## Efforts To Establish County Airport

Efforts are being made to establish an Eastland County Airport, site to be determined, suitable for handling larger industrial and business aircraft.

The Texas Aeronautics Commission held a three-county meeting (Stephens, Eastland and Comanche) recently and reported that airports in this county are presently inadequate and improvements are necessary for industrial use.

An informal study group was established to consider the airport needs and to explore possibilities. Several informal meetings have been held but no definite action taken.

James Wright was chosen chairman for the group and other members are Don Martin, J.T. Carter, County Judge Scott Bailey, Dick Johnson and H.V. O'Brien. Following an early meeting, letters were sent to each town in the county asking for representatives to join in the study program.

In a meeting Wednesday the group voted to pursue the possibility of establishing a county airport and to continue to encourage county-wide participation. Commissioner Danny Woods attended the Wednesday meeting.

The TAC has emphasized throughout that each community could maintain their present facilities even though a larger, more servicable airport were developed central to all. Persons interested in helping

## Funeral Services For Clifford Gilbert

### To Be Thursday

Clifford C. Gilbert, 83, former resident of Carbon, passed away July 8, at 10:15 p.m. in Denton after an extended illness. Services will be at 2:00 p.m. Thursday in the Bakker Funeral Chapel with the Rev. C.C. Schultz of the Methodist Church of Carbon, officiating. Burial will be in the Murray Cemetery in Carbon.

Born Feb. 14, 1892, in Marquez, Texas, he was a teacher in the Eastland County Schools before World War I, receiving his Teaching Certificate for West Texas State. He was a Veteran of World War I serving in the U.S. Army. He married Delmar D. Murray Jan. 7, 1920, in Carbon. He had been a resident of Carbon since 1920. He was a farmer in the Carbon area for some 32 years. Mr. Gilbert was post master in Carbon from 1952 until 1967, and was a member of the Methodist Church of Carbon for 65 years.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Calvin Gilbert of Denton, and John Kent Gilbert of Memphis, Tennessee; three brothers, W.F. Gilbert of Spur, H.M. Gilbert of Gorman, and H.W. Gilbert, also of Gorman; six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

### Food Stamps To Be Changed

Food stamp recipients can use 50 - cent, \$2 and old \$5 food stamps until August 31, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced today.

USDA introduced a new food stamp series - \$1, \$5, and \$10 - on March 1, with a deadline of June 30 for spending old series food stamps at authorized retail food stores and meal services. The deadline was extended to allow recipients who were issued old coupons in March, April and May adequate time to use them.

Grocers and meal services can redeem old coupons at commercial banks through Sept. 30.

The change, which was effective July 1, 1975, will be published in the Federal Register of Wednesday, July 9.

WASHINGTON, D.C. - - IT IS AMAZING WHEN WE STOP TO THINK how technology, even in small matters, affects our every day living. HOW MANY HAVE HAD THE EXPERIENCE OF BEING TOLD "They don't make it any more"? This was the case when we recently tried to find a rasp to remove hard-baked enamel from some porch furniture. The elderly man at the hardware store said that he hadn't seen one in years and didn't know where one could be found.

THE NEXT EXPERIENCE WAS TRYING TO FIND A GASKET for an old - style pressure cooker. "They don't make that kind any more" we

were told. THE BALL - POINT PEN HAS REALLY COME INTO ITS OWN since 30 years ago when they were first put on the market. Now it is difficult to find ink and there is no such thing as an inkwell.

AT A TIME, BNAKS KEPT INK ON THEIR TABLES in the lobbies where customers could fill their fountain pens but it is doubtful there is one anywhere which now provides that service.

POST OFFICES USED TO HAVE INK ON THEIR OUTSIDE TABLES but after a little experience, no one would gum up their pens with the grade of ink they had. It was more like caustic stove polish and maybe it was purposely designed to discourage pilferage.

THE BALL - POINT PEN, WE ARE TOLD, CAME ON THE MARKET IN 1945 and, for awhile, there was some doubt whether a signature or legal documents using a ball - point pen was acceptable.

