MANY IN Eastland are looking forward to hearing State Salvation Officer Dan Eddy as featured speaker for the Chamber Banquet Thursday evening. CALENDAR IN WORDS By Viola Payne

JANUARY: An ice storm has moved across the County, turning it into a fantasy land. A grove of post oaks, on the side of a hill, is coated with crystal. The sun strikes against the trees with dazzling impact, showering diamond-sharp points of light against the landscape.

FEBRUARY: A herd of cows, seeking shelter and food, has moved down into the wild-rye pastures along the river bottom. The bright contrast of a little green meadow against the drab pecan and underbrush catches the eye.

MARCH: A grove of wild plum, bursting with fragrance and shining with white bloom, stands etched against storm clouds moving in from the north. I would call this picture "Hope".

APRIL: What could be more appealing than a sloping meadow covered with bluebonnets, with rose-colored spikes of Western Paintbrush standing guard? A grove of oaks, decked in new glossy leaves, can frame the scene.

MAY: This is the month the Yucca blooms, and its soft candles taper above the red and yellow of cacti. I would put a border of mesquite around this picture, with its fresh, lacy leaves.

JUNE: The heat moves across the landscape, withering delicate vegetation. The cows come around the stock tanks to drink and graze. I would draw a picture of a round tank, perched half-way down a hill, with willows matting the dam. Cattle are resting in the shade, and wading into the shallow reaches of the water.

JULY: July should show a corn patch, with watermelons growing underneath in secret places. A realistic picture would include a racoon climb-

ing up one of the cornstalks, on his way to sample the first ripe ear.

AUGUST: I would draw a scene of a picture-book country church on a hilltop, like Pleasant Hill Baptist Church south of town. The time would be just before sundown, with a group of people going inside for a revival. I would have a cloud boiling high in the sky, and a streak of silver rain moving toward the church. I would call this picture: "The Latter Rain".

SEPTEMBER: A few people in the County still stand up feed in shocks. I would like to draw a picture of curving rows of shocks, golden against the green woods beyond.

OCTOBER: A pecan tree, loaded with ripening nuts, would be perfect for an October scene.

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — The Texas Senate resumed its long-delayed trial of the O. P. Carrillo impeachment case after taking steps to shorten the proceedings. In spite of warnings by their counsel, Leon Jaworski, senators voted to

accept the entire transcript of a Judicial Qualifications Commission removal hearing on Carrillo for use in the trial.

Attorneys estimated use of the JQC testimony and exhibits may shorten the Senate proceeding from the expected six weeks or more to three.

Meanwhile, the Judicial Qualifications Commission continued to move forward on its own course toward ousting the 229th district judge from office.

Carrillo's attorney, Arthur Mitchell of Austin, made clear he will try to show the impeachment effort was launched as the result of a political break between the Carrillo and George Parr factions in stormy Duval County last year.

Carrillo has been suspended from his court since last August when the House of Representatives voted articles of impeachment, but he continues to draw full pay.

Bentsen Starts
U. S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen began his re-election campaign with a two-day barnstorming tour which ranged from Houston to the Panhandle and from Dallas/Fort Worth to San Antonio.

Bentsen also campaigned in Austin, Lubbock, Amarillo, Abilene and Laredo.

Senate Inquiry
A new task force is investigating tangled state Senate financial affairs over a

five-year period. The inquiry is part of the independent investigation set in motion by Atty. Gen. John Hill after indictment of Senate Secretary Charles Schnabel on charges of theft and misconduct. Senators voted last week to keep Schnabel, who has been their chief administrative officer for 20 years, on the job pending trial on the charges.

Lease Sales Set
The School Land Board has scheduled oil, gas and sulphur lease sales February 3, June 1 and October 5 to encourage domestic exploration and development.

Total bonuses received from three oil and gas lease sales last year came to more than \$11.8 million.

Primary areas of interest in the 1976 sales are the lower Laguna Madre and the central coastal region near Matagorda Island. The latter has been restricted to development because of activities on the now-abandoned U. S. Air Force Base and bombing range.

Hearings Begin
The Railroad Commission will start a series of hearings February 3 in Austin and Dallas which could have significant impact on shippers of packages weighing from 100 to 350 pounds. Nine carriers seek to show present service is inadequate. More than two dozen carriers already operating protest the applications.

Courts Speak
The Texas Supreme Court refused to grant Texaco Inc.'s application for writ of error in a case that could have cost the state \$30.8 million in franchise tax revenues. The decision again upheld constitutionality of the state's method of collecting franchise taxes from multi-national corporations.

