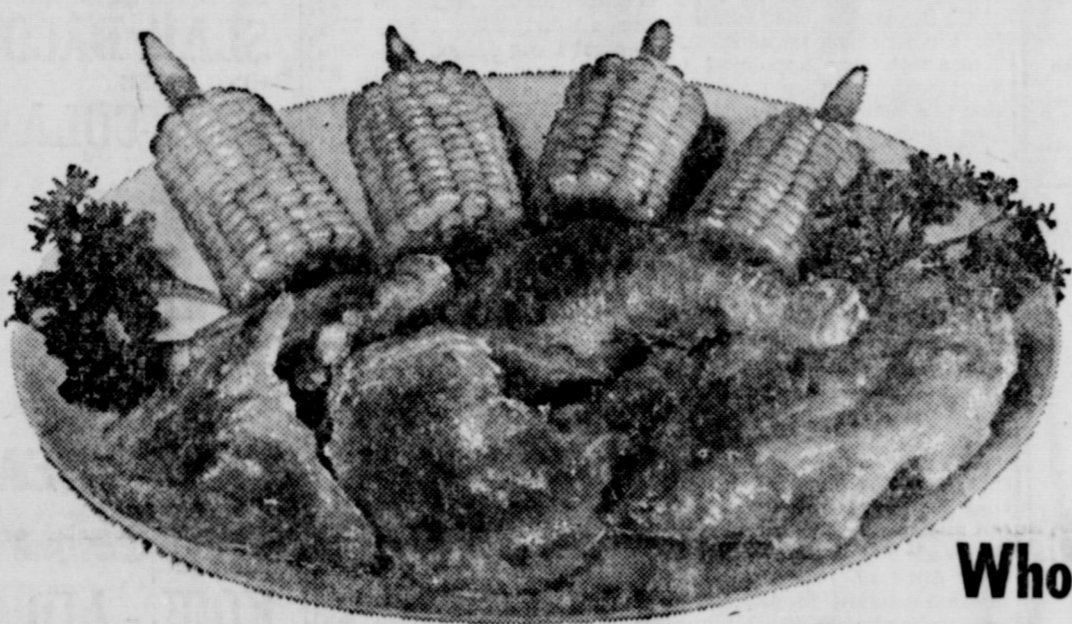

Letters TO THE EDITOR

Editor: I had been a member of the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department for eight years. Since I have been a member, I have observed a division in the department - those who wanted to move forward and try new ideas, and those who are not willing to do anything but sit still. I have supported anything I thought would be better for the department. On October 15, 1962, the department decided in favor of C. B. Radio base station for the fire department. A committee was appointed to meet with the City Commission and bring our request before them. I was a member of that committee and worked harder than anyone else for C. B. Radio. On Nov. 19 this committee met with the City Commission and was refused permission to install the C. B. base station. On Dec. 3, 1962 (in the presence of a reporter) the fire department voted in favor of the C. B. radio but that any further action involving the city commission be postponed until a later date. But the fact remained that the fire department still wanted the base station when the city got ready for us to have it. On April 19, 1963, the commission saw fit to grant the go ahead with it. No one from the department asked the commission for their decision. Instead of the whole department giving appreciation for their decision, some immediately started saying the Commission went over our heads and is trying to cram C. B. down our throats. Nothing could have been farther from the truth. When the chief was asked by some of the volunteers if they could install a donated antenna, he refused to let them do it. He stated it was not the will of the department. When we explained that the minutes of Dec. 3 was for C. B. radio, he declared the minutes of that meeting were not correct, yet the department unanimously approved these minutes at the following meeting. Mayor Don Pierson asked Fire Chief Guy Robinson, "Why are you so opposed to C. B. radio?" Guy answered, "Things have been said about me over the radio that I didn't like." This was his reason for opposing the radio. If this isn't a personal grudge, I don't know what one is. Pierson requested the fire department to call a special meeting to decide on the issue. The chief and some of his volunteers contacted each volunteer. Some of the volunteers he just reminded of the meeting, others he had quite a discussion with. At the meeting, the chief refused to allow any discussion on the issue before voting and refused to read the minutes of the Dec. 3 meeting. Why? This was a business matter of the entire department and should have been discussed by all. What was said to persuade the majority to reverse their decision of Dec. 3? All other fire departments in the county have installed, ordered the equipment or favorably discussed the use of C. B. Radio. It is only a matter of time until Eastland will have to use C. B. equipment, in order to coordinate with other departments in the county. If the Eastland volunteers want to stand still, I do not want to waste my time trying to help when it is not appreciated. If Fire Chief Guy Robinson honestly believes the minutes were wrong, and that the department never voted in favor of the C. B. Radio base station, then I have the highest respect for his determination for what he felt was right. DARRELL G. BASHAM

