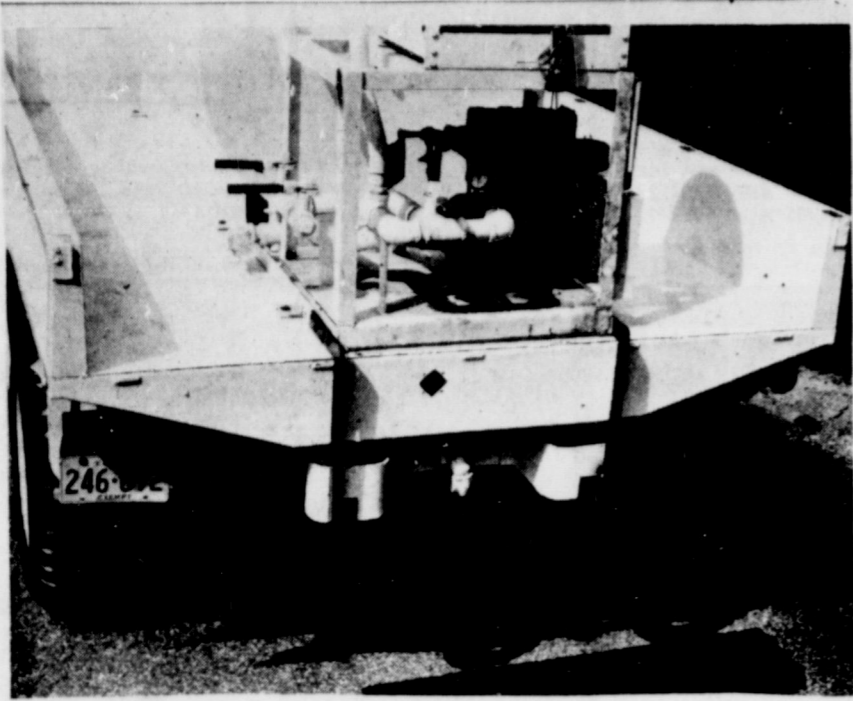

Volunteers through the Texas Surplus Property Agency, in which an Army surplus "6 by 6" truck can be secured by the department. The truck would be equipped by the Texas Forest Service at Lufkin with a 750-gallon water tank, pumps, hose, a winch and a siren. Cost to the department will be \$3,500 to be raised by the department in projects and contributions. Chief Graham reported.

The truck will be capable of handling the local rural fire fighting chores with its six-wheel drive and will be a valuable addition to the department's equipment.

The local department has also been advised of training programs consisting of training in equipment operation, ground cover fires, structural and fire behavior tactics, which is available from the Forest Service.

Below is the letter of notification to Chief Graham:

Dear Mr. Graham: Received your application to participate in our Rural Fire Defense program. Since this is a cost share program we will have to receive your portion (3,500) of the rigging cost before we can start work on the truck. Delivery can be expected from ninety (90) to one hundred twenty (120) days.

Also we have almost completed a training program consisting of training in equipment operation, ground cover fires, structural, and fire behavior tactics. This training will be given to department such as yours, at no charge upon your request.

Plans Are Being Re-Drawn For Eastland Senior Citizens

An advisory committee for the purpose of trying to develop a Senior Citizens Program in Eastland met in the Eastland National Bank Conference room Monday night.

Chairman of the committee meeting was Roy Cartee, head of Cisco Junior Colleges, Regional office on aging.

Present were committee members, Don Baird; Kenneth Reese who represented Grover Hallmark, Steve Haines represents Eastland Telegram, Mrs. M.H. Corbell representing Mrs. Dan Childress and Kenneth Rawson who attended to inform the meeting of the availability of a meeting hall he may have.

Following the meeting of members, Cartee presented the following proposal as was presented to the West Central Texas Council of Governments.

PROPOSAL TO WCTCOG AREA AGENCY ON AGING
This proposal is to designate

the Cisco Junior College as a Regional Office on Aging. The action would expand the present contract for implementation of the program for FY 1976.

The purpose of this is to foster the development of a comprehensive and coordinated program for Older persons.

