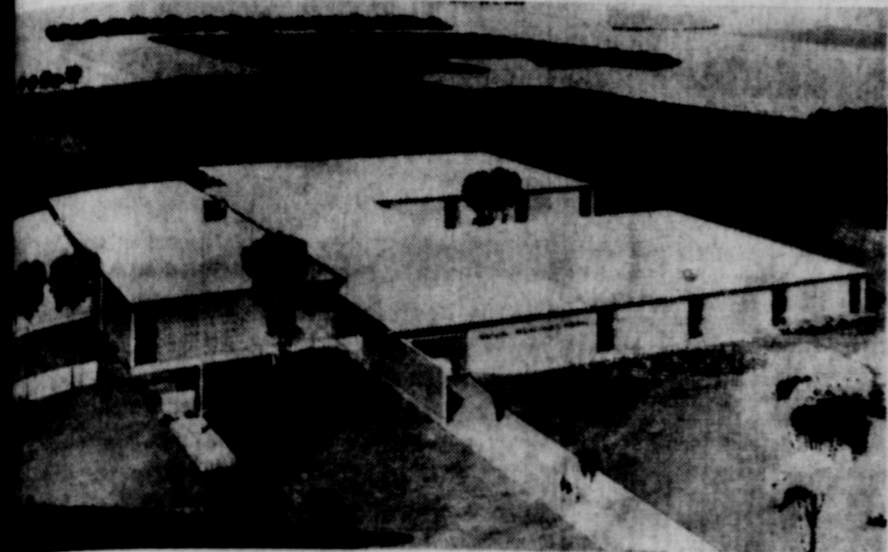

## UP TAXES 5c Construction Expected To Cost \$525,000 Elementary, Gym, Shop

If your property is valued at \$5,000, a new elementary school, gymnasium and vocational shop for Eastland will cost you about \$2.50 more a year in taxes.

Rate of increase is expected to be about five cents on \$100 value, members of the Eastland Lions and Rotary clubs were told at a joint meeting Tuesday.

Morris Dudley, investment banking representative, explained the current tax rate is \$1.50 per \$100, and only an additional nickel would be needed for retirement of the bond, if conditions including total valuations, collections, etc., remain the same.

A Eastland home owner whose property rendered at \$1,000 would pay 50 cents more, and a \$10,000 home owner would pay \$5 more.

Truett Gregory was in charge of arranging the program which was one of three held Tuesday to familiarize the public with the plans for the construction of a new grade school, gym and shop here.

Board President M. H. Perry presided and introduced Dan Boone, architect, and Dudley. Boone began his talk, "Taxes are already high everywhere, and the public needs a understanding of the undertaking," he said, and then proceeded to explain the program in Eastland.

In discussing the possible rate of increase, he said the only one available and that its "topography" can be coped with.

Petitions, asking the board to call the necessary election, was made available and began receiving signers immediately after the noon meeting.

The petition carries two pro-

positions, as will the ballot:

I. Shall the board of trustees have the power to levy and cause to be assessed a district collected an annual ad valorem tax at a rate not to exceed the limit of \$1.50 on the \$100 assessed value of taxable property in the district, for the maintenance of the schools.

H. Shall the board have the power to issue bonds of the district, in one or more series of issues, in the aggregate principal amount of \$525,000, to mature in serial annual installments as follows:

- \$5,000 in each of the years 1964 through 1970.
- \$10,000 in each of the years 1971 through 1973.
- \$15,000 in each of the years 1974 through 1977.
- \$20,000 in each of the years 1978 through 1983.
- \$25,000 in each of the years 1984 through 1988.
- \$30,000 in each of the years 1989 through 1992.
- and \$25,000 in the year 1993.

bearing interest at rates not to exceed five per cent per annum, for the purpose of the construction and equipment of public free school buildings in the district, and the board be authorized to levy and cause to be assessed and collected an annual ad valorem taxes in an amount as provided in the above schedule.

## City Commissioners Discuss Meat Inspection; Airport

City Commissioners spent most of a three-hour session Monday night discussing meat inspection problems and trying to work out satisfactory arrangements with J. O. Earnest, local packer.

In order for Earnest to sell his meat outside Eastland it must carry an "inspection by the City of Eastland" stamp, and therefore the city is responsible for the meat.

Dr. John Foster, newly settled veterinarian in Ranger, was called to the meeting, and agreed that he would come to Earnest's place once a week for inspection purposes.

In addition, he agreed to train a layman to do daily inspection chores. This person will either be City Manager Lewis Tiner or a man agreed upon by the city and Earnest. The vet will charge the city \$7.50 per trip, which will in turn be billed to Earnest, plus an amount to be agreed upon if the city manager does the routine inspection.

