Auto Tags To Go On Sale In County Monday

Vehicle license plates will go on sale in Eastland Tuesday, Tax Assessor-Collector Stanley Webb said today.

Mr. Webb said that the new auto tags will have a prefix of C-S and C-R.

The C-S prefix will have numbers from 10 to 5799 and the C-R prefix will begin at 6800 and go through 9999.

The new truck license prefix will be I-M and I-L. There will be 1,400 sets of those to be sold in the county, Mr. Webb explained.

Farm trucks will carry the fix 5-J on their license plates this year. The tax assessor said he expected to sell approximately 1,200 of those.

Mr. Webb recently received a shipment of 11,884 tags. In the past year approximately 10,000 tags were sold. He reminded car and truck owners that they can be "of great help by buying their license plates early."

Quarterbackers To Build Track, Practice Field

Quarterback Club members voted to go ahead with plans to build a permanent football practice field and track at their regular monthly meeting held Thursday night in the High School cafeteria, set the date for the annual Quarterback Club Minstrel, planned the 1955 membership drive and voted to purchase a movie camera for the school.

The one-hour and 15-minute meeting was termed the best held by the club in several years. "We accomplished more tonight than we have in a long time," one member said.

He outlined work already done on the practice field-track project, and showed the club the completed engineer's layout. The new athletic layout will be located near the high school building. Hightower termed it "our number one project."

City Charter Was Approved In 1919

First Of A Series
(Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of articles written from information gained by reading the city charter. Others will appear in other editions of the Telegram.)

On May 16, 1919 the citizens of Eastland went to the polls to vote on a proposed charter for the city. And by a majority of votes, they favored the new set of laws for the city.

Today, almost 36 years later, the 45-page charter still governs the citizens of this West Texas city. In many ways it is a standing tribute to the men who first drafted it, for it proves that they were farsighted enough to realize that many changes would take place.

There are things in the charter, however, that probably are not needed nearly so much today as they were 36 years ago.

The charter outlines the form of government the city is to have, setting up the City Commission and the position of city manager. It assures the citizens of "all of the benefits of local self government."

The charter calls for the election of five members to the Board of Commissioners, and says that they shall meet once each month.

"All powers of the City of Eastland, Texas, except as in this Charter denied or restricted, shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of Commissioners," the charter reads. "It shall be the duty of said Board to pass, establish and cause to be enforced all ordinances and to do all other things necessary and proper for the carrying out and execution of the powers and duties specified in the Charter."

That seems sensible enough, but there are a few things in the charter that are not so up to date. For instance, did you know that it could be against the law here to ride a velocipede in the city limits? The city charter says that the "city has power to regulate the use of velocipedes and other like vehicles."

For those of you who don't know what a velocipede is, Webster terms it "any of various light vehicles propelled by the rider or riders" or "a vehicle like a bicycle but smaller and having two real wheels."

Apparently the velocipede problem has lightened some here during the past 36 years.

Taxpayer Aid To Be Discontinued Temporarily

Ben Smith, Administrative Officer in charge of the Eastland office of the Internal Revenue Service, announced today that Monday, January 31st, would be the last special Taxpayer Assistance Day until March 14.

The Internal Revenue Service has assigned technical employees every Monday morning from 8:30 to 12:30 during the month of January to answer taxpayers' questions and to render group assistance to taxpayers. The Revenue Service must continue their regular work of checking tax returns throughout the tax filing season from January 1st through April 15th.

It costs our government approximately \$25 in lost revenue to assist a taxpayer in the preparation of an income tax return since a technical tax man brings in \$80 in additional taxes every hour he works on his regular duties.

The Revenue Service will resume special Taxpayer Assistance Days on Mondays beginning March 14. Technical personnel will be assigned to assist taxpayers on March 14, 21, 28, and April 4 and 11. Taxpayers are advised to study carefully their instructions received in the mail.

Taxpayers requiring more information than given in the instructions received in the mail can secure "Your Federal Income Tax for 1954," Internal Revenue Service Publication No. 17, from the United States Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., for 25c. The Lions-Rotary joint meeting will be held at noon and the special assembly will be held at 1:30 p.m.

Mr. Tanner said the theme for the 1955 Brotherhood program will be "One Nation Under God." He termed it a challenge to each of us in these unsettled times.

"The theme also means, 'Together We Stand, Divided We Fall,' for only by true Brotherhood and by being 'One Nation Under God' can we continue to be the bulwark of religion and freedom," Mr. Tanner said.

He is accused by Mrs. O. G. Phillips, who lives between Long Branch and Romney, near Rising Star, of forcing her to write him a \$900 check payable to another man.

Tax Assessor-Collector Stanley Webb said that 1,230 had paid their poll tax at his office at the courthouse. Sub-stations throughout the county have sold an estimated 800 more, he said.
