6 Ranger Citizens Honored At Annual C-C Banquet

Six outstanding men and women of Ranger were honored Friday night at the annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet held at Lone Cedar Country at 7:30 p.m.

Chosen by popular vote of Ranger citizens, awards of engraved plaques were presented to Bill Auvershine as Man of the Year; Mrs. Dewey Cox, Jr., Woman of the Year; B. B. Freeman, Rural Citizen of the Year; Mrs. John R. Finto, Saleslady of the Year; and Earl Lebrado Salasman of the Year. A special award of Citizen of the Year was presented to Mayor Morris Newham. Directors of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce selected Mr. Newham as recipient of this special award.

Awards were announced by Dr. Theodore Nickisch, president of Ranger Junior College, and presentations of the awards were made by Richard Henderson, president of the chamber of commerce.

Certificates of Merit awards for outstanding efforts of individuals in community work were presented to Mr. Henderson for his work as president

of the chamber of commerce; W. T. Eaton, for work as chairman of the agriculture committee; Morris Campbell for assistance in many projects and to Dr. W. P. Watkins, for his untiring efforts to tend the sick, especially when, for a six-month period Ranger had the services of only one doctor.

2. Not deceive itself by saying it has explored all possibilities.
3. Not be afraid to attempt big things and.

Pecan Bake Contest Rules Are Released

Rules for the bake contest to be held in conjunction with the Eastland County Pecan Show in Ranger Dec. 14-15 have been released by the County Home Demonstration Clubs Council, sponsors of the contest.

The Council will also sponsor the Pecan Arrangements Show. Rules for entries in this show have also been released.

Following are rules for both contests:

BAKE SHOW RULES

1. There shall be five divisions of products with a requirement for each:
 - a. Pies — must enter one whole pie
 - b. Cakes — must enter one whole cake
 - c. Candy — must enter at least 6 pieces
 - d. Cookies — must enter at least 6 cookies
 - e. Nut Bread — must enter one whole loaf
2. All entries must contain pecans
3. Anyone, man or woman, from this county or an adjoining county may enter products in the show
4. All entries must be entered and in place by 11:00 A. M. when the judging will begin (Dec. 14)
5. The two judges will be trained in Home Economics
6. Score cards will be used to judge entries in all 5 divisions and each member of the ribbon awarded according to score

7. A grand prize will be given in the cake division
8. Each entry becomes the property of the bake show to be sold and the proceeds will all go to the Home Demonstration Council
9. None of the products entered in the bake show will be sold until December 15 (Saturday)

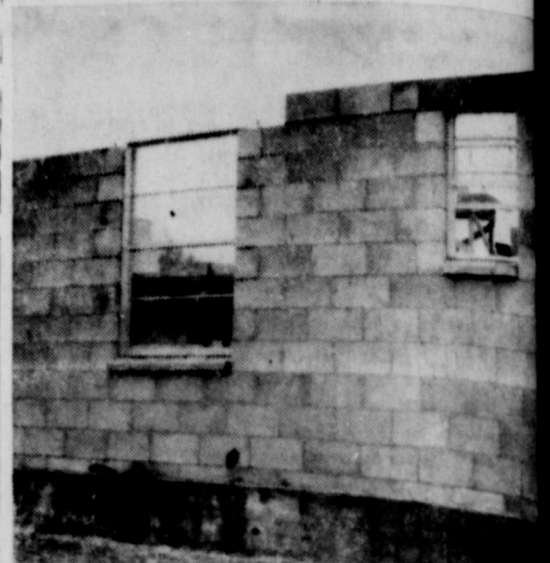
Please bring your products on disposable plates, foil or paper, or pieces of stiff cardboard so that there will be no risk of losing cake or pie plates.

PECAN ARRANGEMENTS

This year, the Eastland County Home Demonstration Council will also sponsor the Pecan Arrangements Show. This will consist of centerpieces and arrangements made from pecans or parts of the pecan plant, such as the leaves. The rules for this show are as follows:

1. There will be three prizes given to the top three entries.
2. All entries must have in the arrangement, pecans or parts of the pecan plant, such as the leaves.
3. Anyone, man or woman, from this county or an adjoining county may enter an arrangement in the show.
4. All entries must be entered and in place by 11:00 A. M. when the judging will begin (Dec. 14)
5. The arrangements must remain in place until noon Saturday (Dec. 15).

Gordon Man In Germany

U. S. FORCES, GERMANY (AHTNC)—Army PFC Charles R. Van Veekhoven, 24, whose wife, Joan, lives in Gordon, is participating with other members of the 51st Infantry in Exercise SABRE KNOT in Germany.

The week-long field training maneuver, designed to test winter combat readiness, involves approximately 30,000 troops.

Van Veekhoven is assigned as a medical aidman in the infantry's Headquarters Company in Mannheim. He entered the Army in September 1961 and received basic training at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. Van Veekhoven was last stationed at Fort Sam Houston, Tex., and arrived overseas in March of this year.

He is a 1956 graduate of Florien (La.) High School and was employed by the Lone Star Gas Company in Gordon, before entering the Army. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dosa Van Veekhoven, live on Route 2, Florien, La.

Oil and Gas Operators To Meet

A meeting of oil and gas operators with properties in the watershed of the new Hubbard Creek Lake has been set for January 8, 1963, in Breckenridge, for a report on salt water pollution.

The meeting has been arranged by the Pollution Prevention Committee of the West Central Texas Oil & Gas Association. P. W. (Bill) Pitzer, Jr. of Breckenridge is chairman of the committee.

In a letter to operators last week, Pitzer said "this Association

believes that it is our responsibility to give all operators concerned a first-hand picture of the pollution situation in the Hubbard Creek Lake drainage area. Our primary concern in this matter is to be of assistance to the operators and keep them informed as best we can."

