Following service in Navy during World War II, he became associated with the U.S.O. and served as Director of the U.S.O. Clubs in Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana, from 1944 to 1947.

World renown portrait artist Dmitri Vail painted a \$5,000 portrait in appreciation for his widespread civic contributions. The oil painting hangs in Dmitri Vail's "Celebrity Gallery" in Dallas.

An Honorary Life Membership in the Dallas Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1966 was his remuneration for many years of counseling and guidance to the second oldest Jaycee organization in the world. (The second man ever so honored in their 50 year history).

Dallas City Council appointed him chairman of the first Dallas Motion Picture Classification Board. (1,117 movies were classified in 1966).

In July, 1967, he was selected "Man of the Month" by the East Texas Chamber of Commerce.

He is a former director of the Champions Life Insurance Company of Dallas.

In July, 1967, he was selected as the first Honorary Life Member in the history of the Polk County Chamber of Commerce in Livingston, Texas.

He was given an Honorary Life Membership in the Greater East and South Dallas Chamber of Commerce in October, 1967.

Lasso Club of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce honored him with a "Top Hand Award" for exceptional service from 1958 to 1968.

Governor John Connally appointed him a Commissioner of the nine-member Good Neighbor Commission of Texas in 1968.

Represented the Governor of Texas and the Good Neighbor Commission of Texas on an East Texas Chamber of Commerce World Trade Mission to Central and South America in 1969.

In constant demand as a speaker, he has addressed more than 2,000 local, regional, state and national groups and organizations.

Successful new lines for Vassarette are increasing the need for more employees at the Eastland plant, Manager Gene Johnson reports.

"We made some of the samples before the holidays on a test basis", he says, "and came back from the holidays to find that the new lines are selling so fast that we've got to increase production to keep up."

No experience is necessary, he says, and the Eastland plant needs sewing machine operators. Vassarette is an equal opportunity employer, with starting rate at \$2.30 per hour; \$2.40 per hour after nine weeks training; and \$2.50 per hour after six months, and employees can earn more on piece rate incentive system.

The company offers nine paid holidays, a company retirement plan, hospitalization and life insurance benefits, and two weeks paid vacation after three

years. Working hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. with other company benefits.

## Musical Sites To Be Cited

Sites that have been associated with significant music events or individuals during the nation's 200-year history will be designated as landmarks and permanently marked during 1976, it was announced by the National Music Council. The project, funded by Exxon, is part of the Bicentennial Parade of American Music, also sponsored by the NMC.

"Locations chosen may be associated with musical events or prominent musical persons", according to Don C. Robinson of Atlanta, Ga., chairman of the Music Educators National Conference Bicentennial Commission, which is administering the program. "Each state has its own screening committee, appointed by the Council's 60-member organizations, which has nominated the places to be cited," Robinson explained.

Following approval of the candidates by the National Committee, a bronze plaque commemorating the musical landmark will be installed at each site with appropriate ceremonies. Final selections are to be announced shortly after January 1, 1976.

Although over 300 sites have been suggested, he said, only those that are significant to our broad musical heritage will be officially recognized—not to exceed 200. "We believe the establishment of these musical landmarks, preserving for posterity a record of two centuries of musical development, will be one of the most important events of the Bicentennial celebration," he added.

Another part of the Bicentennial Parade of American Music is a series of 52 free concerts at Washington's Kennedy Center, extending over a 20-month period, that is administered by the National

Federation of Music Clubs. Programs saluting the musical contributions of each state are held in conjunction with the "State Day" celebrations organized by the Washington, D.C. Mayor's Office of Bicentennial Programming. The project is underwritten by a \$200,000 grant from Exxon, \$50,000 of which is earmarked for the historic plaques.

Dr. Merle Montgomery, NMC president, is the national coordinator for this 200-year survey of American music. "America has a right to be proud of its musical heritage," Dr. Montgomery pointed out. "As we observe our Bicentennial, it is altogether fitting that the musical pioneers who gave us our vital music background be recognized and honored by the performance of their works, and that the places where those no longer with us lived or worked should be marked in an appropriate manner."

