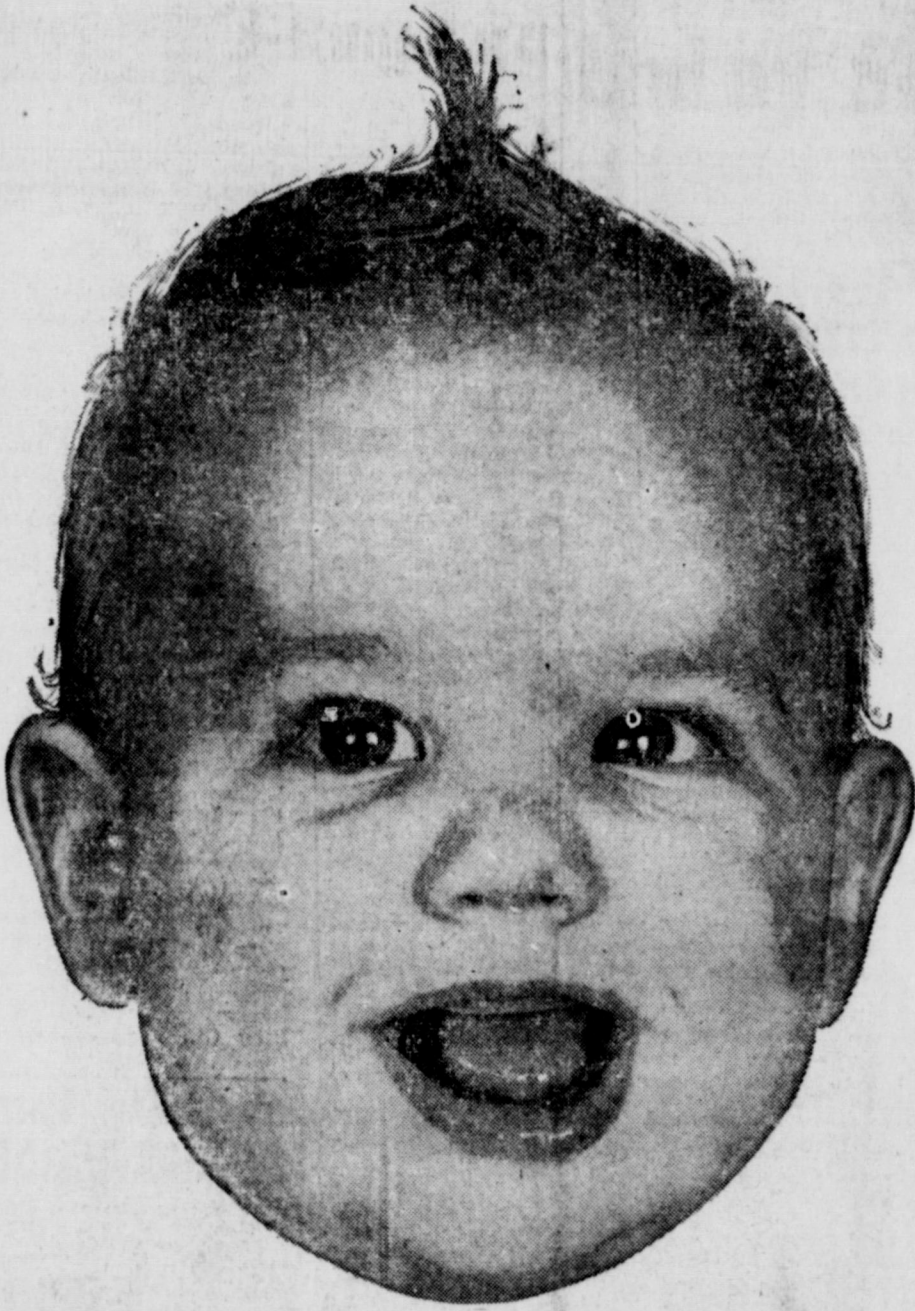
A \$32,937 damage suit naming a Rising Star physician and the Rising Star hospital has reportedly been settled and will not be brought to trial as scheduled.

Browsing With Bev

Peanuts are so delicious! Peanuts have been on everyone's mind since the Peanut Bowl festivities, so I thought I would give you some ideas and recipes using peanuts. Peanuts are no longer considered as only "nibble bait." They can be used many ways at meal-time as well as for snacks. They add crunchiness to any dish and make company fare. Peanuts are rich in the B vitamins needed for steady nerves, pep and energy. Their high quality and quantity of protein rates them high as a meat alternate.

TOASTED PEANUTS
Put a small amount of oil into a shallow pan, pour in the peanuts and stir them until they are well coated. There should be no excess oil in pan, just enough to give an oily surface to each nut. Set the pan in oven and stir often until they become light brown. Drain off a platter and sprinkle with salt.

FRENCH FRIED PEANUTS
Heat your deep fryer to 375 degrees and put your peanuts in hot oil. In four minutes take peanuts out of boiling oil and drain on paper toweling. Spread peanuts on a platter and sprinkle with salt.

PEANUT CLUSTERS
1/4 lb. sweet chocolate
1/2 cup condensed milk
1 cup unsalted peanuts
Melt chocolate, stir in milk and peanuts, stirring until thick. Drop by spoonful.

STUFFED BANANA SALAD
2 large or 4 small bananas
1/4 cup peanut butter
2 tablespoons chopped raisins
Mayonnaise
Lemon juice
Chopped salted peanuts
Peel and split bananas

lengthwise. Fill sandwich fashion with peanut butter and raisins which have been mixed together. Roll in mayonnaise that has been thinned with lemon juice, then put in chopped salted peanuts. Serve a half or whole banana on lettuce. Garnish with a red cherry or strawberry.

GOD'S WORD
AND MAN'S EXPERIENCE

For some people, one of the most difficult things to do is to distinguish their own experience of God from God Himself in their own experience. The religion of many is based on their own feelings or thoughts about God, rather than on the revelation of God which confronts these human feelings and thoughts. In no way must God's Spirit be confused with our own spirit.

How can one distinguish God's thoughts from one's own?

This can be done only by keeping central God's revelation to man in Jesus Christ, and constantly holding up this fact before one's attention and concern. And, along with this, to grow toward maturity in an increasing understanding of the Holy Scriptures, which constitute the chief witness to Christ, Who Himself is God's Living Word.

It is easy to use the Bible in such a way that we suppose ourselves to be its masters, rather than to use the Bible as a channel of God's Word to us—when He chooses to speak. We suppose ourselves to be the infallible interpreters as to what the Bible says. This leads to human pride of opinion, which is one of the worst of sins. Rather we should read and study the human words of the Bible, ever listening for what God might have to say to us. God's Spirit doesn't automatically sneak His Word, as we read the words of the Bible. He is not bound by the written word, or by any act-

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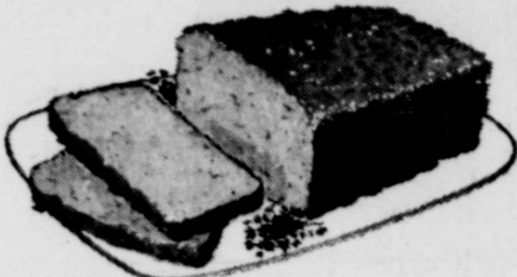