The city fathers expressed reluctance to continue in the "meat inspection business" but will continue they said, as a service to one of the city's industries.

Arrangements in the past have been less than satisfactory according to Earnest.

Audit of the city's books is expected about a week, it was reported during the meeting.

Commissioners passed reading a financial report (because there isn't one), and minutes of the previous meeting were also dispensed with.

Chairman Virgil Seaberry reported that he had been informed that Bob Wilson of Midland can provide enough badly injury and property damage insurance to meet the city's requirements for tearing the old city hall down.

Tiner said that he had talked with Wilson and that he had indicated that he wouldn't want to pay the previously-offered \$500 for the building since he had to provide, so much insurance and bond.

Commissioners agreed that the man could forego the bond if he would agree to leave the salvaged materials "at a specified place" until the job is done satisfactorily.

Tiner is to contact him. The city will advertise for bids for a five-year lease on 100 acres at Lake Eastland. Mr. Treadwell who now has the property under lease at \$325 per year, wants a five-year lease.

Commissioners agreed to buy a three-quarter ton, 1957 Chevrolet pickup for \$650 to be used by city workmen.

Discussion of work needed at the airport took some time, and Tiner was instructed to inquire about cost of having the runway paved for about .7 miles, 40 feet wide.

The city will again contribute \$400 to the Thursday Afternoon Club for library use, and will buy an ad in the livestock show program.

Tiner reported that he is filling a vacancy in the fire department, after I. A. Carmack was transferred to the police department following the resignation of Patrolman Howard Bradford.

## Mrs. Roberson 'Not Guilty'

An all male jury took just over an hour Tuesday night to find Mrs. John T. Roberson of Ranger "not guilty" of assault to murder in 91st District Court.

The jury was handed the case at 5:30 p.m. after two days of testimony in the trial which resulted from an incident in Ranger in February of 1962.

A motion to quash the indictment against Mrs. Roberson was overruled by Judge Turner M. Collier Monday morning.

The motion was made by John Whitesides of Fort Worth, attorney for Mrs. Roberson.

Mrs. Roberson was charged with assault with intent to murder with malice aforethought on Mrs. Nancy Pennington, also of Ranger.

Prospective jurors were questioned for about two hours by Dist. Attorney Earl Conner, and Whitesides.

Each juror was asked about any personal relationship with Conner, any history of auto accidents from which law suits resulted and of any prejudice against the state for the indictment of a woman.

Members of the jury included: J. M. Sparks, Herman Elson, Bill J. Greenaw, L. A. Hamp, Bill J. Greenaw, L. A. Hamp, Clements, Jack Germany, L. D. Holliday, L. B. Carlile, E. M. Crisp, B. E. Simpson and J. E. Harris.

Conner called Dr. W. P. Watkins of Ranger as the state's first witness, who testified that he treated Mrs. Pennington, after the auto accident.

The physician said that the woman had a fractured left leg and fractured left hand.

"The rule" was invoked by the defense before testimony began and some 20 witnesses were sworn before being excused from the courtroom.

Delbert Capps of Ranger, the state's second witness, identified photographs of the Pennington Ford which he had made following the accident.

He stated that it was about two weeks before he was requested to photograph the Ford.

Dr. Treadwell, 49, is owner of Eastland Medical and Surgical Clinic, and has served on the city commission before.

Pipkin, 38, is a native Eastlander and is owner-manager of the Sport Center here.

Other candidates who have announced are Roy Lee Smith and Dale Troutt.

The son of the Rev. and Mrs. M. A. Treadwell Sr. of 505 S. Dixie, Dr. Treadwell has been an Eastland resident 11 years. He and his wife, and three children, Terry, 15, Marsha,

13, and Randall, 9, live at 500 S. Dixie St.

Born in Beaumont, Ark., he attended Louisiana College and received his B. S. degree from Rice University and his medical degree at the University of Texas Medical School in Galveston. He had 15 months internship at Scott and White in Temple, and two years surgical residency at the hospital.

He served two years in the Army and did surgery. A member and deacon at First Baptist Church, he is also a director of chamber of (Continued on page 8)

amount sufficient to pay the interest on and principal of said bonds.

The present elementary buildings have served their purpose, Boone said, and the 34-year-old high school building is still serving its purpose adequately, except the physical education facilities.

"The old metal gym is usable in fair weather," he said, "but the old masonry building is on borrowed time, and is not structurally sound, and is not being held together with rods."

"Contrary to some's belief," Boone said, "the school condition in Eastland is stable and has been for a long time."

