POLIO DAY POSTPONED

Type III Sabine Oral Polio vaccine will not be given in Eastland Saturday, as announced earlier.
Dr. E. R. Townsend, County Health Officer, has released the following statement:
"After having made a thorough study of the adverse reports recently made on the Sabine Oral Polio vaccine Type No. 3, I feel it advisable to postpone our program of administration originally set for Saturday, Sept. 22nd, 1962."
"We will at a later date give Type No. II in Eastland."
Dr. Townsend emphasized that this announcement pertained to the program in the city of Eastland only, and not to other campaigns which may be planned in other towns of the county.

City Commissioners Considering C-C Industrial Fund Tax Proposal

An industrial sub-committee of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce proposed to city commissioners here that a voluntary industrial tax on city water meters be levied.
The proposal was presented by Chamber President Frank Deaton and suggested that \$1 each month be charged for the term of three years. The monies raised from such a tax would be placed in a permanent industrial fund of the Chamber of Commerce, the spokesman for the sub-committee said.
About \$36,000 could be raised if the tax is levied, according to findings of the sub-committee.
In the proposal's provisions, meter customers would be free to reject the tax if they did not wish to pay simply by notifying the city manager.

Eastland Mayor Virgil Seaberry Jr. said the proposal by the C-C sub-committee would be considered by the commission at its regular meeting Oct. 15. No action was taken at the Monday meeting on the matter.
Lee Ellis, in other matters, requested the commission to extend the Saturday "free parking" situation. "The merchants like this arrangement and say it has helped business," he said.
Continued free-parking on Saturday was approved.
The following is the statement given to the commission on the industrial tax:
"Gentlemen, only one other time in the history of Eastland have the people bonded together on a major project for progress. The hospital set the precedent and has proved beyond all doubt that such confidence is justified. It stands today as a symbol of service, a creator of jobs and payrolls and a magnet which draws the people of this area to Eastland."
"Tonight we ask you to take another giant step for progress; we ask you to follow the successful method used in building the hospital."
"Eastland needs an Industrial Fund to help establish and create jobs for its people. We need industry to balance with agriculture. To survive, we must become a regional industrial and trade center. We need action now, and we must have money to start this action."
"Ten years ago we had a "hospital tax". We all paid one dollar per month per water meter to help build the hospital. People paid it only if they wanted a part in the progress of our town. They paid voluntarily and thus the hospital tax served a double purpose: it brought in needed money and it made each person feel that he was truly important in the affairs of his town. Money and a strong sense of cooperation—you can't beat that combination in the building of a town."
"Gentlemen, we ask the commission to give this combination another opportunity to work for Eastland. We would like for you to place a voluntary Industrial Tax on each water meter for a period of three years. This will appear on the water bill as "V.I.T.—\$1.00" and appear in the total. Those people who do not want to pay it will only have to write "Please remove this tax" on their water bill and it will not appear on that bill the following month. Those who wish to do so may pay twelve dollars yearly or a lump sum of thirty-six dollars.
We would like for you to think about this and take action at your next meeting."

Executive Committee Selects New Nominee

Scott Bailey of Cisco was unanimously chosen by the Eastland County Democratic Executive Committee Saturday night to be the party's nominee for County Judge in the November election in place of Judge John S. Hart, who was buried the same day.

Hart defeated for the party nomination, both appealed to the committee for the nomination.
Bailey, selected by the committee, was defeated in the primary for another term as state representative by Wayne Gibbons.

Alvin Crawley of Ranger, chairman of the committee, said that he had checked with the office of the staff attorney general and was informed that the County Democratic Executive Committee was to select a nominee so that the name could be certified by the party convention in El Paso Sept. 18.

Members of the Democratic Executive Committee are Calvin Brown of Ranger, Mrs. Onous Dick of Olden, W. G. Baker of Gorman, H. N. Gilbert of Carbo, L. A. Clark of Deslemona, John C. Donaldson of Kokomo, Raymond Gray of Rising Star, Doss Alexander of Pioneer, Ed Townsend of Nimrod, J. V. Heyser Jr. of Cisco, F. S. Boland of Scranton and Don Pierson of Eastland.

The meeting of the committee was held at 5 p.m. Saturday in the Village Hotel of Eastland.

New Teaching Methods Explained By Supt. Siebert for P-TA Meet

"Our schools are once again using the phonetic approach to reading in the first four grades," Wendell Siebert, Eastland school superintendent, told members of the Parent-Teachers Association Tuesday in the Eastland High School Cafeteria. Refined and revised, the phonetic approach has replaced the speed reading method which, among other things, left the student without the ability to spell, he said.

A new, revolutionary method of teaching arithmetic has been developed, and texts which present it are being published. This new method will be taught here within a year or two.

To evaluate our present program of instruction, standardized achievement tests are given, and Eastland last year rated well above the national average, Siebert said.

"Our schools aim to do the most they can for every child, realizing the children have different potentials and knowing that not some will not graduate," the school superintendent explained.

This is opposed to Russia's "educate the best and shoot the rest," he said.

"Often," he said, "we sacrifice your comfort and convenience for the welfare of your child." This was done when children are shifted to a different school in order to keep the number in each class as low as possible.

Mr. Marcus O'Dell presided at the meeting and introduced all of the teachers in each of the schools. Mrs. Alvin Pierce, program chairman, introduced Siebert.

Rooms having the highest percentage of mothers present were Mrs. Homer Smith's second grade at West Ward, and typing at South Ward, Mrs. Charlie Marshall's first grade and Mrs. Don Farnsworth's second grade.