OBJECTIVES

(A) To secure and maintain maximum independence and dignity in a home environment for older persons capable of self-care with appropriate supportive services from the Cisco Junior College, and

(B) To remove individual and social barriers to economic and personal independence for older persons, including the provisions of opportunities for employment and volunteer activities in the communities where older persons live.

PROPOSAL

(A) The Cisco Junior College would be the designated Re-

gional Office for an area within the radius of 35 miles, of the college, except for those cities which may be added or deleted, within or outside the radius.

(B) The Cisco Junior College would establish an Aging Program which could:

(1) Be controlled in the individual city by an Advisory Committee appointed by the city government, or any recognized organization within the city;

(2) Encourage the Advisory Committee to obtain funds for the program through the local government, county government, individuals, or other means;

(3) Secure proper facilities, enabling a visible unit, encouraging walk-in callers, insuring comfort and confidentiality during the interviewing;

(4) Develop resource files, providing information relevant to the needs and problems of the older people;

(5) Develop office staffing, on a volunteer basis, who would be trained to conduct the individual I&R programs, and other programs as outlined later in this proposal;

(6) Include a program of continuing education for the staff, and for the older citizens;

(7) Provide for a publicity and outreach activity, and

(8) Provide escort and transportation services for those who are not covered by other governmental programs.

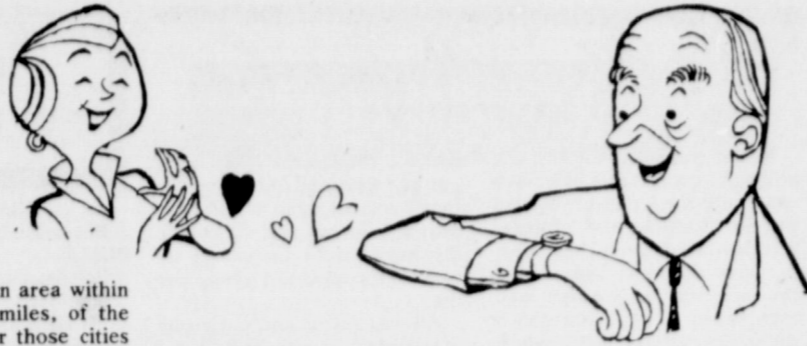
PROGRAMS

(A) The Cisco Junior College would endeavor to establish the following activities, in addition to the I&R service:

(1) On a routine basis the staff of the various city programs on aging would be brought to the college campus for training, by college staff, or other specialists, in the following areas:

(a) **Office Procedures**--teaching of establishing records, maintaining individual files in accordance to governmental procedures;

(b) **Recreation**--Teaching of appropriate forms of organized



and non-organized recreation;

(c) **Sociological**--lectures, visual aids, movies, etc. by qualified college personnel or lectures by visiting knowledgeable individuals;

(d) **Continuing Education**--courses in the fields of: Food Stamps, Social Security, Medicaid; Medicare, Travel, Wills, Taxes, Texas History, and others are requested by the staff or senior citizens;

(e) **Nutritional Programs**--Lectures, the development of local programs (i.e. Meals on -Wheels);

(f) **I&R Programs**--Methods of approach, source of information and types of referrals;

(g) **Library Resources**--lectures, lending of books, use of State of Texas Library;

(h) **Physical Fitness**--methods and proper use of inexpensive equipment, diet, etc.

(i) **Employment**--recruiting, referrals, interviewing and follow-ups;

(j) **Telephone Reassurance**--how to establish such a program, follow-ups, and action in case of emergencies.

METHODS OF CONDUCTING PROGRAM

(A) The Cisco Junior College will use the following procedures in implementing this contract:

(1) A Project Director will be appointed.

(a) The Director will have the responsibility for developing the program;

(b) He will visit the involved cities at least once a month;

(c) He will attend training sessions as suggested by WCTCOG Area Agency on Aging.

(2) The college staff will support the Project Director in:

(a) Assist in training the leaders of the local programs;

(b) On a case basis conduct a program in the various cities.

(3) The appointed volunteer staff would be selected on the basis of interest, capability, and need, to develop the local program.

