Mother of the Year

Mrs. James Marlyn Jackson, Polio Victim, Wins Contest

Mrs. James M. Jackson, 24, of 209 W. Valley, was chosen as Eastland's "Mother of the Year" in the first annual contest.

Mrs. Jackson will receive an electric, automatic hair dryer from Central Drug; an 8x10 portrait from A&C Studio; a white zipper Bible from the Eastland Telegram; A Mothers Day dinner for four at the White Elephant Restaurant and an evening's entertainment for Mother's family at the Majestic Theatre.

The Winning Mother was entered in the contest by her son, 23-month old David Marlyn Jackson, whose entry stated, "My Mom is the greatest because even though she is handicapped, she takes excellent care of us. My family appreciates her." Added to the entry as a post-script was "My daddy helped me with this."

Tia Juana, a victim of polio, is symbolic of handicapped mothers all over the world. Even though their work may

be a "little harder", that does not mean that they don't give "maybe just a little bit more of themselves to the family."

She was stricken with polio in July, 1951 and was in iron lung at the Hendrix Memorial Hospital, Abilene, for two months. She then took physical therapy treatment at Gorzales Wa Springs Foundation for seven months. She was confined to a wheel chair for one year, then graduated to crutches, which she now uses.

The daughter of Mrs. Juanita Hardy of Dallas and Chester Alford, also of Dallas, Tia Juana was married to Marlyn, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Short of Cisco, in 1954.

She attended Cisco High School and graduated through the American Schools. She also attended one year at Cisco Junior College.

After seven and one-half years of marriage, their son, Davy, was born on July 10, 1961, in the Eastland Memorial Hospital. At birth he weighed four pounds and 15 ounces.

Mrs. Jackson was employed with the State Department of Public Welfare in Eastland for two years prior to her

An 18-year-old college girl nominated her mother, and her entry spoke of nothing except sincerity.

One teenager told what a wonderful chaperone her mother is in her nomination.

A minister's wife, a mother of out-of-town residents, a mother who "cooks good spaghetti and chicken", a mother who understand teenagers, a mother raising a family with-

out a father, and a mother whose love "has shone like a beautiful star through all the years."

And others. They came in all forms and sizes. In pencil and ink, on forms, notebook paper and fine stationery.

If you are a mother, and you live in the Eastland area, chances are that you were nominated. The sponsors regret that there could be but one contest winner.

But, as you know, you are "The" winner in the eyes of those who love you—and this is your day!

...SIGNS CONTRACT FOR COLLECTION OF BACK TAXES

Eastland City Commission steps this week to collect the back taxes owed the city.

A contract with C. L. Chance, Austin tax attorney, was signed Thursday during a special called meeting of the commission.

Chance will be paid 15 percent of what he collects in taxes owed the city.

He already has a contract with the City of Ranger, it was reported, and the City of Cisco is considering using his services. He will also be working for the Eastland School District and the Eastland County Water Board, it is reported.

Chance has collected for the Eastland taxing agencies in the past few years.

Eastland entered into a two-year agreement with his firm.

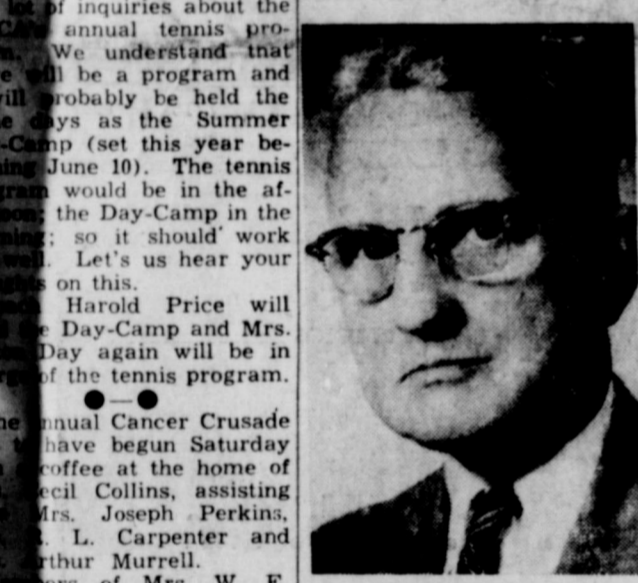
There is \$36,736.14 owed the city in back taxes, dating to 1942. If Chance were to collect all of this, it would mean about \$31,000 in additional operating revenue for the city, and about \$5,510.42 in commission for Chance.