THE USE OF THE BALL - POINT HAS PROGRESSED to make it practical to handwrite multi - copy forms which was not possible with pen and ink. Management analysts seize on this potential to eliminate a lot of typewriting requirements for all kinds of business. The ball - point now has special ink so that not just several but

hundreds of copies of handwritten reports can be reproduced through offset printing. Until the last several years, the Government had no ball - point pen issues but now that is changed since it seems to work well.

SO, THEY ARE JUST NOT MAKING MANY REGULAR FOUNTAIN PENS, except those of the kind that takes an ink cartridge to be thrown away when emptied.

THERE WAS A TIME WHEN OUR BUSINESS SCHOOLS taught "penmanship". Of course, the quill had gone out long before that but, as a youngster in the fourth grade, it was beautiful to see all the curlicues which could be made with pen and ink. But it is supposed that they don't make many of those any more.

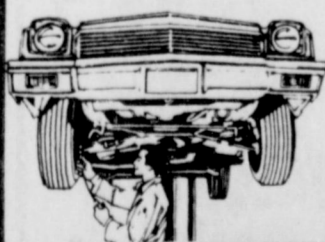

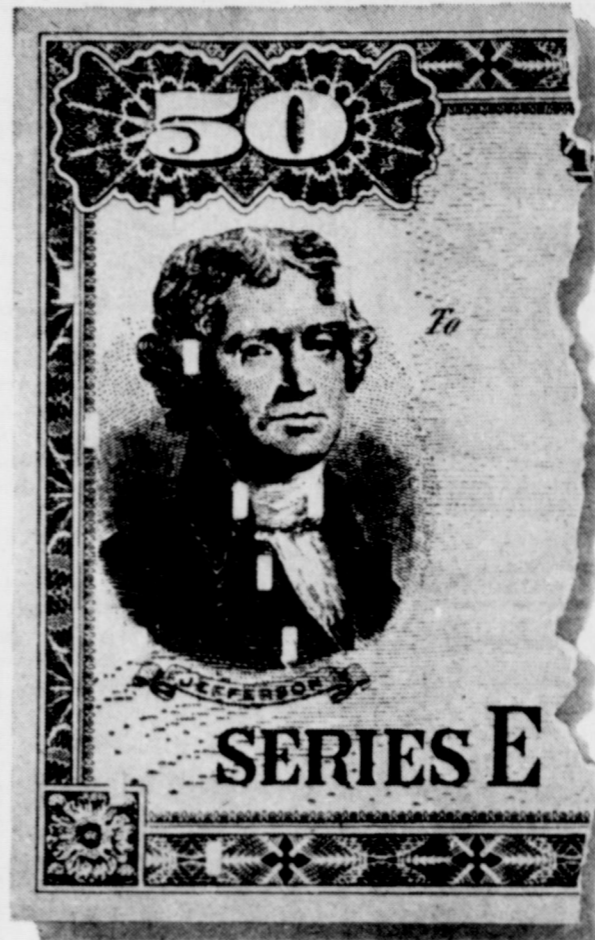

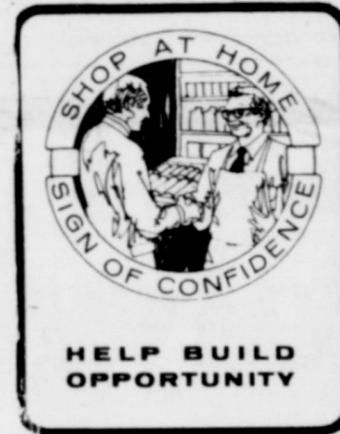

# Do You Remember

As the oil boom continued to expand with more and more producing wells completed, a group of oil men from the East realized the potential of the use of the natural gas that was being vented to the air. The natural gas would and could be used for fuel in industrial, commercial and residences in the larger cities and towns nearest the producing areas. Consequently, pipelines were built to transport the gas to the customers. Gas liquid plants were built to remove the hydrocarbons and make the natural gas suitable for energy needs.

The producers were very glad to sell the natural gas for most anything they could get for it was being vented to the air and bringing in no revenue for the producer. The pipelines and treating plants were expensive. Therefore only large consumers or large towns and cities with many domestic consumers were

considered for potential users of the inexpensive fuel.

