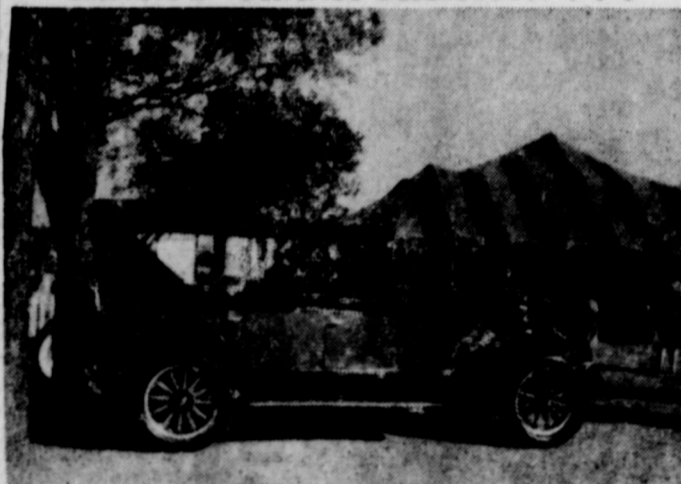

Bell Telephone Seeks Higher Ranger Rates

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has filed a request for higher rates in Ranger.

Bill Boothe, manager of the company, said that "Continued inadequate earnings on our operations here leave us no choice but to ask for an increase in local rates."

Present basic rates were established here in 1960, at the time dial telephones were placed in service. These rates were the result of a request filed in June, 1956, and were based on a study of operating results and economic conditions during 1955, the telephone manager said.

"Since that time, the continuing high costs of furnishing telephone service in Ranger has resulted in unsatisfactory earnings on our operations here," Boothe declared.

"Present rates, based on 1955 operations, are too low to meet today's cost of doing business and provide a fair return on the fair value of our property here."

"The company has done all it can to keep expenses here as low as possible. The only solution is a reasonable increase in rates, in keeping with today's higher costs. We hope our request will receive prompt and favorable action," he said.

School Projects 'On Schedule' Supt. Says

Early July, 1964, will likely be time for completion of the new 16-classroom building and gymnasium, because contractors are "on schedule, and a little ahead", Supt. Wendell Siebert told the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday.

Contract completion date is Aug. 15th, he said, and added that the sixth grade will be added in the new school. (The sixth grade is now a part of the local system's junior high school.)

Siebert talked informally about the local school's problems, projects and operations. The total enrollment now stands at 742 students, compared to 725 last year; 753 in 1961; 732 in 1960; 720 in 1959; and 714 in 1958; he said.

Emphasizing the "drop-out" problem, he pointed out that the present 46-member junior class had 61 members, or 15 more, when the same class was in the seventh grade.

Program chairman for the day was Parks Poe who introduced Siebert, and President Marcos O'Dell presided.

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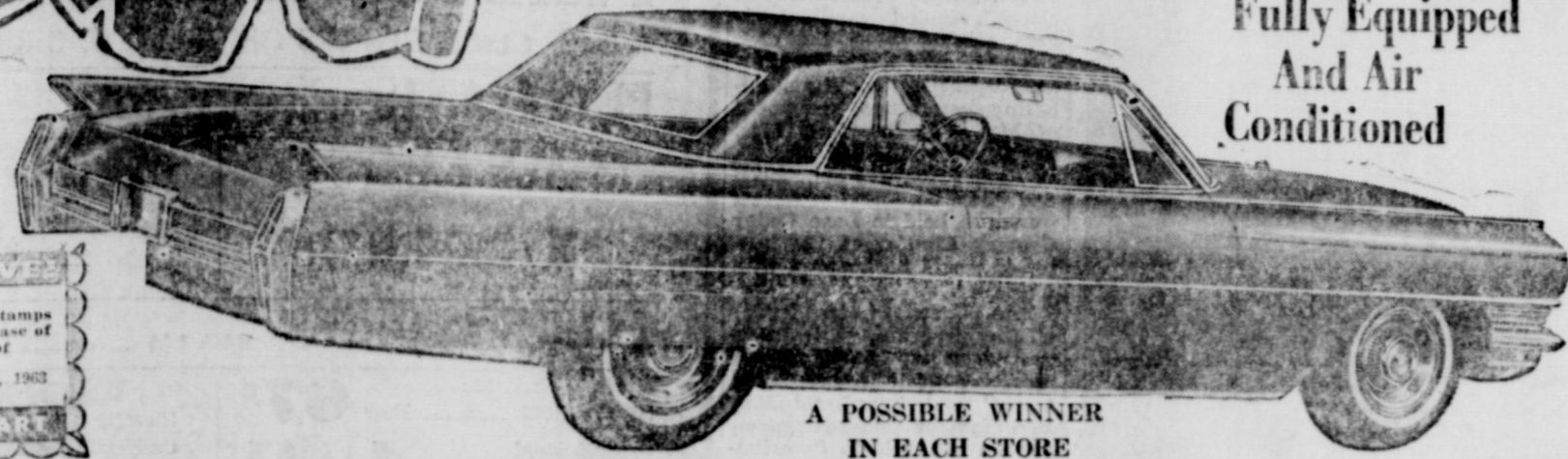

