NEW PRICES TOO Fiesta Bowl Sold; More Features Planned

The Fiesta Bowl, Eastland County's only bowling emporium, has been sold, and the new owners have instituted a new reduced price program.

The first several changes in the price schedule will be effective Saturday.

O. K. Smith of Amarillo and Jack Bradley of Demmitt bought the modern 12-lane alley from Benson Development Co. and change in ownership became effective Saturday.

The facilities on Highway 80 East were originally built by Don Pierson of Eastland and were sold by him to Benson about a year ago.

Smith will move to Eastland in the near future, he said, and will be in charge of management for the entertainment center.

New price policy will be 40 cents a line during the day, or three lines for \$1 until 6 p.m. Price after 6 will be 45 cents per line.

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650 Animals Entered In County Livestock Show

A total of 650 animals have been entered in the annual Eastland County Livestock Show March 15 and 16, according to Ben McKinnis, General Superintendent.

This will make it the largest stock show ever held in the county, McKinnis said.

Visitors to the show will see 245 fat lambs, 162 fat pigs, and 46 fat steers in the Fat Animal Division.

In the Breeding Animal Classes, a total of 56 sheep, 47 goats, 53 dairy cattle and 14 beef cattle have been entered.

Additional entries are expected in the Open Beef Cattle Division of the show.

A change in the rules and regulations of the show calls for all animals to be on the show grounds, properly entered and in place by 10 p.m. on March 14.

The show is sponsored by the Eastland County Livestock Raisers' Association. Ross Wilson of Gorman is president of the group; Waverly Massengale is vice president; Glyn Gilliam, Eastland baker, is secretary; and C. M. McCain, Eastland rancher, is treasurer.

Sifting of animals will begin at 8 a.m. on March 15. Judging of dairy cattle will begin at the same time.

Fat animals including pigs, lambs and steers will be sold at the Eastland Auction Barn on Saturday night, March 16.

Stock Show facilities at the show grounds, one mile northwest of Eastland, continue to be improved, officials said. The large judging arena is being covered to allow judging of animals in any weather.

Adult breeders are encouraged to show their animals this year. Arrangements are being made to take care of all animals, it was explained. All adults compete for ribbons only. The 4-H and FFA Club boys and girls receive cash premiums.

Eastland Proposed Site Of Historical Museum

Eastland was chosen as site for a museum Friday afternoon at 2 p.m. at the second organizational meeting of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee held in the Commissioners' Courtroom.

Upon general agreement of the committee, Mrs. Bernie McCreia, chairman, consented to contact the county commissioners and ask for permission and space to set up cases in the foyer of the court house for exhibits until a permanent building is secured to house historical items.

Attending the meeting were Mrs. McCreia of Cisco, Robert Bell of Nimrod, Charles Freyschlag of Eastland, Mrs. George Blackwell of Gorman and Mrs. Lee White of Rising Star. Several visitors were present at the meeting.

Other items under discussion were arranging time and place for future meetings of the committee, the number of committee members for better coordination and carrying out a program of work, and a charter and by-laws for the organization.

Further discussion by the group concerned publicizing the proposed museum and historical items.

District Court Decision Due Friday In Cisco's School Bond Cases

A decision of the 91st District Court in the Cisco School improvement bond contest will be handed down by Judge Turner M. Collie at 10 a. m. Friday after hearing testimony Monday and Tuesday in two suits.

The first case — Bill Mitcham vs. Cisco Public Schools — was heard Monday, and the other, an election contest suit entered by Park P. Plambeck, was heard Tuesday morning.

Judge Collie promised a decision in both suits at the Friday morning hearing.

L. D. (Slim) Booth, first witness for the Cisco Independent School District, Monday testified in the mandamus hearing that Bill Mitcham, co-chairman of the Cisco Citizens' Group, implied that "if he (Booth) did not sign a petition to revoke and cancel the Sept. 8th \$700,000 school bond election, he and other merchants might lose a lot of business."

Mr. Booth testified that he did not sign the petition and voted for the new school program.

Testimony got underway Monday morning at 9 a. m. in the 91st District Court.

Mr. Mitcham testified that a majority of the qualified voters in the Cisco Independent School District had signed petitions, curling irons, and what the election. He stated that

at 2:45 p. m. Monday.

First witness called by the defendants was J. W. Buckner, 64, of Cisco. He was disqualified on the tally of qualified voters prepared by the plaintiff because he did not have a poll tax receipt. He testified that no one had contacted him to ask if he was eligible for a poll tax exemption as testified by Mr. Mitcham.