In another case, the high court affirmed a \$134,156 judgement against Texaco, favoring a Sweetwater man hurt when oilfield equipment fell on him in a warehouse.

Court of Criminal Appeals reversed a Hillsboro murder case because a divorce petition filed by the slain woman was read to the jury by a prosecutor.

AG Opinions
Salaries of state employees and officers may not be supplemented unless the source of the supplement is reported to the Secretary of State, Attorney General Hill held. Comptroller Bob Bullock said, on the basis of the new opinion, he will issue no state warrant to personnel receiving supplements from unidentified sources.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded: Examinations given by the Merit System Council to prospective employees are confidential by law and excepted from the Open Records Act.

Appointments
Gov. Dolph Briscoe reappointed William B. Blake-more II of Midland to the Public Safety Commission for a six-year term. Ray D. Payne will head the new Texas Railroad Commission surface mining and reclamation division.

Gerald P. Coley of Houston was appointed chairman of a special State Bar committee to study the American Bar Association proposal to relax restrictions on lawyer's advertising.

Short Snorts
The state's unemployment rate dropped near the end of the year to six per cent. National rate was 7.8 per cent. Domestic oil and gas men drilled more wells last year than anytime since 1966. The new Texas Register publication of agency orders, rules and meeting notices began rolling off the presses this month. It sells

for \$25 a year and is put out by the Secretary of State. The Texas Ranger Hall of Fame will be dedicated in Waco February 6-7. Texas farms and ranches will decline by 2,000 — a loss of one per cent — in 1976. There are now 207,000. U. S. Sen. John Tower is spending 10 days in the state and has scheduled visits in a dozen cities. The New Year's holiday was one of the safest on record, but 26 were killed in 22 accidents.

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Alston Central Texas Agronomist

COLLEGE STATION, Dr. George D. Alston has assumed the position of area agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service for the Central Texas area.

Alston will be headquartered at the Extension District 8 office in Stephenville and will serve an 18-county area. He fills the position formerly held by Jr. John Chapin who died in a drowning accident last summer. Alston had been serving as area agronomist for the Extension Service for a 38-county area in East Texas since 1968.

"We are proud of the outstanding work that Dr. Alston has done in conducting educational programs related to field and forage crops in East Texas, and we know he will continue to carry on effective programs in his new area of responsibility," said Dr. John E. Hutchison, state Extension Service director, in announcing the appointment.

"Dr. Alston will be working closely with county Extension agents and county program building committees in the area in planning and implementing educational work designed to boost agricultural income in such key commodities as cotton and sorghum. There will also be increased emphasis on forages to boost cow-calf production in Central Texas," noted Hutchison.

The agronomist holds three degrees from Texas A and M University. He was a Distinguished Student and won the Soil Science Award from the National Soil Science Society in 1961.

Alston served as a student trainee with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service at Temple for five summers and was a graduate assistant in agronomy at Texas A and M while in graduate school.

He is a member of Sigma Xi and the American Society of Agronomy.

Alston is a native of Bell County. He and his wife, Patsy, will reside in Stephenville.

Bullock Offers Wats Line

AUSTIN--Comptroller Bob Bullock said his office began operation Tuesday of a toll-free WATS line to answer general taxpayer questions.

He said the number is 1-800-292-9687.

"Information is like oil to the machinery of business or government," Bullock said. "Without it we just can't run as well."

The Comptroller said his office deals directly with more than half a million taxpayers, nearly all of whom have a question from time to time.

"If they don't get an answer," Bullock said, "they might make a mistake on their return. That will cost them and us money to correct."

He added that every person in the state, "even a kid buying a 15cent candy bar," deals indirectly with his office by paying the state sales tax and is equally entitled to answers about taxes.

Bullock said the toll-free line will be in operation from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, with extensions in each taxing division, as well as in the legal division and tax information office.

Taxpayers with specific questions on matters already being negotiated with the Comptroller's Office should contact the persons with whom they have been dealing directly, he said. Bullock said many taxpayer questions can best be answered by contacting the local district office, listed under "Texas, State of..." Comptroller of Public Accounts" in the telephone directory.

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

Oil News

An Eastland County wildcat drilled three miles southeast of Eastland has been completed as a Duffer discovery.

It is Southeastern Resources Corp. of Rising Star No. 1 Collins Estate. Site is 467 feet from the north and 610 feet from the east lines of A.M. Bearden Survey.

Daily potential was 77 barrels of 42 gravity oil, plus 10 barrels of water. Flow was through an 8 - 64 - inch choke with 110 pounds tubing pressure.

The well is producing from perforations at 3,454 - 60 feet, treated with 500 gallons of acid.

