This is one of the findings arrived at in a nationwide survey to determine how the consuming public has been distributing its money. It shows, for each locality, the amounts spent for food, for clothing, for general merchandise and for other items in the family

The results are contained in the annual market data report of the Standard Rate and Data Service, juts released.

The breakdown shows that housewives in Eastland County spent freely for food, allotting 27 cents of their dollar for such purchases.

As a result, sales in local stores, vegetable stores, butcher shops, suprmarkets and other food emporia amounted to \$6, 385,000, a gain over the previous year's \$6,316,000.

This refers solely to the food bought for home consumption. It does not include expenditures in restaurants and in other eating places.

If divided equally, these purchases would amount to \$899 per household locally. Market strength was exhibit-

Mexico C.ty, sixth largest in the world and second in the Western Hemisphere, old capital of the Aztecs and the capitol of the new Mexico, with its five and one-half million people was the highlight of the trip. The city is located in a valley at an altitude of 7450 feet and is known as the City of Eternal Spring.

The archaelogical ruins San Juan Teotihuacan, fabulous ghost-like Indian city that dates back to near the time of Christ, were visited. Remains today include the huge pyramid to the Sun, the slightly smaller Fyrmid to the Moon, and an mpressive stadium with perfeetly preserved Indian

The Pyramid to the Sun is the largest pyramid in the Americas with a base larger than those of Egypt and a height of 300 feet. The group climbed to the top of this pyramid where originally Indian Temple was located and where in one day alone in the 15 h Century, 20,000 Indian warriors were offered as blood

The Carmen Convent, which now a historical museum, was reported to be quite interesting. The cells of the young ladies in training were just as they were in the 18th Two altars were viewed that are completely covered with gold. In the cellar of this Convent were mummies of nuns who died a hundred years ago, ye their features were recognizable through the glass crypts.

The Shrine to the Virgin of Guadalupe was also visited. The legend goes that on December 9, 1531, an Indian, Juan D'ego was walking ovver a hill near an Indian Temple, which is now on the outskirts of Mexco City, when the Virgin neared to him. She informed him tha she wanted a temple erected to her on that ot. He was to tell the Bishop of her desires and when he did appear before the Bishop, an image of the Virgin appeared inside of his cloak. A giantic Cathedral has been erected on that snot and in the center of the altar is said to be the preserved image from Juan Diego's Hospital News cloak. The big days of religious celebrations are December 12 and Good Friday. On December thousands and thousands of Indians come by foot on long pilgrimages to the Shrine and perform realistic dances around the church. This "Virof Guadalune" is he officially appointed protectoress

of Mexico and the patron Saint of the Americas. It is quite a coincidence that almost every major Catholic Shrine in Mexico has been erected on a site that was famous as an Indian Temple of worship. There will be a special mass said in this Church when President Kennedy goes to Mexico on July 1.

Eighty-five years before the founding of Harvard, Mexico had its University. Established in 1551, the National Universly of Mexico today occupies a campus whose construction cost fifty-five million dollars and boasts an enrollment of more than seventy thousand students. Truly the architecture of this campus was breahtaking and seeing it, it was reported that one has to agree that it is of he most modern in the world.