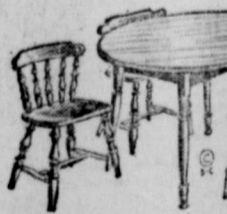

Lone Star Plans Big Addition To Fertilizer Plant

ALLAS — Lone Star Producing Company's Chemical Division will add a \$5-million ammonium phosphate plant to its chemical fertilizer Trinity River Plant complex now under construction near Kerens in Navarro County, it was announced Tuesday afternoon December 3. The Producing Company is a wholly owned subsidiary of Lone Star Gas Company.

The additional \$5-million increases Lone Star's planned investment in the chemical fertilizer business to about \$25 million, said L. T. Potter, Lone Star president.

He noted that the ammonium phosphate plant will be completed in March 1965. It will be erected adjacent to and be a part of the previously

announced Trinity River Plant complex. The first phase of the complex, scheduled for completion in late 1964, will be a nitrogen plant.

Construction of the nitrogen plant is underway and the ammonium phosphate plant will be started in the spring of 1964, the Lone Star President stated.

According to Mr. Potter, the ammonium phosphate plant will have an annual capacity of 100,000 tons. The nitrogen producing phase of the Trinity River Plant will have a capacity of 192,000 tons, he said.

He noted that the Trinity River Plant complex will be located on a 1,200-acre site bounded on the east by the Trinity River, thus water transportation will be available as soon as the proposed Trinity Canal is completed. The site is crossed by State Highway 31 and the Cotton Belt Railroad.

Information on the exact number of persons to be employed in the ammonium phosphate plant will be released later, Mr. Potter said. The nitrogen producing plant will employ some 180 persons, he noted.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — Who is entitled to receive an invalid lift from the VA?

A — Veterans receiving regular aid and attendance support from the VA. In addition, the lift must be medically indicated for the veteran.

Q — Will the boys who are in the service now be entitled to government loans when they return to civilian life?

A — Not unless part of their service was before January 31, 1955, when such rights came to an end.

Q — I hear that dependent parents' compensation was recently raised but I am still receiving \$75 because of my son's death in World War II.

When does this raise become effective?

A — The increase, effective last July, applied to Dependency and Indemnity Compensation only. The older "death compensation" is paid for service-connected deaths occurring before 1957. You may change to the new Dependency and Indemnity Compensation if you wish but this will be advantageous only if your income from all other sources is not over \$750 a year. The graduated rates of the newer law may pay less than your present compensation.

Q — When my National Service Life Insurance Endowment policy reaches the end of the premium payment period, may I receive monthly payments for the rest of my life?

A — No. However, you may choose a lump-sum settlement or payments over a period of three months to 24 months in equal installments.

