Weather - wise, no one would say that February hasn't been unusual.

Traffic - wise, it may prove to be one for the books too.

The Texas Department of Public Safety investigated nine wrecks in Eastland County during the week of February 15, to the 21st, local Sgt. Jerry Mathews reports. There were a number of contributing factors, and certainly, he believes, weather in the form of high winds, slightly damp pavements, played a part.

One serious injury, a number of minor ones and a great deal of property damage resulted from the accidents.

February had a Friday the 13th, but Friday, the 20th, proved to be heaviest for traffic accidents, with four recorded: one of which produced what was believed to have been the most serious injury. A 50 - year - old Austin man, passenger in a vehicle driven by a Dallas man, which collided with a vehicle driven by a San Angelo man at the Intersection of I - 20 and State 206 near Cisco, was taken to Graham Memorial Hospital for treatment and later transferred to an Abilene hospital.

Earlier the same day a truck overturned near the same location when a strong wind

turned the sheet - rock loaded truck over.

Later that Friday an Eastlander apparently lost control of his car and overturned on I - 20 near Ranger, possibly due to wind and a light rain. A driver of an east - bound vehicle apparently went to sleep and crashed into barricades near the construction zone between Eastland and Ranger.

Saturday, February 21, an east - bound vehicle on the service road near I - 20 and State 6, lost control and struck a guard rail. Later the same morning a driver apparently went to sleep and, traveling west on 20, ran off the road, pulled back and turned over on the median. The same Saturday, an Eastlander was forced off State 6, east of Gorman when another vehicle veered across into his lane. Both vehicles left the road and ended up in the ditch.

Sunday, February 15, an automobile, for a change, ran into the rear of a truck - trailer on I - 20 near Cisco.

On Tuesday on I - 20, also near Cisco, three vehicles were traveling west. The first two slowed; the third one didn't.

Eastland Countians planning to attend the important Zone Six Beautify Texas Council Meeting in Eastland on March 11, are urged to secure their tickets now, because, frankly, it appears that it will be a sell-out event.

Local tickets are available through Emmett Lasater, Bicentennial Chairman; James Wright, Chamber of Commerce Manager; and - or Mrs. Austin McCloud, District 23 Governor for the Beautify Texas Council, in Eastland. Carl Lummus has tickets in Ranger; Martha Graves in Cisco and Rev. Owen Aikin in Rising Star. Check Smith has tickets in Gorman. Approximately 200 people from the 44 county zone are expected and the event is attracting statewide interest for its timeliness.

An outstanding program is planned.

Zone 6 of the Beautify Texas Council, which includes Eastland County will meet in Eastland Thursday, March 11, to hear Tom Taylor, Director of Travel and Information Division of the Texas Highway Department, speak on "Texas, a State of Beauty". He will be introduced by State Representative Joe Hanna of Breckenridge.

All residents of the area are welcome to attend, and all chambers of commerce, clubs and organizations are urged to send at least one representative to the workshop and luncheon.

A welcoming coffee will be held at 10 a.m. at the Woman's Club Building.

Talks will be given there by Don Wright, President of the Lakewood Bank and Trust Co. of Dallas, who will speak on "Beauty Pays" and Bill Colegrove, Dow Chemical Executive of Freeport and Ron Josselet, head of Trails and Waterways section of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, will speak on hiking and biking trails.

The luncheon will be at 12 o'clock at the Lone Cedar Country Club.

The council was organized a few years ago as a statewide, non - profit non - partisan organization dedicated to enhancing the beauty of Texas by educating citizens on the proper disposal of litter. It expanded that goal to serve as an agency to encourage, develop and preserve beauty and cleanliness in all state neighborhoods, highways, beaches, shrines and monuments.

It annually sponsors the Governor's Community Achievement Award given by the Governor of Texas to six towns and cities that have been judged most progressive in improving their quality of living. Eastland was one of the winners in 1974 and Fort Worth in 1975. The Council furnishes material and resources for beautification improvement. Mrs. Lady Bird Johnson and Mrs. Janey Briscoe have both used their name and influence to boost the organization.

Mrs. McCloud of Eastland is the District 23 Governor and will act as coordinator of the meeting. Inquiries and reservations can be made to her at 515 S. Lamar Street, Eastland, 76448.

They're proud of it - and they want to show it off!

In observance of Texas Public Schools Week, the Eastland Independent School will hold open house Thursday, March 4, from 6:30 to 9:00 p.m. at all three schools.

It'll be the first time in some time that all schools will be open for visitors on a formal basis.

Parents, friends and all are being invited, yeah, urged to visit the High School, the Junior High School and the Elementary School for this event.

The public schools are important in many ways. Not the least of which is the fact that there are some 40 professional personnel, plus a great number of assisting positions.

Right now the Eastland schools have an enrollment of right at 900 with average daily attendance of about 844. (That's up considerably from 796 last year.)

As part of the open house Thursday, free refreshments will be served at the High School Cafeteria throughout the calling hours, 6:30 to 9:00 p.m. It is hoped that visitors will make it a special point to visit each school during the evening.

Serving as hosts will be School Trustees, Administrators, Instructors and Staff. All facilities will be open

for visitation so that visitors may see the schools' facilities and programs.

Instrumental in Public School Week is the Masonic Lodge and Trustee John Morren is serving as coordinator between the school and the local lodge in helping schedule the open house.

"During Texas Public Schools Week, parents and the public are invited to visit local schools and become more aware of the function of our local public school system", said Supt. Ray Pruitt.

"To prepare for this year's Texas Public Schools Week", many elementary through high school students have become involved in special Bicentennial activities."

