Mrs. Perkins Will Speak In Dallas

Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland, one of five Texas women on the General Federation of Women's Clubs' board, will speak at the Dallas Woman's Forum meeting Tuesday. She will be heard at 1:30 p.m. following a luncheon at the clubhouse, 4607 Ross.

Mrs. Perkins, a past president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs and the Texas Federation of Music Clubs, is the General Federation's resolutions chairman. She previously has served the General Federation as treasurer, as chairman of its music division, fine arts and education departments and as president of the Past State Presidents Club.

For five years the speaker was the only woman on the Texas State Board of Education. She has been a member of the advisory council, University of Texas Extension Library; a member of the National Board of the Women's Medical College of Pennsylvania and a table leader at the White House Conference on Education.

She has held appointments from Texas governors in the fields of health, education and safety and was chairman of the budget and statistical committee when budgets of all-state-supported colleges and universities were reviewed.

Mrs. Perkins' subject Tuesday will be Women in Education.

66 Percent of County Retail Dollar Spent for Food and Cars

How is the retail dollar being spent in Eastland County? How much of it is going for food, for cars, for clothing and for household equipment? To what extent have the economic ups and downs changed local buying habits?

The average local consumer, it appears, reacted only temporarily in his spending to the stock market break and to the other jittery occurrences of the past year.

For the most part, he exuded confidence. He found that his personal income was not affected and that he had no reason to cut down on his normal mode of living.

AIRLINE SERVICE? Chamber Board of Directors Adopt Runway Completion Resolution

Scheduled airline service for the City of Eastland?

Well not anticipated immediately, but action was taken this past week that could lead to such service for the area in the not-so-distant future.

The board of directors of the directors of the Eastland chamber of commerce adopted a resolution encouraging the completion of the present airport, located northeast of city.

Action followed a report of the chamber's aviation committee.

Don Pierson, co-chairman, gave the following report at the regular directors' luncheon Thursday:

"The Eastland Airport, serves Eastland and the area with excellent facilities for both local and trans-continental aircraft and is in itself a major asset to attracting industry, has fallen into a state of disrepair of the runways.

"The runways in the past several years were treated with an oil stabilizing mixture which now washed away and left the airport runways in a potentially hazardous condition.

"This oil mix has averaged out to cost approximately \$1,000 per year and we, the Aviation Committee recommend that a permanent hard surfacing be applied at the earliest date. We feel that permanent hard surfacing will encourage our present industrial business users to utilize the facilities more often as well as encourage other prospective industries to look Eastland over more favorably, as well as being more economical for the city over a period of years. The estimated cost of completing the Eastland Airport with a final solution to the runways, we estimate at less than \$10,000."

The board adopted the following resolution: "The Eastland Chamber of Commerce, recognizing the importance of The Eastland Airport to the area and the hazardous condition of the runways, do hereby pass a resolution of full support in getting the runways hard surfaced at the earliest possible date."

Don Russell is co-chairman of the aviation committee.

Pierson said that the present facilities are worth about \$50,000 and that needed repairs aren't expected to be over \$10,000. He also guessed that there are from between 30 and 35 planes a month using the runway, besides those that kept there.

Max Beazley, Texas Electric Service Co. employe, reported that a TESCO plane was unable to land at the field last week due to the condition of the runway.

Director Ronald Burton, another TESCO employe, asked Pierson what kind of topping would be used.

"That similar to Interstate 20 highway specifications," Pierson said, "and we think we can get a \$12,000 job for maybe \$7,500 for permanent coverage."

Possibility of airline service was discussed by Pierson who explained the new third level

ed service, recently approved and now being tested, in which small towns are served by small aircraft, linking with second level and first level service at the larger cities.

How will the money be raised, Burton asked, and Pierson said that the committee at this time was merely seeking the encouragement support of the chamber and that arrangements will be worked out.

In other business, the directors:

spent in local retail stores and for what, in the 1962 fiscal year, are revealed in the current market study released by the Standard Rate and Data Service. Similar breakdowns are given for communities throughout the rest of the United States.

In Eastland County, it is shown, retail volume was at a high mark, with most types of stores benefiting. A large part was accounted for by food stores and by those selling cars and other automotive equipment.

These two garnered some 66 percent of all retail business. Their combined sales in the year amounted to \$17,252,000. Of this total, the stores that

sold food for home consumption accounted for \$6,541,000.

Another \$7,205,000 went for automotive purchases, which includes cars, motorcycles, boats and accessories.

An additional \$3,506,000 was spent in gas service stations.

The report also shows how much money went for other kinds of goods.

General merchandise purchases, in department stores and variety shops, amounted to \$2,305,000.

Sales of apparel, in stores specializing in articles for personal wear, came to \$682,000. Home furnishings sales total- (Continued on page 2)

ZACHRY CO. Rock Crusher Installation To Get Underway Here Monday

Installation will begin Monday of a giant rock crusher near Lake Leon which is expected to be another big-time, small industry for Eastland.

The operation will be an H. B. Zachry undertaking which will add some 12 to 15 families in Eastland immediately.

Negotiations have been completed between the well-known Texas construction company and Texas Electric Service Co. here for the use of the old railroad spur in hauling the native limestone out.

Site of the crusher is to be on the Collins place near the Lake Leon Power Plant. The Eastland Chamber of Commerce has been helping with

negotiations for several months.

Capacity of the plant will be some 1,200 square yards a day, a company spokesman said late this week.

First multitude of loads are expected to be taken to Dyess AFB near Abilene, where the Zachry Co. has contract for the widening and strengthening of the present runways to make them adequate for B-52 bomber operations. The base is now a B-47 base.

