NOVEMBER 5.84 Inches Of Rainfall Tops Average

Heavy rainfall in November brought Eastland's total for 11 months above the average for the year — although many would probably agree that the sufficiency of rain didn't necessarily come exactly when it was needed for crops.

A total of 5.84 inches fell in November, Official Weatherman James Smith reported, bringing the 11-month total to 26.58. Average for the year is 25.83. Average rainfall for November is 1.67.

It rained six days last month: .02 on the 8th; 2.70 on the 9th; 1.95 on the 20th; .20 on the 21st; .52 on the 22nd; and .45 on the 28th.

Temperatures were above normal for the month, but did drop to or below freezing on several readings. The last day of November produced the low for the month with a 27, and high was an 85 on the 8th.

Eastland Man's Brother Dies In Fort Worth

Word has been received of the death of Robert Ira Fambrough of Fort Worth, brother of Dave Fambrough of Eastland. He died in a Fort Worth hospital Tuesday, November 26, following a lengthy illness.

Funeral services were held at Robertson-Mueller-Harper Funeral Home Friday, November 29, at 11:30 a. m. Burial was in Garden of Memories in Fort Worth.

Born October 27, 1880, near Wayland, he was married to Zola Smith of the LaC as a Community in 1908. They lived in the Necessity Community for several years. For the past 20 years he had lived in Fort Worth.

He is survived by his wife; four brothers; three sisters; 18 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Hotel's Future Undecided As Auction Attempt Fails

The title to one of Ranger's oldest landmarks was tossed up for grabs Monday night only to fall, untouched, back to the originator.

Earl Smith of Waco, a licensed real estate broker and auctioneer, entertained quite a large crowd as he presented the business to the prospective bidders.

In an attempt to warm up the crowd, Mr. Smith delved into the background of Ranger, the days of the boom and the decline of the once prosperous community. He hit upon solutions to the problem faced by small towns such as Ranger, appealing to the civic-minded to use their imagination to bring industry to the area.

The activity to the East was mentioned as a possible stimulant to the local economy.

Most of those present were in agreement with Mr. Smith but not to the point of reacting to his opening quest of \$30,000.

Touching \$30,000 lightly the suggested opening bid dropped to \$25,000 and on to \$20,000. There was still no response.

On a chance that there was one party that needed to only be pushed slightly by an imaginative competitor, the bid dropped to 15 thousand. With successive, unobserved bids of one thousand each it was rapidly carried back to \$20,000 and still no takers.

At this point the auctioneer inserted, "Do you still have faith in Ranger?"

The response was the same.

The historic hotel is still owned by Mrs. T. A. Blakley of Dallas.

The Paramount was originally built in 1920 by Curley Hopper who was the owner when fire caused considerable damage to the building in 1944.

Repairs to the hotel came to \$19,000 above the amount paid by the insurance company.

Monday night there was not a room available in the Paramount hotel. It was booked solid.

Two Deer Is Legal Limit, Warden Says

"Two" is the legal deer limit in Eastland County, and only "one" of these can be a doe, according to Game Warden Maurice Dry.

A hunter may legally kill two bucks, or one buck and one doe, Dry said.

Some question had arisen from the issuance of "bonus" doe permits. These are good, Dry said, only in counties under the jurisdiction of the State Game and Fish Commission where surplus doe have been declared. Eastland County is not under the Game and Fish Commission jurisdiction, so the bonus tags can be used only in adjoining counties which are Commission controlled.

Deer season ends in Eastland County on December 15, he added.

Large numbers of deer are being reported killed.

Mr. Altom has worked in the tax office for about 14 years and is currently assessing deputy. He has been in charge of making the entire tax role for the past five years, including the oil and gas roles.

