Which Do You Prefer—11 or 30-Acre Tract?

Voters in the Eastland Independent School District will go to the polls Thursday, mark a simple ballot, and thereby decide where their new air-conditioned elementary school building will be situated.

Preliminary estimates released this past week indicate that selection of the 30-acre tract will cost about \$2,600 more than it would to develop the 11-acre tract.

Both sites has backers in town, but the school board has maintained a "no choice" attitude throughout.

The school has owned the 30 acres, located south of town, for several years, and this site was assumed to be the one on which a new elementary would be built, but immediately before the Feb. 9th \$525,000 bond issue election, the 11-acre site became available, so the board took options to buy the 11-acres, and decided to hold a referendum election to let the voters decide on the site.

Cost of developing the 30 acres is expected to be about \$16,000 (\$6,000 for water line; \$4,000 for sewerage; and \$6,000 for the materials to pave necessary streets) to which could be added the original cost of the tract which was about \$2,000 and which would bring the total to about \$18,000.

Cost of developing the 11 acres is expected to be about \$13,400 (\$8,000 for its purchase; \$2,400 for fencing; and \$3,000 for water).

The fence on the 11-acre tract is believed necessary because the site lies adjacent to what will eventually be Highway 6, when it is re-routed through the city of Walnut St.

Opponents of the 30-acre tract contend that it's virtually "undevelopable" because of its low uneven topography.

Some feel too, that cost of developing the 30 acres will far exceed the preliminary estimates when the actual work begins.

There are those too who reason that developing the 30 acres would open "new territory" including the 11-acre site, for further growth in the city.

On the other hand opponents of the 11-acre site feel (Continued on page five)

Who's Been Indicted? No Return on Capiases

There has been quite a bit of confusion, during the past few weeks between newsmen and officials in 91st District Court.

Center of the controversy has to do with the Cisco Hasey murder case and the indictments returned by a grand jury recently.

Among the eight indictments was one for murder but the District clerk does not enter the indicted person until the "capiases" has been returned to him.

A capias is a warrant for arrest. It is a legal term ordering an arrest, and is from the Latin, "You may take."

Fort Worth Fishermen Catch Bass

Fisherman Leo Wadley and John Michener, both of Fort Worth, caught seven black bass weighing a combined total of 36 pounds Thursday at Lake Leon.

Caught on yellow and black and black and white Coach Dog Hell Benders, the largest of the bass weighed between six and one half to seven pounds.

According to a report, the fish were caught in shallow water, three to six feet deep.

SMITH ANSWERS

More Water at Better Rate; Help the School As We Can'

There are, in our city, several hazards for pedestrians and drivers. We need a better traffic control program," he said in reply to intensifying traffic control.

Concerning citizens band radio facilities for the Fire Department he says "A study of citizens band radio should be conducted."

He is a captain in the fire department and has been active in seeking city cooperation in utilization C. B. radio system—which would entail installation of a base station at the fire station, for use by the Volunteers in emergency work.

"The citizens have a right to know our city's standings," he said, "Yes, publish a monthly report." This was his answer concerning publication of a regular financial report.

"We could use a building code, but at this time I feel we

have more important business to attend. Let us consider lowering our water rates first."

He was most outspoken about the city charter. "Our city charter is old and I am sure needs several revisions. Times have changed. To keep modern, we must adjust ourselves to the modern world in which we live. I am in favor of a study to up-grade our standards," he says.

Making Eastland a recreation center? Smith says "I believe the city commission can work with and help our civic organizations to beautify our city. That will attract more tourists each year."

Paving Available Through City

Eastland residents interested in having paving done are being reminded that now is a mighty good time.

City manager Lewis Tiner has been approached by a representative of the firm that is doing the extensive paving work in Ranger, and these services will be available in Eastland if enough residents are interested.

Tiner says the firm is offering to do paving work for about half what it generally costs.

The firm will do a 30- by 300 feet strip for about \$200 Tiner said, and this is about what the materials have cost the city when they provide the labor and equipment.

Anyone interested, is asked to contact Tiner at the city hall.

