## Registration Deadline Is August 17th

Parents having children who will enter the first grade in Eastland Schools this September are requested by Wendell T. Siebert, Superintendent of Eastland Independent Schools, to register them at the business office in the high school building by August 17th.

A child entering for the first time must be six years of age or before September 1, 1962, possess a valid birth certificate, and proof of smallpox vaccination.

It is extremely important that parents co-operate in registering their children by the date designated in order to adequately plan teacher assignments and to equally divide the classes.

According to Mr. Siebert, registration blanks along with a letter of instruction, have been mailed this week to parents of first graders whose names are on the official school census.

Those who did not receive a blank by mail may secure one by calling the office of the Superintendent, or if preferred, may drop by the business office in the high school building.

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## TO GET INDUSTRY Seminar Speakers Offer Service and Assistance

"By 1980, 18 years from now 80 per cent of the American population will be living in some 80 metropolitan areas," representatives from four county towns were told in Eastland Tuesday night.

Speakers at the Industrial Seminar were Harry W. Clark, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, and J. K. Bradley, head of the industrial economic research division of Texas A&M College.

Persons from Eastland, Ranger, Cisco and Gorman attended the meet at the Texas Electric Service Co. meeting room.

Invitations were sent to over 100 persons by the cooperating chamber managers. A disappointingly low number of only 31 persons attended.

Clark outlined the history, scope and purpose of the commission, and summed it up by saying that his organization acts as a coach, with the individual citizens of a town "doing the ball carrying."

His is a state-wide project for landing industry in Texas. As late as 1958 laws prohibited the spending of state funds for securing out-of-staters, but a 1959 law established the industrial commission. Last year \$100,000 was made available for the task.

Confined to a small organization, the commission's functions include advertising in selected publications and generating

prospects, which are turned over to likely site location towns.

"We've generated 15 prospects, landed three plants," Clark said, "and have never met a prospect face to face," he said.

He mentioned the prospect who came to Eastland recently and the unhappy event that happened to him here. (He stepped off a curb and apparently sprained his back.)

The commission prepares brochures (one on the "Texas common market"), distributes other types of literature, provides field men, checking specialists and provide "panic button"

## Comanche County Electric To Hold Annual Meeting

The Comanche County Electric Cooperative will hold its Annual Meeting of members at the Comanche High School Stadium in Comanche at 8:00 p.m. August 3, 1962. Louie E. Throgmorton, Director of Public Services, for the Republic National Life Insurance Company, Dallas, will be the featured humorist and Master-of-Ceremonies. He is widely known for his very witty entertainment.

The Comanche County Electric Cooperative is a very im-

portant part of the economy of this area. The payroll in Comanche and Eastland Counties amounts to over \$110,000 per year. Property taxes in the various tax Districts are over \$110,000 per year. Postage is over \$2,000 per year. Local Expenditures for gas, oil, trucks, automotive repair, tires and other transportation equipment are more than \$15,000 per year. Other miscellaneous local expenditures amount to several thousand dollars more.

Then, the members on the Cooperative's lines spend hundreds of thousands of dollars each year for electrical equipment and equipment repair and maintenance. There is hardly a merchant on "Main Street" in any town in the area who can not see the effect of rural families having electricity available to them.

The Cooperative's Directors and Management are very interested in the 4-H program and have sponsored numerous 4-H activities and projects; FFA and other youth activities are of great interest to them also.

The Co-op urges all members to attend the meeting and states that the General Public is also cordially invited.

## July Rains Net 5.60; 103 Is High

It rained on six different days in July and the total rainfall for Eastland for the month was 5.60 inches.

The first day of the month set the pattern when .02 fell, but it was dry and hot for 16 days following, until 1.70 fell on the 17th. A shower of .03 fell a day later, and .05 fell three days later.

Heaviest rain was on the 26th when 2.35 was recorded by Official Weather Observer James Smith.

Another inch and .45 rounded out the dampness for the month on the 27th.

Highest temperature for July — and probably so far this year — was on the 16th when 103 was recorded. There were two other days with 102 and one day when 101 was reported.

Low for the month was a 64, registered immediately after heavy rains toward the end of the month.

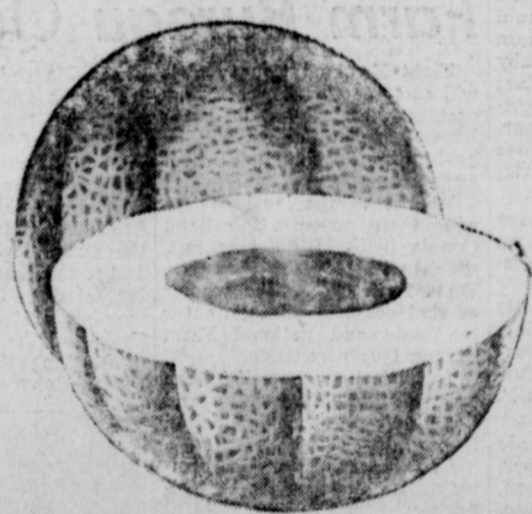
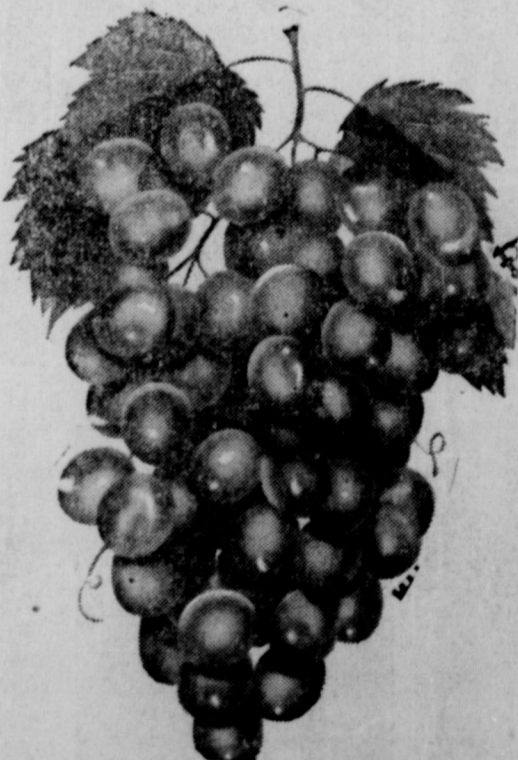

## Meter Connections Equal to '48 Total

The number of electric meter connections in the city limits of Eastland last year was exactly the same number as reported in 1948, the Rotary Club learned this week.