In addition to Mr. Robinson, members of the Plaque Committee are: Leonard Feist, National Music Publishers' Association; Dr. Montgomery; James Roy Jr., Broadcast Music, Inc.; William R. Coyle, National Association of Music Merchants, Inc.; and C. Edward Thomas of the Afro-American Music Opportunities Association, Inc.

And then it was over: This is the phrase which I find myself saying over and over again. There were so many things that I wanted to do, but never got around to doing, and then it was over.

Well, it isn't over, yet. Just because the Christmas tree is now on its way to the garbage doesn't mean we can't still pretend the holiday foods aren't in the menu. The December budget has been blown for several weeks around our house and we still have a week to complete the damage. I have always wanted to make a "snow man cake" for the kids. Every year I let my time get away from me and the cake for the kids never gets done. Since West Texas has a way of forgetting our "White Christmas", the kids need something to remind them that some people do have snow at Christmas time.

Today we will make a snowman cake for the kids. There are many people who don't believe anything from a mix or a box is worth eating. This cook believes anything that makes life easier is "worth a try". You begin your snowman cake with a cake mix. Shame! Any brand cake mix or any flavor of mix is appropriate. Mix according to directions and pour batter into two 9" cake pans and one 6" cake pan. Bake according to directions.

When the cake is cooled, cover a large piece of cardboard (approximately 12" x 30") with aluminum foil. Place the two larger cakes side by side to form the body of the snowman. Place the smaller cake at either end to form the head of the snowman. Use the following frosting mix and cover all three cakes generously with the icing.

**ICING**  
½ cup sugar  
2 Tbs. water  
¼ cup white Karo  
Bring mixture to a boil and continue boiling until mixture reaches a soft ball. Slowly pour mixture into Two beaten egg whites.

Continue beating mixture while adding syrup. Beat until icing forms a peak when the beaters are lifted. Add 1 tsp. vanilla for flavoring and begin frosting your cake.

To decorate the snowman after the icing is complete. Add a black construction paper hat. Use licorice sticks cut into small pieces for the eyes, nose, and buttons on the front of the snowman's make-believe cape. Use red cherries for his mouth and a long licorice stick for the customary broom. Let the kids invite the neighborhood children and their friends over to share their "snowman" cake. They will have a lot of fun just pretending they made him out of real snow.

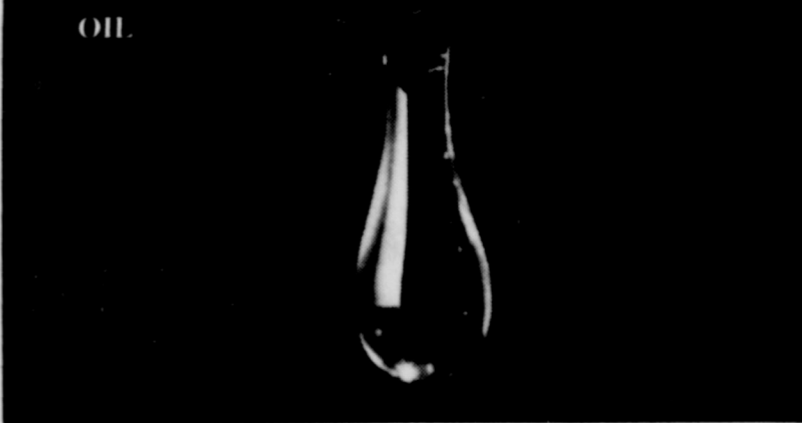
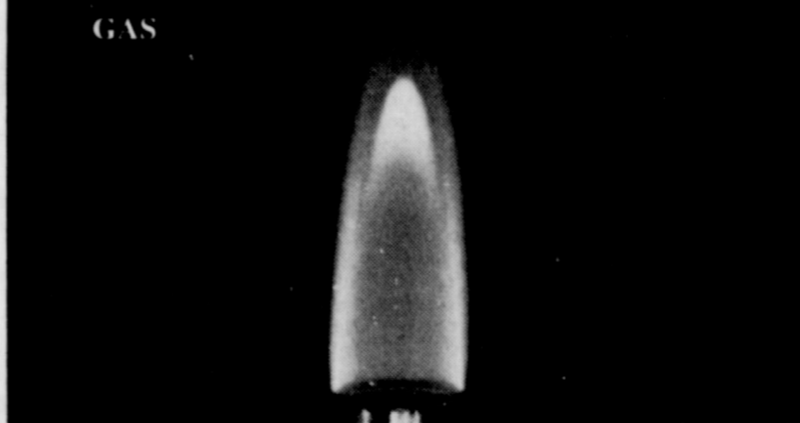

