'Hamlet' Assignments **Being Announced**





President Graves, a Cisco Junior College instruction, recently attended a special workshop on the project and was awarded a diploma for work done by Dr. Lee Smith of San Marcus. Sheriff Sublett's office is providing an engraving service free to the public for identifying valuables in an effort to protect and recover stolen property.

HANDS UP is a nationwide volunteer crime reduction effort launched by the General Federation of Women's Clubs, through its 13,067 clubs. The new program is made possible through a Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, Department of Justice grant.

The campaign has four key elements:

1. INQUIRY: A national survey of private social service agencies on their role in crime reduction (the first survey of its kind) plus the attitudes of GFWC members and the general public. The GFWC used the information from these surveys as bases for discussion at the National Crime Summit.

NATIONAL CRIME SUMMIT: Held in Washington, D.C. on January 23 - 24, 1976. Participants included GFWC delegates, specialists from the criminal justice system, policy leaders of national citizens' groups and private social service agencies, representatives of various ethnic and special interest groups, victims and ex - offenders. They came from all over the country to join in SYNCON. SYNCON is an innovative process designed, in the case of HANDS UP, to focus the efforts of the participants on realistic crime reduction recommendations. These ideas were sent to national leaders as well as the public.

3. AREA CRIME SUMMITS: To be mounted by GFWC clubs in cooperation with the media in communities throughout the country, these meetings will develop realistic crime reduction recommendations and lead to the organization of local action groups.

4. LOCAL ACTION GROUPS: Local action groups will be set up in communities throughout the United States, the ultimate goal of HANDS UP. It is expected that crime recommendations developed from this process will create new programs which will utilize such strategies as education of the public, contribution of time, development of resources and use of legislative action.

other passengers in your car or passing motorists. Ask them to send for an ambulance and police and to halt or re - route traffic so that you can carry out your first aid without further danger to the victim and vourself.

- Your first priorities are:
- To prevent the victim from choking to death.
- - To restore breathing.
- To stop bleeding.

The unconscious victim should receive attention first. His airway may be blocked by blood, vomit, loose teeth or broken dentures. Inspect his mouth and throat with your fingers and remove anything that threatens to choke him. Then check to see if he is still breathing. You can tell by the movement of his chest and the sound of breathing.

If the victim is not breathing, you should immediately clear his airway and start mouth - to - mouth resuscitation. Remember that you must breathe directly into his mouth, with his head tilted backward and his nostrils pinched to prevent the escape of air. When you detect the first sign of resumption of breathing (that is, when his chest rises a little on his own) stop and see if spontaneous breathing continues. If not, breathe for him until he seems to be breathing well under his own power. Then turn him on his side so that if he starts to vomit or bleed there is less risk of choking.

Almost as urgent as the restoration of breathing is the prevention of serious blood loss through external wounds. The application of pressure is the most effective way of doing this. First apply pressure directly with your hand, being certain you have identified the entire wound. Then, as soon as you or anyone else who has joined the rescue can find a cloth, put a thick pad over the wound and hold it in place with a bandage. You may have to use your own clothing or the patient's clothing to accompoish this. Raise the portion of the body that is bleeding, but do not use a tourniquet. If the bleeding continues, apply another pad and bandage, but do not remove the first one. There is some risk that the bandage can be applied too snugly. If the patient complains of pain or numbness in the fingers or toes of the injured arm or leg, ease the bandage slightly - - but not enough so as to decrease the pressure.

Both the breathing aid and the bandaging can be done while the victim is in the car if it does not seem safe to move him. In general, do not move an injured person unless absolutely necessary. You may be forced to move him because of the risks of fire or moving traffic. At this point in the rescue it is to be hoped that others have come to your aid so that you do not have to move a victim single handedly

A few final safeguards in coping with highway accidents:

Do not touch occupants or vehicles if live wires are in contact with the car

Turn off the ignition of crashed cars.

- Make sure no one is smoking at the scene; spilled gasoline can ignite and compound the problems.





The garden calendar states that now is the time to plant Irish potatoes.

Many people make two or three serious mistakes in the annual process of planting their Irish potato patch. Most people know pretty well how to prepare the soil and at what depth to plant potatoes and they know what variety they want to plant. However, they many times do not get an adequate stand of potatoes after they plant. We would now like to discuss a couple of the problems that bring this about.

When we are preparing our potato seed pieces, that is cutting them up with one or more eyes on each seed piece. we need to be very careful. If we cut through a potato that has a rotten spot in it. we should discard that potato and all of its pieces then sterilize our cutting knife in a solution of household bleach for a few seconds. If we do not do this, we will often spread this rot organism to the

Bob Bullock Mails Checks Totaling \$2.7 Million

Comptroller Bob Bullock has mailed checks totaling \$2.7 million to 186 counties and 300 cities

The money is their share of the mixed drink tax for the October-December quarter of 1975.

