6 Injured In Holiday Accidents

Three people were still in hospitals Wednesday and others had been treated and released following a siege of auto accidents during the Christmas holidays, amid the seasonable weather.

Five persons were hurt in and near Ranger on rain-slick roads, and two were injured in Eastland when the vehicle in which they were riding was reportedly forced off the highway.

Ernie Mae Lane, 14-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Lane, was in good condition at Eastland Memorial Hospital where she is being treated for severe cuts and bruises about the face.

Mikey Taylor, 19, of Midland, was in fair condition in Ranger General Hospital and was to be transferred to a Midland hospital Wednesday.

Mrs. H. S. Twyman of Ranger was also resting well in the Ranger Hospital Wednesday.

Miss Lane was a passenger in a pickup driven by Phillip Gosnell, 15, of Cisco, that left the highway east of Eastland, about 10:30 p.m. Saturday, and almost went over the edge of a bridge.

The girl was reportedly thrown through the windshield and landed in the ditch of icy water.

The two said that their vehicle had been forced off the highway by an auto, whose driver slowed after the accident, but did not stop.

The pickup caught on the bridge edge and was removed soon after the accident.

Gosnell was treated and released.

Taylor, the Midland youth, was seriously injured, and a passenger, Adrian Brown, 28, of Ranger, was slightly hurt in a one-car accident nine miles east of Ranger on U. S. 80 8:15 p.m. Monday.

John Melvin Varner, 59, of Abilene, received multiple lacerations about the mouth when his car skidded on slick pavement at 3:50 p.m. Tuesday 10 miles east of Ranger.

Mrs. H. S. Twyman and Ronnie McGough of Ranger were injured in a two-car accident on West Main St. in Ranger at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday. McGough was treated and released.

NEW FRONT EXPECTED Clear Skies Welcomed

Clearing skies were welcomed by area residents Wednesday following two days of unpleasant weather in the area.

A slow-falling drizzle hit the area Monday and continued through Christmas day.

Moisture recorded for the two-day period was .30 inch.

Temperatures ranged in the low 40's most of Monday, dropping to freezing Monday night and early Tuesday morning.

Local School Discussions Scheduled School Vote Ballots Canvass Set Tonight Vote 8 to 7 at Courthouse

A group of Eastland citizens will probably be invited to discuss local school problems and tentative plans during a special meeting sometime in January.

The school board discussed such a meeting at their last regular meeting and selected several persons to be invited for the first of what will be a series of familiarization meetings.

Plans are being made to hold a joint meeting of the local Rotary and Lions club Tuesday, Jan. 22nd, at which time Daniel Boone, architect for the school, will talk, and the first citizens meeting could possibly be held that same evening.

The election was called to clarify an earlier (1951) debt assumption election which followed the consolidation of the Morton Valley School District with that of Eastland.

In the 1951 election, voters approved the assumption of

debts, but the ballots were inadvertently drawn up to include only the then-current Morton Valley debt (now paid), but did not specify the debt already owed by the Eastland district.

This current election in no way affects the present status of the local school district, and is being held merely to clear the technicality of the earlier election.

The simple ballots are "for" the assumption, or "against" the assumption, and a small turnout of voters was expected due to the holiday season.

The 1961 poll tax receipt is required and the voters must have property in the district rendered for taxation.

County Retail Sales Exceed Quota in 1962

How well did retail storekeepers in Eastland County make out in the past fiscal year?

The figures on local business activity, just released as part of a national survey, show that they had a good year. Their sales volume was surprisingly high, notwithstanding the persistent talk of a forthcoming depression, which caused many consumers to cut down on their spending.

The survey was made by the Standard Rate and Data Service, utilizing data obtained from national, state and local

sources. It covers the 12 months through June 30, 1962.

Retail stores in Eastland County, it is shown, had gross sales of \$26,034,000, which topped the previous year's \$25,760,000.

The volume of business was equivalent to .9115 percent of the national total, which was more than its quota, since the local population is only .0101 percent of the national.

The market strength that was demonstrated locally was in direct contrast to the situation in some sections of the nation, where unemployment

continues to be a major problem, stifling business.

Most types of retail store in Eastland County benefited some more than others, however, as consumers shifted their emphasis of their spending during the year.

More money was devoted to automobile purchases and other big ticket items and a smaller proportion than usual to services.

What made possible big spending locally is readily apparent from the figures, which show that the average family had bigger earnings than before.

Local income in the year, after allowing for tax deductions amounted to \$27,955,000. This compares with the prior year's \$26,814,000.

