

Testimony isn't expected to be completed until Thursday in the \$26,000 damage suit against the T&P Railway now underway in 91st District Court.

The trial is a re-trial of the case following a miss-trial last year

Suit was brought by the parents of Tommy Ford, Ranger High School football player, who was killed in a car-train crash at the Main St. crossing in Ranger in February of 1960 Selection of the jury got underway at 9 a.m. Monday but the attorneys for the Fords

took most of the morning questioning prospective jurors. Several Ranger people who had been called for service, excused themselves from service, and the resulting jury is composed of seven Cisco men, and five Eastland men.