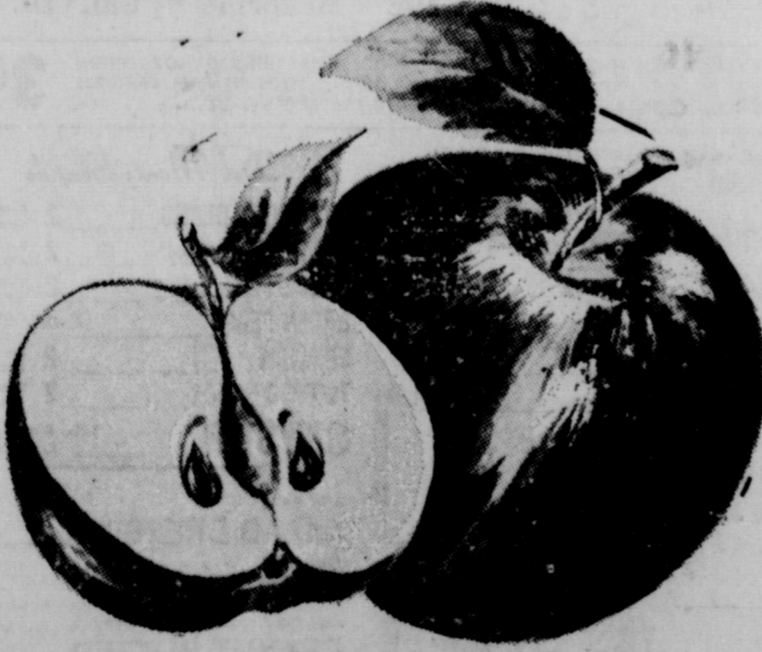

Accent on Health

AUSTIN — Know how many hunters there are in Texas? Imagine a city the size of Dallas and each resident a Nimrod, gun in hand, ready for the hunt. This is the picture.

To each hunter, fall has special significance. Dove season opened September 1 in north zones and October 1 in south zones. Deer and turkey seasons follow, opening November 16. During these months - September through December - statistics show a rise in accidental fire-arm deaths. In a year's time, a total of 184 persons die from accidents with guns.

Some hunters never live to enjoy the season. In the last three years, 38 died cleaning and handling guns, perhaps in anticipation of opening day. Twenty-four died transporting fire-arms into the field.

Theoretically, a gun is not dangerous itself. But in the hands of an inexperienced, unskilled person it becomes a deadly weapon.

Texans across the state recognize this problem and are doing something about it. Some local health units and National Rifleman Association instructors work at the grass-roots - teaching home gun safety to children.

This is an excellent step in the right direction but there is no substitute for individual practice of fire-arm safety, with the hunter consciously alert to the hazards of gun handling from the time he dresses for the first hunt until he stores his rifle at the end of the season.

Even his choice of hunting

clothes is a factor in safety a-field. Clothing ideally combines warmth, comfort and safety features. Red or yellow outer garments and caps help distinguish the hunter from wildlife.

Proper fire - arm care and cleaning are vitally important. A speck of rust or dirt in the delicate mechanism may trigger an unexpected discharge, barrel eruption or other mishaps.

Maneuvering barbed - wire fences poses less problem for the hunter if companion holds the gun. Otherwise, the rifle should be placed carefully on the ground while the hunter climbs through or over the fence.

The hunter who "thinks he sees a turkey" and shoots

pronounces a possible death sentence for some person.

Ideally, the sportsman returns home with bag-of-game in hand. Fatigued or not, his responsibilities aren't ended. Cleaning and storing the fire-arm away from the hands of children - ammunition is a separate place of course - completes the event.

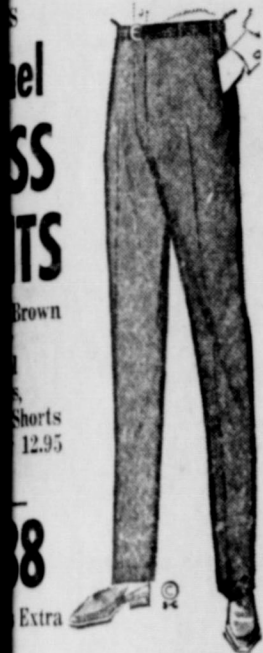

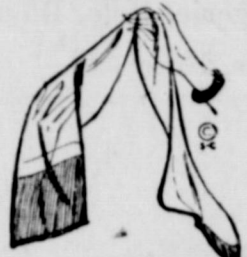

Historical Site Marking Project Ready For Roads

AUSTIN — The Texas Highway Commission has moved to establish a uniform system of marking historical sites under a program approved by the 58th State Legislature.

The Commission agreed that requests for placing markers should fulfill specific stipulations to coordinate work of the Texas Highway Department with planning of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

Stipulations approved by the Commission:

1. Sponsors are to submit a complete description of the proposed marker and the exact inscription.
2. After a marker request is received 90 days will be allowed for study before acceptance or rejection; another 90 days may elapse before selection and preparation of a site, if accepted.
3. No markers will honor living persons.
4. Previously marked sites will not be remarked.
5. Markers shall be furnished by the sponsors at no cost to the Texas Highway Department, and the Department will maintain the sites in keeping with the right of way in that area.
6. All marked sites must meet established standards for access and parking facilities.