The 1962 taxes do not become delinquent until July 1, but there is \$6,406.09 owed from that year.

For 35 years, Mr. Worley was advertising and public relations counsel for some of America's great industrial concerns in New York. Seven years ago he lost his voice box, through surgery, to cancer and learned to speak in the unusual method he now uses and teaches.

This method of speech depends on developing the knack of swallowing air and then forcing it up through the esophagus in a manner which creates tissue vibration that results in sound. This sound, then moulded in the oral cavity, produces words that are amazingly intelligible.

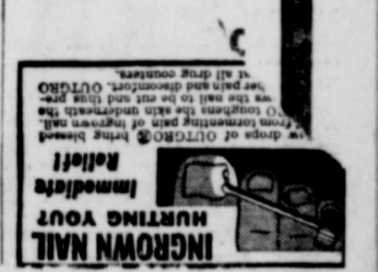

Hospital Week Marks Progress in Medicine

There will be quite a few Eastland area people among the 1,500,000 people who will discover this year that a quiet revolution has taken place in Texas.

These men and women will be admitted as patients into one or another of this state's 556 hospitals. And at Eastland Memorial as in all the others, they'll find in daily use techniques and equipment undreamed of only a generation ago.

Week to salute those whose efforts have developed institutional medicine to its present efficiency and who work toward the improved hospital of the future.

Eastland Memorial is observing the special week and Mayor Don Pierson has signed a proclamation declaring the week here.

Some of the advances in hospital treatment include:

- Shortening of the average stay in hospitals from 40 days in 1900 to 8 days in 1963.
- Development of a host of new products including electronic devices that automatically dispense medicine and give continuous readings on blood pressure, pulse, respiration and temperature.
- Tripling of the use of therapy oxygen since World War II.
- Widespread use of new cost-cutting disposable products—from needles and syringes to bedpans and oxygen masks.
- A guide path for future innovation is provided by the progress of oxygen therapy from a World War I curiosity to the present indispensable role in treatment of respiratory and circulatory difficulties.
- A central oxygen supply

system was added to the local hospital recently as part of the giant expansion program which included the addition of a new wing, Board Chairman Jim Parks has announced.

Excerpts from the official proclamation:

"Whereas hospitals are staffed by professionally trained personnel who daily provide diagnostic, therapeutic, and rehabilitative services of the highest quality to help maintain the health of our citizens; and

"Whereas hospitals further serve the community as a variety of health personnel; and

"Whereas hospitals offer career opportunities and rewarding lifework to many persons in this community; and

"Whereas each member of hospital staff performs a task essential to the recovery of patients or to the safe and efficient operation of the institution;

"Be it resolved that Eastland, in recognition of National Hospital Week, May 12-18, salutes its hospital for its continued progress in health care; for conducting the educational programs that insure a continuing supply of well-trained health personnel, and for providing a growing number of career opportunities for the youth of America."

Thoughts for a Sunday

By REV. E. SURFACE Some 700 years before Christ, a country preacher by the name of Micah carried on his ministry. So startling were his words that they continued, long afterwards, to be remembered. Today we may read some of his words in the Bible book under his name. One central theme runs through the book from beginning to end. It is that God is summoning His people to judgment. It is a sombre picture which the preacher paints, yet he never loses sight of the light which streams forth from the Divine Mercy. God is still the God of salvation. He will turn again and have compassion, for He is a God who pardons iniquity. Never has the essence of the true life of devotion been more beautifully and succinctly expressed than in Micah 6:6-8; not in the multiplication of religious ordinances, not in the most dramatic exhibitions of self-sacrifice, is God worthily served, but in doing justly, loving mercy and kindness, and walking humbly before God! And the last words of Micah express God's nature truly: "He delighteth in mercy. He will turn again. He will have compassion upon us; He will subdue our iniquities. And thou wilt cast all their sins into the depths of the sea." Humility before God best becomes us His creatures. Jesus gave the parable of the proud, self-righteous Pharisee and the humble, repentant tax-collector, then said, "He who exalts himself shall be humbled; he who humbles himself shall be exalted." One hundred years after Micah, in China, Lao-tzu said: "Be utterly humble."