Final witness for the defendant was Stanley Webb, tax assessor and collector for the Cisco Independent School District.

The case was adjourned at 3:15 p. m. Monday.

The Plambeck Case

A trial amendment in the

Park P. Plambeck vs. Cisco Independent School District was denied Tuesday morning by Judge Collier.

Virgil Seaberry of Eastland and W. B. Wright of Cisco objected to the amendment on the basis that plaintiffs were trying to inject something entirely new and change grounds for the law suit.

Representing Mr. Plambeck, a Cisco farmer, was Davis Scarborough of Abilene. Mr. Plambeck was seeking to have the election declared void on the grounds of voting irregularities.

First witness called by Mr. Scarborough was H. R. (Pop) Garrett, Eastland County School Superintendent, who testified to the accuracy of a map of the Cisco Independent School District, excluding a

portion located in Callahan County.

Johnson Smith, County Clerk, said in his testimony that a map of Precinct 12 was the same as that in his office. He also stated that part of Precinct 12 was not included in the Cisco Independent School District but what portion could not be determined from the Feb. 12 poll tax list.

O. D. Kean of Cisco, judge for the Sept. 3 election, testified that he asked for a list of the qualified voters from Stanley Webb, tax assessor and collector for the school district, but was told that one was unavailable. He said that the only list of voters in possession at the election was the Feb. 12 poll tax list.

In further testimony, he said that none was asked to sign an affidavit showing a poll tax, an exemption or eligibility of exemption.

In cross-examination, he stated that he believed the total vote cast was true and correct as found by election judges. He said that to his knowledge, no person was refused the right to vote because of not having rendered property.

He said that the only voting irregularity that occurred was "loitering outside the poll" and that he put a stop to one such incident. According to Mr. Kean, he knew of no illegal votes having been cast.

In testimony, Mrs. Eula Simpson, bookkeeper for the Cisco Independent School District, stated that only one person voted who did not appear on the rendition list and that

that person voted before she had a chance to stop him.

Stanley Webb, tax assessor and collector for the school district, testified that the rendition sheets are public records and may be seen by anyone, and that a maximum of 60 persons might have rendered their property after the election was called but prior to the election.

Final witness in the case was W. E. Austin, member of the Cisco School Board.

Historical Group Votes To Locate Graves Of Vets

The Eastland County Historical Survey Committee met at the County Courthouse in Eastland on Friday, Feb. 15, with Mrs. Bernie Chesley McCrea of Cisco as chairman.

Business included the reading of a letter of Mrs. McCrea from Governor John Connally, expressing his regret at not being able to attend the previous meeting of the committee due to a full schedule in Austin.

Mrs. McCrea also read a letter to the committee from John Ben Shepherd, a member of the State Historical Survey Committee, requesting that the Eastland County Committee participate in the program to mark the grave of each Civil War veteran in the state. The committee voted to participate in the program. Anyone knowing the location of a Civil War veteran's grave

was requested to inform the committee about the location.

Other business of the committee included discussion of the development of the new Eastland County Historical Museum, and discussion of plans to form an Eastland County Historical Association, with membership open to everyone interested in historical programs and work.

The next meeting of the committee was announced for Friday, March 8, 1963, at 2 p. m. at the courthouse.