Bullock said counties got \$1.4 million and cities \$1.3 million of the total.

The mixed drink tax, collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission, is 10 percent of all gross receipts for the sale of mixed drinks.

The cities got 15 percent of the tax colected within city boundries, while counties reap 15 percent of all the tax collected from unincorporated areas. The remainder, \$6.5 million

in the last quarter of 1975, goes in the State General Revenue Fund, Bullock said. Eastland County total tax

revenue is \$2,373.98 and County's 15 percent remittance is \$356.10. Eastland's total City Tax

Revenue is \$606.05 and the City's 15 percent tax remittance is \$90.91. And, Cisco's total City Tax Revenue is \$926.98, and the City's 15 percent tax remittance is \$139.05



WHODUNNIT?

A friend who missed bass fishing in the Lower Neches River triggered a column recently by Tom Lepere, a Dallas newspaper columnist.

Seems that the friend, who moved to the Dallas area some 15 years ago, still missed fishing for bass in the Neches River, though "the water was so polluted that, if you had caught some you would have been afraid to eat them.' What hurt him most, he said, was that the "Neches River near Beaumont was considered 'dead'." Paper mills and refineries had spewed their pollutants into the river and "poof" a lot of fish life just disappeared.

And it did, too. But that was some years ago.

At any rate, the friend

Connet

thought it was a joke last fall when, on his vacation in the area, a fellow fisherman invited him on a trip to the Neches to catch some "We dumped some bass. topwater lures in among the cypress roots -- and whammo -the bass were back and as scrappy as they had been 20 years before," the friend was quoted as saying. And they

were tasty too. "That just goes to prove that industry working with the conservationists can restore natural things to the way they were before 'progress' got out of hand," the column says.

Certainly industries and conservationists, and municipalities as well, are due a large share of the credit for restoring to health the Neches, as well as other bodies of water in the state.

But let us not forget that the State of Texas has played a very large part in the picture. In 1967 when the Texas Legislature passed the Texas Water Quality Act, and created the Texas Water

Quality Board, the pollution loading going into the Lower Neches in the Beaumont area was (in technical terms) 223,000 pounds per day. Since then, the loading has been decreased to some 70,000 pounds per day, and by 1979 it is projected that the load will be down to a low 19,000 pounds per day.

So, along with the "environmentalists, ecologists and Mother Nature's healing hand," which the Dallas columnist credits for improvement in the Neches, a great deal of credit must also go to those in Texas State Government who recognized the problem and took steps to solve it. Without stiff directives from state government which required industries and municipalities to clean up their wastes, the Lower Neches River might still be devoid of tasty black bass.

The Neches still isn't as clean as it needs to be, or as it will be, but it's cleaner than it was, and it's good to know







STAR-SPANGLED HISTORY



"WASHINGTON TAKING COMMAND"

George Washington was elected commander-in-chief of the Continental Army by the Second Continental Congress in 1775. His first act as commander, in March, 1776, was to fortify the Dorchester Heights overlooking Boston. This action forced the British to evacuate the city. Informal Meeting At Corral Room Tuesday For W.W.C.

The Westbound Water Corporation will hold an informal meeting at the Corral Room on Tuesday, Feb. 24, from 7:30 p.m. to inform the subscribers of the progress of the joint loan and grant application submitted to the Farmers Home Administration. Mrs. Meta Isenhower. president of the corporation. emphasis that this meeting is not a substitute for the annual meeting that the by-laws require to be held in the month of April each year. Westbound Water Corporation

was organized for the purpose of providing a city water line to rural residents of Eastland County, south of Eastland and Cisco, and the eastern part of Callahan County including Putnam. An application to the Farmers Home Administration requesting a Federal Grant in the amount of \$745,000 and a loan in the amount of \$754,000 wa submitted in November 1975

R. Leon Decker of Yeatts and Decker Inc., Consulting Engineers of Abilee. reports that the preliminary plans of the water route includes 169 miles of lines ranging from 8 to 2 inches in diameter. Water will be purchased from the cities of Eastland and Cisco, and will require two pumping stations. Water from Eastland will serve residents west of Eastland to Cisco and south of US Highway 80 to the Carbon area. Water from Cisco will serve those west to Putnam and south of the Old Abilene Highway.

This special meeting is to explain the water routes and location of water meters. There will be maps available showing the proposed lines and proper-ties that must be crossed. Each property owner on the proposed route must sign an easement granting the right to the corporation to cross their property. Owners not wishing to grant this right must sign rejection letters.

All members who have signed a service agreement with the corporation are urged to attend this meeting and bring a copy of the deed to their property to grant the easements. Each member should contact his neighbor or individuals owning adjoining property and invite them to participate. Anyone wishing to sign up for the water service can sign the service agreemesnt and make their deposit at the meeting.