In gathering the raw natural gas from the fields and delivering it to the plants, a great deal of "drip gasoline" accumulated in the pipelines and gathering facilities. The companies provided liquid traps along their pipelines to remove the free liquid and thus increase the flowing capacity of their pipelines. The drip gasoline could be used in the motor vehicles which were mostly Model T Fords in those days. Some companies even employed a man who worked at a liquid plant to fill up employees' cars free of any charge. Some folks used a light mixture of motor lube to keep the highly potent fuel from burning up their valves so fast. Employees were allowed to use this drip gasoline until the government placed a tax on gasoline purchases. So the free gasoline use had to be abandoned.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — The row over medical malpractice insurance has landed in district court here.

Argonaut Insurance Companies, one of the largest carriers of malpractice insurance, filed suit to enjoin the State Insurance Board from freezing rates at the June 3 level.

Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie charged insurance companies appeared to have inflated their rates when a new law required them to file with the Board.

"It's beginning to look like the classic case of weighing the butcher's thumb along with the hamburger," Christie said. He said one company nearly doubled quoted mid-May rates after the legislature ordered filing with the regulatory agency.

A Board order of June 27 put companies on notice that only premium rates in effect June 3 may be charged for renewal of policies for doctors and hospitals unless a 90-day notice of increase is furnished in the insured.

Argonaut went to court and got a temporary restraining order effective until a July 10 hearing, blocking the 90-day notice provision.

The provision, Argonaut attorneys claimed, imposed a past duty they could not have anticipated. They also contended that re-issuing policies at pre-May rates even though inadequate would "result in irreparable damage" to companies.

### Press Buy Protested

Texas printers are strongly protesting a proposal by Secretary of State Mark White Jr. to explore purchase of a large web-offset printing press to print copies of the proposed new state constitution.

White said press dealers informed him the state could save \$150,000 by doing its own printing of the document and the new official "Texas Register."

Printers, backed by an auditor's letter, claim the press purchase would cost the state far more than commercial printing of the constitution and register, and would lead to additional government competition with the printing industry.

Austin State Sen. Lloyd Doggett requested an attorney general's opinion on constitutionality of the purchase. Printers threatened a lawsuit to stop it.

White said no purchase will be made unless bids clearly show money can be saved.

Five and a half million copies of the constitution document must be mailed to voters by October. About 100 editions a year of the Register will be printed.

Jobless benefits dropped \$1 million — to \$22 million — in Texas during June, according to Comptroller Bob Bullock.

County Commissioners must fill a vacancy in a county school superintendent's office.

A "hot check" submitted for tax payment is public information in absence of any assertion of a privacy interest.

Ray Hutchison, Dallas State Representative, is new chairman of the State Republican party.

Harry Hornby Jr., Uvalde Leader-News publisher, was named by Gov. Dolph Briscoe to the Board of Regents of the Texas State University System.

Charles Meadows, former Odessa fire chief, has been appointed state fire marshal to head arson investigation and licensing of fire prevention and detection alarm equipment.

William J. Edwards of Galveston was named by Briscoe to the pharmacist position on the Texas Board of Health Resources.

Alvin C. Asken Jr. of Austin will head the Governor's Energy Advisory Council.

### Hearings Slated

Five hearings over the state are examining needs for revision of solid waste disposal regulations.

The first was held in Dallas July 1, the second in Corpus Christi July 8, another in Pasadena July 9. They will wind up in Austin July 18 after a July 11 session in El Paso.

Information gathered at the hearings will be presented to Texas Water Quality Board at an August 22 meeting in Austin.

### Short Snorts

Texas Employment Commission office at McKinney, Lorena B. Byrnes of the State Department of Public Welfare and Ron P. Mansolo of the State Commission for the Blind received awards for contributions to employment of the handicapped.

Former Gov. John Connally will be honored at a statewide non-partisan dinner in Houston July 31.

A \$1.37 million federal grant has been received to assist economic development of Laredo.

Ten meetings are being conducted July 7-25 to brief local officials on the Texas First program to locate 15,000 new jobs.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reported a 12 per cent reduction in Texas cotton acreage this year.

Eight hundred cities and towns received \$28.8 million in city sales tax rebates for the second quarter of 1975.