**Snow And Ice Makes For Bad Driving**

Many persons think they can easily cope with winter. But unexpected problems from car wrecks to frostbite abound, says the Texas Medical Association.

Highway accidents always jump dramatically when snow or ice settles in. One of the most dangerous road conditions is glaze ice, a glass-slick ice layer almost undetectable until you start sliding. Pumping the brake pedal often can cut down on slides. Some persons put extra weight in their trunks to aid traction. But, if you absolutely have to travel, probably the best way to avoid wrecks is to think slow in the snow. A slow trip is a lot speedier than standing around waiting for the authorities to investigate an accident.

Pushing a vehicle out of snow also can be very dangerous. The exertion can cause muscle strains and even heart attack, especially in middle age men who are overweight and don't get much exercise. Sometimes a stuck car's exhaust pipe will become clogged with snow. Then carbon monoxide can get into the passenger compartment and cause illness or death.

Snow shoveling, although necessary to cut down on falls, can be another unexpected exertion, especially if it is done hurriedly. Again, overweight, middle aged are prime targets for trouble. But at the right pace, snow shoveling can be good exercise for many persons.

One of the most serious dangers of winter is frostbite. Wind plays an important part in causing frostbite. Air moving at 45 miles per hour in 20 degree weather has the same chill factor as 40-below zero air on a still day.

One of the dangers of frostbite is that you often don't feel it. First thing you know is that someone else notices that your nose or ear is turning white. The frozen part becomes hard to the touch and loses feeling. Many sports leaders advocate a buddy system for outdoor winter sports: two persons are paired off, each watching the other for signs of frostbite.

To prevent frostbite, first be certain that you are properly dressed for the temperature. Avoid over-exertion and excessive perspiration. Avoid contact of bare flesh with cold metal. Don't smoke or drink alcohol.

In first aid for frostbite, forget the old "remedy" about rubbing the affected part with snow, and also forget the completely invalid caution - against rapid thawing. Also, don't massage or rub the frozen part. Don't touch it at all.

Begin rewarming as soon as possible. A hot bath is excellent but avoid scalding. Hot wet towels will help, changed frequently and applied gently. If no fire or hot water is at hand, place the patient in a sleeping bag, or cover with coats and blankets. Hot liquids help raise body temperatures. For any frostbite, even a mild case, prompt medical attention is important. The depth and degree of the frozen tissue cannot be readily ascertained, and the treatment will vary with the severity of the injury.

The Texas Medical Association says most cases of frostbite can be avoided if you dress properly and use common sense about exposure in severe cold.