Asked if the city plans to do any paving of its own, Tiner said that he doubted it because the city "can't afford it now," but this does provide an excellent opportunity for our city, for any who may be considering paving.

The finished paving is of superior quality and exceeds that which the city does, he said. Specifications of the firm are for about 8 of an inch of paving, but has generally been running closer to an inch, he said.

The firm will be finished and will leave Ranger in about 140 days, he said.

Thoughts for a Sunday

First Presbyterian Church
"DEPENDABILITY"

In the rush of our lives, in this day of ours, the energies of most people are scattered thinly over a great variety of interests and activities. As a result, this, or perhaps as the cause of this, the lives of multitudes are disorganized and without any semblance of order. Along with this disorder and lack of organization, each day's living brings with it a lot of lack of a sense of responsibility and undependability.

How much can we depend upon others to do what they have promised to do? How much can others depend upon us, to meet our promised obligations and responsibilities.

There is one area that we want to meditate upon for a moment: that is in the realm of meeting appointments on time. There are those, in business, and in social relations, who faithfully promise that they will be a certain place at a certain time. Is it very important that this promise be fulfilled. We think so.

The Eighth Commandment reads: "Thou shalt not steal." This means that God commands us, specifically, not only to take some material thing which is not rightfully ours, "Thou shalt not steal" means also, that God commands us not to rob another of his time, or his good name, or of his joy, or of his peace, and so on. Yet we all do it.

We are interested, just now, in this: a business man states that he will come to the house at a certain time to do a specific needed job. He doesn't come. If he does when he does come, he says that he just couldn't get to it. But if only he had called, at the time, to tell us he couldn't get to it, instead, he literally broke the Eighth Commandment and stole the time of the one to whom he had made the promise.

Dependability is a virtue

which is not so common as it ought to be among us. To begin a meeting, or a service on the announced time, is a vital necessity. Why should those who come on time be penalized by the late coming of others? It is not fair thus to reward those who come late for breaking the Eighth Commandment. "Thou shalt not steal"—and thereby to condemn those who are dependable.

Let each of us resolve to be dependable; to be the sort of person who can be depended upon to do exactly what he says he will do. No one would deny that, sometimes, certain other obligations come up which keep us from our first promise.

But there are exceptions. At least we can, should such unforeseen matters arise, get in touch with the first party, and state our reason for failing to keep our promise. We owe at least this.

For a major quality of virtue is that we may be trusted. We trust in, we believe in God, because He can be trusted; because He ever remains faithful to His promises.

that location of the school next to what will be a state highway, which traffic undoubtedly will increase, will entail enormous safety problems, even with a chain link fence.

Following that reasoning further, others believe that there might be a possibility that the state might re-route the highway "around town" should the school be located next to Walnut St.

Having had their problems with Walnut St. before, the State Highway Dept., at least on the district level, has refused to comment on the situation either way.

The ballots will read "FOR the 11-acre site," and "FOR the 30-acre tract," and voters will mark through the choice which they do not prefer, leaving unmarked the choice which they do prefer.

Voting requirements will be the same as those used in the bond issue election—a voter must be a resident of the district, of legal voting age, possessors of poll tax receipts or be exempt, AND have property, real or personal, rendered for school taxation.

Polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. in the first-floor lounge at the Courthouse. Costs for developing either site will apparently be shared by the school and the city. The city has agreed to cooperate, but hasn't spelled out exactly to what extent.

All costs by the school will of course have to come from the \$525,000 in bond money.

Of the eight indictments returned on Feb. 20 by the current grand jury, only three have been returned. These were the three youths from Cisco accused of setting grass fires. They were tried, but found "not guilty" due to a lack of evidence, and new charges filed against them.

The same grand jury had returned nine indictments earlier, on Feb. 8, and all but one of these, one for forgery, has been returned and the indicted tried.

Asked about these occurrences, District Clerk Roy Laie said,

"It has been reported in various ways that the defendant in the murder case is still under a \$10,000 bond, executed prior to the presentation of the indictment and the issuance of the capias; however, no such bond has been filed for record in this office as of this date (March 7)."