(4) The expenses for the volunteer staff would be underwritten by this contract, to include at least the following:

(a) Mileage on a cash basis, not to exceed 124 miles per month;

(b) Mileage and training when visiting the college.

Cartee gave facts concerning older people during question and answer periods and also asked each person present to help in assisting the representative in selecting of a coordinator who would be capable of handling a fairly heavy work load.

Also discussed was a workshop to be held on July 28, at 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in the Cisco Junior College Library. The workshop will show senior citizens, by use of films, many of the different crafts and organized activities they can do together.

Another steering committee meeting will be held again soon.

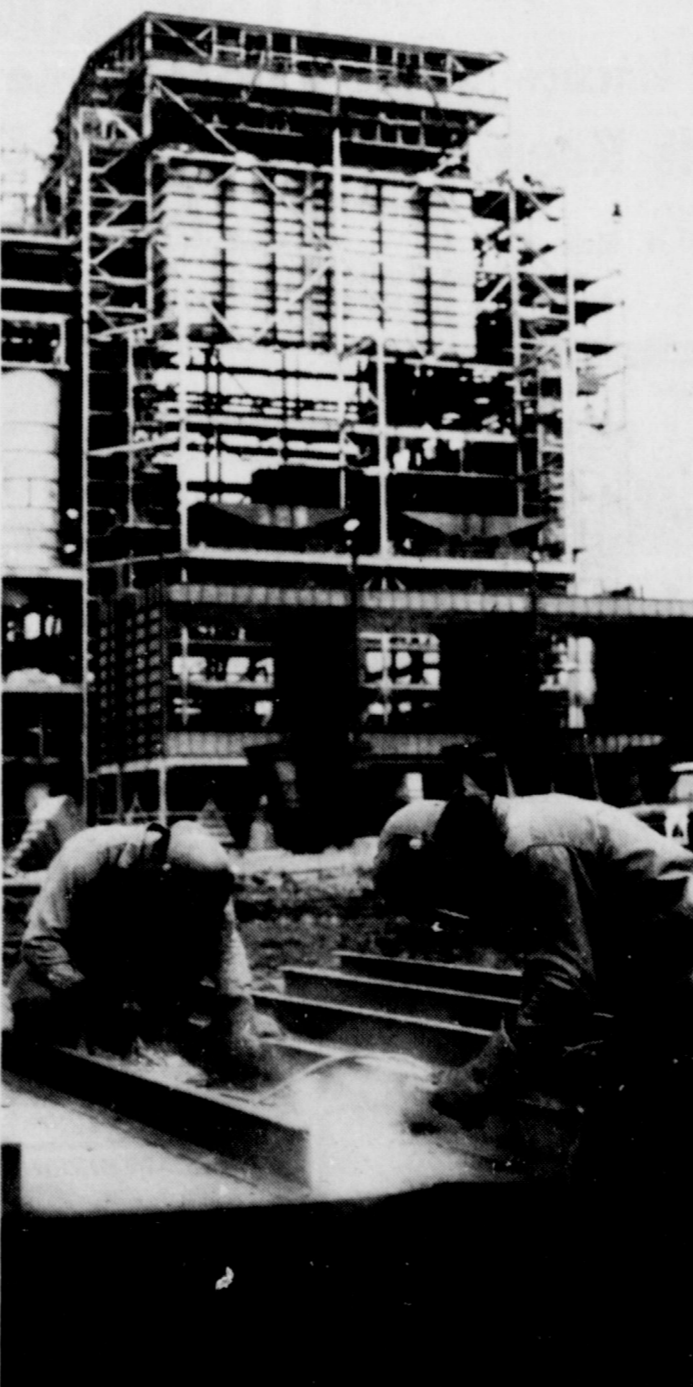

Consumers fall victim of confusing and misleading ideas in the "health food" field.

But scientific evidence does not indicate that organically-grown foods have greater nutritive value than food produced by usual agricultural methods.

The term "health foods" is widely used by untrained health enthusiasts in reference to foods that supposedly prevent, treat, or cure diseases-or

produce superior health. Actually, any food that offers the body something it needs and contributes to health could be called a health food.