Frank Sayre, district manager for Texas Electric Service Co., told the club that there were 1,436 connections in 1961—the same number as in 1948.

The number of connections dropped from the 1,490 status in 1950 to 1,369, and decreased yearly, until 1957, he said when the number began to increase again.

Source for Sayre's talk was the Community Survey published yearly by his company.

Quoting from the report, Sayre said that approximately 85 per cent of the county's acreage is devoted to livestock farming. In the southern part, row crop farming exists and is chiefly comprised of peanuts—some 28,000 acres.

Peanuts gross approximately

\$2,000,000 and is the leading cash crop.

There are 14 farms in the county that are considered irrigated, with 18 pumping water wells, he explained, and there are 650 persons employed in manufacturing in the county.

Total employment in the county is 6,550 with 1,425 in agriculture and 5,125 in non-agriculture employment.

(Continued from page 1) counseling on request.

"Our services, however," Clark emphasized, "are of no use to you, unless you're interested in landing industry in your town."

In describing what it expected by 1980, he said that this nation is going into an urbanization and industrial "evolution" that will leave thin populations outside the big cities. "Some will be left behind," he said.

The two factors which will determine your future in industrialization are the basic economic points (resources, man power, utilities, tax structure, industrial climate, etc.) and the leadership, which must recognize the need to induce industry he spelled out.

"We feel every community in Texas must get busy," he said, "and the Commission greases the wheel that squeaks—not squeaks."

In forecasting coming industrial assistance, he explained a program of financing which will be recommended.

(Money would be made available under this plan by lending agencies pooling short-term notes. Such a plan is being used successfully in North Carolina).

Bradley explained the services which his A&M-associated organization offers, on a fee basis, in helping a town get ready for industry.

Commenting that his agency had been contacted several times by Cisco and Eastland citizens, he said that selling the community is the heart of getting industry.

The research agency produces an analysis of the town, and an industrial development plan ("a route to take").

He made these random points: Only about 35 Texas towns have adequate industrial programs.

Don't change the membership of your chamber's industrial committees yearly.

Every town has some industrial development advantages—and disadvantages.

During a question and answer period Dr. James Whittington asked if a county with five competing towns had ever been surveyed, and Bradley answered that no multi-city county had ever been handled.

Mrs. D. E. Pulley of Ranger asked about the fee. "It depends on the town," he answered. "Costing Sweetwater \$3,850."

Grady Hogue of Cisco asked how towns get prospects. "The prepared towns will get the prospects" was the answer.

Clark volunteered that the best prospects come from home-grown industries with a town's allies (the power companies, railroads, etc.) providing other 50 prospects.

"In a since, my agency is a salesman. We sell the best products we have. If your town is it, then we sell you," he said.

Describing the federal ARA program, Clark said he gives it five years, and that it will eventually strangle itself. In the meantime, he said, some communities will benefit from it—those who are patient enough to go through the red tape necessary. "Solve your own problems," he suggested.

County Agent J. M. Cooper explained the work and progress of his program planning committee, and re-emphasized his belief that this area needs to develop its industrialization based on the No. 1 resource—peanuts. The out-of-towners agreed wholeheartedly that this approach is best for the area.

Ronald Burton asked how important an industrial foundation is (one was recently organized in Eastland). "Very important," Bradley said, "if handled properly and are most successful in the acquiring of land sites."

This is their reason. It will last from now until cold weather cuts into their ranks. A few people have an apparent immunity to chigger attacks, but the vast majority of us are so-susceptible.

They—the chiggers—have a special affinity for low damp places covered with vegetation. Bermuda grass harbors them well, but for some unexplainable reason they are not usually found in carpet grass.

All agree, they are bountiful in Eastland county.

Just for the record, it's the larvae which do the damage, attaching themselves with their mouthparts and sucking blood until they become engorged and fall off.

The fiery itching is caused by an anti-coagulant material they inject into their host.

Although adult chiggers—large, red and velvety—are probably harmless to humans, their wayward offspring can be serious as well as annoying.

Not that they spread any specific disease—at least not in this country—but their

bites demand scratching which frequently causes secondary infections in the form of sores and boils.

To learn where chiggers are harboring, stand a piece of black cardboard on end where you suspect their presence.

If after a few moments you see tiny yellowish or pinkish mites accumulating on the upper edge, you know it's time to check your supply of insecticide.

Chiggers attack lizards, snakes, birds, and rodents with the same vigor and resourcefulness they display in attacking humans. No distinction is drawn between man and lesser animal species, which is hardly complimentary to us Homo sapiens.

Light applications of sulphur dust on lawns and low branches of shrubs have been used successfully for years to control chiggers. Nowadays, the new insecticides such as chlordane and lindane give better results. Just follow the directions on the label.

A quick word of caution: Be sure to avoid unnecessary exposure to the insecticide. If you spill the concentrated material on your skin, wash it off immediately. And be sure to keep children and pets out of the yard until the spray dries.