Headquarters for Zachry is San Antonio, and they were a co-contractor for the recent installation of the 12 Atlas missile sites circling Abilene.

The company has had a permanent asphalt plant located at View, near Abilene, for many years, and development of the rock plant in Eastland will further the company's extensive operations in this area.

Bob Burns is area superintendent for the company and is in charge of getting up the plant here.

Leon crusher manager will be R. S. Batten, who has rented the Hood King place on West Highway 80, and was to move here this weekend.

A spokesman said that installation of the crusher shouldn't take more than a week.

Some eight or nine men are to be brought from the Capital Asphalt and Aggregate Co. operation near Abilene for the installation. Others probably will be hired locally, it was reported.

Resumption of heavier traffic over the TESCO rail spur will create a need for traffic precaution at least two cross gaps. The spur crosses Lake Leon road (FM 570) near the entrance to the Leon plant gate, and Interstate 20 (Highway 80) near Oiden.

TESCO has averaged about one train per month over the line, reports say, for the delivery of poles and supplies.

Further demand for housing is expected in Eastland, in as much as the crusher is considered to be a "permanent" operation.

Unconfirmed reports are that the company has highway contracts which will require a great supply of rock for quite some time.

Miss Shirley Smith Is EHS Homemaker of Year

Shirley Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Johnson Smith, is Homemaker of Tomorrow for Eastland High School in the 1963 Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

Having achieved the highest score in a knowledge and aptitude test given senior girls December 4, she now is eligible, along with winners in other state high schools, for the title of state Homemaker of Tomorrow.

The state Homemaker of Tomorrow is awarded a \$1,500 scholarship by General Mills,

sponsors of the program. The runner-up receives a \$500 scholarship.

Basis for selection of local and state winners is a test prepared and scored by Science Research Association, Chicago. The test was administered to all Eastland High School senior girls by Miss Loretta Morris, Home-making teacher. The test concerned problems and situations encountered by typical young housewives.

Miss Smith has four credits in Home-making and she has taken three years of home-making and two summer home experiences. She was a member of the Future Homemakers of America for three years and was secretary the last year.

The 1963 Betty Crocker Search reached another all-time high in enrollment with 410,466 girls in 12,364 schools participating. In the program's nine years, nearly three million girls have been enrolled.

661 Herds of Cattle Tested For Brucellosis

A total of 661 different cattle herds have been tested for Brucellosis in Eastland County since the work began on Jan. 7, according to word the Crew Chief, Jim Ellis, furnished the County Agent's office this week.

Total number of cattle in the 661 different herds was 11,927 animals, possibly more than one third of the cattle in the county, since the exact number is undetermined. The last count was in the 1950 census taken in the fall of 1950.

To date there have only been 20 different herds found to be infected with only 23 positive animals.

Only 165 calves have been vaccinated by the technicians. Owners must get their calves vaccinated for Brucellosis if they are between four and 12 months of age and if they will be moved prior to the testing date.

The mobile blood testing lab, which is located at the Eastland depot, is available at the laboratory.

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

One of the chief contributors to modern American society is the institution known as baby sitting. One noted authority estimated 35 percent of the buying power attributed to teenagers probably comes from baby sitting salaries.

It wasn't too long ago, that unless mother and father had a handy grandma around they stayed home or took the children with them. Just as freedom has come to other oppressed groups — grandparents no longer get stuck endlessly, because more often than not, they are also out enjoying themselves.

As a result baby sitting has grown into what amounts to a major industry—practiced, all too often, by inexperienced nannies and sometimes unqualified young people.

Whether the youngsters are six months old or 10 years old, parents leaving them want to know the sitter is someone they can trust.

It must be someone the parents know is responsible and sufficiently mature, one who

will like the child and get along with him. This calls for a study of the sitter's references if he or she is not already well known to the family.

To be in charge of one or more children and the home they live in is a serious business. Careful arrangements need to be made between the parents and the baby sitter.

Both the parents and baby sitter have obligations in preparing and carrying out the agreement.

Parents should make the request well in advance. A thorough briefing should be made to the sitter — explaining where the parents will be including phone numbers, and the expected time of return.

The sitter should meet the child while he is awake, especially on the first visit. The layout of the home should be explained and emergency numbers listed.

The sitter should be alerted for expected visitors or deliveries otherwise the doors and windows should remain locked. Finally the parents should have the correct change available to avoid confusion and provide safe transportation home.

The sitter's responsibilities are similar. She should keep awake—even if parents allow napping, follow parents' views on TV, phone, snacks and visitors, and make periodic checks quietly on sleeping children.

Full information on food, habits, rituals and nicknames should be obtained. Sitters

should understand basic first aid and learn to suspect illness in a child. Safety should be a sitter's first consideration.

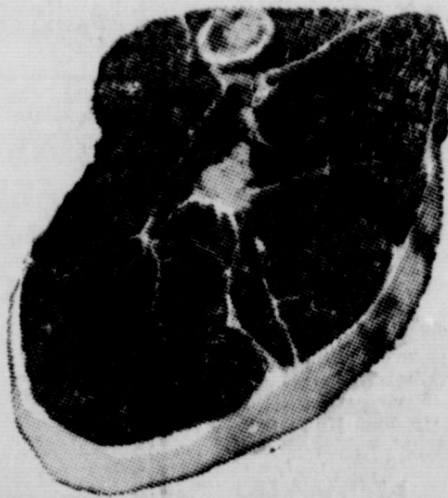