#### P.T.A. MEETING

Parents desired to create and control desirable environment in the classroom with modern heating, lighting and cooling equipment," Daniel Boone, Adkins architect told Parent-Teachers Association members Tuesday. He explained his firm's concept of the 16-room elementary school proposed for Eastland.

The one-story brick building, actively portrayed in a large water color painting, is designed to include a cafeteria adequate for serving 400 in shifts, as is the practice, and for seating 600 when in use as an auditorium.

A large glass panel in each classroom prevents the "closed-in" feeling many people experience in windowless rooms, Boone said. The panel could also be broken and used as an exit in case of fire, he explained. "The building is completely fireproof."

Outside doors to each classroom were avoided, he said, because of several problems—child expense, the fact that in some cases they are not used and that wind from an open door frequently creates breezes.

Boone explained that the school is a new gymnasium, and a vocational agriculture shop, are all included in the building program. Also on display was a color sketch and floor plan of the proposed gym.

Morris Dudley, who spoke for Almon and McKinney, Dallas investment banking firm, stated that the proposed building project for the three buildings would require a \$525,000 bond issue with a 30 year maturity schedule. Tax wise, this would mean an increase of 5 cents per 100 or 50 cents per 1,000 in school taxation, he said.

Boone and Dudley were introduced by M. H. Perry, chairman of the Eastland School Board, who spoke briefly.

The program was presented by Mrs. Alvin Pierce.

Mrs. Mavis O'Dell presided during the business meeting.

Boone, who is a member of the state architectural examining board, explained how advanced educational institutions are overloaded, where it's the "survival of the fittest."

Of course, he said, good administration, good teaching are necessary as well as good facilities to provide equal opportunity for the youngsters in Eastland.

He said that it is felt that the \$525,000 budget "is well within the means of this community."

In explaining financing, Dudley said that the bond is now raising \$14,000 worth of aid bonds, and another \$50,000 is being refunded. This \$50,000 amount will be repaid over a ten-year period, at three percent interest. (This represents a saving to the district, because in 1955, the old bond interest was 4.5 percent.)

The \$525,000 will be dove-tailed with the \$50,000 refunding payments, he said, over a 30 year maturity schedule.

The exact rate on the bonds will be determined after the election, in order to take ad-

## AUTO LICENSE PLATES ARE COMPLETED FOR TEXAS CARS

HUNTSVILLE — Due to the continuous efforts of a number of Texas Department of Corrections officials and the hard work of 220 specially-assigned inmates of the Huntsville Unit, car owners of Texas will be able to purchase their license plates on time in 1963.

License Plate Plant Superintendent Benjamin Smith announced this week that the last of more than eleven million (actual count 11,094,268) individual vehicle plates were shipped to the distributing centers on January 13, 1963 one full month ahead of the deadline established by the Texas Highway Department.

Since July 1962 when the plant started producing 1963 license plates, inmates and employees have worked a day-and-night shift.

Reuben Blagrave, 17-year veteran employee of the Department of Corrections, said, "This was our busiest year. We got started late due to installing new equipment, and we had one million more plates to produce, but we got caught up and finished well ahead of time."

Blagrave gives credit to the inmates who operated the presses, cutters, ovens, and other machinery in the plant. "They are the boys who turned out the work," he said.

The job of providing inmates for the staffing of the License Plate Plant falls on Leon Hughes, Director of Classification. Hughes said, "When the plant went on double shifts, we transferred more than 10 inmates from the farm system to the plant. We consider this a job promotion for the inmates. When the plant closed last week, we reassigned many of the inmates to trusty jobs on construction and on special State Approved Trusty jobs. The inmates proved themselves, and we were pleased to promote them."

The Huntsville plant produces 29 varieties of license plates for the vehicles of Texas. The 1963 order called for 7.8 million individual plates for automobiles. The smallest single order was for the special plates used by members of the United States Senate from Texas. The Huntsville inmates produced six sets of license plates for the senators.

The largest order for license plates came from Harris County with the second largest order being from Dallas County. Harris County was shipped a total of one and one-third million plates (actual count 1,334,410) and Dallas County received a total of 1.1

million (actual count 1,105,597) plates.

Kennedy County in the Rio Grande Valley region received license plates for a total of 451 vehicles, including two sets for house trailers.

The Texas Department of Corrections manufactures the license plates for the Texas Highway Department on a contract basis. Proceeds from the contract go into the General Revenue Fund of the State.

Roberson Cadillac. Pictures of the Ford were entered as States Exhibits while those of the Cadillac were entered as exhibits for the defendant.