I will be in the office of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce Wednesday, May 22 and June 5, 1963 at 10:00 a. m. A number of Eastland County residents usually are there to inquire about their social security status and discuss their retirement plans.
May I say there is a time when a person should make his first inquiry about social security retirement benefits — at age 62. Then again at age 65, or 72 even though still working, if no claim was filed earlier.
At age 62 it is possible to get social security benefits, you will have a reduction in your check of at least 20 percent. So, if your monthly benefit for age 65 is \$100.00 you

Those who attended the annual Eastland County Budding School here April 18 have been invited to meet at 2 p.m. Thursday, May 9, at the Kent Word orchard to see the results of their practice work. County Agent J. M. Cooper announced.
"We will cut and remove the tapes around the buds on the small pecan trees that were budded," Mr. Cooper said. "After the tape is removed, we will carefully remove it. We will then prick the bark on the bud patch. If it is green then we will force it out."
"Forcing it out as you already know means cutting the top of the small tree off so as to force the plant food nutrients and the sap directly into the patch of bark containing the bud of our desired variety. The meeting will probably last about an hour and a half."
The pecan school was held at Cisco Junior College. The Word orchard is on the Leon River, south of Cisco on the Rising Star highway.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — A friend of mine no long association, I arranged relative-died without funds or a funeral and picked up the family recently. Due to our tab. The deceased has served

A — Patients requiring emergency medical treatment may be taken directly to the nearest VA hospital, but if possible the veteran or someone acting for him should communicate with the VA by telephone or telegraph beforehand.
Q — Can a widow of a veteran live with another man as his wife but continue to draw a VA pension as long as she does not actually marry the man?
A — No. The law governing widow pensions was amended in 1962 to declare such a person not eligible for pension.

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HIGH SCHOOL DROPOUTS

The next five years, approximately 325,000 young people will walk out of between the ninth and high school graduation school official estimates, represents a loss of \$75 billion in lifetime earnings.

Starting facts about the problem are reprinted in the April issue of "Outlook," the Texas Teachers Association journal.

Every five pupils in the eighth grade in 1949-50, only one graduated from high school in 1960-61. There were 208,452 in that first class and only 85,102 received a high school diploma.

In the eighth grade, there were 176,000. Education officials are predicting that 7,000 of these boys and girls won't be at graduation ceremonies in 1965.

The transition from the ninth to the tenth grade is considered the first really critical point. Most boys and girls become 16 years of age that year, and the compulsory attendance law no longer applies to them and their parents. Moreover, they are moving from junior to senior high school, with a stiffer curriculum.

Dropouts face a dead end in a world where education and its skills in the employment field are becoming a necessity, the "Outlook" article states.

"Automation is eliminating the menial kinds of jobs which these kids can do," says Victor Sumner of the Texas Education Agency research division, who made the dropout estimate.

"People in the employment

Browsing With Bev

Americans spend about 500 million dollars a year on food supplements as a result of food fallacies.

The money goes for supplements such as pills, powders, capsules and compounds which are mixtures of vitamins, minerals, exotic herbs, sea weed and dried vegetables.

Fancy prices are paid for these products because there are thousands of door-to-door peddlers, national advertisements, phony health lectures and authors, and self-styled "food scientists" who promote their wares in these typical patterns.

(1) They make mysterious, but appealing, claims for the curative and disease-preventing powers of their products.

(2) They denounce the nutritional value of common everyday foods which they claim are "grown on worn-out soils", or poisoned with chemical fertilizers and pesticides, or robbed of their nutrients by over processing by food manufacturers, or other reasons—none of which are true.

"Quackery" is at the highest point in history, and only are there more frauds, but modern quackery is becoming more sophisticated. It is time we all take a fresh look at this difficult social problem, for if quackery is to be eliminated, the public must be better informed and more and better law enforcement is necessary.

There is a vast amount of untrue information being circulated about calories.

Calories do count, in dollars as well as in pounds.

From the middle of 1960 to the end of 1961, more than 100 new reducing aids were put on the market. There are no drugs which are effective to control appetite, that are safe to take without medical supervision. Most reducing products which can be purchased without a prescription are food supplements, which have no effect on food intake.

