Final Rites For Arthur P. Fambro **Held Friday**



Celebrate 50th

The United States is not at war, so we think of all Americans as being safe and at home. However, many are living in foreign countries it is far from safe. A West Texas family is one of

CBS television featured the Ed Hart family from Eastland. Texas, on its morning, noon and nighttime news reports Friday. May 14. on life in Beirut. Lebanon. Texas relatives knew the program had been filmed in March, but no one knew when it would be shown. A telephone call from a daughter-in-law in Fort Worth told Ed's mother of 1313 South Seaman when to

The film showed the Harts at home where they occupy a whole floor of an apartment building in Beirut. Mrs. Hart-or 'Viv' - as she is called was preparing a meal and said it is difficult of obtain food for their family which includes four growing boys. Mr. Hart-or Ed--as he is called conducted church services in the basement of a bombed school building The boys were playing as boys everywhere play. Two were skating, but the difference was the pile of rubble beside the street. A game of ping-pong was underway, but beneath a balcony protected from stray shells. Also one son showed a collection of empty shell casings he had gathered from different

areas of the city How did a family from a quiet Texas town begin the journey that has led to fourteen years in far-off Beirut? A feeling of going where he was needed led

Dr. Edward Clegg Hart was born in Eastland, Texas, in 1929. His parents moved to Texas from Woodfield, Ohio in 1927. The late Mr. L.W. Hart worked in the oilfields of West Texas to raise his family. Mrs. Hart taught school before she married. Somehow they impressed all four of their children with the importance of educaton. They all graduated from

Ed's older brother, Walker, now lives in Fort Worth and works for Texas Utilities of Dallas. His sister, Jane Riggs, lives and teaches school in Arlington, Texas. Youngest brother. Don. lives in Merkel. He is manager of Taylor County Co-op. There are several cousins to make coming back to Texas fun for the Hart boys.

Ed. as he is known Eastland, graduated from Eastland High School. From here he attended and graduated from Texas Tech in Lubbock. For awhile he lived in Schenectady. New York. He worked for General Electric. It was here he met and in 1957 married the former Vivian (Vic) Lake. Ed's family was quite surprised, but pleased when he decided to study for the ministry. Training for his life's work was at Presbyterian Seminary in Montreal. Canada. He returned to New York, married, and began preaching. Deciding to obtain his Masters in electrical engineering. Ed and Vic returned to Lubbock where he taught at Texas Tech and earned his

Masters. It was from Lubbock that the Harts first went to Beirut in 1962. His education still was not over for he returned to Ohio long enough to study and earn his Ph. D. at Ohio State.

The Ed Harts have four sons--David. 15: Peter. 13: Danny, 8: and Paul, 5. David and Peter were adopted in Lebanon as was another son who was fatally injured and is buried there. These things strengthen their ties to Leba-The older boys attend the American Community School and Paul attends kindergarten. Viv teaches nursery school. Ed and Vic worry that the boys education may be suffering because of disrupted classes. Ed's classes at the collège have only been held for a few weeks this year. He hopes they can

begin again if a workable cease-fire can take affect. Meanwhile he preaches at a community church. In quieter years they have traveled to interesting countries such as the Holy Land and Turkey. Last summer Ed preached in a

church in Greece. Letters, when they arrive at Ed's mother's house in Eastland, are always a week old and she wonders what has happened during that week. Not much is mentioned about the fighting in those letters that Mrs. Hart receives. Once in a while a bit of uneasy news creeps in. An example is the paragraph expressing relief the shellings had stopped at night. Ed writes they sleep better "When it is

The Ed Harts visited Texas two years ago when several weeks were spent in Eastland. The boys fished and had the wonderful freedom of small town life. Viv kept busy helping tend her family and admitted they longed for many Lebanese foods unavailable here. Ed puttered around his mother's house and she points with pride at the paneled kitchen he finished while he was "on

In Eastland, Mrs. Hart looks forward to a summer visit from Viv and the boys. She hopes with all her heart, especially when the news for Beirut is grim. that Ed will decide to join his family for a safe, quiet summer in Texas.





