



## **Two Deer Is** Legal Limit, Warden Says

"Two" is the legal deen limit in Eastland County, and only "one" of these can be a doe, according to Game Warden Maurice Dry.

A hunter may legally kill two bucks, or one buck and one doe, Dry said. Some question had arisen

from the issuance of "bonus" doe permits. These are good, Dry said, only in counties under the jurisdiction of the State Game and Fish Com mission where surplus doe have been declared. Eastland and Fish Commission jurisdicbe used only in adjoining counties which are Commission controlled. Deer season ends in East

### Mrs. Perkins Reviews Book for Hall. To Vote On Ft. Worth Club **Cotton Crop**

Eastland County farmers will be among others who will vote in the December 10 re-

ferendum on cotton marketing quotas according to Emmett Powell, office manager of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee.

All farmers who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1963 are eligible to vote in the referendum.

The basic program choices are: first, if at least twothirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approve of quotas, then the quotas will be in effect for the 1964 upland cotton crop. Also, marketing penalties will apply to any 'excess' cotton produced on a farm, and price support at a level within the range of 65 to 90 percent of parity will be available to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allotments.

If more than one-third of the growers who vote oppose the quotas, then there will be no quotas and no penalties appliacable to the 1964 upland cotton crop. Then price support to farmers who comply with their farm acreage allot. ments will be available at 50 percent of parity, as directed by law. Allotments are not affected

by the outcome of the balloting. They will remain in effect, whether or not quotas are approved, as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support.