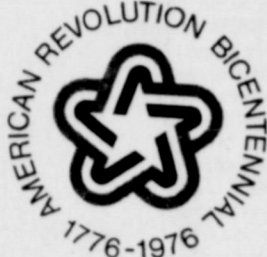

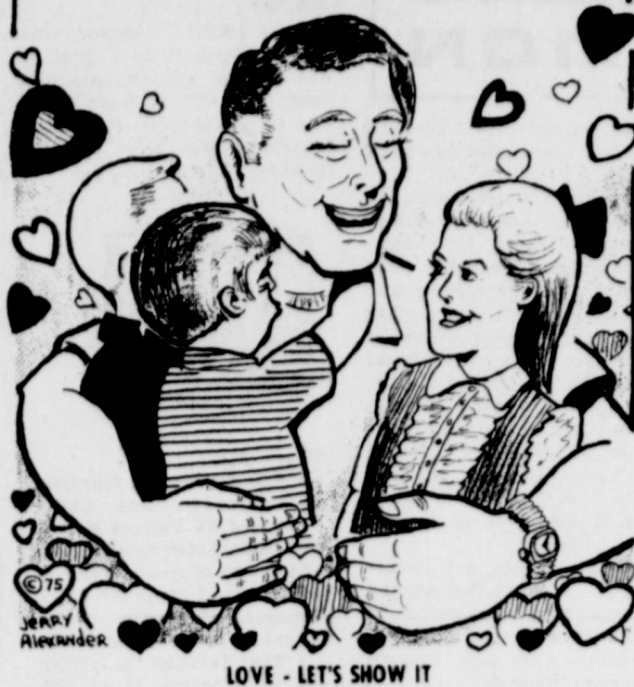

### Individuals I.R.S. Questions Intended To Provide Accurate Basis

Individual Internal Revenue Service (IRS) taxpayer returns for 1975 include questions on residence intended to provide an accurate basis for equitable distribution of general revenue sharing funds, according to the office of Revenue Sharing (ORS) of the U.S. Treasury Department.

Such funds are returned by the Federal government to State and local general purpose governments under terms of Federal revenue sharing law. The amount each government receives is based, in part, on population and per capita income estimates made by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce.

The new questions on the income tax form are designed to identify the taxpayer's legal residence, which may differ from his or her mailing address. Authority to ask the new questions is provided in Section 6017A of the Internal Revenue Code.

The information from the residence questions will be used by the Bureau of the Census to

make biennial population and per capita income estimates needed to insure that States and communities receive the amounts of general revenue sharing funds to which they are entitled. For this reason, all taxpayers are urged to provide the information as an assistance to their States and communities. The Internal Revenue Code authorizes a fine to be imposed for failure to provide the residence data, unless reasonable cause is shown for such failure.

Information provided to the Census Bureau, under law, can be published as statistical totals only, and no information about a person or individual firm may be disclosed to any person, institution, or government agency. This law of confidentiality under which the Bureau operates applies also to the residence data to be collected on IRS returns.

The new questions are labeled A, B, C, and D, and the wording of each follows:

Question A--in what city, town, village, etc., do you live?

Question B--Do you live within the legal limits of the city, town, etc.?

Question C--In what county and State do you live?

Question D--In what township do you live?

In regard to Questions A and B, directions on the form explain that every municipality has defined legal limits. If the area where you live is unincorporated, or is outside the legal limits of the place named in Question A, check "No" to Question B. If you are not sure whether you live within the legal limits, check "Don't Know" to Question B.

Question D, the form also explains, applies only to townships or equivalent areas in New England, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New Jersey, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Dakota and Wisconsin.

Taxpayers who have difficulty in answering the residence questions are instructed to seek assistance from their local government officials or to write the Bureau of the Census, Residence Question, Washington, D.C. 20233, or to call collect at 812-948-2111 between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. (E.S.T.) Monday through Friday.

Crime-related public and private spending exceeds \$24 billion per year, or approximately \$1,000 per year for every man, woman and child in the United States.

From 1968-1974 crimes of violence increased almost half (47%) and crimes against property have increased more than 28%.

Losses from burglaries totaled \$856 million in 1973. This

figure represents a 31% jump since 1968. Large population areas report almost 2,000 burglaries per 100,000 people (population areas over 250,000); suburban rates are 1,054 per 100,000; rural rates, 564 burglaries per 100,000.