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

The water - bath method is used for processing fruits, rhubarb, and tomatoes and is done using a pan with a lid and rack. The rack is used to hold the jars off the bottom of the cooker. The pan is large enough to cover the jars with one to two inches of water, so that the jars are surrounded with boiling water. The lid is used to help retain the heat. The acid in some fruits and vegetables hel,s prevent the growth of some bacteria which is the reason the water - bath process can be used.

However, low acid fruits and

vegetables must be canned using the pressure cooker. The spores ("seeds") of some bacteria are highly resistant to heat, which makes it necessary for them to be destroyed by high heat. This is accomplished with the pressure cooker.

What are foods processed by these methods? The water bath is used for such foods as peaches, plums and tomatoes. The pressure cooker is used for such low acid foods as beets, peas, corn, beans, greens, squash and okra.

Summer time is salad time! Cantaloupe, strawberries and bananas - - are the beginning of a refreshing spring fruit salad.

Wash, cap and slice one cup fresh strawberries. Slice one large banana in chunks. Use a melon ball cutter to scoop melon balls from one small cantaloupe.

The secret to this spring medley is the dressing.....Mix three tablespoons frozen orange juice concentrate with three tablespoons water. Pour over fruit or slice fruit into dressing. Chill and serve.

The orange juice gives a tart refreshing flavor and keeps the fruit from turning dark. Sugar can be added if a sweeter salad is preferred.

Another great salad is wilted lettuce salad. With so many gardens in the county having fresh garden leaf lettuce, you might like to use this superb

2 to 3 large bunches garden leaf lettuce

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

TMA Offers Safety Check List

Rural residents and many people living in outlying suburbs are exposed to dangers the average urban dweller does not have to face. The Texas Medical Association (TMA) says fatal and seriously disabling accidents occur with greater frequency among rural residents than urban citizens. Studies show that approximately 87 persons of every 1,000 rural residents suffer serious accidents yearly. This is in contrast to only 60 such accidents per 1,000 urban residents.

Many of these accidents result from highway mishaps. Seventy percent of all traffic fatalities occur in rural areas. Farming, rated as the third most dangerous occupation, also contributes to the high accident rate.

To help cut down on the dangers of rural living, TMA offers a short safety check list. Give yourself a "3" on the following questions if your answer is "yes". Mark "2" if things need improvement. Mark "1" if the answer is "no" Low scores spell trouble. (A perfect score totals 33.)

- 2 - 3 Are hazardous places such as pesticide storage, grain bins, silos and manure storage protected to keep out children and guests? Also, can you close and lock your shop and machine shed to bar children and pilferers?

1 - 2 - 3 Do you operate power walking or riding mowers according to instruction manual recommendations, taking extreme care to avoid contact with

1 - 2 - 3 Do you set ladders on firm, level footing and when using a straight ladder follow the "4 - to - 1" rule (one foot out for every four feet up)

1 - 2 - 3 Do you keep guards and shields in place when operating machinery, and stay clear of unshielded moving

1 - 2 - 3 Do you stop power before unclogging, adjusting or repairing machinery?

1 - 2 - 3 Do you keep children and others not essential to the work operation off and away from farm machinery?

1 - 2 - 3 Do you hitch heavy loads only to the drawbar or specified hitch points to reduce risk of backward overturn?

1 - 2 - 3 Do you adjust travel speed to ground and visibility conditions, slowing when unfavorable?

1 - 2 - 3 Do you check your farm vehicle before going on public roads - - tires, lighting. hitch cleanliness of cab windows, load security, Slow Moving Vehicle (SMV) em-41 ACRES - - CISCO, Coastal, Lovegrass, nice tank, owner

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

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
