## Daniel Boone To Give Three School Programs

Proposed plans for a new elementary school and a method of financing the construction of such a school will be discussed for members of the Parent-Teachers Association

Tuesday. Members and their guests will meet at 3:45 p.m. in the Eastland High School auditorium.

In order to hear a similar program, the Eastland Rotary and Lions Clubs will hold a joint meeting Tuesday at noon in the White Elephant.

Approximately 30 local citizens will be invited to attend a meeting at 7 p.m. in the high school on Tuesday.

Guest speakers for the three meetings will be Daniel Boone of the Abilene architectural firm of Boone and Pope and Morris Dudley of Almon and McKinney, Dallas investment banking firm.

Boone will describe the building which his firm has planned for Eastland, explaining its cost. Dudley will discuss a financial proposition for financing such a school.

Both men are representatives of firms employed by the Eastland School Board to advise them in regard to the school.

Among the Abilene buildings designed by the Boone and Pope firm are Cooper High School, the First Bank, Horace Mann and James Madison Junior High Schools and Jan Long and Reagan Elementary Schools. The firm has in the design stage, the U. S. Post Office and Federal Building in Abilene, a \$1,250,000 construction, the City Service Center and a science building and field house for McMurry College.

Boone, chief architect of the firm, is a graduate of the University of Texas. He is a member of the American Institute of Architects, the Texas Society of Architects, and the Texas State Board, Advisory Examiners.

## Local Auction And Bank Join in '\$-0-\$' Appeal

Eastland Livestock Auction Co. is actively lending support to the statewide campaign to raise \$1 million urgently needed by southwest Animal Health Research Foundation to complete eradication of the ravaging screwworm.

The local livestock auction market, owned and operated by D. S. Buchanan, is participating in "3-0-\$ Week in Texas," Jan. 21-26, to aid the Eastland County Animal Health Committee, in its local fund-raising drive.

The six-day statewide observance is sponsored by the livestock auction market industry of Texas in cooperation with the Foundation which recently announced the screwworm eradication program may be scuttled March 31 due to a crucial \$1 million shortage in the SWAHRF producer fund.

Stock raisers in the county were asked to contribute 50 cents per head for all cattle and horses, and ten cents per head for all sheep, goats and hogs.

## New Court Meets . . .

## County Employs Ranger Man To Head Surplus Food Program

J. W. Elder of Ranger was appointed surplus foods administrator in Eastland County to replace J. J. Porter, Sr., of Cisco, at the regular meeting of the Commissioners' Court at Eastland Monday. No reason for the change was given.

The replacement of Mr. Porter was discussed by the commissioners during a December meeting, but no record of any action was made in the minutes. Judge Scott Bailey said Tuesday that the matter came up in Monday's meeting unexpectedly to him.

A letter signed by Judge Bailey and commissioners was delivered to Mr. Porter Tuesday morning. The letter stated that his job with the county would terminate on February 1.

The motion to appoint Mr. Elder to the post was made by Commissioner Tip Arther and seconded by Commissioner Buck Collins. Only Commissioner C. B. Dill of Cisco voted against it.

Mr. Porter said Wednesday morning that he had asked Judge Bailey to call a special session of the commission to permit him (Mr. Porter) to confer with the commissioners.

Judge Bailey, Porter said, told him that he didn't feel that the circumstances merited a special session, but that he was perfectly welcome to attend the next regular meeting of the commission, Monday, Jan. 28th.

Mr. Porter said that if he doesn't get what he believes to be fair consideration in this county, that he will take the matter to State Department of Public Welfare in Austin.

He said that he believes he should continue in the program at least until August 31, date for which the current contract is in effect.

A feature article concerning Mr. Porter, his work and the success of the program appeared in Sunday's edition of this newspaper.

In other action, the court voted to place certain county officials, with the exception of justices of the peace, under a salary fund rather than pay them under the fee basis. This action, it was explained, was to comply with laws affecting counties under 20,000 population.

The constables in Cisco, Eastland and Ranger were given salary raises to equal those at Gorman and Rising Star — \$125 per month.