The pay was fractured with 170 sacks of sand.

Operator set the 4 1/2 inch casing at 3,720 feet. Total depth was 3,721 feet, and plugged back to 3,684 feet.

Gas - oil ratio was too small to measure.

Ausanka Oil Operations of Wichita Falls will drill No. 3 - A J.J. Hawkins as a proposed 1,600 foot wildcat five miles southeast of Ranger.

Location is on a 2,630 acre lease, spotting 6,050 feet from the south and 4,550 feet from the east lines of Spires and Dooley Survey, A - 77.

Site is 100 feet west of No. 1 Hawkins, to be completed at 3,440 feet.

L and L Producing Co., Wichita Falls, will drill No. 3 G.R. Langford in the regular field 12 miles north of Ranger.

The planned 4,000 foot venture is located on a 160 acre lease.

It spots 467 feet from the north and west lines of the northeast quarter of Section 62, Block 6, T&P Survey.

Harvest Inventory For 1976

COLLEGE STATION - - Although the frost is barely on the pumpkin, it's not too early to begin planning for next season's home gardening and food preservation, Marilyn Haggard, a foods and nutrition specialist, says.

"Your cupboard and freezer can tell how wisely you planned last year. A surplus of some items - - but a short supply of others - - can be avoided with a little advance planning before planting or buying fruits and vegetables for preservation," she said.

Miss Haggard is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System. She advised planting enough vegetables enjoyed by the family for eating during the growing season and to preserve for use through the rest of the year.

"If you have a surplus of vegetables, try bargaining with neighbors or friends to obtain. And remember to use all of last year's foods before using newly preserved foods", the specialist said.

Take inventory of canning and freezing equipment and containers. Now is the time to have the pressure canner

gauge checked before the green beans are ripe and ready to be canned, she said.

"Make sure that jar rings are staying dry and are stored to prevent bending and denting. Check supplies of replacement lids and buy only enough for one year's needs.

"Inventory your freezer to keep the stock rotated. This is easy if packages are labeled with the name and type of product and the date put up," she said.

Briscoe Asks CPB Committees To Help Make Texas "No. 1"

COLLEGE STATION - - Gov. Dolph Briscoe has challenged County Program Building Committees in each Texas county to move ahead vigorously in 1976 toward the state's goal of making Texas No. 1 in agricultural income.

In a letter to County Program Building Committee chairmen, the Governor stated: "As our Nation begins its Bicentennial observance, Texans can look back on a proud heritage of accomplishments. No industry has contributed more to the pride we have in our heritage than agriculture. Progress resulting from the dedicated efforts of our citizens in the past indicates that we can move forward with confidence into Century III."

In 1973, Briscoe declared that one of the highest objectives of his administration was to make Texas No. 1 among the states of the Nation in agricultural income.

"It is my conviction that Texans have the resources, the energy, and the managerial ability to achieve first place in both gross and net income from agricultural production. Achievement of this goal has important economic and humanitarian implications for our State, Nation and the World," the Governor said.

Continuing, Briscoe pointed out that based on current income trends, Texas producers will need to earn \$9.1 billion in annual cash receipts to become No. 1 by 1980. This would have an impact of more than \$30 billion on the State's economy, the Governor emphasized.

Established trends indicate that, barring droughts or other disasters, the goal of making Texas No. 1 is within our reach, Briscoe said.

Agricultural income in Texas increased from \$2.68 billion in 1968 to \$5.8 billion in 1974. When all receipts are in for 1975, Texas farmers and ranchers are expected to market products totaling nearly \$6 billion.

"There is, of course, no advantage in being No. 1 in gross income unless our producers are also No. 1 in profitability. Our concern for sound agricultural policy and for successful marketing systems must be in accord with our productive capacity," Briscoe noted.

He stressed that cooperation and coordination among all segments of the State's agricultural industry are essential to success.

"I consider the County Program Building Committee in each county best represents the leadership, experience, and knowledge required to establish challenging but obtainable goals required for success. It is my hope that your County Program Building

Committee - - including each of the economically important commodity committees - - will give this goal priority consideration in 1976," the Governor said.

"I am certain that the staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and all other professional agricultural agency representatives will respond to any requests made by County Program Building Committee chairmen. Together, we can achieve this goal which has so great a potential," Briscoe concluded.

The Extension Service, under the leadership of Dr. John E. Hutchison, director, has joined in the intensive effort to help Texas reach this important goal. "On our way to No. 1" is an effort to promote development of the full potential of the State's agricultural industry, and County Program Building Committees can establish priority programs for reaching this goal," said Hutchison.