Conner then called J. W. Vinson of Ranger to the stand. A member of the Ranger Police Department, Vinson testified that he had given three tickets to Mrs. Roberson following the collision: (1) leaving the scene of an accident, (2) failure to stop and render aid, and (3) negligent collision.

The State called Robert Kincaid, a passer-by who stopped at the scene of the accident. He testified to hearing Mrs. Pennington say, "Someone's trying to kill me, please help me." Kincaid said that Roberson took the victim's hand and Mrs. Roberson shoved him back and said, "Leave her alone." He also stated that he observed no damage to the Cadillac.

Marlin (Turk) Lufkin of Ranger testified that he heard Mrs. Pennington say, "Mrs. Roberson is trying to kill me." According to testimony by Mac McGowan of Lubbock, former member of the Ranger Police Department, marks on the pavement were spin-marks rather than skid marks, stating that there was a difference.

Linda Kay Warford, Jeralyn Anderson and Linda Hatton, all seniors at Ranger High School, were called as witnesses for the state.

Mrs. Pennington, victim of the alleged assault, answered questions nervously and reluctantly and remembered little about the incident, during questioning just before the trial was adjourned Monday at 4:15 p.m.

Mrs. Pennington objected to a recording of a telephone conversation between her and Mrs. Roberson.

"She (Mrs. Roberson) did 't like me" was Mrs. Pennington's response to a question of the personal relationship between the two women.

Mrs. Pennington stated that Mrs. Roberson had never threatened her but had said that she (Mrs. Roberson) was going to run her out of town, the latter which was denied by the defendant.

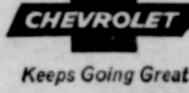

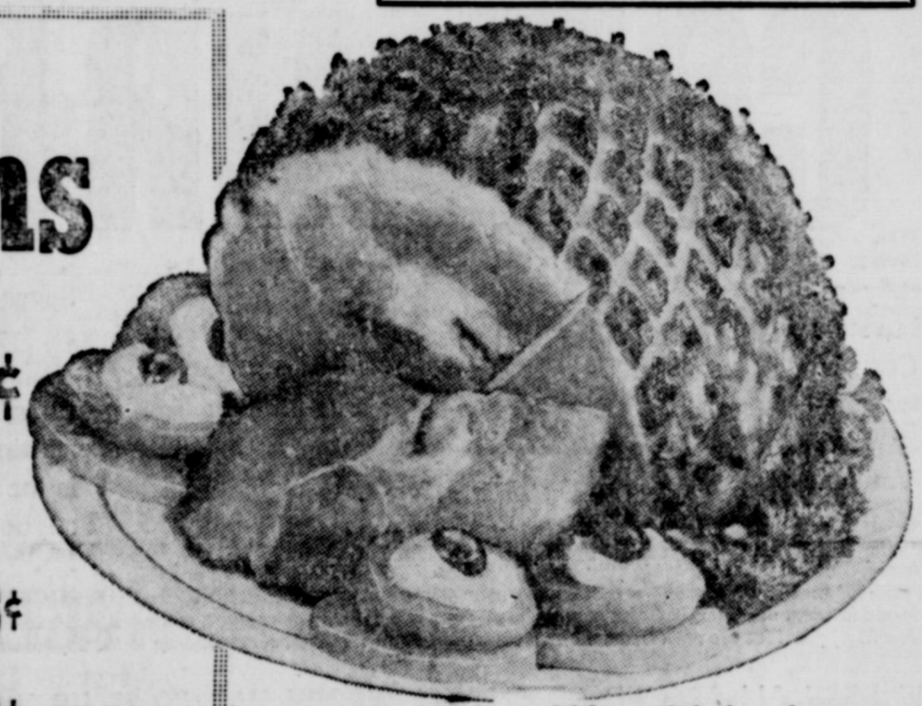

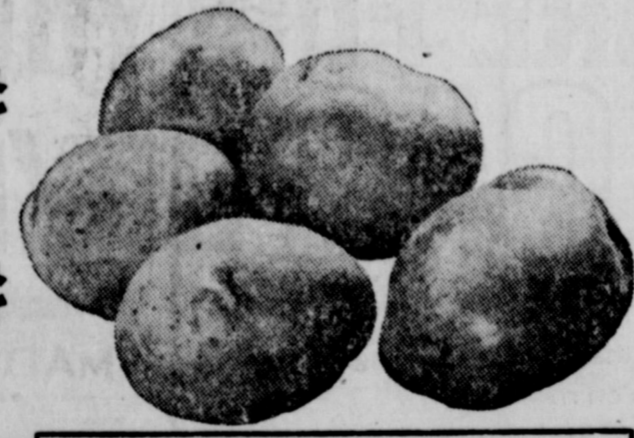

## It's The Law

### OWNER'S POLICY vs. MORTGAGE POLICY

Three out of four families who buy houses in the \$11,000 to \$15,000 price range jeopardize their investment because they do not protect their cash and ownership with commensurate title insurance.

