



Musical Sites To Be Cited

Sites that have been associated with significant music events or individuals during the nation's 200-year history will be designated as landmarks and permanently marked during 1976, it was announced by the National Music Council. The project, funded by Exxon, is part of the Bicentennial Parade of American Music, also sponsored by the NMC


'Locations chosen may be associated with musical events r prominent musical persons" cording to Don C. Robinson of Atlanta, Ga., chairman of the Music Educators National Conference Bicentennial Commission, which is administering the program. "Each state has its own screening committee, ap-pointed by the Council's 60nember organizations, which has nominated the places to be cited." Robinson explained. Following approval of the candidates by the National

Committee, a bronze plaque commemorating the musical landmark will be installed at each site with appropriate ceremonies. Final selections are to be announced shortly after

January 1, 1976. Although over 300 sites have been suggested, he said, only those that are significant to our broad musical heritage will be officially recognized -- not to exceed 200. "We believe the establishment of these musical landmarks, preserving for posterity a record of two centuries of musical development, will be one of the most important events of the Bicentennial

celebration," he added. Another part of the Bicen tennial Parade of American Music is a series of 52 free concerts at Washington's Kennedy Center, extending over a 20-month period, that is administered by the National






Federation of Music Clubs.

Snow And Ice Makes For

Many persons think they can easily cope with winter. But unexpected problems from car wrecks to frostbite abound, says the Texas Medical Association. Highway accidents always jump dramatically when snow or ice settles in. One of the most dangerous road conditions is glaze ice, a glass-slick ice layer almost undectectable until you start sliding. Pumping the brake pedal often can cut down on slides. Some persons put extra weight in their trunks to aid traction. But, if you absolutely have to travel, probably the best way to avoid wrecks is to think slow in the snow. A slow trip is a lot speedier than standing around waiting for the authorities to investigate an accident.

Pushing a vehicle out of snow also can be very dangerous. The exertion can cause muscle strains and even heart attack. especially in middle age men who are overweight and don't get much exercise. Sometimes a stuck car's exhause pipe will become clogged with snow. Then carbon monoxide can get into the passenger compartment and cause illness or death. Snow shoveling, although necessary to cut down on falls, can be another unexpected exertion, especially if it is done hurriedly. Again, overweight, middle agers are prime targets for trouble. But at the right pace, snow shoveling can be good exercise for many persons. One of the most serious dangers of winter is frostbite. Wind plays an important part in causing frostbite. Air moving at 45 miles per hour in 20 degree weather has the same chill factor as 40-below zero air on a still day One of the dangers of frostbite is that you often don't feel it. First thing you know is that someone else notices that your nose or ear is turning white. The frozen part becomes hard to the touch and loses feeling. Many sports leaders advocate a buddy system for outdoor winter sports; two persons are paired off, each watching the other for signs of frostbite. To prevent frostbite, first be certain that you are properly dressed for the temperature. Avoid over-exertion and excessive perspiration. Avoid contact of bare flesh with cold metal. Don't smoke or drink alcohol. In first aid for frostbite. forget the old "remedy" about rubbing the affected part with snow, and also forget the completely invalid caution against rapid thawing. Also, don't massage or rub the frozen part. Don't touch it at all. Begin rewarming as soon as possible. A hot bath is excellent but avoid scalding. Hot wet towels will help. changed frequently and applied gently. If no fire or hot water is at hand, place the patient in a sleeping bag. or cover with coats and blankets. Hot liquids help raise body temperatures. For any frostbite. even a mild case, prompt medical attention is important. The depth and degree of the frozen tissue cannot be readily ascertained. and the treatment will vary with the severity of the injury. The Texas Medical Association says most cases of frostbite can be avoided if you dress properly and use common sense about exposure in severe cold.

Service (IRS) taxpayer returns for 1975 include questions on residence intended to provide an accurate basis for equitable distribution of general revenue sharing funds, according to the office of Revenue Sharing (ORS) of the U.S. Treasury Department Such funds are returned by

the Federal government to State and local general purpose governments under terms of Federal revenue sharing law. The amount each government receives is based, in part, on population and per capital income estimates made by the Bureau of the Census, U.S.

Department of Commerce. The new questions on the income tax form are designed to identify the taxpayer's legal residence, which may differ from his or her mailing address. Authority to ask the new questions is provided in Section 6017A of the Internal Revenue Code

The information from the residence questions will be used by the Bureau of the Census to

Individual Internal Revenue make biennial population and per capital income estimates needed to insure that States and communities receive the amounts of general revenue sharing funds to which they are entitled. For this reason, all taxpayers are urged to provide the information as an assistance to their States and communities. The Internal Revenue Code authorizes a fine to be imposed for failure to provide the residence data, unless reasonable cause is shown for such failure.

Information provided to the Census Bureau, under law, can be published as statistical totals only, and no information about a person or individual firm may be disclosed to any person. institution, or government agency. This iaw of confidentiality under which the Bureau operates applies also to the residence data to be collected on IRS returns.

The new questions are labeled A. B. C. and D. and the wording of each follows: Question A -- in what city, town, village, etc., do you live?


