## \$525,000 Bond Election Carries on Both Counts, 2 to 1

Eastland voters overwhelmingly said "yes" to a \$525,000 school bond issue in an election Saturday. The ballot contained two propositions—levying of a maintenance tax and the issuance of the bonds. Both carried. The vote was 453 for the maintenance tax; 185 against the maintenance tax; 458 for the bond issue; and 181 against the bond issue. Election Judge E. E. Layton said the total vote was 650. Votes averaged one-a-minute all day, he said.

Approval of the bond issue was the initial step toward construction of a new 16-classroom, air-conditioned elementary building; a modern gymnasium; and an agricultural vocational shop. It will mark the first school construction program since the high school and junior high buildings were built some 30 years ago. Realization of the building program will culminate several years of planning, and "thinking" about school needs.

Several attempts have been made in the past few years, to initiate a building program, but the board had hesitated to start such a program because of the financial condition of the schools. The schools have operated under a federal court order since 1942, following an unpleasant bankruptcy experience, similar to that of many school districts in the state during that boom period. On Feb. 1 of this year, the school "got out from under" the court order with the calling in of the last bonds. The district paid off \$44,000 of the bonds, and arranged a refunding bond issue for the remaining \$50,000, which will be paid back at a lower, three per cent interest.

What with getting the school's financial affairs in such good condition, the board felt that in view of the continual worsening of physical plant conditions, especially at the two ward schools, the time had come to set about building new schools for the youngsters in Eastland. Seeking professional help, the board employed an architectural firm in Abilene and a financial advisory firm from Dallas to help with the planning.

Immediately prior to the election, a thorough education program for the public was carried out—with joint meetings of the service clubs, meetings with the Parent-Teacher Association, and general public meetings. Some dissatisfaction was expressed by citizens concerning the 20-acre tract owned by the school, and tentative proposed site for the new elementary building.

Another site became available, and the week before the election, the board took options on the other site, and decided to leave it to the public as to which site the school will be built on. Date for the referendum election has not been set, but is expected to be soon.

Board President M. H. Perry expressed the board's "thanks" to the people of the Eastland district for turning out in such a great number to vote. He also added that the board members appreciate the vote of confidence which the public gave their plans and ideals for the schools.

"We will endeavor to conduct the school's business in the future, particularly in regard to the construction program, in such a manner," he said. (Continued on page 4)

An arch-way sign bearing the above inscription will mark the Highway 80 entry to the lot.

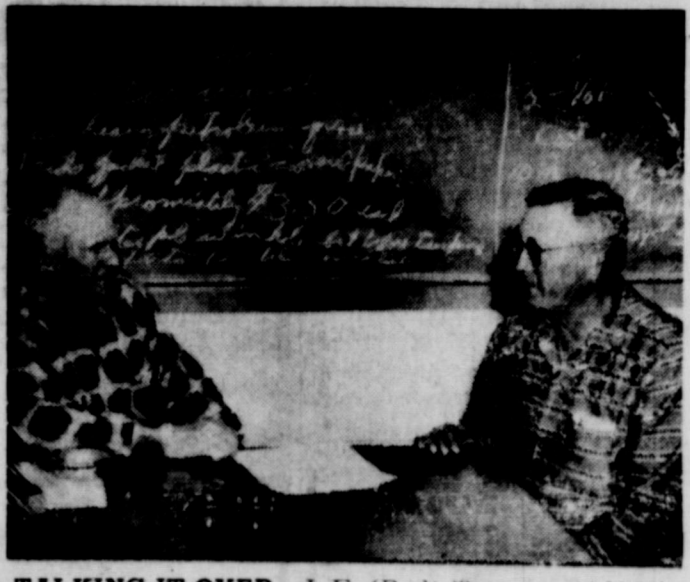
Opening day is set for Saturday, Feb. 16, a day expected to be a ringer—complete with string band, concessions, and maybe an auction or two.

