



plants have crinkled or curled leaves while normal plants have smooth leaves.

Geneticists with the USDA have shown that the crinkleleaf characteristic is a domi nant inheritance when introduced into a cross between two peanut lines. This mutation can be easily seen at an early stage of the plant's de-