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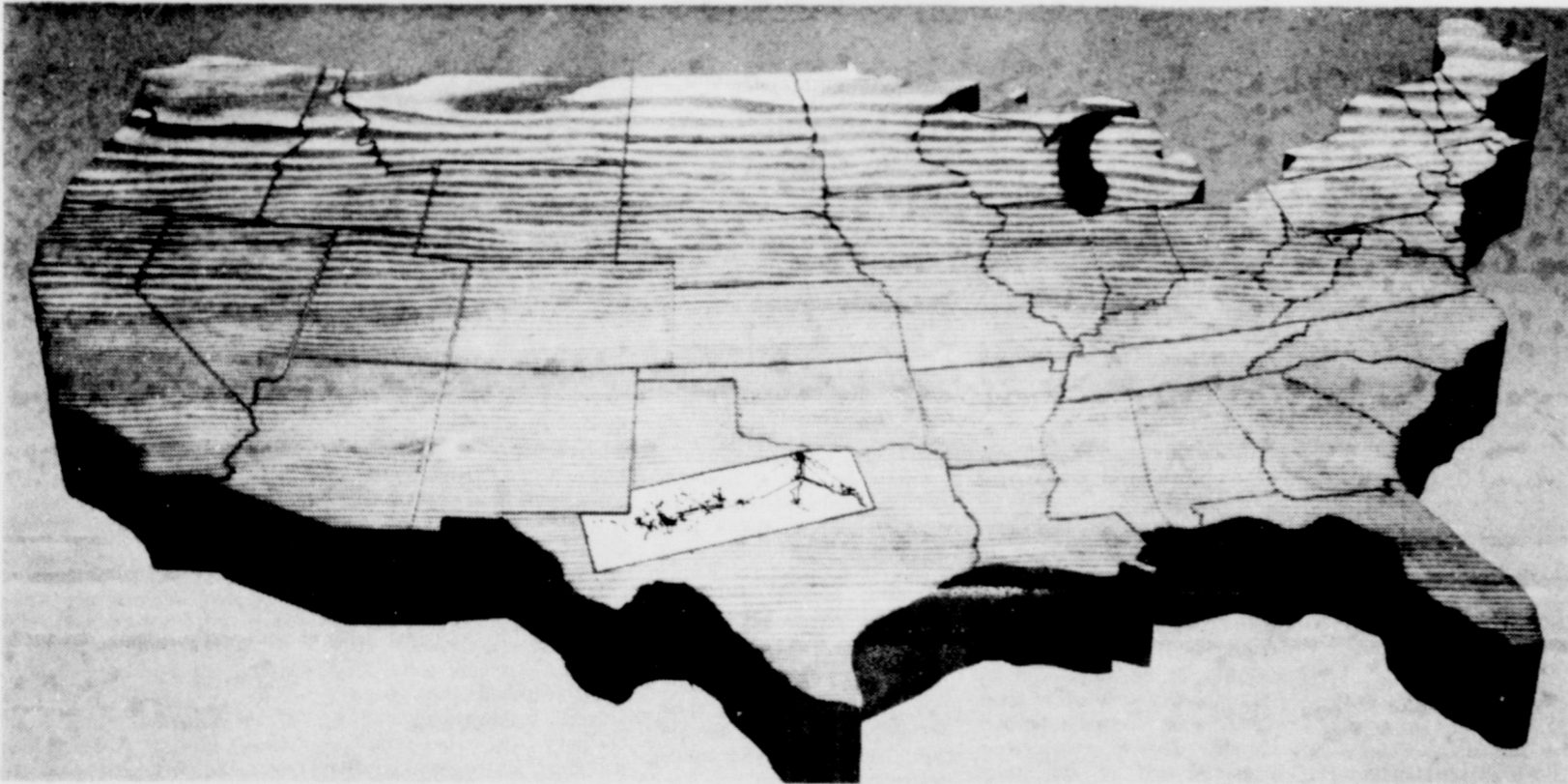
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# Homecoming Fever

## A Trip Back Home

(EDITOR'S NOTE: EHS - Exe Leon Hale, '39, writes of the Homecoming in his June 29 column for the Houston Post.)

### TRIP BACK HOME

Just got back from a three-day visit to my little old home town way out west of Fort Worth. They have a big homecoming out there every five years. I missed the last one so it had been 10 years since I saw most of my classmates. A few of 'em I hadn't seen since we came out of school in 1939. My, my - 36 years.