As construction of the big lake has progressed, reports have reached the Association office that many operators have already started voluntarily cleaning up their leases in an effort to cut down on possible pollution sources. The West Central Texas Municipal Water District, which operates the lake, has also done considerable work on controlling pollution in the area particularly by the plugging of old wells in the lake proper.

Hubbard Creek Lake is located several miles northwest of Breckenridge in Stephens County and will be the future water supply source for Abilene, Albany, Anson and Breckenridge. It will drain an area of about 1,100 square miles through parts of Callahan, Shackelford, Stephens, and Eastland Counties. This area is probably one of the most densely drilled oil areas in the country, containing hundreds of old plugged and abandoned wells, and also many active producers.

The U. S. Corps of Engineers has sent a "bundle" of core drilling site locations to Eastland in connection with a study of flood control of the Leon River.

City Council Chairman Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. said however that he would have to write the Fort Worth Corps headquarters to find out exactly when the sites will be needed.

The project is a current re-evaluation of Leon flood danger, and federal funds are now available for work on the river. First study of the area was made in the mid-1940s, and some improvements have been made on the river in this county already.

Engineers said recently that study would include core drillings and aerial photography.

Safety Test Gift Toys, TSA Urges

The Texas Safety Association today advised Christmas shoppers to keep safety in mind when selecting toys for children.

J. O. Musick, General Manager of TSA, advised selecting toys that are sturdy and well-made.

"Cheaply constructed or breakable toys may come apart or be broken under strenuous child play," Musick said. "Broken or jagged edge-form toys can cause cuts and infection."

He advised testing the strength of a toy to see how much bending it will take and whether it will last past Christmas Day.

"Choose the toy which is suitable to the strength of the child. A toy which is too heavy for a youngster to handle easily could cause an accident to that child," Musick explained.

He further advised shoppers to beware of toys manufactured with sharp edges or pointed ends, and to check all playthings to make sure there are no parts which may become loose and find their way into the mouth.

"Babies and toddlers invariably follow the 'hand to mouth' rule for everything they touch. See that they don't play with small toys, marbles, coins, beads or other tiny ob-

jects," Musick said. Other things such as stuffed animals with button eyes which may become loose, whistles with removable mouth pieces and pull-toys with small removable parts also are dangerous for small children.

The safety director reported that nearly 600 children under age five die each year in the U. S. as a result of suffocation from ingestion of small objects.

Last year in Texas, 16 children under age five died from ingestion of objects other than food.

He said shoppers should keep in mind the age, interest, and physical and mental abilities of a child in selecting toys.

"An archery set, dart game or chemistry set may become dangerous if a child does not know how to use them or is too young for such games," Musick said.

"It is sometimes necessary for parents to supervise the use of such toys, but children should not be overburdened with toys that require constant adult supervision."

He said electrical toys of any type are unsafe for the very young and that such toys for older children should be carefully selected.

"Inspect electrical toys for frayed cords or any defect which may cause shock. Teach your child how to handle electrical toys and warn him not to play with electrical equipment with wet hands or when wearing damp clothing,"

he added. Musick reminded parents that even if a toy is safe, it may not stay that way.

"Inspection of toys and play equipment periodically is important. Check wooden toys for splinters, wagons for loose wheels and baby's rattler for cracks which may free the little stones inside. If satisfactory repairs can't be made, discard toy immediately."

He noted that toys can be hazards not only for children at play, but also for adults. "Serious falls may result from toys left on steps, stairways, walks or in the yard. Have a place for toys and teach children to put them away," he concluded.

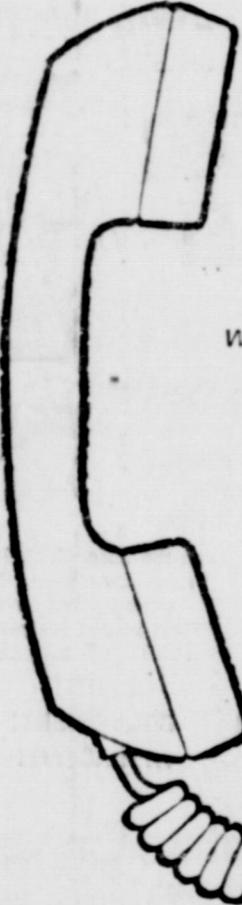

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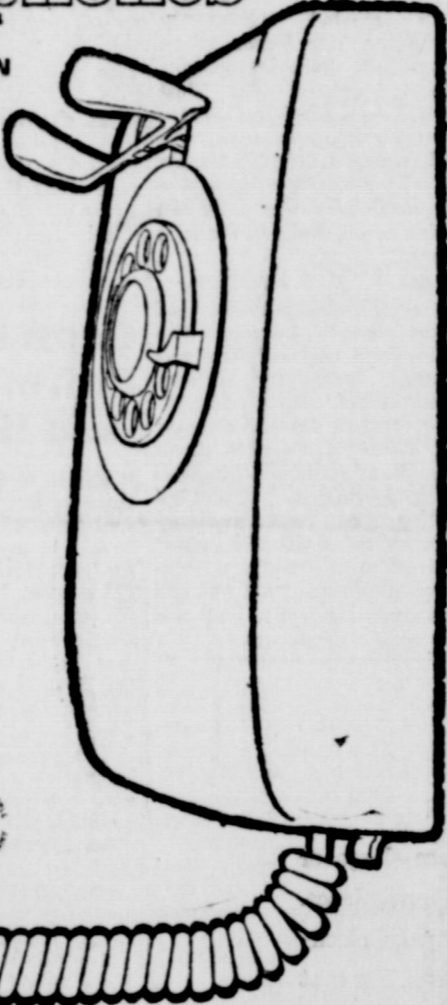
