## Eastland National Bank Joins Centennial Banking Celebration

The Eastland National Bank will join with all other commercial banks of the country during 1963 in observing the Centennial of commercial banking, by carrying on activities to focus the attention of Eastland on the important role that the bank has played in local community progress. Plans for Centennial activities were approved recently by directors according to Tom Wilson, President.

Commercial banks throughout the country are observing the 100th anniversary of President Lincoln's signing of the National Currency Act, on February 25, 1863. This Act gave the nation its dual banking system by authorizing federally chartered national banks to operate alongside already existing state-chartered banks.

### CENTENNIAL OF THE DUAL BANKING SYSTEM By Chairmen of City Council of the City of Eastland A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS the year 1963 marks the centennial of the approval by President Lincoln of the National Currency Act on February 25, 1863; and

WHEREAS the National Currency Act led to the establishment of a system of National banks chartered by and operated under the supervision of the Federal Government and charged with the responsibility of issuing a new National Currency; and

WHEREAS this was the beginning of the "Dual Banking System" which for a century has been an important factor in the economic growth and productivity of the United States; and

WHEREAS this dual system of Nationally chartered and State chartered commercial banks, conceived the functioning in the spirit of competitive enterprise, has provided the credit necessary to our economy vital, has contributed greatly to the survival and strengthening of the Nation in times of crisis, and stands today as a symbol of our country's present strength and future capabilities; and

WHEREAS it is appropriate that the centennial of the approval of the National Currency Act be celebrated to commemorate the significance of the establishment of our Dual Banking System;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Virgil T. Seaberry, Jr., Chairman of the City Commission, do hereby proclaim the period from February 25, 1963, to December 31, 1963, as the Centennial of the Dual Banking System of the United States.

I urge the people of Eastland to join with representatives of the Eastland National Bank in activities and ceremonies designed to pay tribute to the contribution which our Dual Banking System has made to the economic, social, and cultural lives of the people of this community.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of Eastland Dual Banking System to be affixed.

Done at the City of Eastland this 22nd day of February in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and sixty-three.

## Indictments Returned By Grand Jury

Eight indictments were returned by the Grand Jury for the 91st District at 4:05 p.m. Wednesday.

Returned were indictments for murder, wife desertion, D.W.I., possession of forged instrument, removing mortgaged property and three counts of burning grassland.

District Attorney Earl Conner Jr. stated that he could give no possible date for the trials.

While in session, the Grand Jury also studied other matters including the number of untried cases in the county, but apparently no action was taken.

The Grand Jury recessed until March 26th.

## DPS SPECIALISTS Deadline Nears, Inspections Lag; 'As Usual' Veteran Boustead Reports

If you haven't had your automobile inspected yet, you're among the majority of the people in this county.

You'll also probably be among the same majority waiting in long lines not so many days from now.

That's the word from Carl Boustead who's in charge of supervision for the Department of Public Safety of the 16 inspection centers in this county and some 51 others in adjoining counties.

Boustead, a 26-year veteran

with DPS, reported this week that at the current rate of inspections, only about 45 per cent of the eligible vehicles in this county will have been inspected by March 1.

You can see that "more haven't, than have." And you might save yourself some bother if you'd take the few minutes now, rather than wait until near the April 15 deadline.

There are 14,630 vehicles registered in this county which fall in the category of these that must be inspected, 51-year-

old Boustead reports.

Asked if this was customary, Carl answered, "We're always behind, it seems."

He emphasized that he didn't want to give the impression he's urging the people to get their cars inspected for the department's or the various stations' benefit. "I just know it's exasperating to wait in line," he says.

It isn't that there isn't plenty of places for inspection either.

In Eastland, these are inspection centers: Blevins Motor Co.; Muirhead Motor Co.; Allen's Auto Repair; Fullen Motor Co.; King Motor Co.; and City Garage.

People in Cisco can take their autos to Booth's Garage; Graham Motor Co.; Rutherford Chevrolet; or Gore Garage.

The Mission Garage; Anderson Chevrolet; and Lee Crawford Garage are inspection centers in Ranger, and Lone Star plant has its own fleet inspection center.

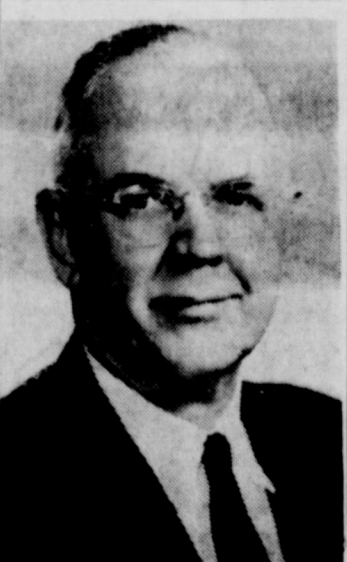
Smith Brothers Chevrolet is inspection center in Gorman and Butler Motor Co. in Rising Star.