No safe reducing diet is quick — and no quick reducing diet is safe.

If one eats more calories than his physical activity burns up, there is a weight gain, and if one eats fewer calories than his body uses, there will be a reduction in weight — regardless of the source of these calories.

Calories do count — and there's much to be said for the steady and steady reducing diet that simply cuts down on the number of calories you eat.

Nutritionists in the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service say it's important for a person on a diet to eat three well-balanced meals a day.

If you can, plan your meals around foods that are a part of the family's way of eating. This will make it easier for you to stick with your diet and easier, too, for the cook.

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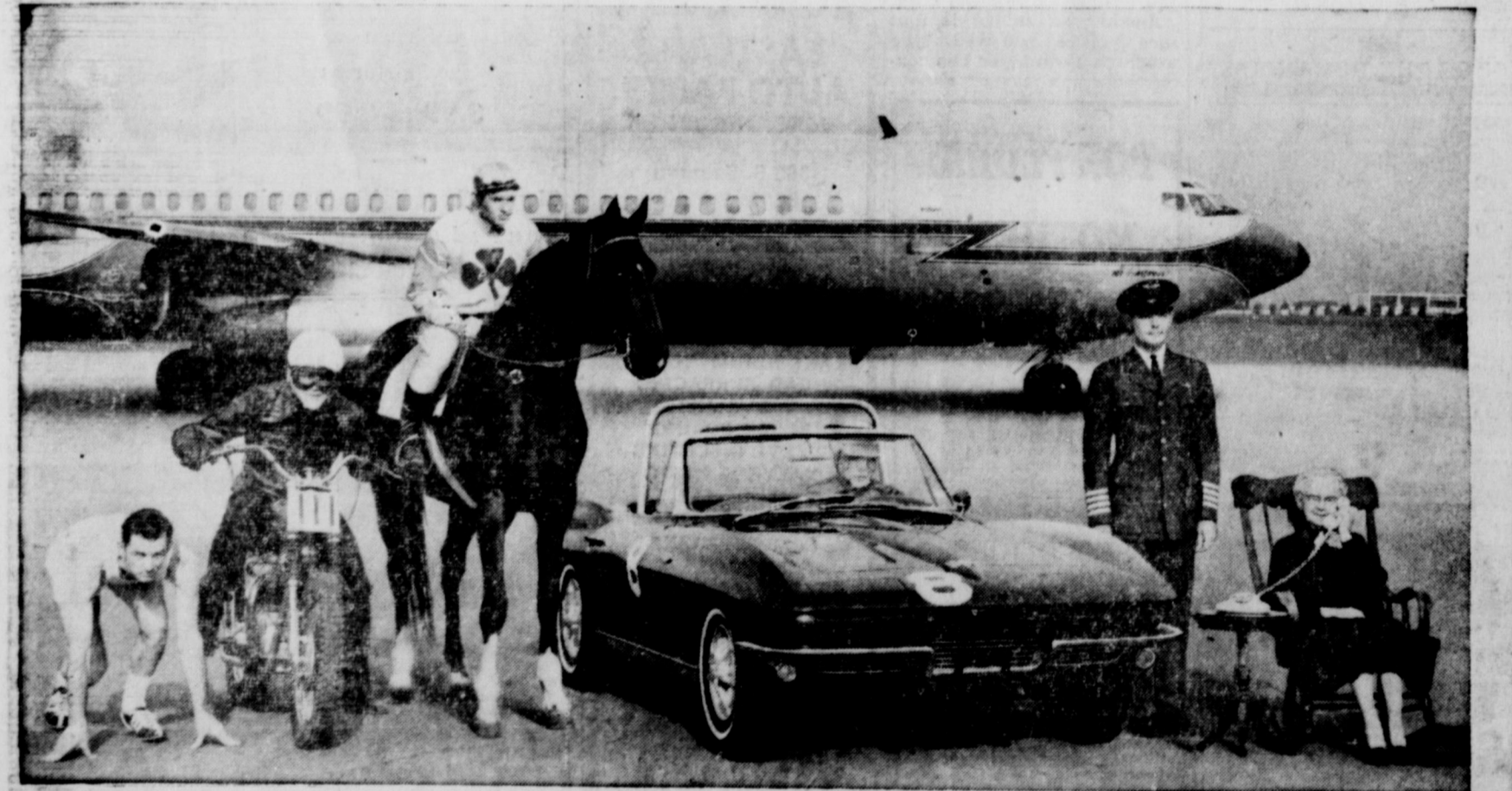


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