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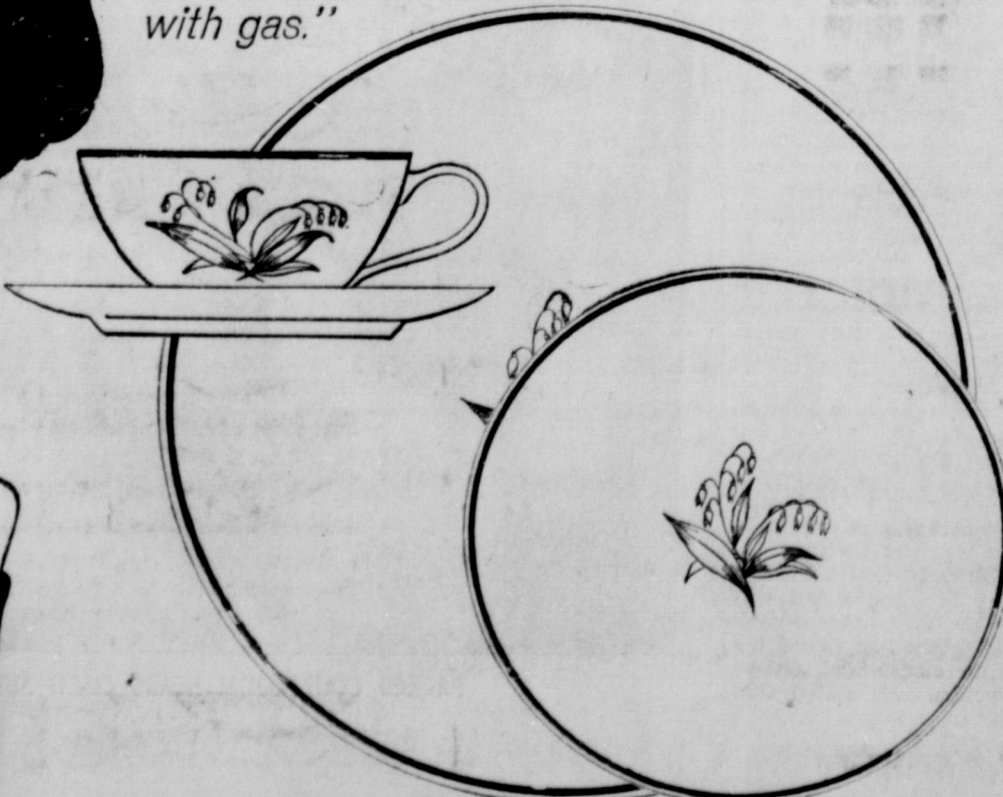
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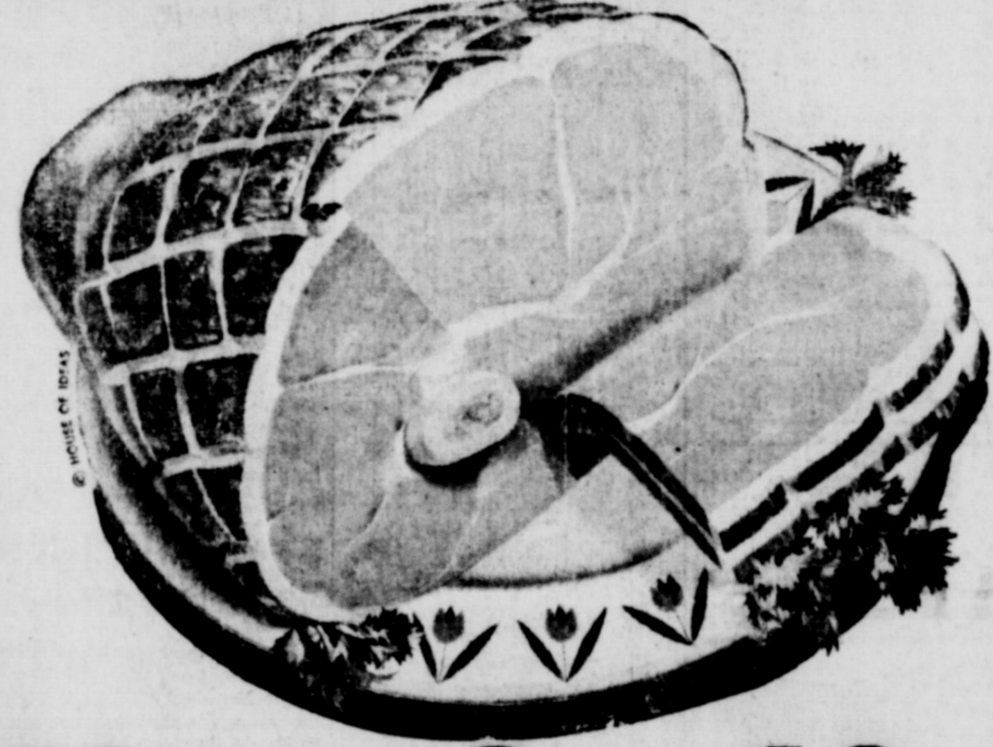

