



It is the common policy of most Chambers of Commerce to serve as an aid to these people. This service is not without reason.


We want these workers to live in our town so that they will stimulate our economy. There should be a central office to help these people. This is just one aspect of Chamber activity.



PERFECT CONTRAST

Last December, as in a legion of past Decembers, the American people bought mountains of Christmas gifts. The stores, as always, were loaded with an infinite variety of wares. The buyer was limited only by his own tastes, judgement, and pocketbook.

The American retail store, large or small, chain or independent, provides a perfect contrast between an economic system based on free competition and free choice, and an economic system based on official decree.

In the Soviet Union, despite its vast population and its wealth of natural resources, the shortage of consumer goods has become so acute that Premier Khruschev has been complaining, and official heads have rolled. In Red China-also with a vast population and a wealth of natural resources-only subsistence items, food included, can be found in the stores, and even those are in tragically short supply



All vehicles coming under the provisions of the Texas Vehicle Inspection Act must secure the 1963 inspection sticker by April 15, 1963. After that date, vehicles not displaying the new inspection sticker will b_e operating in violation of the law and the operators of those vehicles will be subject to arrest, Garrison said. He reported that approximately one half of the inspect-ion period has expired and

about one fourth of the vehicles in the state have been inspected. Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, he added, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

"There are approximately 5,000 authorized inspection stations in the State and they are ready and capable of handling the inspection of all vehicles without delay if the owners of uninspected vehicles do not wait until the last few days before the deadline," Garrison





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
