School System Lions Topic

The Eastland School System is big business, it was pointed out for members of the Eastland Lions Club at their luncheon meeting Tuesday.

Speaker was Supt. Ray Pruitt who explained that the school is holding the tax line this year without having to make increases and hopes to do so next year, but after that it appears that the state will re-evaluate across the state, resulting in tax increases.

President Ray Pryor presided and Clint Bray was in charge of the program, introducing Mr. Pruitt. Guest was Larry Martin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Martin.

James Wright will have the program next week.

The school's local fund assignment (the amount sent to Austin) has increased from \$78,000 to \$102,000 and forecastably will go to \$350,000 annually. The district's \$18 million valuation is being increased by some \$14 million and will conceivably go to \$34 million as the state re-figures districts across the state prior to July 15, 1977. Supt. Pruitt explained.

The local district's 791 average daily attendance - gained two teachers for this year, but with new funding and weighted programs going into effect, some of the hoped-for vocational programs are going to cost the system in the future especially in those areas where the students leave the school campus such as in the program where they are doing work at Cisco Junior College and in the Home Economics Training Program.

Big Business indeed is the school with a professional payroll in excess of a half million dollars and an operating budget in excess of \$755,000.

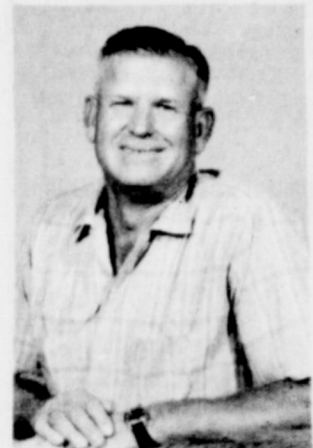

SUNBURN - -

WELL DONE IS FOR STEAK

Having a beautiful tan is a status symbol to most Americans. Too much roasting, however, results in more burn and less status.

The Texas Medical Association points out that the sun has little or no health value and can sometimes cause more or less serious skin problems, including cancer. There may be psychological gain - a sense of relaxation or well-being - from basking in the warm sunshine. But don't over-do it!

Over-exposure can cause burns, as almost everyone has found out. Continued over-exposure over a period of years can cause skin to look weatherbeaten, wrinkled, leathery and coarse.

If you are going to "catch some rays", the time of day is all important. The burning ultraviolet rays are most intensive from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Sunburn is unlikely before 8 a.m. and after 5 p.m. High noon is the hottest time of day. Rays reflected from sand or water can burn, even if you are not directly exposed.

Your first time out in the sun should be for a minimum amount of time. Ten minutes on each side is enough. If you must "bake" longer, do it before 10 a.m. or after 2 p.m. Increase the time of exposure about five minutes on each successive day. Don't be fooled by a cloudy or hazy sky. You can burn on cloudy days too. Most suntan lotions contain chemicals called sunscreens, which absorb various wave lengths of burning ultraviolet rays. The better lotions allow you to stay in the sun longer with less risk of burning. They do not, however, shut out all the radiation, or else you wouldn't tan at all.

Choosing an effective sunscreen is difficult. Your best bet is the product made by a reputable manufacturer.

Do You Remember

In the late 20's and early 30's, there was a young man in the community who had aspirations of becoming the head of a household when he was out of high school the next spring. He recognized that to provide for his family, he must have employment. This would be a problem for it seemed there were fifty men for every job that developed. He had been fortunate in obtaining work during the summer months with a company that employed men to do certain jobs and when the job was finished, the extra men's employment would be terminated. It was customary in those days to receive pay for work at 35c per hour for ten hours per day when it did not rain and seven days per week.

Although the wage scale in those days seem unreal when

compared to present day wages, you could buy a new car for less than a thousand dollars and you could get a car load of groceries for five dollars. Today it would be a small piece of meat you could get in a grocery store for five dollars. A new car will cost five times more than in the early 1930's.

People who want to work today can find a job. However, there are those who are content to use up their unemployment pay and take undue advantage of the food stamp program.

In the old days our young man did manage to get a temporary job that lasted forty-odd years and retirement. He did have his family and was proud when his children went out and developed their own families.

WATER SKIING SIGNALS

AUSTIN -- At this time of the year, water skiers are making their impact on lakes all over Texas.

Joel Block of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Water Safety Section warns: "Too often water skiers ignore or do not know the correct and safe methods of water skiing and become accident statistics."

"As spectacular as skiing may appear," said Block, "it is one of the easiest sports to learn. Many neophyte water skiers, especially children, can easily master the fundamentals within an hour."

If you've never been up on a pair of skis before, it's a good idea to take lessons from an instructor or an experienced skier to learn the correct and

safe methods. This can be very important, because bad habits once learned are difficult to correct.

Before you hit the water, you'll probably find yourself on the beach learning such things as required equipment, tightness of your ski binders, how to hold the tow line, how to get up and hot to stay up.

It may take a number of attempts to get up and moving on skis, but once you have done it, it is relatively easy to remain standing while gliding over the water. Points to remember which will add to your ease and enjoyment are:

1. Try to relax. Holding the towline too tightly and becoming tense are bad habits. Handle - grip tension has a way

of transmitting itself to your legs, back and thigh muscles. A relaxed skier learns faster and takes fewer spills.

2. Fight off that fall. At least half the falls a beginning skier takes needn't happen at all. Too often, a skier feels that a fall is inevitable and simply resigns himself to a dunking.

3. If you must fall, don't fall forward. Lean to the side or back before you release the towline. In this way, you will fall in the direction of the lean. As you fall, cover you face with your forearms to cushion the impact and protect your face. Don't attempt to dive as you fall.
