Today, Mr. A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., announced statement requests were mailed to 418 businesses in Eastland County. He said figures obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1963 totaled 418 manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers in this area as compared with 402 in January, 1962 — an increase of 4 per cent for the period.

According to Mr. Hemphill, each January business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to approximately three million business concerns — to the corner grocery store worth a few thousand dollars as well as to businesses worth millions.

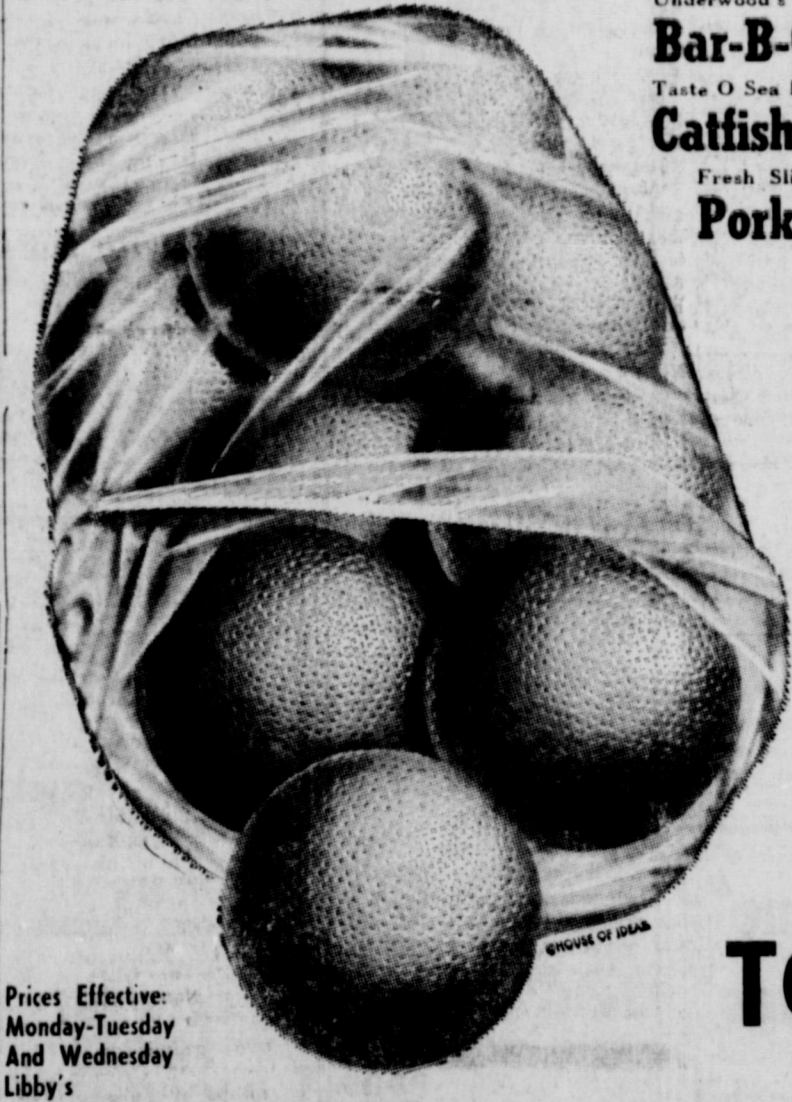