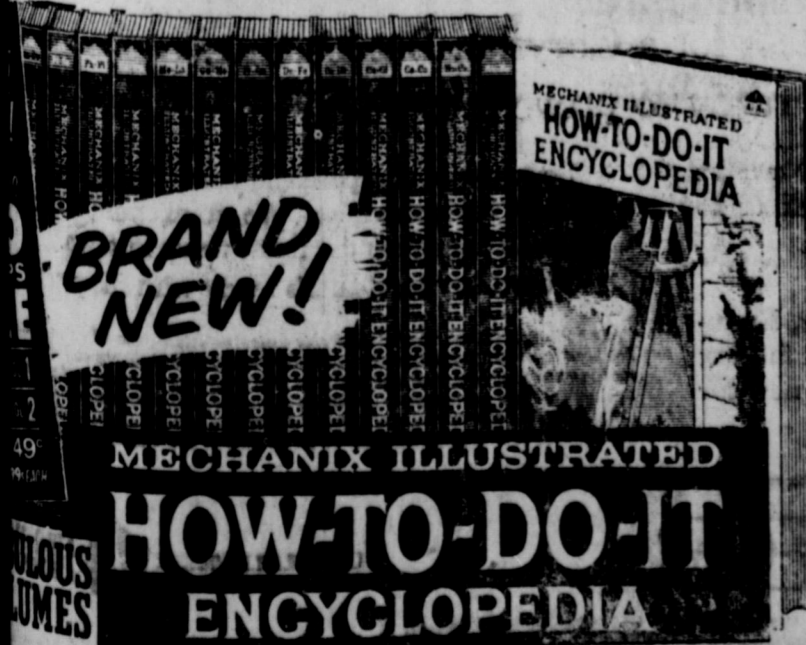

cent election, to be dated March 1, 1963, at \$5,000 each, with a maturity date of March 1, 1984.

The Mercantile Band of Dallas will be the paying agency. Date for the site selection election will be Thursday, March 14, and the same voting requirements will apply. Asked about the \$135,000 price tag on the gym, Boone answered that that figure is based on cost-of-gyms built in this area during the past few years.

He said his firm would probably finish final plans within about 90 days after the March 14 date, and with the 30-day bid-seeking period, could possibly be letting bids by mid-July. Construction could begin sometime in August.

Asked about early completion of the gym, he said, that it could be possible, if they could work out such a schedule with the contractor, so that the district wouldn't be penalized in cost for building one structure ahead of the other. Most contractors, he said, naturally, prefer to build units jointly.

So, it's possible, though not definite, we could have a gym by the early part of next year, and the elementary by school opening in 1964.

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

MUSTER DAY IS PLANNED BY NATIONAL GUARD ON FRIDAY

Battery C. 3rd Rocket Howitzer Battalion, 132nd Artillery, 49th Armored Division of the National Guard in Cisco will hold a muster at the armory located on the Lake Road on Friday, Feb. 22, George Washington's birthday.

Purpose of "Muster Day," as announced by Winford H. Hogan, commanding captain of the armory, is to commemorate the days when the militia, forerunner of today's Guard, was mustered annually on the village green, assembled and a roll call taken to see how many able-bodied men were available to bear arms in the event of an emergency.

Captain Hogan stated that the event was in honor of George Washington's first service in public life as a member of a Militia regiment which he later commanded in his home state of Virginia. The public has been invited to attend and observe the occasion at the National Guard Armory.

Refreshments will be served and jeep rides and howitzer rides will be available for children and interested adults.

Captain Hogan stated that all high school seniors, college students and young career men in the Cisco area who may not understand their military obligation have been invited to talk to him or to S-5 Bill James who is on duty at the armory from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Monday through Friday.

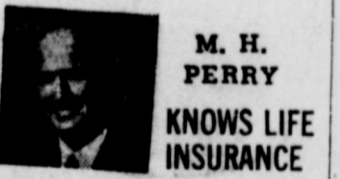
Captain Hogan said many had not had the following terms, active duty, ready duty, and standby reserve defined for them. The term "active duty" refers to the standing Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, and Coast Forces which make up the nucleus of the country's defense system.

Conditions for minimum terms of enlistment in each of the divisions of the Armed Forces is as follows: Army, 1-34 years of age, three years active duty, one year ready duty, two years standby duty; Navy, 17-31 years of age, four years active duty, one year ready duty, one year standby duty; Marines, 17-28 years of age, three years active duty, two years ready duty, one year standby duty; Air Force, 17-34 years, four years active duty, one year ready duty, Coast Guard, 17-26 years, four years active duty, one year ready duty, one year standby duty. All five of the armed forces have six years total service.

