Postmaster Urges Early Mailing To Aid Delivery

The busiest person during the Christmas season won't be that jolly fellow from the North Pole — but the postman.

And he'll need your help to make sure every Christmas card and gift is delivered before Christmas Eve, says Postmaster Mrs. Marene Johnson.

Here are some things she says to watch for:

- 1—Be sure each address is complete with full name, Street and number, city, state and zone or ZIP code number.
- 2—Use sturdy materials in wrapping packages.
- 3—Buy postage stamps now.

She suggests using the 5-cent Christmas tree stamps on cards.

4—Get free labels from the Eastland postoffice which read "All for out-of-town Delivery" or "All for Local Delivery" so you can sort cards into two groups, with addresses facing all one way, insuring fast delivery.

5—Be sure your full name and address is on all Christmas card envelopes and shipping labels and be sure to include your ZIP code number in your return address.

Mrs. Johnson urges scheduling of Christmas mailings for distant points by Friday, Dec. 6, and local mailings as soon as possible — and not at the last minute!

Senior Girls To Compete In Scholarship Test

Eastland High School senior girls will join more than 460,000 others in over 13,000 schools across the country in the only national scholarship competition exclusively for girls.

Boys will be banned for fifty minutes, Tuesday, December 3, while the girls take this test. Desdemona High School of Desdemona is another of the area schools which will take the test.

The event is the written knowledge and attitude examination of the tenth anniversary Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Prizes range from attractive pins to scholarships totaling \$110,000.

For achieving the highest score in her school on the test, one senior girl in each school will be named that school's Homemaker of Tomorrow. She will receive an awarded pin, and her paper will be entered in competition with other school winners in the state. The highest-ranking girl in each state will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and her school will be awarded a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica by Encyclopedia Britannica, Inc. The state runner-up will be given a \$500 educational grant.

Next spring, State Betty Crocker Homemakers of Tomorrow, each accompanied by a school advisor, will make an expense-paid educational tour to Colonial Williamsburg, Va., Washington, D. C., and New York City. The trip will culminate with the naming of the 1964 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow on the basis of original test scores of state winners and personal observation and interviews during the tour. Her scholarship will be raised to \$5,000. Three awarded \$4,000, \$3,000, and \$2,000 scholarships respectively.

Local Law Officer Warns Against Holiday Swindlers

Be alert for swindlers during the busy holiday shopping season.

That's the warning of city and county law officers to merchants and businessmen. Especially, he said, be cautious in cashing checks.

The formal notice provision of the new Texas hot check law is aiding swindlers, the officer declared. After cashing a bad check, the writer can't be filed on for a period of 10 days.

The 10-day grace span is allowed after the signer of the spurious check has been notified by registered letter or telegram.

"This gives swindlers plenty of time to really get lost," the enforcement officers said Friday.

He re-emphasized a prior warning urging businessmen to be extremely wary in cashing checks for strangers without complete and proper identification.

Since having issued a similar warning several weeks ago officers said that area and local merchants and bus-

nessmen are continuing to be bilked out of a substantial total of cash each week.

They also suggested that businessmen note the license numbers of vehicles driven by strangers who cash checks.

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Browsing With Bev

Thanksgiving Day feasting in colonial times was subject to the luck of the year's farming, the current mood of the local Indians, and shipments from abroad.

Imagine the frustration of the good citizens in one Connecticut town when a cargo of molasses failed to appear in time for pumpkin pie making. Thanksgiving that year waited for the molasses.

Such a hitch could never develop in modern Thanksgiving Day plans. Today's foods are not only abundant and readily available, some are so instant you hardly dare turn your back on them. In fact, research in the U. S. Department of Agriculture and elsewhere has made holiday cooking in general a lot more convenient.

Consider the traditional Thanksgiving siring of both white potatoes and sweet potatoes. The potato flakes that currently are in wide use of mashed potatoes resulted from a USDA developed process. Now comes sweetpotato flakes, based on the same process and just getting started on the retail level in a few areas.

