Present basic rates were established here in 1960, at the time dial telephones were placed in service. These rates were the result of a request filed in June, 1956, and were based on a study of operating results and economic conditions during 1955, the

"Since that time, the con-tinuing high costs of furnishing telephone service in Ranger has resulted in unsatisfactory earnings on our operations here," Boothe declared.
