



A complete story of Tanner life would read like fiction, yet it has been said that truth is stranger than fiction. He was a rolling stone before he settled in Eastland about 19-

Tanner "almost" became a physician in his youth but got about as close to a M.D. degree as he got to leading a revolution.

He was born in Kaukauna, Wis., July 20, 1883, the son of a doctor. He was graduated from high school in 1900 and enrolled as a pre-med student at the University of Wisconsin, where he received his B. A. degree in 1904. Then Tanner received a scholarship at the Wisconsin College of Phycians and Surgeons.

Tanner had been in the medical college for two weeks when the dean asked him to lecture and conduct quizzes in histology. A few weeks later asked to take over the department, Silkin.

Soon thereafter, he got into what he called a "row" with the anatomy department and said to the dean, "good gosh, Dean, I don't think much of your college when you offer me a profesorship!'

"You can see, I am a garrulous old buzzard," said Tanner as he laughed over his decision to quit medical school

Quit the college he did, and he went off to Mexico to hunt on a sugar plantation, of which his father was president. He had been in Mexico for month when the man in charge told Tanner he was

quitting. "I got a wire telling me to come home immediately," Tanner said. "Then I was sent back to run the plantation until a new manager could be found."

As it worked out, Tanner stayed on for 13 years.

He planted 50 acres of Stoneville 213, March 7 and harvested 797 pounds of lint per acre in August. The field was fertilized with 240 pounds of 20-20-0 placed in the rows and rebedded.