Organically-grown foods have not been subjected to pesticides or artificial fertilizers. They are grown in soil that has organic matter added to increase the humus content.

Organically-processed foods are organically-grown foods which haven't been processed with preservatives, hormones, antibiotics or synthetic additives of any kind.

Natural foods are foods in the same form as they were harvested and are unprocessed. Natural foods may or may not be grown organically.

Decreased shelf life and special growing conditions generally make health, organic and natural foods more costly than regular foods. This extra cost in no way indicates that consumers are buying more nutritive value.

A delicious nutritious dessert for the hot summer months is Texas Sherbet.

1 Tbsp. or 1 envelope gelatin

1/4 cup cold water

1/4 cup sugar

1 can (6 oz.) frozen fruit juice concentrate (pineapple, orange, lemonade.)

2 1/2 cups buttermilk

Soften gelatin in cold water. Dissolve over hot water. Mix with sugar and stir until dissolved. Add fruit concentrate to gelatin mixture; add buttermilk and stir well. Turn into freezing tray. When mixture is partially frozen, remove to bowl and beat until smooth. Return to tray and continue freezing until firm. Serves 6.

Diseases, Bugs And Worms Present Major Turf Problems

COLLEGE STATION - Drouth, leaf spot diseases, chinch bugs and white grubs present major turf problems for home lawns in Texas for the next several months.

"High temperatures, high winds and limited rainfall create drouth problems for all turfgrass species," points out Dr. Richard Duple, turfgrass specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Raising the mowing height one-half inch will increase the depth of the turfgrass cover and provide more insulation against extremes in high soil temperature. This practice also encourages more extensive rooting of turfgrasses so they can more effectively use soil moisture."

Along with higher mowing, the Texas A&M University System specialist suggests watering to moisten the soil to a depth of four to six inches after each application. Light, frequent irrigation produces shallow - rotted turf that is more susceptible to drouth stress.

The specialist advises against using soluble nitrogen fertilizers to stimulate grass growth during mid - summer stress periods since they increase the water requirements to turf.

"Leaf spot diseases are generally a problem when lawns are under stress and increase with high temperatures, drouth, heavy shade and close mowing," points out Duple. "Proper mowing and watering will reduce these

Texas Wild Flowers

One of the most spectacular sights of Summertime is a many-acre field of purple Horsemint (*Monarda citriodora*) with spiked flowers the creamy color of a grape ice cream soda.

More than a half-dozen species of Monarda are known in the state, but purple Horsemint is the most showy and widespread. Other species have white, lilac and yellow blossoms. A perennial species, *M. fistulosa*, in East Texas has a single cluster of pink flowers.

Monardas did not get their common name because horses like them—they don't—but because of an old-English custom of dubbing any coarse-leaved plant of rampant growth with the prefix of "horse."

Horsemints are a member of the Mint Family, naturally, and have aromatic foliage which smells faintly of citrus when crushed. Some wild-fool enthusiasts use the leaves sparingly in salads; others make a brisk tea from dried leaves.

Despite their ungainly name, Horsemints are a welcome addition to the home garden. They like sunny, but moist, situations and withstand heat well. Because of their branching habit, they fill up an area quickly.

Masses against a white house or along a fence, Horsemints are traffic-stoppers with their beauty. They can be made more bushy by pinching the square-stemmed young plants in the Spring.

The seed spikes are highly prized for winter decorations.

Horsemints are easy to raise. Gather the seed spikes in the late Summer as they are turning brown and keep them upright in a bag until dried completely. Turn the spikes over in the bag and shake vigorously to dislodge the seeds. Plant in mid-Fall.

Battleship Texas' New Self Guided "Talk Tours" Add Greatly To Visitor's Enjoyment

(HOUSTON) The final completion of the three month installation of a completely new self guided electronic "Talk Tour" of the Battleship Texas was announced today by Rear Admiral C. H. Taylor, USNR (Ret.), Chairman of the nine member Battleship Texas Commission.