Texas Public Schools Week was organized in 1950 so that community members might have the opportunity to see first - hand how their local public school system operates. Supt. Pruitt said. He further stated that both parents and none - parents are encouraged to attend with students and to ask questions.

He said, "community members are also involved in preparing students for the job market. Administrators, teachers, and students all depend on and welcome comments and constructive criticisms from actively interested citizens."

Mrs. Austin McCloud, District Chairman and coordinator for the Zone Six Beautify Texas Council to the directors about the important meeting which will be held here March 11, and encouraged chamber participation. Some 200 people from the 44-county zone are due here with key speakers scheduled to

share ideas and projects on beautification. The board pledged its support and will have tickets available at the chamber office.

Membership Chairman Wilbur Simmel reported a successful drive underway with three new members signed up, three new individual memberships and a list of more prospects being made.

Manager James Wright reported that the chamber is out of the deluxe brochures and President Coleman asked that the Special Events Committee be in charge of developing a new one.

Manager Wright gave a good report on a new industry for the city, and reported on the recent annual banquet meeting.

Coleman asked the special events committee also to be in charge of chamber policy on Flag Day celebration here.

A Chamber building committee was appointed including Walter Hall, Ray Winenger, Buddy Rogers, Bob Carroll and Larry Kirk.

The membership committee was asked to review Manager Wright's salary.

The Carbon Bicentennial Committee met Thursday evening at the Baptist Church to discuss and make preliminary plans for their participation in the nation's birthday this year.

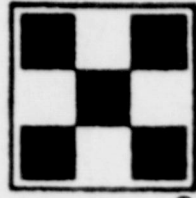

RR panel orders phase out of natural gas in boilers

Public interest requires an orderly phase out of natural gas as a boiler fuel in Texas with the minimum disruption possible to the Texas economy, the state Railroad Commission decided Wednesday.

By unanimous action, the three-member commission decreed effective immediately a 10 per cent reduction in consumption of natural gas by boiler users by Jan. 1, 1980, and a 25 per cent reduction by Jan. 1, 1985, from 1974 or 1975 levels, by boiler users who burned an average of 3 million cubic feet or more of gas a day.

An exemption for those individuals, businesses or governmental subdivisions who use 100,000 cubic feet or less of gas daily as a boiler fuel.

A ban on new contracts for gas as a boiler fuel unless authorized by the commission.

The gas age is ending for electric power plants.

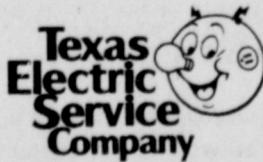
The Texas Railroad Commission says electric companies must begin phasing out the use of natural gas for making electricity.

IN MEMORIAM

EDITH MAE ROWE WOOD

(Mrs. Harry E.)

There are a few things that we children feel we must say about our mother aside from the facts that are automatically published in the newspaper.

We can have deep emotional pleasure with the memory of our mother's Christian life, the knowledge that her total energies throughout her entire life were to her family, the church, and to the training and spiritual enrichment of the little people of the church.

What a monumental Christian mother she was - she created her own perfect environment because of her faith and unwavering beliefs of Christianity. - Yes, our mother was ready to go home and that makes it easy for us to let our precious little mother go. She prepared for 77 years to go.

She was the last charter member of the Eastland Church of Christ on Daugherty Street.

Her high school friends still meant a lot as though they had been graduated together 10 years ago. Mother always kept in touch with her high school friends, but since the first Eastland Reunion in 1957, she, as class agent, has been in constant touch with each of the nine members of her 1917 graduating class. During her very recent illness, she heard from three of the surviving six members who were concerned enough to check on her.

Our homeplace, 111 East Sadosa, was her "honeymoon" home for her entire married life. She and our daddy moved into the house a few days after their wedding, June 1, 1919.

Just before our little sister was born - Old Rip was awakened from a 31-year rest, which put Eastland on the map. It was our grandfather, E.E. Wood, who placed in and removed the sleepy horned load from the cornerstone. Our daddy, Harry E. Wood, was there on both occasions. Our uncle, Will M. Wood, was the person who traveled with Rip to New York, and to Washington, D.C., where they visited President Calvin Coolidge.

At our grandparents home, as children, before Rip's death, we used to stake him out in red ant beds to eat.

Before Eastland had Payne & Lovett Hospital, the first three of us children were born at home, so at this time we are all four looking nostalgically for a "large glass dome" to place over our homeplace to preserve the love and closeness we shared together inside.

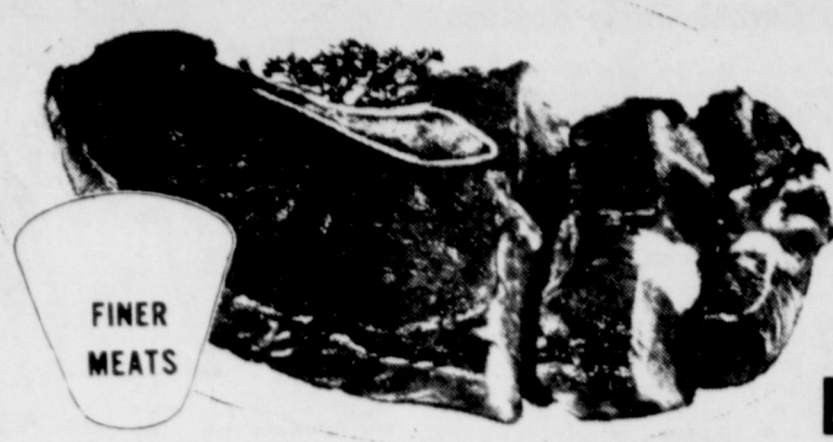
