BIDS BEING SOUGHT

Commissioners Look for Another City Hall Razer

Jack Brown of Big Spring, who contracted for the demolition of the old City Hall building in Eastland, has cancelled his contract, according to an announcement made by Mayor Virgil Seaberry Jr. at a City Commission meeting held Tuesday morning.

Seaberry added that Brown stated he was unable to obtain the required bond of \$20,000 for the contract.

Earlier in the year, the City Commission granted the contract to Brown for no charge and in doing so, refused the contract to a Rising Star resi-

dent who offered \$500 for the same contract.

At the previous meeting, a Commissioner stated that they were obligated to the Big Spring man.

City Commissioners met Tuesday to discuss a proposition from other concerns to tear down the old building.

Seaberry announced that two concerns, Bobby Wilson of Midland and Dallas Wrecking Company, were interested.

Commissioner Don Person made the motion to advertise for two weeks in local, Fort Worth and Abilene newspapers.

The motion was seconded by Jack Germany.

All bids for the contract must be made by November 16th and will be opened at the City Council meeting on November 19th.

A nominal forfeiture sum of a \$250 cashiers check was set.

If case bonds are not met within 30 days after the contract is awarded, it will be forfeited and the \$250 fee goes to the City of Eastland.

The necessary bond was lowered from \$20,000 to \$10,000 with a total liability insurance of \$100,000 being required.

A minimum of 120 days was allotted for completion of tearing down the old building and clearing the site with a penalty for every day over that amount.

City Manager James Young stated, "With bad weather coming on, no penalty will be made for those days on which work is unable to be done due to weather conditions."

Collection To Be Displayed At Cisco College

Woody Crumbo, eminent among painters of Indian art, will send an exhibit consisting of 36 paintings to be displayed in the Cisco Junior College library during the month of November.

The comprehensive exhibit of American Indian art in the media of silk screen and etching techniques will depict various phases of Indian life, including ceremonial, dances, costumes and animal pictures.

Crumbo is noted as painter, etcher and silk screen maker. A Julius Rosenwald Foundation Fellowship was his first major art recognition. He is represented by six murals in the Department of Interior Building, Washington, D. C. and by more than 150 paintings in the collections of the Gilcrease Foundation, Tulsa, Okla.

Crumbo joined the staff of the El Paso Museum of Art to become Curator of Western Americana in August, 1960. Paintings on display at Cisco Junior College will be for sale.

Browsing With Bev

Here are some do's and don'ts for hanging pictures.

- DO
- (1) Hang your pictures flat against the wall.
- (2) Glue pieces of foam

rubber at the lower corners of pictures. This prevents dust from collecting behind the picture and keeps the picture straight on the wall.

(3) Use gummed-cloth hangers for light weight pictures. They work best on smooth walls. To apply them, moisten the glue and press to the wall. The hook is ready to use when the paste dries. To remove, moisten the cloth with water

and peel off.

(4) Use regular picture hooks, available in many sizes, to hang medium weight pictures, mirrors, etc. Drive the long brad through the hook at an angle, increasing the weight it can hold.

(5) Drive nails or brads through an X of cellophane tape to prevent plaster from cracking when the nail is removed.

(6) Use two parallel wires down from the picture molding at the ceiling to give adequate support for heavy mirrors and pictures.

To hide wires used this way, paint them the exact color of the wall.

(7) Try grouping three pictures with a lamp for an informal arrangement. Let the lamp take the place of a fourth picture. The lamp then lights the group.

(8) Place a picture at the side of a furniture grouping with a plant, lamp or other accessories to balance the unit. The informal arrangement is often more pleasing than the stiff formal one, which always centers a picture above a piece of furniture.

BONTS

(1) Let hanging devices and wires show. Keep the ones that must show as much in the background as possible.

(2) Place a picture in a dark corner where it will be lost.

(3) Use too many pictures just because you have them. Use a few each season and store the rest.

(4) Dwarf a small picture by hanging it in a very large wall space.

(5) Make your stairway a safety hazard by placing pictures stair-step fashion all the way up. Use pictures and mirrors at top, or at landing.

(6) Form a zig-zag line with pictures around a room.







Unclaimed Social Security Checks Awaiting Many

The Abilene office of the Social Security Administration has written letters to some 600 near-by West Texans who seem to be due monthly retirement checks but who haven't claimed them, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager. Many of the letters are being returned as undeliverable, as the only available addresses were those used when social security cards were obtained, possibly as far back as 1937.

If you meet the following conditions, and have not already filed a claim for your social security, you may well be one of the more than 365,000 potential beneficiaries being sought across the nation:

1. You were born in 1896 or earlier, and
 2. You have had earnings covered by social security from 1 1/2 to 3 years, any time since 1936, depending on your sex and exact date of birth.
- The 1961 Amendments greatly liberalized the entitlement requirements as well as the earnings limitations governing the right to collect before age 72, the age at which benefits are payable regardless of the size of continued high earnings.

Texas Tourist Industry On Upswing After Decline

The Tex. Tourist industry may be on the upswing again after a long period of decline, the Texas Highway Department said today.

The Department reported that the number of tourists serviced this summer by its Tourist Bureaus was up 22 per cent over a year ago, while summer requests handled through its Austin mailing offices were up 26 per cent as compared to 1961. Comparison was made for the months of June, July and August for the years 1961 and 1962.

The Highway Department's statistical research has shown a steady decline in the number of tourists visiting Texas since 1957. However, preliminary findings this year indicate that the stepped-up tourist attraction activities of the Department may be taking hold to level off this decline and encourage a moderate upswing, despite the unavailability of funds for a media advertising program to compete with other states.

As the state's official tourist agency, the Department has increased its travel promotion

activities to the point where it now provides travel service to more than 550,000 people annually and reaches millions more through a nationwide program which generates free publicity for Texas.

The Department now distributes more than two million pieces of travel literature annually to encourage vacationing in Texas, and operates eight Tourist Bureaus at key entry points to the state. These "hospitality centers" are located at Gainsville, Denison, Texarkana, Wichita Falls, Orange, Waskom,

Laredo and Anthony, near El Paso.

They are staffed with trained Travel Counselors who make use of extensive knowledge of the state to encourage additional tourist travel on the part of visitors who stop at the bureaus.

These tourist attraction activities are financed from highway revenues. However, a national media advertising program cannot be implemented until a special appropriation is made to the Highway Department from the General Fund in accordance with state law.