Lane went on to say, "It was reported in the Abilene Reporter-News (Tuesday, March 5th) that a date of April 1st had been set for a hearing on a motion for a change of venue filed in this murder case. However, no such motion has been filed in this office as of this date. (March 7)."

We've received numerous phone calls and inquiries, Laie said, about this murder case, as well as some of the other cases in which capias have not been returned, but we cannot reveal the identity of the parties indicted until the capias are returned to this office, according to Art. 394 Code of Criminal Procedure.

A check of the books show that there are several capias unreturned, or at least not showing as having been returned on the criminal docket.

They are as follows: Case No. 1962-2; Sept. 2, 1962; 3; Nov., 1961, 1 (for assault); Oct., 1961, 1 (for assault with intent to rape); July, 1960, 1 (wife desertion); July, 1960, 1; Sept. 1959, 1; May, 1959, 2; and May, 1959, 2.

Books have been placed in the Church Library in memory of Marsha Heckendorn, Mrs. Mary Heckendorn and Mrs. Elsie Fien-ny.

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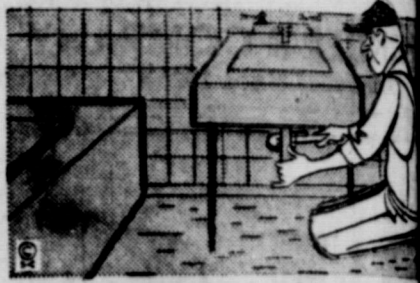
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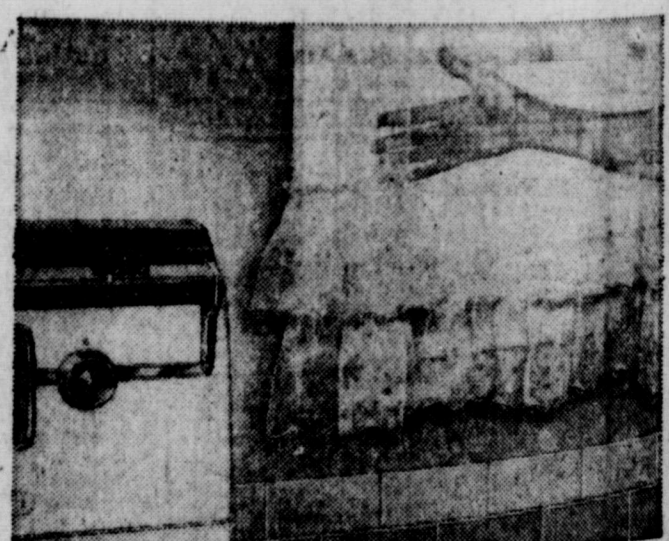
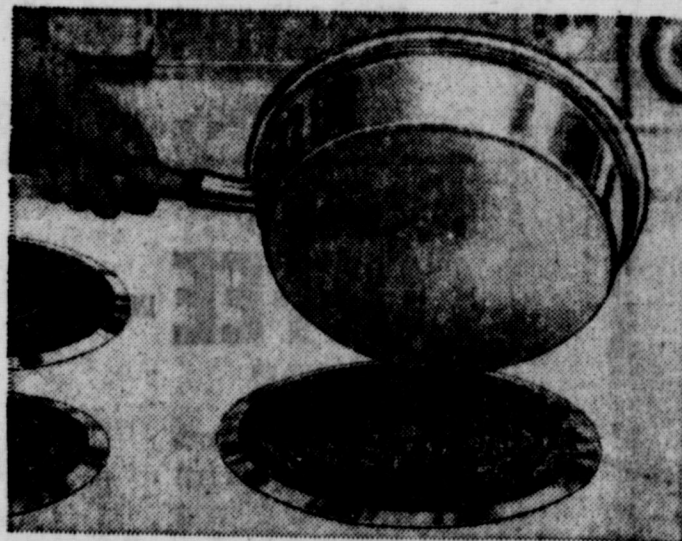


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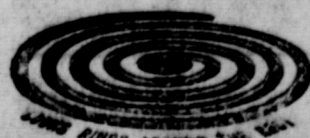
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