What impressed me this time was how healthy and prosperous and handsome everybody looked.

I've never been much on homecomings but I've always heard they make a bad scene because you're thrown suddenly into a bunch of fat old women and bald-headed old men and it pains you to realize that you are a member of that bunch of old-age pensioners. I tell you what, I didn't get any such feeling. I was proud of my bunch, they way they look and what they've done since we left each other way back there when we pledged always to keep in touch, and never really did.

I've not ever seen so many sexy-looking grandmothers. Why, they are seven times prettier now than in 1939, every one of them. And it's so fine to see them because you can go up and give them a big hug, the way you wanted to do every time you met one in the hall at school 35 years ago, and you couldn't do it because it was against the rules. Now when they're all 53 and 54, nobody cares or gets mad or arrested or slapped or kept in after school. I sure had a good time.

I thought the men looked great too. When I meet a guy who's been to a homecoming he generally makes that everybody - has - gotten - old - but - me joke. I had just the opposite feeling about my bunch. Why, those birds born back in 1921 and '22 came strutting into that class meeting looking like a gang of river-boat gamblers, all duded up in fancy duckings and two-tone shoes and shirts so loud they needed noise permits. They went prissing around there so light footed and spring-legged you'd think they could still go out and enter the foot races in county meet.

Somebody said, well, it's these flashy new clothes, that make the men look young. I don't know. It's true we used to show up dressed like a flock of molted roosters, in dark trousers and gray ties and white shirts covered up by black coats. Just right for graveside services.

Now - the first guy I saw when I walked in used to wear white shirts and black ties even to English class in 1939. At the homecoming he had on bright yellow slacks and a checkered go-to-hell shirt that pretty near blew the lenses out of my seeing-eye glasses.

But it's more than clothing. I felt there was a sparkly light of success dancing around most of the men. I admit it might have been partially the punch, which had something in it that went well with apple juice at 11:45 a.m. But I'll be damned if everybody but me didn't seem to be the vice president of something.

Or they're lawyers, or bankers, or they own a shoe store in Midland and just got back from a vacation trip to Spain. Hoo boy, you talk about coming a long way. Most of those old boys back there in the '30's would have bet the patch on the seat of their britches they'd never see Spain anywhere except on a geography test.

Some of us got together and sent round to a few of the old spots, to corral memories, to re-enjoy happenings, to make them better than they really were. It's so easy to do that.

Down to the courthouse, where they used to throw Thanksgiving turkeys off the roof on First Monday and one old gobbler - I swear this is true - sailed all the way over the bakery, over the old shrub-hidden hotel where all those evil and interesting things were

said to happen, over the rodeo grounds, over the grocery warehouse, and landed at the front door of the express office at the T&P Depot. Isn't that so? And didn't it set a record for distance among turkey gobblers?

Out to city lake, where a couple of us nearly drowned one time trying to swim across the upper channel carrying the end of a trolley in our teeth.

Up to the pale brick high school on the hill, that old boxy building that's so ugly and which so many of us thought was beautiful and do still. How curious it seems now that we rejoiced on Saturdays because we didn't have to climb the hill to that stack of bricks. We celebrated every holiday as if not being obliged to go to school was the ultimate privilege.

Then when we graduated, we cried, and went back to that school on every excuse, and grieved because they hadn't a desk for us any longer.

Those who never left the old home town can't realize how much it has changed. To me it resembles itself only in a vague way. Even the square is a different place. Pecan trees three floors high grow on the courthouse lawn, where we used to play rough games on election nights, and no trees at all grew there.

I counted only three businesses on the square that still operate in their 1939 locations. A ladies dress shop in the Corner Drug Store, our old Meeting Place. How strange that is.

The tall brick hotel just off the square is closed down. We were proud of that hotel, of its height and its facilities. It had a ball room on the top floor - the Roof Garden - and the earliest I remember you could rent it for \$15 a night, for dances or parties. All of us in my bunch collected a scrapbook of memories up there on that Roof Garden.

One night that sticks with me, the year was 1942 and we had what amounted to our first class reunion up there. I'd say a majority of the bunch was present. That war had started. At midnight we did a sort of cornball thing - stood in a circle and held hands and sang sentimental songs and looked at each other in new ways. Ways that said, "I may not see you again!" For me that was a mighty sobering experience.

