## 17 Accidents Occur In June

SERGEANT Roger W. Sosebee of the Eastland Highway Patrol sub-district released today the Eastland County rural traffic accident summary for June 1962. Sergeant Sosebee reported that 17 rural traffic accidents occurred last month in which no persons were killed, 11 injured with property damage amounting to \$38,425.00. During the same month last year there were 10 accidents with 0 killed, 7 injured and property damage amounting to \$6,803.00.

Sergeant Sosebee reminded more strict compliance with our traffic laws would further reduce this tremendous loss that kills and cripples so many of our citizens each month.

# 2 Teachers Hired, 4 to Go; Cooled Building Talked

## Hammond Buys Building; Plans Extensive Decorating

W. C. Hammond, owner-operator of Hammond Furniture, located on the corner of Lamar and Commerce Sts., has purchased the building in which his firm has been located for the past seven years, and the adjoining building west which houses the Greyhound Bus Terminal.

Mr. Hammond bought the two buildings, the furniture store is 50x100 feet and the bus station is 25x50, from the Owens family.

Amount of consideration was not announced.

Immediate plans call for the repair of the roof of the buildings, he said, and he also plans to sand-blast the front of the furniture store, and possibly add aluminum awnings at a later date.

Mr. Hammond is Eastland dealer for Necchi and Elma sewing machines and carries a complete line of new and used furniture in his store.

A resident here since 1925,

he came here from Ranger, and operates the store by himself.

He emphasized his faith in the future of Eastland in announcing the purchase of the prominent, square-located property.

## Enrollment Balanced, Now!

Class-room equalization for good operating teacher-pupil ratio in Eastland shouldn't cause too much bother this year — unless.

The "unless" is possible, Supt. Wendell Siebert explained this week if enrollment figures expand in any of the six elementary grades.

Right now, he said, it's in good shape, based on surveys and school enrollment figures.

Here's the breakdown by class: First grade, 75; second, 74; third, 73; fourth, 67; fifth, 67; and sixth, 77. The sixth grade total is believed a record, by the way.

There will be about 35 Negro students in the school this year for the first time, with two or three on the first grade level; four in the second; three in the third; four in the fourth; three in the fifth; about eight in junior high school and the same number in high school.

The board decided to district for equalization of the two elementary schools rather than put first, second and third grades in one building and the others in the other.

By districting, there will be a grade of each in each school which is more convenient for most parents.

(If districting is necessary, this newspaper will carry a complete breakdown so that every student (whose record and student is on file with the school) will know where he's supposed to be on opening day.)

The local school board talked elementary school construction and got almost two-thirds of the way through their annual teacher-hiring ordeal during a six-hour session Monday night.

The board accepted with regret the resignations of three more teachers, and okayed the hiring of two others. The action rounded out the school's coaching staff.

Formal resignations were read from Hugh Brown, ag teacher, and Joe Ed Ingram, junior high coach and teacher, and that of Mrs. J. M. Cooper was reported verbally by Supt. Wendell Siebert.

(It is understood that Mrs. Cooper, an elementary teacher, will teach at Olden this fall.)

Hired were Mrs. Earl (Edna) Conner for high school multipositions; and Deason Moody, first-year teacher who will be on the coaching staff and teach social studies.

Also announced during the session was the hiring of Harold Price, who will be on the coaching staff as well as teach social science.

Athletic Program Under a new plan, Head Coach Millard Glass, also new this year, Price and Moody will all work with both the junior and high school athletics. The two assistant coaches are being hired on an equalized basis, and both will work under Glass, for all physical education endeavors for the two grade levels.

Four teachers are still to be hired — one high school science teacher, an ag teacher and two elementary teachers.

An Ag teacher was okayed and hired, but when he was notified Tuesday, he reported that he had already taken another school.

The board will meet again next Monday night to iron out these weighty problems as well as huddle with architectural representatives concerning the new building.

About half the session Monday night was spent talking with Fred Buford and R. D. Sharpe, of the prominent architectural-engineering firm of Fred Buford and Associates of Dallas.

This is the second group of architects the board has talked with and will meet with David Cassie of Abilene next.

Buford in his presentation, showed pictures of buildings his firm has designed, explained his company's background, and outlined the three phases of architectural assistance — pre-planning, final drawings and supervision during construction — for which he would be paid six per cent of the total project, if hired.

Members were slightly taken aback with his "rough" estimate of cost. He guessed about \$12 "per square foot" although he pointed out that the "per square foot" basis is not an accurate measure of cost.

