

Eastland voters overwhelmingly said "yes" to \$525,000 school bond issue in an election Saturday. The ballot contained two propositions-levying

of a maintenance tax and the issuance of the bonds. Both carried.

The vote was 453 for the maintenance tax; 185 against the meintenance tax; 458 for the bond issue; and 181 against the bond issue.

Election Judge E. E. Layton said the total vote was 650.

Votes averaged one-a-minute all day, he said.