The court re-instated the \$70 per month travel expense for the judge.

Salary increases were approved for the first deputy in the offices of the county clerk and district clerk, to give them the same pay scale as first deputies in other departments.

Dr. E. R. Townsend of Eastland will be re-appointed to serve another two-year term as county health officer.

James Wright of Eastland was re-appointed to serve as county veterans service officer for the coming two years. Appointed as his assistants were Roy Williams of Ranger, John Nunnally of Rising Star, Lee Wallace of Gorman, and O. A. Nance of Cisco.

A statement for \$1,051.80 was presented to the court by Mrs. Roy Young of Eastland, who had been hired to make a delinquent tax roll for the past two years.

H. A. Tyrone of Gorman and Henry Lovell of Carbon met with the court to request payment for their work in the brucellosis program being carried

## Reading Is Popular Here; Youngsters Pick Classics

Everybody in Eastland reads a lot—and apparently the youngsters have the better reading habits.

All types of books are taken of course, but mysteries led the list for adults.

The teenagers select classics while the elders pick mysteries, according to a report by Mrs. A. E. Cushman, librarian at Eastland Public Library.

Biographies and horse stories were most popular with the youngsters.

Last year 530 different people read books from the library. There were 394 young people checking out books and 136 adults.

In all, 5,867 books were checked out last year, Mrs. Cushman reports. The teenagers took 3,456 and the adults, 2,411 books.

The library bought 249 new books, 35 were donated and nine were given as memorials, making 293 books added to the shelves last year.

Carla Boustead was chosen library patron for the month of December for having read the most of any young person.

The Library Committee of the Thursday afternoon club announced these new books: "The Man Who Played God" by Robert St. John; "Beyond Your Doorstep" by Hal Borland; "The Forest," Life magazine; "Only Fifty Years Ago" by Gladys Hasty Carroll; "Gambit" by Rex Stout; "The Zebra-striped Hearse" by Ross Mc MacDonald and "Favorite Poems Old and New for Boys and Girls".

## PERFECT CONTRAST

Last December, as in a legion of past Decembers, the American people bought mountains of Christmas gifts. The stores, as always, were loaded with an infinite variety of wares. The buyer was limited only by his own tastes, judgement, and pocketbook.

The American retail store, large or small, chain or independent, provides a perfect contrast between an economic system based on free competition and free choice, and an economic system based on official decree.

In the Soviet Union, despite its vast population and its wealth of natural resources, the shortage of consumer goods has become so acute that Premier Khrushchev has been complaining, and official heads have rolled. In Red China—also with a vast population and a wealth of natural resources—only subsistence items, food included, can be found in the stores, and even those are in tragically short supply.

## \$-O-\$ Proclamation

WHEREAS, the livestock industry of our surrounding area is a key factor in the economic progress and prosperity of our community, and

WHEREAS, annihilation of the costly screwworm is vital to the welfare of the livestock industry in our own trade territory and over Texas and the Southwest, and

WHEREAS, the highly successful screwworm eradication program — jointly sponsored by Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, Texas Animal Health Commission and U. S. Department of Agriculture — will be halted March 31 unless an additional \$1,000,000 in producer funds is secured, and

WHEREAS, 32 leading Texas livestock and agricultural organizations which support this campaign and our County Animal Health Committee have launched an extensive and intensive drive to meet this grave financial emergency.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, as Chairman of the City Commission of the City of Eastland, do hereby designate January 21 through January 26 as "S-O-S WEEK" and urge livestock producers and businesses associated with and supporting our livestock industry to lend their full financial support to this important fund-raising effort.

## An Appeal...

An urgent "\$-O-\$" distress call is being sent out to farmers and ranchers of Texas during January by Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and supporting livestock organizations.

It's an all-out emergency appeal for \$1 million in producer contributions to meet the under-subscribed \$3 million SWAHRF goal required to continue the effective program now in progress to eradicate the costly screwworm from Texas and the Southwest according to C. G. Scruggs of Dallas, Foundation president.

One of the highlights of the big January fund-raising drive will be "\$-O-\$ Week in Texas" sponsored by the livestock auction market industry during a whirlwind six-day statewide campaign — January 21-26.