Carrying things a step further, USDA recently turned pure pumpkin puree into pumpkin powder with the same kind of equipment used to make potato flakes. The powder is a likely candidate for future use in restaurant and bakery pies and a good bet for retail pumpkin pie mixes.

The grand old bird itself is a far cry from the wild turkeys roasted for early Thanksgiving. Its greater tenderness has come about through breeding research and from research-developed processing refinements.

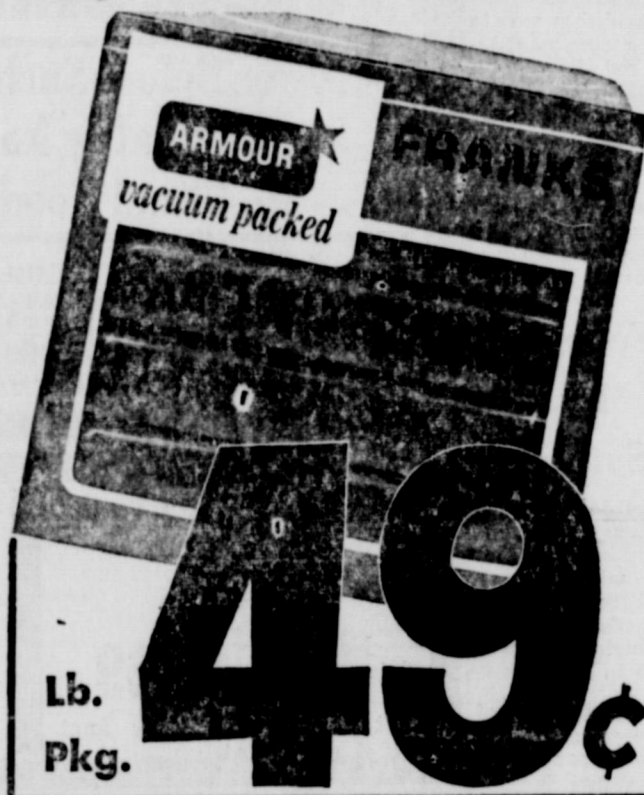

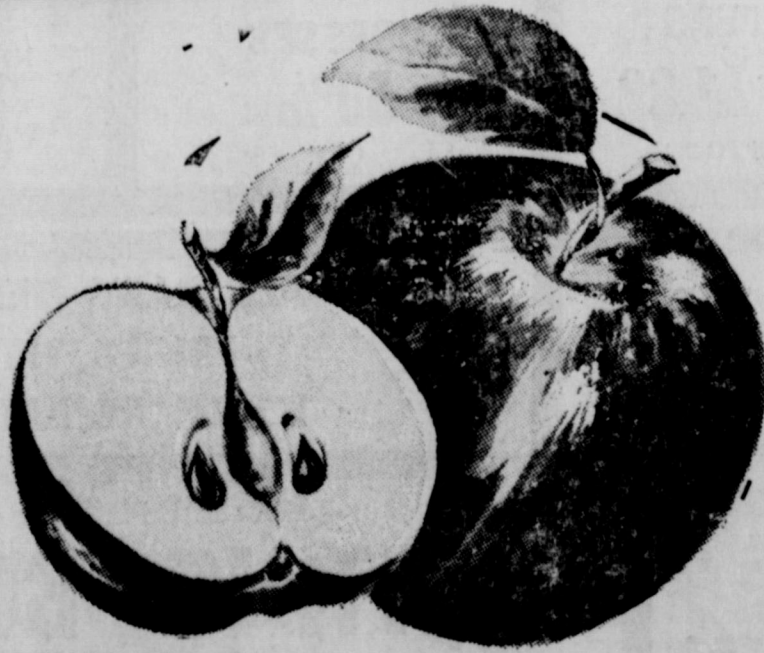