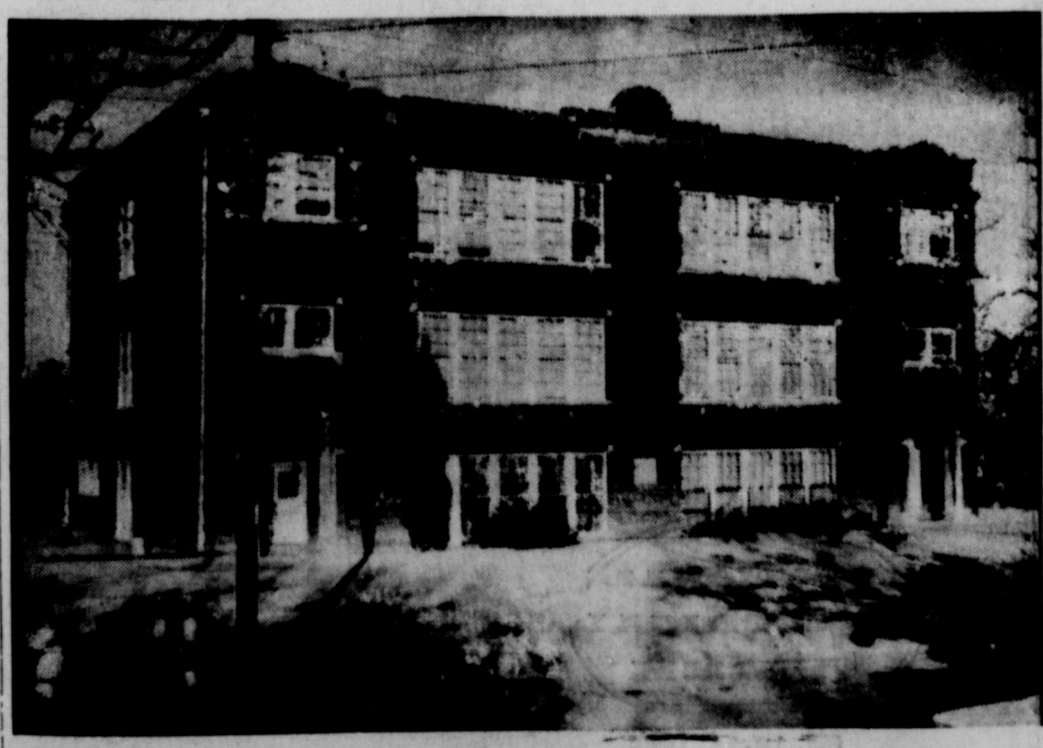

**BUYING A DISPOSAL.**

If you are considering buying a food waste disposer, study consumer information available. Many people hesitate to purchase a disposal because of the trouble they have heard that others have had with them. Some of the most frequent "trouble" stories that circulate are that disposers will:

**CLOG THE DRAIN**

They will not if used according to simple directions the manufacturer provides.

**HAVE TO BE CLEANED FREQUENTLY**

If enough water is used during and after operating, the disposer cleans itself.

**USE TOO MUCH WATER**

They use about 1 1/2 gallons a day per person—about 2 percent more than the family normally uses.

**AREN'T SAFE**

They are safe. Many have solid shredding tables or walls, eliminating the direct use of knives or blades; others have safety covers which keep fingers and foreign objects out and waste in. On some, the only opening is beneath the revolving steel plate.

**CAN'T BE USED WITH A SEPTIC TANK**

This is the \$64 question in many areas. They can be used with a septic tank if the tank

meets the Minimum Proper Standards of FHA. These state that the septic tank should be 750 gallons for 3 bedrooms, 1,000 gallons for four bedrooms, plus 250 gallons for each additional bedroom.

Don Smith is a senior in the U.S. Army at Texas Southwestern Medical School in Dallas.

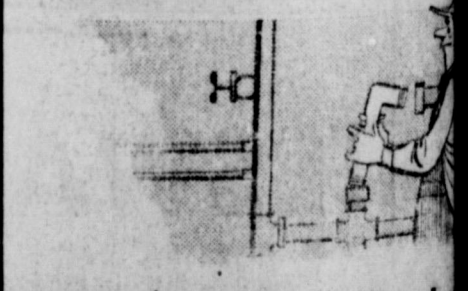

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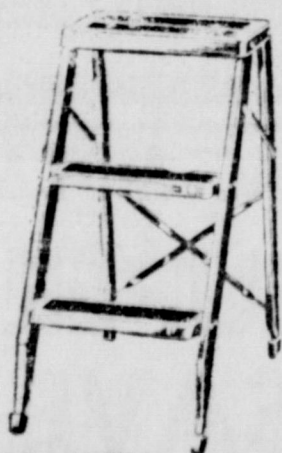
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