"Operation of the screw worm eradication program is reaching a very critical stage in its financing," declared R. Taylor of Amarillo, president of Texas Livestock Auction Assn. "And it is hoped that our '\$-O-\$ Week in Texas' may result in raising substantial funds to materially aid and assist the Foundation which represents livestock producers of Texas and the Southwest."

board of trustees of Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and a past TLAAP president, are co-chairman of the special 200-member "\$-O-\$ Screwworm Eradication Committee.

### Auto Inspection Deadline Is April 15

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today urged Texas automobile owners to "do their shopping early" this year to reduce the last minute rush for inspection stickers.

All vehicles coming under the provisions of the Texas Vehicle Inspection Act must secure the 1963 inspection sticker by April 15, 1963. After that date, vehicles not displaying the new inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and the operators of those vehicles will be subject to arrest, Garrison said.

He reported that approximately one half of the inspection period has expired and about one fourth of the vehicles in the state have been inspected. Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, he added, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

"There are approximately 5,000 authorized inspection stations in the State and they are ready and capable of handling the inspection of all vehicles without delay if the owners of uninspected vehicles do not wait until the last few days before the deadline," Garrison said.

ment paying families don't see much need for a family lawyer. Often only under prodding, one may have his lawyer prepare a will. But can you tell a big legal risk from a small one? Can you spot the signs of legal trouble?

Check with your family lawyer when: 1. Your status changes: upon coming of age, marriage, the birth of your children, buying a house, divorce or death. For you may then need to draft or revise your will, change your insurance, or re-figure

your taxes. 2. You buy or sell. Look out for flaws in the papers before you go into debt, part with money, or sign anything involving big expenditures or long term obligations. 3. You enter into other contracts. Promises, spoken or

written, bind you if they call for a "consideration", something of value in return. 4. Someone threatens your rights: The law exists to defend them but with some rights you must take action yourself for them to work for you. When you can bring your lawyer "live" facts (e.g. unsigned contracts, vexing tax returns you haven't filed), he can do much more for you, and at a smaller cost than when you bring him "cold" facts (mistakes you have made which threaten trouble).

But above all, get both live and cold facts to him at once. For time may run out in many such situations. Your lawyer may be able to do something for you today, which he cannot do tomorrow. Tell your lawyer what you want. Tell him all the facts, good or bad and then keep him informed all along. He is sworn to keep what you tell in confidence, and he cannot serve you well without full knowledge. (This newsfeature, prepared by the State Bar of Texas, is written to inform—not to advise. New Oil Discovery Well Seen For Area North of

A new Mississippi oil discovery well was in prospect for Eastland County this week after the Texstar Petroleum Co. and Low Drilling Co. et al No. 1 F. O. Stokes, a wildcat test, flowed on two drill stem tests. The test is located eight miles northeast of Cisco near the "Y" intersection of the Cisco, Eastland and Breckenridge highways.

Pipe has been cemented to the bottom of the hole at 3,970 feet and plans call for completion work to begin in the next few days.

The first drill stem test, from 3,693 to 3,760 feet, yielded gas to the surface in one minute with gas cut mud in the hole. A later test from 3,760 to 3,855 feet had gas to the surface in two minutes and oil flowing in 32 minutes. The final test was from 3,855 to 3,915 feet and oil flowed again in 33 minutes after gas appeared at the surface in two minutes.

The test is three miles from the same companies' Mississippi production discovery last year on the Gordon Woods land. It was understood that Texstar and Low have about 400 acres of land under lease

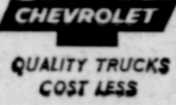

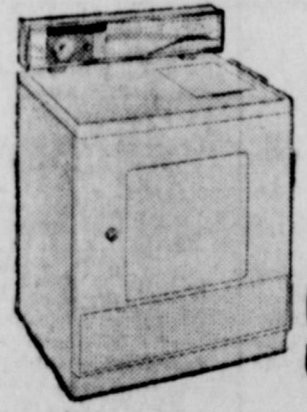
