Millie Gets 5 Years, Bill 10, For Ranger Worth Armed Robbery

Millie Jones, 37 year old grandmother, was assessed a five-year prison term and her boy friend, William Splawn, 40, got a 10-year term after they pleaded guilty to robbing the Ranger Worth Food Mart before a jury Monday in 91st District Court in Eastland.

John Blackwell pleaded not guilty and was given a 5-year suspended sentence by a 91st District Court jury Tuesday. He had been indicted as an accessory to the grocery robbery.

Prosecuting Attorney Earl Conner, Jr., told the jury of 11 men and one woman that

the state was waiving maximum punishment in the case, which is the death penalty under an armed robbery conviction.

The jury turned down an application by Mrs. Jones for a suspended sentence. Pleas for both defendants were heard by the same jury, and a decision in the Splawn case was reached in about 15 minutes. The jury took two hours and 15 minutes to reach a decision in the case of Mrs. Jones.

Splawn did not take the stand in his defense, but Mr. Conner stated for the record that Mrs. Jones was the

driver of the get-away car after Splawn robbed the Food Mart of \$839 last March.

Mrs. Jones testified on the stand that their only reason for pulling the hold-up was that "We were drunk." She also said that after she and Splawn complete their sentences she "would like to have a home" with him.

Authorities said that Mrs. Jones and Splawn had lived in California until shortly before the robbery, although Mrs. Jones had resided in Eastland at one time several years prior to that time.

Several months after the robbery, the two were arrested in Idaho but escaped from jail there before being turned over to Eastland authorities. Mrs. Jones, who was nude at the time of the jailbreak, developed a severe case of poison ivy, she said. After being recaptured they were transferred to the Eastland County jail on July 28.

Grand champion of the county pecan show held last Saturday in Ranger was a quart of Comanches entered by C. E. Smith of Rising Star, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and major winner in the annual show this year.

The show, held in the Joseph building, was sponsored jointly by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and the growers. It started Thursday night with the crowning of Miss Tonia Arnold, Ranger Junior College sophomore, as queen of the show.

B. G. Hancock, Extension horticulturist, and Dr. J. B. Storey, of the Horticulture department of Texas A&M University, judged the 185 entries which represented 24 named varieties and a half dozen or so unnamed seedlings.

A native pecan entered by Doss Alexander of Pioneer, one of the long-time producers, was named "Champion-in-shell," and also champion native seedling and reserve champion pecan of the show.

An entry by W. V. Fenter of Rising Star was the champion shelling pecan of the show. It was a Brake, which is grown very little in this area, and produced 59.5 percent kernel per pound. It took 56 unshelled nuts to make a pound.