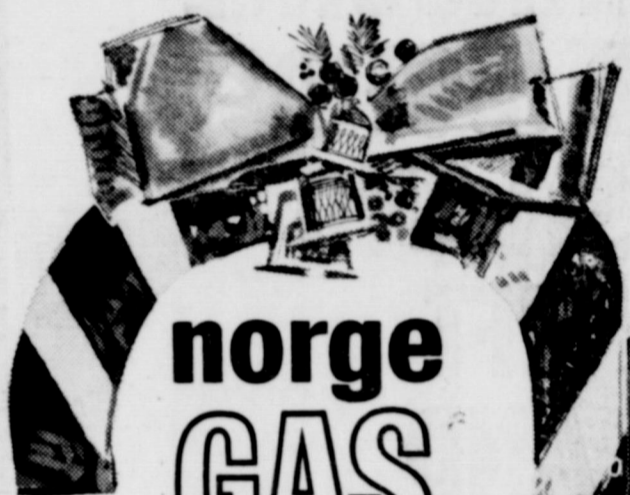

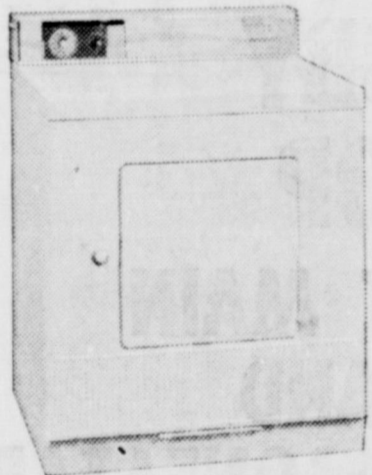

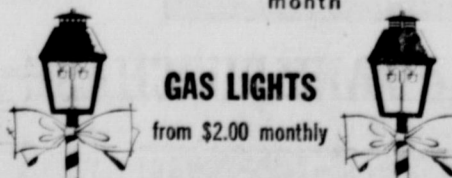

County Farmers To Vote On Cotton Crop

Eastland County farmers will be among others who will vote in the December 10 referendum on cotton marketing quotas according to Emmett Powell, office manager of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee.

All farmers who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1963 are eligible to vote in the referendum.

The basic program choices are: first, if at least two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approve of quotas, then the quotas will be in effect for the 1964 upland cotton crop. Also, marketing penalties will apply to any 'excess' cotton produced on a farm, and price support at a level within the range of 65 to 90 percent of parity will be available to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allotments.

If more than one-third of the growers who vote oppose the quotas, then there will be no quotas and no penalties applicable to the 1964 upland cotton crop. Then price support to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allotments will be available at 50 percent of parity, as directed by law.

Allotments are not affected by the outcome of the balloting. They will remain in effect, whether or not quotas are approved, as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support.