I did not, in fact, ever again see two of those classmates. One died in the pilot's seat of a B-17 and another, several years later, of cancer. In recent years we've lost a third member, from a heart attack.

Not a bad record, for a '39 class. There were 44 of us, and only three gone.

Sometimes the customers fuss at me for not naming the old home town when I mention something that happened there. I don't normally do it because it is not always the same town. My family lived in nine towns when I was coming up, ranging in size from Fort Worth to a farm community that wasn't really a town at all, and they all became home towns to me.

But the one I go back to is Eastland, where I went to High School. It's in that Cross Timbers country on Interstate 20 between Abilene and Fort Worth. It's the size town that had 44-member senior classes in 1939. I don't know - somewhere around 3,200 population now, I think.

People who live there often say it's a unique town, that everyone who ever spent time there is devoted to it. Which of course is not true, but I think it's all right for them to say that.

An Eastland County wildcat drilled 16 miles south of Cisco has been completed as a Marble Falls lime discovery. It is Rhodes Drilling Co. of Abilene No. 1 - B J.F. Cooper, spotting 1,560 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of F. Vorn Bauman Survey, A - 699.

Daily potential was 24 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus five barrels of water. Flow was through a 12 - 64 inch choke with 325 pounds casing and 75 pounds tubing pressures. It is producing from perforations at 2,911 - 27 feet, treated with 1,000 gallons of acid and fractured with 300 sacks of sand. Operator set the 4 1/2 inch casing at 3,003 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 3,021 feet.

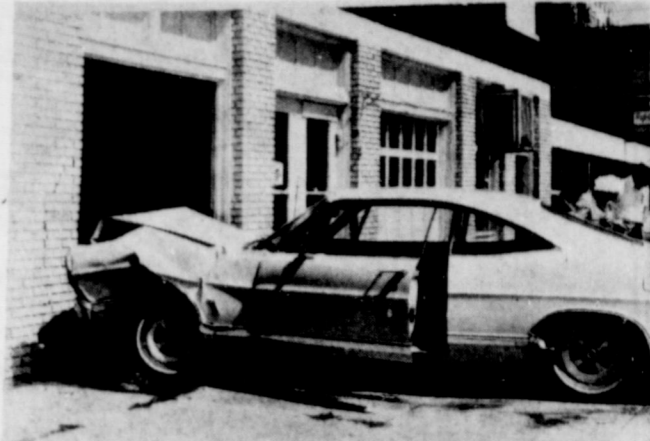

## SPCA Asks Increased Support

Increased support for humane shelter activities by municipalities, dog clubs and individuals was urged by Encil Rains, Executive Vice President and General Director of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, New York City, recently in Manhattan. Speaking at the luncheon meeting of the Dog Fanciers Club, reports the Gaines Dog Research Center, Mr. Rains cited a 10 - year deficit of almost four million dollars to carry out his organization's activities in New York City. "The municipal government doesn't give us one penny," he declared. Observing that the ASPCA is often criticized for not enforcing the city's leash laws, Mr. Rains pointed out that his organization has only 16 agents while the police department, which is responsible for enforcing leash ordinances as well as all other laws, has 31,000 members.

Commenting on the issue of destroying stray and unwanted animals, Mr. Rains stated that this is a necessary evil brought about by irresponsible pet owners. "The problem of euthanasia could be reduced substantially if owners didn't allow their dogs to roam freely and breed indiscriminately," he said.

Mr. Rains called upon critics of the ASPCA to become better acquainted with the facts before making statements about animal control. "To say, for example, that we need stricter laws is misleading," he declared. "We already have the laws. Some critics quote minimum penalties as if they were maximums, giving the impression that these laws are weak and meaningless.

Carroll Chaloupka, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, and Warren Newberry, executive director, will speak to the group at the opening session, July 14.

Guest lecturers include Dr. Clifton Ganus, president of Harding College, Searcy, Ark.; Dal Shealy, assistant head football coach, Baylor University; Cleon Skousen of Salt Lake City, author, lawyer, and former FBI agent; and Dr. Phillip Gramm, economist, Texas A&M University.