It was at the average rate of \$4,987 per household. This is more than was available locally in fiscal 1961, \$3,761 per household.

Most economists have made an about face in their forecasting. They are now predicting that business will continue rising modestly for the next year and that there will be no depression.

They point out that consumers are armed with a huge amount of liquid savings and higher personal incomes, which will bring them to the market place in force, especially if their Federal taxes are cut during the year.

A son, Lee, lettered three years as a McMurry College quarterback, completing his college career this fall.

Mr. King was a member of the Elks Club.

Surviving are his wife; one son, Lee of Abilene; a daughter, Mrs. Gene Sutton of Burleson; two brothers, Ralph of Houston and Alton of Eastland; and three grandchildren.

Caddo Oil Seen for School

Prospects for Caddo lime production in the Frank Slyter et al No. 1 Schoor Estate, wildcat re-entry project six miles southeast of Cisco, appeared good Saturday, according to reports here.

The Slyter company took over the hole that was drilled to 3,700 feet in 1951 by Oil Associates.

With Hoffman Drilling Co. of Eastland on the job, the hole was cleaned out and pipe was set. Perforations in the Caddo yielded a good show. The formation was treated Friday with 1500 gallons of acid and testing was due Saturday. The perforations were from 2,874-84 feet.

If the Caddo yield is inadequate, plans call for attempting completion in the Marble Falls, the report said.

Elsewhere, Low Drilling Company and Texstar Corp. plugged and abandoned as a dry hole their No. 1 Adolph Mueller, a wildcat test that went to 4,200 feet nine miles north of town on the old Canyon Road. The hole was bottomed at 4,200 feet. A test in the Ellenburger yielded sulphur water.

Low and Texstar planned to begin drilling Saturday in their No. 1 F. O. Stokes, eight miles northeast of Cisco near the Highway 183 "Y". A 4,500 test was planned. The project is in Section 37, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Lone Star Producing Company's No. 1 C. E. Pippen, a 4,100 foot wildcat seven miles west of Cisco, was drilling at about 3,000 feet Saturday. Location was in Section 3171, TE&L Survey. The McCright Drilling Co. has the contract.

Home Accident Toll Greatest In Winter

The greatest number of fatal home accident fatalities the three winter months, according to Texas Safety Association records.

"Based on these records," Lone Star Gas Company Manager Gordon Goldston said today, "451 or 35 percent of all home accident fatalities for the next 12 months will occur in December, January and February."

Fires and falls, in that order, will offer the greatest threats to life and limb during the winter months," Goldston said. "We must find and re-

type before, our loved ones are injured or killed.

"Leading causes of fire deaths are smoking in bed, children playing with matches, faulty electric wiring, defective flues and chimneys, and overheated equipment."

Children of less than five years of age and senior family members in the 65-and-older age bracket will be the most frequent victims of home accidents, with 286 or 63 percent of the expected 451 fatalities in these age groups. A total of 169 of the 286 victims will be 65 or over and 117 will be less than five.

That's according to the Texas Department of Public Safety, and we see no reason to doubt it.

Dry statistics.

Eight wars have taken the lives of 1,130,393. In 61 years, the highways have claimed 1,378,854 lives.

For those who might be interested, the breakdown on wars looks like this:

Revolutionary War — 4,435.
War 1812 — 2,260.
Mexican War — 13,283.
Civil War — 529,332.
Spanish American War — 2,446.
World War I — 407,828.
Korean War — 54,246.

It's hard to imagine that more people could be killed on our own highways, than on battlefields — but it's true.

Like we said, statistics, are so boring — but then of course, a highway crash in which you're involved, isn't exactly the most delightful thing in the world either, is it?

Earnest Named to CJC Nursing Advisory Board

Frank Earnest, administrator of Eastland Memorial Hospital, has been named as a member of the Advisory Board of the Cisco Junior College School of Vocational Nursing, according to announcement today by President G. C. Hogue.

Other members appointed to the Advisory Board include Mrs. Nova Graham, Cisco; Donald Kephart, Breckenridge; and Yates Clayton, of Albany. The board will function as an administrative group, responsible for formulating policies and directing the general operation of the nursing program.

The recently-initiated vocational nursing program at JC is affiliated with Stephens Memorial hospital, Shackelford County hospital in Albany, Graham Sanitarium in Cisco and Eastland Memorial hospital in Eastland. Students are now being accepted, with the first class scheduled to begin February 1.

