NEW VERTICAL FLIGHT SIMULATOR-A technician monitors the "flight" of a new flight simulator, developed by the Ryan Aeronautical Co., San Diego, Cal. It is being used to improve the controls for the Army's new XV-5A Vertical Short Takcoff and Landing (V/STOL) research aircraft - world's first lift fan V/STOL aircraft. In the simulator, the pilot at the controls of an aircraft faces a panoramic wrap-around screen. A projector system tied to an analog computer transmits through a transparency an extremely sharp, detailed, realistic representation of a land or nscape on the screen. Although the pilot remains stationary in the darkened room, he experiences a sensation of movement. The image of the terrain is shifted in response to the visual contitions of flight that would occur in an actual situation.