The incidence of forcible rape has risen 62% (nearly 1/2) during the period 1968-1974. Over 51,000 rapes were reported last year. Fifty-eight major

cities experienced a forcible rape rate of one per every 1,000 women.

The FBI estimated that the number of serious crimes committed in the U.S. numbered about 3,400,000 in 1960. In 1974, this figure jumped to over 10,000,000. Even more disturbing is that officially reported crimes represent fewer than half of the crimes actually committed in a given period.

Rural areas experienced a greater increase in crime than urban areas over the past two years. From 1972-1974 crime rates in suburban areas rose nearly 20%.

Juvenile crimes are increasing seven times faster than adult crimes. Seventy percent of all funds spent on juvenile corrections now goes towards supporting juvenile institutions

rather than juvenile probation. Aggravated assaults in the U.S. have risen 47% since 1968. Reported assaults now total 400,000 a year.

From 1968-1973, motor vehicle theft rose 19 to a total of almost one million cars per year. Over 42% of these thefts can be attributed to owners leaving their keys in the ignition.



Dear Editor:

I read the article in your Dec. 18 morning issue titled "Eastland TV Viewers Mad at FCC Rule Enforcement." This article was of great interest to me because I am in the CATV business and because, in this case, I am personally involved.

I have hesitated in writing this letter because of my personal involvement. However, since I've seen no other articles on the subject of Eastland petitioning Abilene merchants to try to get KRBC to relax its demand for non-duplication protection, I would like to take this opportunity to explain to the people of Abilene why such a move as circulating a petition came about, and to correct a statement made by Mr. Terry in the above mentioned article.

First, let me comment on Mr. Terry's statement. He said that the problem "is between the FCC and the Eastland cable company." I do not understand what Mr. Terry meant by this because, as he well knows, the only time the FCC enforces this law is upon request by a television station. The FCC certainly does not care how many stations a CATV company carries over its system. The rule was written because some television broadcasters felt that a cable company could hurt them economically by importing distant signal into their otherwise "exclusive" area. This has never been proven to be true.

Now, as to why the petition. I have been dealing with Mr. Terry on this business of non-duplication for quite some time. Let me say right now that he has always been polite and courteous with me and I have probably dealt him more headaches than he has me. However, he and I are at opposite ends of the pole on this subject and we as a cable company have made several attempts to appease him short of killing out KXAS Ch. 5 NBC programming.

First, we invited his engineers out to look at our pictures in order to show them that in nearly all cases KRBC was a much clearer picture than KXAS, therefore most people would watch NBC programs on Channel 9 KRBC engineers agreed with us on this point as did Mr. Terry. We explained that our reason for having KXAS on the cable is to back up channel 9 when we have weather problems from the west as well as to offer the non-duplicated programming on Channel 5 KXAS.

Secondly, I personally offered to carry KRBC on another of our systems in exchange for a "letting alone" in Eastland and Cisco. This would have given him an extra potential 3,000 viewers.

Thirdly, the Eastland Chamber of Commerce met with Mr. Terry and asked him to relax his demands.

Fourth, he was contacted by some individuals in this area via letter.

And finally, the Abilene Chamber of Commerce was contacted and asked to speak to Mr. Terry.

Each and every appeal was denied and/or sidestepped.

As a last resort a petition was drawn up by a private citizen and circulated. Over 2,300 people in this area signed the petition. Considering the size of this town I think someone should sit up and take notice.

I am of the opinion that it is not the losing of part of Channel 5's programming that has upset people so much. Eastland people are not so foolish or childish that losing a television station is going to hurt or upset them—that is not the problem. I rather think that people (not only here, but all over the country) are fed up with being told what they can and cannot do because of some asinine bureaucratic regulation; and certainly if we can be told what to do so can you.

I think we should all give due thought as to how much government we want in our lives. Here, on the eve of our Bicentennial celebration, we might remember that the battle cry of our revolutionary forefathers was "taxation without representation." I wonder what they would think if they could see it with representation?