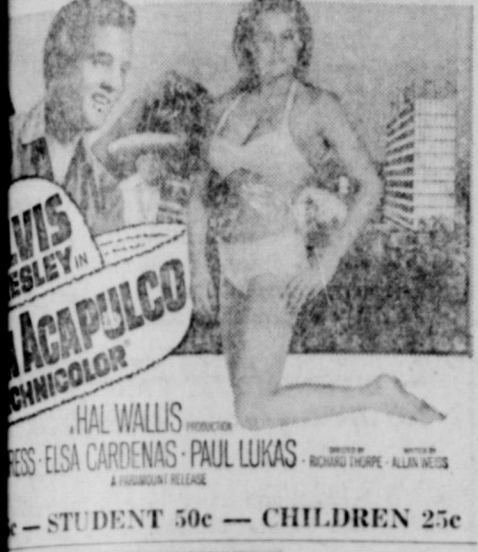

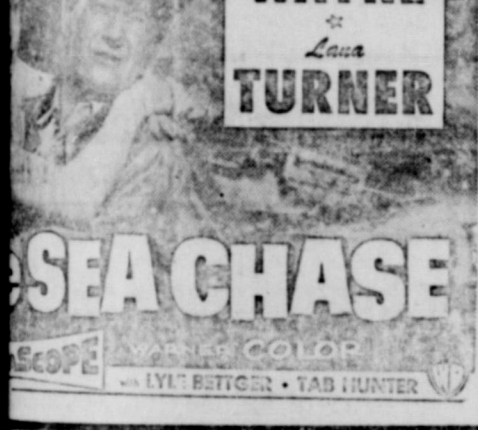

Saturday morning, December 7, a score and more persons were on hand for the simple, yet impressive program and dedication of the monument commemorating the old frontier outpost, Camp Solomon, later known as Camp McCord.

Matt Fisher, 79, Interred After Sunday Services

Final rites for Mr. Matt Fisher, 79, a resident of the Ranger and Eastland County area for 70 years, were held at Second Baptist Church in Ranger Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

Rev. Frank Brooks, pastor of the church, and Rev. K. C. Edmonds officiated. Interment was in Mount Zion Cemetery with Killingsworth's Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Fisher died in Ranger General Hospital Saturday morning at 4:40 o'clock following a short illness.

The deceased, a member of New Hope Baptist Church No. 3, was born in Austria-Hungary on Nov. 25, 1884. He came to the United States with his family at the age of 17, first residing in New York City, later moved to Hot Springs, Ark.

In 1905, Mr. Fisher drove a covered wagon from Arkansas to Gorman.

Prior to his retirement he had been engaged in farming for 50 years.

Mr. Fisher was united in marriage with the former Mary Ellen Wood at Gorman on Dec. 9, 1909.

Survivors are his widow; three daughters, Mrs. Charley Veale of Ranger, Mrs. Barney Wilson of Disney, Okla., and Mrs. L. P. Hammond of Desdemona; two sons, Frank Fisher of Grand Prairie and T. C. Fisher of Ranger; and nine grandchildren.

When Should You Apply For Your Social Security

"When should I apply for old-age insurance benefits under social security?" is a question frequently asked. I cannot answer without knowing all the facts in each individual case.

I do know, however, that many people do not apply for their social security benefits at the most advantageous time because they fail to obtain the proper information. Some lose hundreds of dollars by failure to get the facts at the proper time.

For some people, age 65 is a good time to think about applying for benefits. People no longer able to work or who do not wish to continue working full time, or whose full time work is low paid, may apply as early as age 62. Retirement benefits at age 62 are lower than they would be at age 65; but in most cases approximately 12 years would elapse before any actual financial loss would occur.

Age 65 can be the proper time for many people to apply for old-age insurance benefits. A substantial majority are no longer working full time after age 65 and, since their incomes are sharply reduced, they find that the social security checks help in paying their basic living expenses.

I want to urge everyone who is 65 years old to inquire at the social security office about filing a claim, even though he is still working full time. If the claim is filed then and the applicant later retires, it is a simple matter to start the benefits because all the paperwork will have been previously completed.

Everyone 72 years old who has worked under social security and has never applied for benefits should do so at once. Social security checks may be paid to anyone 72 years of age or older who has enough work covered by the law, regardless of his current earnings. However, payments do not begin unless an application has been filed.

Information on social security obtained from relatives or friends is not always reliable, no matter how well-intentioned. Changes in the social security law in 1960 and again in 1961 may make eligible for benefits some people whose claims were previously disallowed. Inquire in person or by writing your social security office and get the facts, or meet a representative of the Abilene Social Security Office when he is next in your vicinity.

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
