



In issuing the proclamation Scaberry termed the dual banking system "a clear and historic response to the Constitution's call for checks and balances" in the apportioning

"Under this system," is said, "private ownership of our banks has a choice of doing business under either state or federal supervision. This gives the private citizen protection against arbitrary or oppressive policies and actions at either level of government."