These financial risks result from insufficient knowledge of the difference between an 'owner's policy' and a 'mortgage policy,' and lack of information about title insurance.

The main point is that the usual title insurance taken out by the purchaser of a home in the up-to-\$15,000 bracket serves only to protect the bank or lending institution. It is often compulsory for the buyer to purchase this insurance, known as the 'mortgage policy,' since some mortgages insist upon this particular safeguard as one of the loan conditions. The 'mortgage policy,' however, never protects the home owner's equity. This is so even after the mortgage is fully paid.

A course remains open for the purchaser who wants to cover himself for the entire price of the home. He should, at the time of application for the required 'mortgage policy,' check with his attorney about simultaneously obtaining an 'owner's policy.' The 'owner's policy,' in contrast to the 'mortgage policy,' protects the home buyer as long as he owns the property. In many instances, it also protects an owner even after he sells, if he has a warranted title.

Owners of higher-priced homes usually take out both title policies. Thus, they purchase peace of mind on their substantial equity instead of trying to 'save' a few dollars, a false economy which may later invite trouble.

Title insurance took on greater significance after World War II. It is a requisite today by many banks and lending institutions for those applying for mortgage loans, and is for the lender's protection. A defective title, it was shown, may cost the 'owner' not only the price of the home but considerably greater sums if the new owner 'inherits' previously undiscovered liens, back taxes, or defects of title that do not appear on the records.

The purchaser of the \$11,000 - \$15,000 home often withholds taking the 'owner's policy,' which protects his equity continually, 'in order to save a few dollars.' An element of risk enters, however, if flaws are subsequently found. The owner without title insurance would not be reimbursed to the extent of the defect. To compound his difficulties, the owner would be burdened with the cost of correcting the title defect and legal costs.

To illustrate the difference in an 'owner's policy' and the 'mortgage policy,' the following case was cited: Mr. Smith buys a home for \$15,000. He places \$2,000 down and takes a \$13,000 mortgage loan. Pursuing the course of many home buy-

ers, his only title insurance purchase in a 'mortgage policy' for \$13,000, which the mortgagor demands and which protects only the lending institution. Each year Mr. Smith's equity increases as his mortgage decreases. Nevertheless, knowingly or not, Mr. Smith is not carrying any title insurance which protect Mr. Smith.

If a faulty or fraudulent title should be discovered, or if previously unknown liens against the property were to be established during the life of the mortgage, or after it was paid, Mr. Smith would have no protection.

Stokes Well Is Completed As Important Oil Producer

Texstar Petroleum Co. and Low Drilling Co. have completed their F. O. Stokes No. 1 an important Mississippi lime discovery well in northern Eastland County, according to information here today. The well is some eight miles northeast of Cisco. A potential test run last weekend gave the well a rating of 160 barrels per day with good flowing pressure. Production was from perforations at 3,851-63 feet. The well began flowing and cleaned itself out without acidizing after a brief swabbing operation, the operators reported. Total depth was 3,970 feet. Location is 330 feet from the north and 1,950 feet from the east lines of Section 37, Block 4, H&TC Survey. The operators' Stokes lease covers about 170 acres, and they were reported to have a total of about 320 acres in that area. No plans for further development in that area were available at this time. Elsewhere, Lone Star Producing Co. has completed their No. 1 C. E. Pippin, seven miles west of Cisco in Eastland County, as a new Caddo gas discovery well. The potential on open flow was 6,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily from perforations at 3,078-90 feet. Location was in Section 3171, TE&L Survey, about half a mile north of a lone 4,030 Ellenburger producer.

Gun Club Seeks New Deer Law

The Cisco Gun Club voted to ask Rep. Wayne Gibbens to introduce legislation to return Eastland County to regulation of the state game agency for deer hunting at their monthly meeting last Thursday night, according to President Jim Bob McCannies. "The state game agency is the proper management authority for deer hunting," Mr. McCannies said. "Under the present law, all of the deer does might have been killed last year when 500 permits were issued by the county clerk. We certainly hope this situation is remedied." The club heard a lecture on gun safety by Dr. Charles H. Ballew and a report on a deer hunting trip to Colorado by Jibby Donovan. Some 25 members were present.