The Battleship Texas, moored at San Jacinto State Park in the shadow of the San Jacinto Monument, on the Houston ship channel, is the only floating museum of its kind in the world. Her history covers 63 years embracing the AGE of the BATTLESHIP, an era in naval warfare now only in memory in our nation's history.

Oil And Gas Production Has Impact On Economy

The production of crude oil and natural gas in 1974 continued to have a significant impact on the economy of Eastland County, with the estimated value of the country's production, royalty payments, and state severance taxes reaching new highs.

Eastland was one of 197 counties - an increase of four from 1973 - which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,000 in a year which saw the total value of state production jump from just over \$6.7 billion to almost \$11.4 billion.

The country ranked 154th in the state in the total value of petroleum produced - \$3.3 million - with \$2.1 million of that coming from the sale of \$296,535 barrels of crude oil; \$1.2 million from the sale of 4.3 million MCF of natural gas.

This study by the Texas Mid - Continent Oil & Gas Association shows also that the country's petroleum production last year resulted in the payment of \$415,082 to royalty owners.

"These figures, whether considered statewide or individually in almost 80 percent of Texas' 254 counties, emphasize the importance of a healthy petroleum industry in the nation's No. 1 energy state," said Sherman Hunt, a Dallas independent oil man who is president of Texas Mid - Continent.

"In the face of declining production in Texas, it is significant that this increased return to royalty owners and

producers came from crude oil and natural gas which is free from restrictive federal price controls. But there are at this time proposals in Congress which would place all of Texas' petroleum production under federal price controls, with predictable disastrous consequences for the industry, as well as the whole economy of the state," Hunt said.

The survey also shows that the State of Texas received \$188,852 in production taxes from country wells, with \$95,484 coming from crude oil output and \$93,368 from natural gas production.

Oil and gas developers and producers spent an estimated \$1.5 million drilling 67 wells in the country last year, with 77 percent of that figure lost in 58 dry holes. The total drilling yielded two oil wells and seven gas wells. The exploratory effort in the country included the drilling of 42 wildcat wells seeking new oil and gas fields.

According to the Texas Employment Commission, 277 oil and gas industry employees worked in the country in 1974 and shared a payroll totalling \$2.2 million.

Processing plants also added to the country's petroleum - related economy: The "Oil and Gas Journal" lists four natural gasoline processing plants, with a daily capacity of 50.2 million cubic feet.

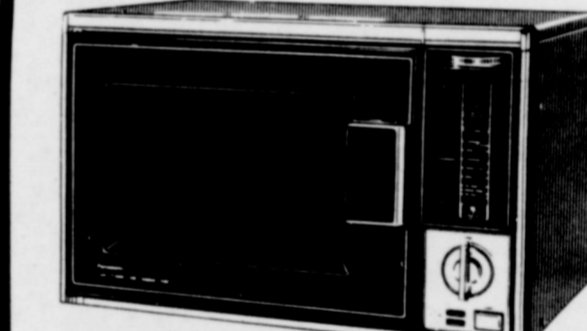

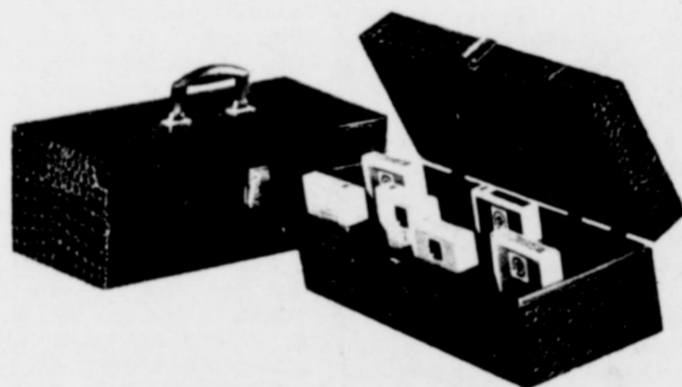

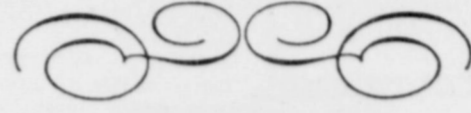
Joining the Bike-A-Thon are both male and female of all ages. They are expecting as many as 200 participants in the celebration.