Boustead has five other counties (Stephens, Shackelford, Brown, Coleman and Callahan) and ten inspection centers in Taylor County, over which he rides herd as inspection supervisor for the DPS.

He is one of 70 authorized officers in the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of DPS that has supervision of 4,700 inspection stations in the state.

A "Yankee" by birth (Iowa), Boustead has been in Texas since 1928, and joined DPS in 1927 as a combination patrolman-examiner. (The department was created in 1935). In 1941 he went with the communications section and like

Cautious by frequent robberies of coin-operated machines in this area in the past, the attendant phoned the police who radioed the sheriff's department in Eastland and the three were picked up.

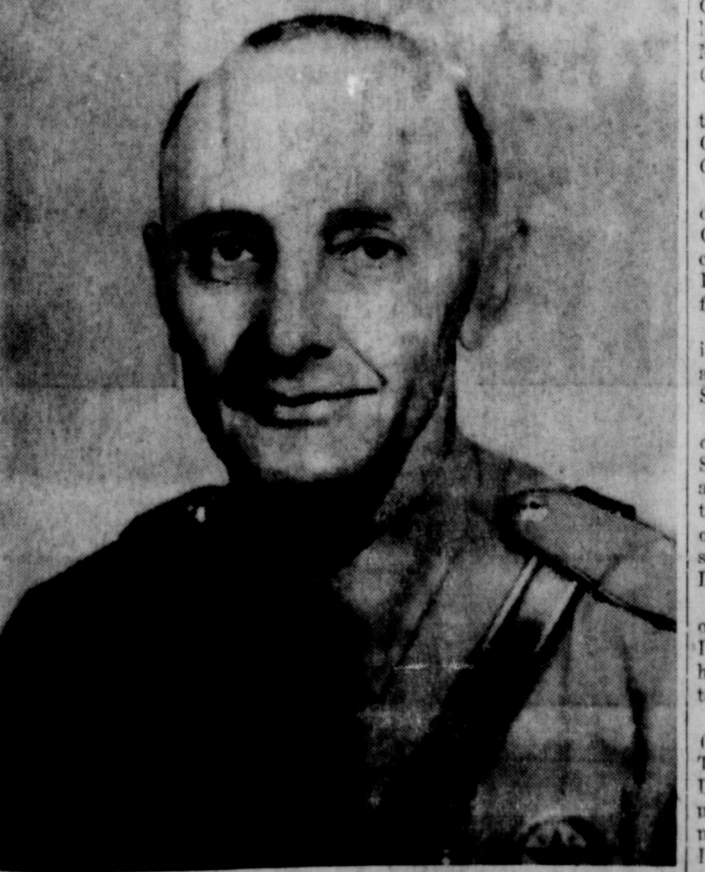

HOW TO PREPARE ROLLS FOR FREEZING

Any successful roll or bread recipe may be used for frozen rolls. Fat is likely to dry out less than one containing little. A little more sugar than is used in fresh-made rolls and bread may be desirable because more of the sugar is likely to be used by the yeast during the longer period the dough remains unrisen. Grease the surface of the shaped rolls well to prevent them from drying out.

(1) Permit the dough to be risen to double in bulk.

(2) Shape it into rolls as desired and grease the surface of each roll well to prevent drying.

(3) Immediately place the rolls close together in shallow packages.

(4) Lay a piece of cellophane or waxed paper on top. If necessary to pack in two layers, place a very thin piece of stiff paper between them. Do not pack so many layers in one package that the bottom ones are crushed. The shaped rolls may also be placed in paper baking cups before packing.

(5) Always keep out pocket of air from the packages, and freeze the rolls immediately. Rolls that have been allowed to rise before freezing are likely to have a smaller volume, a less uniform texture, and a less desirable flavor, than those that have not been allowed to rise previously after being shaped. Roll dough may also be frozen before it is shaped.

(6) Do not store longer than three to four weeks.

HOW TO PREPARE AND BAKE FROZEN DOUGH

(1) As soon as you remove the rolls from the freezer, place them in warm greased muffin tins over hot water, out of any draft, to rise. You may wish to remove the rolls from the paper cups because paper is a

good insulator and tends to allow the warming of the dough; or you may wish to set the cups of dough on racks where the warm, moist air can circulate around them. Rolls spread out on baking sheets where they have no support tend to increase in size by spreading out rather than rise.

(2) Let the rolls rise in a warm, moist place until light (from one to two hours). If the rolls rise slowly, "off" flavors may develop and coarse flattened cells and thick, tough crusts may form.

