written consent for necessar medical care if your child leaves home for a visit or camping trip, or if you plan to be away for any length of time.

For example, a summer camp nurse may bring a boy into a hospital with an acute case of appendicitis. but the doctor may well hesitate to go ahead and operate without the par ent's consent.

Is the doctor arbitrary, and s such permission just a legal technicality? No, he is well within his rights, though he may give first aid — but only for emergency treatment where a child's health or life may be at stake. He is likely to put off follow-up care until he can reach the child's parents. A relative or baby sitter general lly cannot grant consent for a

child's treatment. Even an adult must request treatment and grant consent to medical care on his own before doctor can give it to him.

Children cannot do this. By going to your doctor you show your willingness and con sent to accept his treatment Your consent is assumed also when you ask for a house call by the doctor, or if as a result of an accident you come to hospital for emergency treatment. If you are unconscious the doctor may well give you emergency care, yet later should get your consent to further treatment.

Minors cannot consent t medical treatment, and ex cept in dire emergencies their parnts or guardians must give it for them.

The consent should not be broadly or losely phrased, but should get your consent to furstances permit.

The principal reason for having the consent in writing i to avoid later misunderstandings. It is a protection both to the patient and physician.



### Poultrymen Advised On **Egg Shells**

quality during the summer is a problem that all Texas poultrymen face. Changes in feeding and management practices are required if the shells are to be kept thick and strong, says Dr. J. H. Quisenberry, head of the Department of Poultry Science at Texas A&M Col-

Feed consumption falls off during hot weather, and this results in a lower calcium supply for the egg shell. Either supplementary oyster shell must provided or the calcium con-

tent of the ration increased. More and more poultrymen are changing to a complete ration, which eliminates the extra labor required for supplementary feeding of oyster shell says Quisenberry. Also, when oyster shell is distributed over the feed, some birds, particuarly in laying cages, tend to overeat the shell. Most poultrymen use a complete ration with 2.25 per cent calcium during the cool months, but this should be increased to 2.75 to .3.00 per cent dring the summer.

Since calcium obsorption and metabolism may be reduced during hot weather, management changes that result in ooler houses and more comfortable birds generally reduce the summer egg problem. Paint-ing the roof white, opening up sidewalls for ventilation, planting grass around nouses to reduce heat reflection, and use of fans or spray nozzles will increase bird com