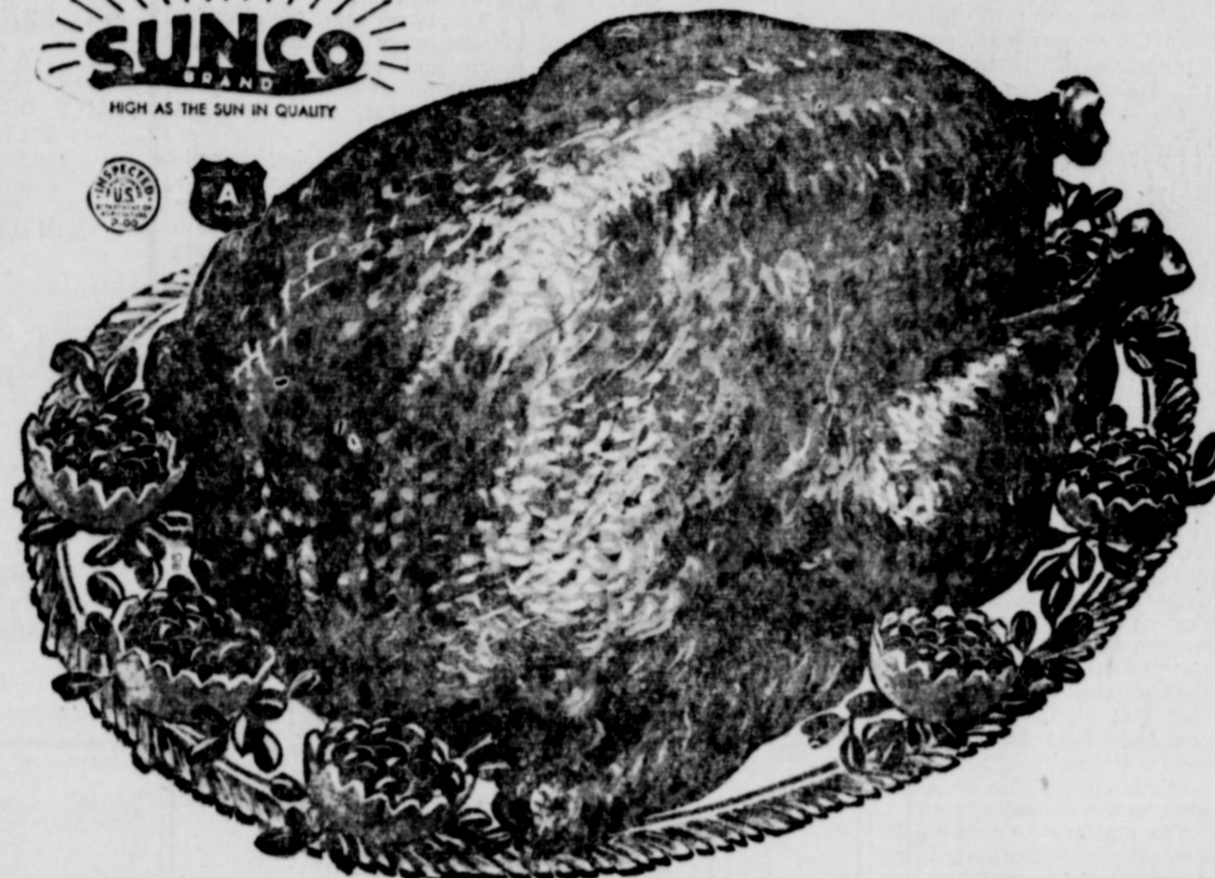

Change Made In Army Enlistment Qualifications

A major change in the U.S. Army enlistment qualification processing makes it possible for many prior service Army, Army National Guard and Army Reserves to enlist in the U. S. Army. Lt. Colonel James W. Dickerson, Commanding Officer of the U.S. Army Recruiting Main Station announced today.

Under the new standards announced, mental standard is only one factor to be considered in determining an individual's eligibility for reenlistment.

Local recruiters are authorized to employ the "whole man concept" which included: Mental capability as indicated by his test scores; personal conduct, amenability to discipline, moral standards and attitude, manner of performing assigned duties and physical condition.

These new provisions for reenlistment may make it possible for some prior service men to reenlist who in the past have been declined reenlistment. For more information contact your local Army Recruiter.

SCS Reviewing Conservation Plans for Farms

Soil Conservation Service personnel are busy this month reviewing conservation plans with farmers and ranchers in Eastland County, according to E. E. McAllister, manager of the Eastland County office of the Soil Conservation Service. This annual review is a part of the assistance available to operators who have signed a Program contract.

Progress in applying a conservation plan as well as practices scheduled for the coming year are reviewed. As a part of this review, the operator analyzes his forage resources for the coming year. Using the land within its capabilities and treating it for maintenance and improvement is the goal of most of the farmers and ranchers.

Some 100 acres of cropland has been changed to pasture in 1963 and approximately 500 acres of rangeland seeded under these Great Plains contracts in Eastland County. A balance of grazing and hay resources with cash crops, such as peanuts, will have a stabilizing effect upon the agricultural enterprises.

Current investment in Conservation will pay dividends in the future. The Agricultural Great Plains Conservation

Program are set up as a way the American people can have a stake in the future, through a shaving of cost in application of conservation practices.

It is not always easy for the farmer to pay his share and make adjustment in his operators to apply a conservation program. In many cases reduced income for a few years is necessary in getting a unit stabilized for continuing operators.

The way farmers and ranchers manage and operate today will determine if there will be food and clothing available in the future.