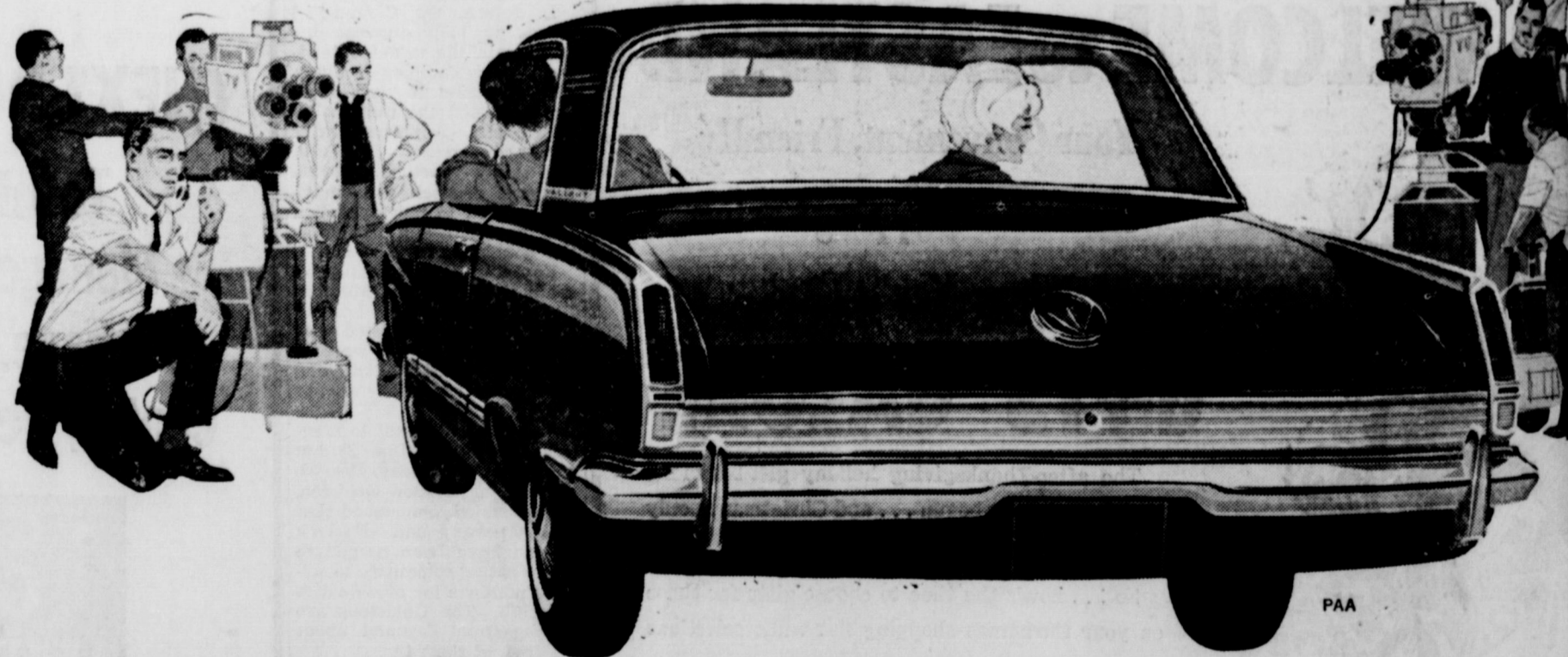

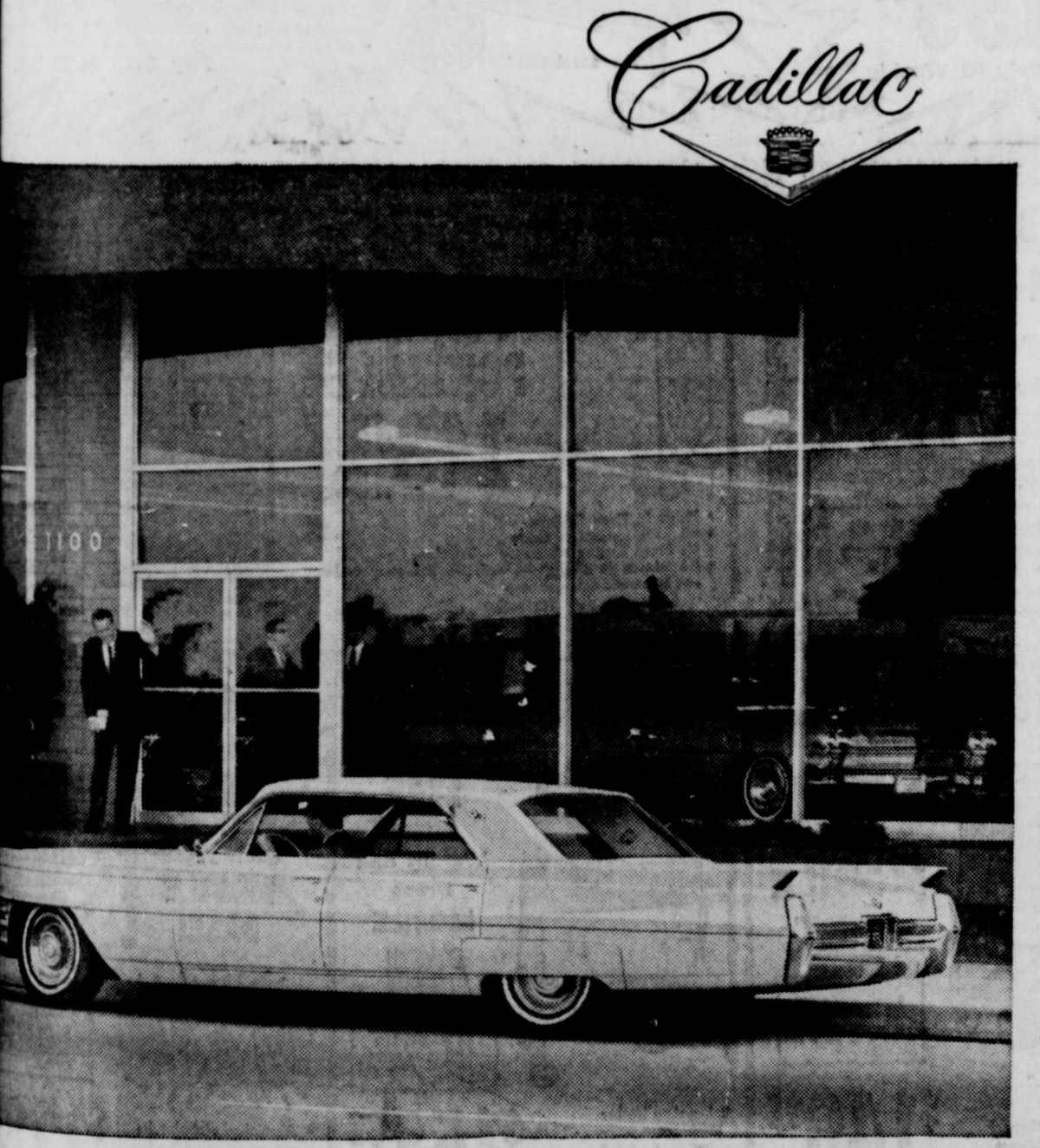