Prospective students should contact the hospital administrator in their area for application forms. Qualifications include at least two years high school or equivalent and good physical and mental health. Applicant must be between the ages of 18 and 55.

The program, which is fully accredited with the Texas Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners and the Texas Education Agency, will cover a full 52 weeks of study and first 20 weeks will be spent in the classroom, while the remaining 32 weeks will be spent in the affiliating hospital. The affiliating hospital will provide a graduate stipend to compensate for some of the student's expense from \$10 up to a maximum of \$60 per month, as the student progresses and spends more time in the hospital.

Air Conditioning Is Seen As Important In School Design

AUSTIN — Air conditioning has become the single most important new development in Texas public schools, the November issue of the "Texas Outlook," reports. The magazine is published by the Texas State Teachers Association.

Besides making schools more comfortable, air conditioning is responsible for a host of innovations in school design. The goal is to improve learning.

C. Lyman Ellis, consultant in school architecture for the Texas Education Agency, is quoted as saying:

"It has given the architect freedom to plan a building to the best utilization of the site, eliminating the need for considering sun direction and other external factors."

Among the innovations is the "compact" school. An outstanding example is the Forest Park High School in the South Park Independent School District in Beaumont, reputed to be one of the first windowless, air-conditioned schools in the nation.

Since the almost-square building depends entirely upon electrical power for its light and air circulation, an emergency lighting system powered by batteries is maintained in case of power failure.

Belaire Elementary School in San Angelo, built in 1955, was the first Texas school completely designed and built for air conditioning.

San Angelo has been a leader in the trend toward air-conditioned schools, and Supt. G. B. Wadzeck tells why:

"We feel that air conditioning is more economical and provides a more efficient educational atmosphere."

Wadzeck says janitorial personnel can maintain almost ten per cent more square footage when a building is air-conditioned, which more than offsets the utility cost increase.

Another trend is toward more colorful interiors. These include planters in corridors, brightly colored lockers and bulletin boards, and floor covers chosen for beauty and



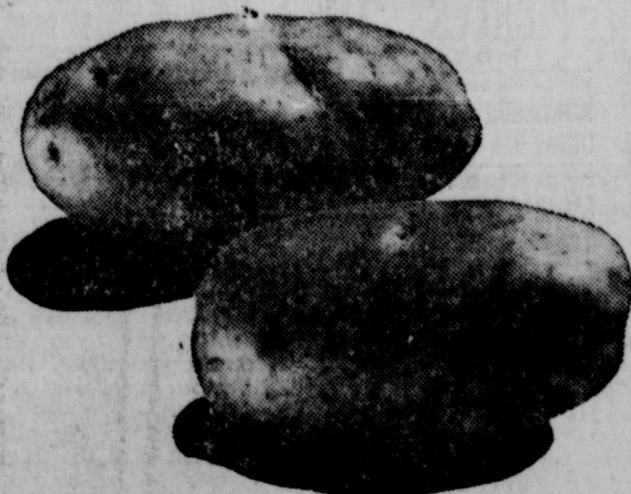

Peace-time Vet Receives VA Training

A 39-year-old Air Force Master Sergeant in San Antonio is the first peace-time veteran in Texas, and possibly in the country to be enrolled for vocational rehabilitation under a new law recently signed by President Kennedy, the Veterans Administration said today.

He is Elmer L. Cullison, of 939 McVaine Street. Cullison was retired with physical disability from the 6,570th Air Base Group three months ago after more than 20 years of service in the Air Force, including tours in Korea and Germany.

Cullison and nearly 100,000

other peacetime veterans who have suffered service-connected disabilities will benefit under terms of the peacetime vocational rehabilitation law, according to Edward P. Onstot, manager of the VA Regional Office in Dallas.

This bill extends to these peacetime veterans the benefits of VA's wartime Vocational Rehabilitation Bill.

Onstot estimated that some 12,000 peacetime veterans incur injuries each year and may be eligible for the new benefits. Veterans entitled to the benefits are those who sustained service-connected disabilities while in the Armed Forces, (a) during the period between World War II and the Korean Conflict, and (b) since February, 1955.

Eligible disabled peacetime veterans are entitled to as much as four years of vocational rehabilitation training at Government expense, Onstot said.

Cullison was an aircraft maintenance expert in service, but

his disability limits physical activity. He has been enrolled in the Alamo Watchmaking College in San Antonio.

Disabled peacetime veterans can obtain further information from any VA office, Onstot said.

