





National Farm Safety Week Is **July 22-28**

STEPHENVILLE - Farm organizations and cooperating agencies and groups across the nation will join together in observance of National Farm Safety Week, July 22-28.

As proclaimed by President Kennedy, all persons and or-ganizations allied with agriculture are urged to join in the effort to reduce the number of farm, home and highway accidents. The Safety Concil, in cooperation with various other farm agencies and organizations.

The Stephenville Production Credit Association, agricultural financing organization, serving a 10-county area of North Central Texas, is among the area agricultural groups par-ticipating in the week's observance.

All farm and ranch people were urged to participate in the observance in an effort to decrease the number of accidents occuring to the agricultural population, according to W. M. Irwin, general manager of the association, which is owned and operated by farmers and ranchers in Eastland, Coman-che, Erath, Hamilton, Somer-vell, Johnson, Parker, Tarrant, Hood and Wise counties.

Irwin pointed out that al-though the farm population is only 8.7 per cent of the nation's total, farm and ranch people suffered 13 per cent of the motor vehicle deaths in 1960 and 13 per cent of the no fatal motor vehicle accidents.

According to National Safety Council figures, Irwin said, fatal accidents to farm and ranch residents in 1960 totaled 11,300 with disabling injuries eaching a total of 950,000. Accidents included motor hicle, home, work, and public nonmotor vehicle.

Although motor vehicle accidents counted for nearlly half of farm deaths, home and work accidents caused 680,000 disabling injuries, in comparison to only 180,000 disabling injuries due to motor safety practices at home and at work on the farm and rench.

About 1,000 persons killed each year in farm tractor accidents, the PA executive said, and 45.000 nonfatal ac cidents involving tractors ocagainst carelessness, daring or sporting liberties while driving a tractor in the field, on the farm or on the highway.