Although certainly nothing has been finalized, heat-suffering teachers and students will probably be happy to know that Buford and the board were talking about an air conditioned building.

The proposed building would be planned for some 400 students and Member Dr. Bob Alexander asked if \$250,000 might be considered a "fair guess" as to cost. Buford thought that might be a little low.

The cost of equipping such a plant will cost about six or seven per cent of the total, he said, and a fully equipped lunch room kitchen would cost between \$9,000 and \$10,000.

Asked about the cost of building a new gymnasium, the architect suggested \$15 to \$17 per square foot as average cost for the type he builds — which he called complete.

He'd only said "cheap as anybody" when asked about an agriculture building.

He said the Butler, Delta and U.S. Steel-type buildings for gyms cost about \$2.80 per square foot, plus floors, electrical, etc., making the total cost about \$10.

It looks as though the junior high school will go to a seven-course day this year in order to work in all requirements, plus the added emphasis on physical education and

## Paper Saving

"Lives of great men all remind us  
We can make our lives sublime,  
And, departing, leave behind us  
Footprints on the sands of time."

Thus wrote the poet Longfellow in a homily which swiftly found its way into every school reader. One can certainly question its accuracy—greatness and virtues are not necessarily synonymous—but it does simply point up the values that can come to us from the past, and from the actions, words and philosophies of the great figures of our history.

But to obtain, to preserve, to organize, and to make available the records of this nature is nowhere near so easy a matter as it may seem to the uninitiated. Writing in the June 23 issue of Saturday Review, John Tebbel says: "From the time of their utterance until the last dozen years or so, the words of the great men who wove the American political fabric have been scattered for and wide across both this country and Europe. Scholars working with these materials had to ferret them out of libraries and private collections. Other people with an interest in the history of the United States had to depend more or less on what the scholars could produce for them."

This was an obviously unsatisfactory state of affairs. It also was a problem that could not be solved by purely commercial publishing, because of the tremendous cost involved and the relatively small circulation of massive compendiums of letters, state papers, and the like. The solution, Mr. Tebbel tells us, has been found elsewhere—in projects of the university presses backed by the money of corporations, funds and foundations. Slowly, but persistently and steadily certain of these presses are gathering and publishing the complete papers of great Americans, and thus preserving them forever.

The work involved, no less than the overall cost staggers the imagination. For instance, Princeton University Press with a grant from the New York Times, is producing, over an estimated 20 year period, the complete works of Jefferson—this runs to 78,000 manuscript pages and the outgo will be something like \$1 million. Yale, with another grant, is doing a similar job with Benjamin Franklin's papers, which will eventually demand about 40 volumes—search for material led far afield, including five of the Iron Curtain countries.

Biggest of all, it seems, is the publication now underway at Harvard of the Adams papers. The Adamses are generally called the foremost American family, their mark is on all our history, and its members were extraordinarily voluminous writers. In this case says Mr. Tebbel, "The quantity of documents is so formidable that a complete letterpress edition is impracticable." There are 400,000 pages of manuscript. This will be made available in its entirety on micro film. The letterpress version may reach 100 volumes even though it necessarily will be incomplete.

Here is the recording of history on a grand scale. Mr. Tebbel concludes: "Where all this collecting and publishing will lead is known with some certainty and more hope. For it is the intention of the National Historical Commission to see to it that the papers of all the Presidents are published, along with those of other Americans distinguished in the nation's political life. Presumably none of us will witness this end, and indeed it cannot end, because successive Presidents will always be a jump ahead of the compilers."

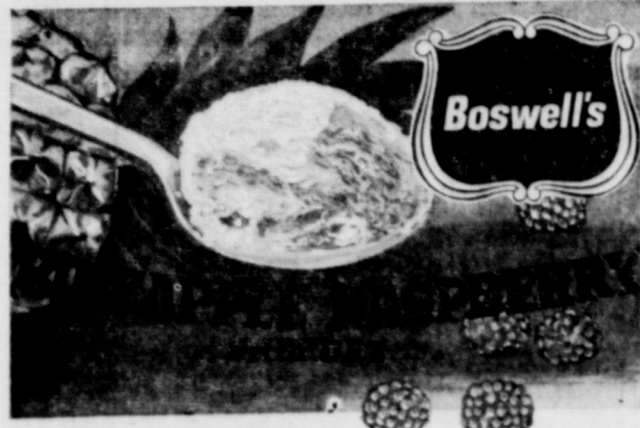