Captain Hogan stated that young men may choose to enlist in one of the reserve programs. The ready reserve

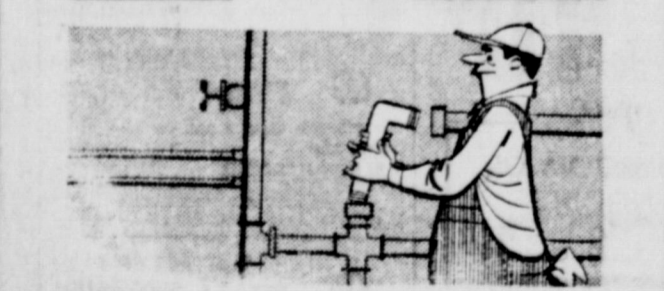

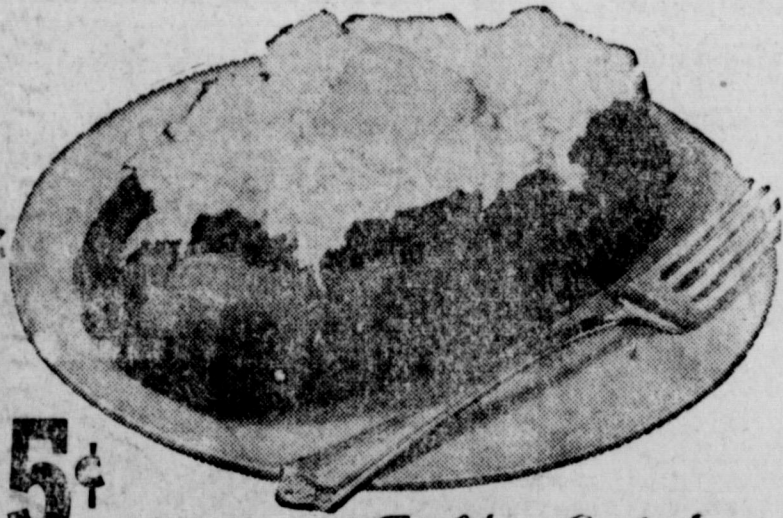

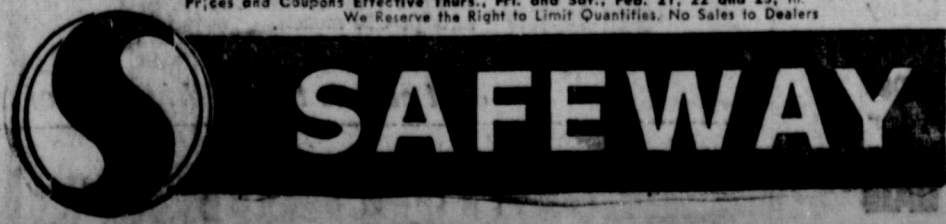

Mention the word "sale" and shoppers react in various ways. Efficient shoppers often buy at sales. Retail stores, especially department stores, feature a number of sales annually in an effort to increase sales volume. These sales are of various types. They may be special purchase sales, clearance, annual, anniversary, seasonal and stimulative.
 When and why are the various sales held?
 Clearance sales are held to move fashion merchandise, goods that are being discontinued, or merchandise that has been left over from the previous season. These sales offer sav-

ings ranging from 25 to 50 percent.
 Special purchase sales may be either pre-season or post-season sales of goods which a store has bought at special or reduced prices in the wholesale market. They normally offer savings of 15 to 20 percent.
 Annual sales may also be called regular stock or department manager's sales. They offer goods from regular stock at reduced prices for a short period of time. While this type sale offers the smallest reductions—usually 10 or 15 percent—they are considered by store people to be the most reliable sales.
 Anniversary sales commemorate the founding of the store, and may occur at any point during the selling season. Their aim is to increase sales by offering a large variety of goods at special prices.
 Seasonal sales are regularly repeated each year. August and January coat sales are examples of this type sale which offer savings to the consumer.
 Stimulative sales are intended to boost selling during dull periods, and are found under various names including back-to-school sales, Mother's Day sales, etc.
 Sales terms often differ from those used to describe regularly stocked merchandise. "Irregulars" and "seconds" are terms used to identify merchandise that falls below standard specifications. If you shop carefully, these may be good buys. Examine items before buying, however.
 Consider these factors when you shop at a clothing sale: Do you need the item? Does it meet your needs? Is the color suitable and becoming? Does it fit to your satisfaction? What alterations, if any, will be needed? If soiled, can it be cleaned? If damaged, can it be repaired successfully? Does it fit into your wardrobe? Will you have to purchase new accessories to complete the outfit?
 You will want to consider fiber content when you purchase goods on sale. Check information about performance. What special finishes have been

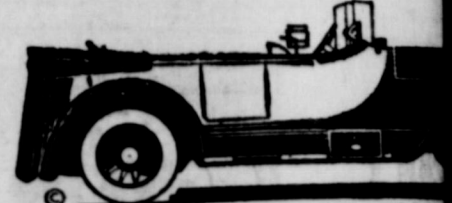