Browsing With Bev

While driving through wooded areas or along city streets in Texas during the fall of the year, have you ever wondered why leaves of trees change their color?

There is a real good reason. It is a part of the process by which the tree prepares itself for winter.

Both legend and science have reasons for the beautiful red, brown, yellow, and orange colors which decorate Texas broad-leaf trees each year. One story has it that

Jack Frost paints the multicolors on trees in autumn. Another one is that celestial hunters have slain the great bear in the sky and his blood dripping on the forests change many trees to red. In reality, however, change in coloring is the result of chemical processes which take place in the tree during its preparation for winter.

All during the spring and summer the leaves have served as food factories. In the autumn, cool weather causes a slowing down of tree growth and the work of the leaves comes to an end. As this happens, the green coloring matter, or chlorophyll is which helps to make food, dies or loses its color. While the chlorophyll, which helps to make food, is active, it makes out other colored pigments in the leaf such as brown, red or yellow. As it dies, these other colors predominate.

Some of the food, such as sugars, may be trapped in the leaves when this activity ceases. These give rise to additional colors such as reds, purples and blues. This process adds further hues to the leaves bringing about a riot of autumn colors.

The effect of the leaf fall is to prepare the tree for winter sleep or inactivity. Also, the falling leaves make a blanket over the ground. As spring comes the leaves decay and put back into the soil some of the nutrients taken up by the roots during the past growing season. The decayed leaves help to make the soft, spongy soil which rapidly takes up rainfall.

Green Acres Has Orange For Christmas

Q - Who is entitled to Veterans Administration guardianship service?

A - The VA provides guardianship service for minor children of deceased veterans, for incompetent veterans, and for certain other veterans' dependents who are not capable of managing their own affairs, during fiscal year 1962, more than 519,000 persons received this guardianship service. Their combined estates amounted to more than \$757 million.

Q - Are World War II veterans able to apply for insurance from the veterans Administration?

A - No. Bills introduced to permit World War II veterans to apply for NSLI insurance for a period of one year did not pass the 87th Congress.

Q - Is it true that a married girl can qualify under the War Orphans Education program if otherwise eligible?

A - Yes. Marriage is not a barrier. Educational rights are open to all children of a deceased war or peacetime veteran whose death resulted from service connected causes. They generally must be between the ages of 18 and 23 but there are occasional exceptions. They may be single or married.

Q - I have heard that many veterans and widows are not taking advantage of VA pension plans that would give them more money. Is that true?

A - Yes. Apparently thousands do not fully understand the new pension law and the VA is still anxious to explain all the facts. Suggest you contact or write to nearest VA office.

Q - I am in the armed forces overseas and plan to enter training under the War Orphans Education program. I understand the VA is authorized to provide transportation at Government expense to and from my place of vocational counseling. How can this be arranged when I am overseas?

A - It cannot be arranged. VA does not provide vocational counseling overseas nor can travel be authorized back to this country for such counseling. You should decide where you will go to school when you return to this country. If you then write to a VA regional office near that school, advising when you will be there for counseling, time will be saved in setting up your counseling appointment.

Q - Do the Veterans Affairs Offices of the State Department act as an overseas arm of the Veterans Administration?

A - The office has the function of administering directly VA educational and training benefits and VA medical care and treatment benefits for eligible veterans in the countries comprising Western Europe and in Mexico. In addition, the offices furnish information and assistance to veterans, their dependents and beneficiaries on the full range of veterans matters, as do U. S. embassies and consular

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A - Yes. Apparently thousands do not fully understand the new pension law and the VA is still anxious to explain all the facts. Suggest you contact or write to nearest VA office.

Q - I am in the armed forces overseas and plan to enter training under the War Orphans Education program. I understand the VA is authorized to provide transportation at Government expense to and from my place of vocational counseling. How can this be arranged when I am overseas?

A - It cannot be arranged. VA does not provide vocational counseling overseas nor can travel be authorized back to this country for such counseling. You should decide where you will go to school when you return to this country. If you then write to a VA regional office near that school, advising when you will be there for counseling, time will be saved in setting up your counseling appointment.

Q - Do the Veterans Affairs Offices of the State Department act as an overseas arm of the Veterans Administration?

A - The office has the function of administering directly VA educational and training benefits and VA medical care and treatment benefits for eligible veterans in the countries comprising Western Europe and in Mexico. In addition, the offices furnish information and assistance to veterans, their dependents and beneficiaries on the full range of veterans matters, as do U. S. embassies and consular

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