(3) Bake the rolls in the usual way at 400 degrees F. If desired, package the dough for rolls without shaping it into rolls in a flat sheet in the same manner as bread dough; then show and shape the rolls in a glass baking pan.

FREEZING AND CANNING WORKSHOP

A "freezing and canning workshop" will be conducted by the County Home Demonstration Agent during the month of March.

The first meeting will be held Friday, March 1 at 10 a.m. in the Conference Room of the Texas Electric Service Company, Eastland.

Anyone interested in attending the actual workshop, which will probably be held March 22, should attend the first meeting on March 1, as plans will be made and supplies discussed.

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## Report Indicates 800 New Homes Built In County In 10 Year Period

To what degree has the building surge of recent years changed the face of Eastland County? How many new homes have been put up? How does the local rates of construction compare with that in other communities?

The extent of the change is indicated in the latest data on the subject, released by the Department of Commerce.

It shows that 800 of the dwellings that are now in use in the county were not in existence in 1950.

In the period between 1950 and 1960, that is the number of new housing units that were built. It brought the overall total in the county to 8,249 units. Some of the new ones replaced old and dilapidated dwellings, which were torn down in the process.

The rate of construction stacked up favorably with that reported for many areas of the country.

As to occupancy, the survey places the average number of persons per dwelling at 2.8. The average elsewhere in the United States is 3.4.

The amount of new building in the county was greater than in any other decade. It was made possible by rising personal income, by wider distribution of income and by liberal home financing, supported by Government funds.

In the process, many county families who had formerly been renters, became property owners.

Nationally, the figures show that one-family housing continues to dominate new residential construction, but not to the extent that it did at one time.

There are distinct signs of a shift in the direction of multiple dwellings, principally two-family houses and apartment buildings.

The amount of new construction in Eastland County was high, in the period, in relation

to average local population. It was equivalent to 38 new dwelling units per, 1,000 people.

An estimate places the value of this construction, based on the median cost of new, non-farm housing in the local region, at a total of \$10,240,000.

However, the importance of home building is not fully indicated by outlay alone. It also generates jobs, production and investment in other fields, from lumber, cement and other building materials to home furnishings and appliances.


### Services For Mrs. H. C. Croom Thursday, 3 P.M.

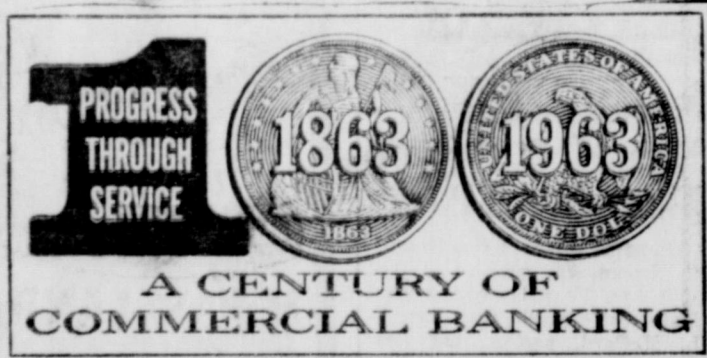

WHO INHERITS PROPERTY?

When you die, who will inherit your property? Your will may not be valid. Your will may be set aside. Your will may be changed. Your will may be revoked. Your will may be amended. real estate and for personal property, for community property and for separate property, for homestead property, and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not have a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendant of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving they divide the entire community estate between them.

(Continued from page One) thousands of others went into military service in 1942. For three years he was a port security specialist with the Coast Guard during World War II, coming back to Eastland in 1945 and the Department in 1955 as a patrolman.

He volunteered for the inspection section immediately after its inception in 1951 and came to Eastland County in August, 1953.

He and his family have lived in the same house in Olden since that time.

Putting in about 60 hours a week, even the holidays do not belong to men like Boustead. At such peak traffic times, he joins the patrol force and assists with traffic control, law enforcement and accident investigation.

Each inspection station pays the state 25 cents each for the stickers and is authorized by law to charge \$1 for the inspection. Any repairs that have to be made to meet requirements must, by law be charged for at the average rate.

It's Boustead's duty to see that the stations conduct the inspections in the prescribed manner—neither too stiff nor lenient—and that prices are adhered to. Each station has a \$1,000 performance bond.

The public often isn't aware of the serious section within the DPS if a man's in uniform "check a highway patrolman." But there are specialties and Boustead's is one of them.

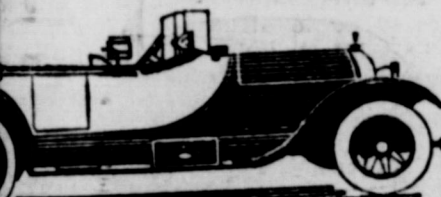
