Gordon Elected President; Program Building Reported

Gordon, manager of Gas Co., has been elected president of the Eastland Club, succeeding [Name].

Spoke on the County Program Building Committee. He called on County Agent J. M. Cooper, and Chamber Manager Lee Ellis, both of whom are committee chairmen in the program, to describe the work that is now being done.

Based on material gathered by his committee, Cooper said that estimates are that by 1970 there will be only 620 farms (and-or ranches) in the county, the average size of which will be 708 acres. The trend has been toward larger farms, but fewer in number.

He also pointed out that data indicates that by 1975, there won't be any cotton acreage in this county.

Peanut acreage is expected to remain fairly constant — 23,070 in 1930, 35,936 in 1940, 32,000 in 1950, 23,500 in 1960, and 26,000 anticipated in 1965 and 23,000 in 1970.

Contest of Ranger Wet Victory Anticipated on 11-Vote Margin

A contest of the Ranger wet election was almost a certainty, even before the county Commissioners met Thursday to canvass the vote held last Saturday.

The margin of victory for the wet forces was 11 votes — 643 for and 632 against the proposition for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages within the city limits of Ranger for off-premise consumption.

The county commissioners are required by law to hold a special session at least five days after the vote to canvass the returns.

County Judge Scott Bailey Monday called the canvass meeting for 10 a. m. today (Thursday).

The city of Ranger will legally become "wet" at the completion of the canvass meeting, according to T. E. Jones, a State Liquor Control Board Investigator, who was among a group of LCB men who visited the Eastland County Court house Monday.

Another visitor in the county Monday was a representative of a Fort Worth wholesale liquor distributor who was inquiring if any applications for retail permits has been filed. None have.

Even though the City of Ranger will be apparently be legally "wet" today, sale of intoxicants isn't expected to be legal until retailers receive permits from the state.

If the dry faction files a "protest" to the election, this, it is believed, will prevent the issuance of permits by the state LCB.

However, such permits were ordered issued by the State Supreme Court recently in the Impact case in Abilene, after the high court held that the area had been voted "wet", and established status quo, permitting the area to function as a wet area until legislation is settled.

What lies ahead for the legal sale of intoxicants in Ranger appears still to be in question, and will undoubtedly lead to some extent, on the findings in the Impact case.

A total of 1,301 ballots, including 62 absentee, were cast in Saturday's election.

This was the fourth election in Ranger on the wet-dry issue in the past eight months, and this was the largest turnout of voters by some 300 persons.

RANGER-EASTLAND TO HOST BASS TOURNAMENT AT LEON

The Ranger and Eastland Chamber of Commerce will be hosts to the First Annual Fort Worth Invitational Bass Tournament Saturday and Sunday, April 6-7, it has been announced.

Headquarters for the tournament will be east of Highway 2214, at the bridge, and at 5:30 p. m. Saturday, April 6, a fishery will be held for participants, members of the board of directors of the Eastland County Water Supply District and members of the Ranger and Eastland Chamber of Commerce. The fish fry will be catered by Walter Jeton of Fort Worth.

The contest will consist of three divisions: 1. Largest black bass; 2. Largest string of black bass; and 3. Husband and wife team (first prize for black bass, then string). Trophies will be awarded in all three divisions.

Anglers will fish as a team of two in a boat, and an entry fee of \$2 each or \$4 per team, will be charged. The contest is for black bass only (11 inches or longer) and must be caught at Lake Leon by any legal means except set lines, trot lines or trolling.

The contest will get underway at 5 a. m. Sunday and will close at 2 p. m. Wednesday, April 3.

Competition on Saturday, April 6 will be on an individual stringer weight basis and on Sunday, April 7, on a team basis.

Committees from both the Ranger and Eastland Chambers of Commerce will be on hand to welcome the contestants and help with the tournament.

Lake Leon has the reputation of being one of the "hottest" lakes in Texas for "lunker" bass.

O. W. Edwards Services Are Held Tuesday

Funeral services for Overton Walter Edwards, 85, were conducted Tuesday 2 p. m. at the Killingsworth Funeral Chapel with the Rev. B. L. McCord, pastor of the First Methodist Church, officiating. Burial was in the Evergreen Cemetery.

Mr. Edwards, born August 12, 1877, in Salada, Texas, had been a Ranger resident for many years, and had been a patient in the Ranger General Hospital for some time.

Only known survivors are two cousins, Thomas W. Edwards of Bonham and Mrs. Bush Rust of Camarill, California, and one niece, Mrs. C. L. Terry of Kansas City, Missouri.

Two Courts Not Attacked

At least two of Eastland's courts are safe, it would appear.

Such is not the case with the 11th Court of Civil Appeals at the 91st District Court.

Abilene representatives would move the Appeals Court to Abilene, and a Dallas GOP representative wants the 91st District Court in Dallas.

Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton said this week that he knows of no attempt to move his JP Court, and Corporation Judge Lewis Tiner said that he thinks the city court is safe.

91st District Court Re-Shuffle Proposed

Another Eastland County tribunal has been zeroed in on but, like the effort to have the 11th Appeals Court moved, the results are yet to be seen.

Judge T. M. Collie's 91st District Court would be moved "in toto" to Dallas under a House bill introduced by Rep. Henry Stollenwerck, a Republican legislator of Dallas.

The local court's work would be thrown into the 82nd District Court, made up of Comanche, Hamilton and Coryell Counties, under the proposed legislation.

"In my opinion, our court won't be moved," Judge Collie said. He added that there have been attempts for the past 20 years to move the court.

Judge Collie indicated that Sen. Tom Creighton had told him that the measure would be carefully watched in Austin.

"Our 91st Court had only 30 less cases filed in 1961 as did the district into which Rep. Stollenwerck would place this court. In 1961, District Court 52, made up of Bosque, Comanche, Coryell and Hamilton Counties, had 533 cases filed. Our court had 503 cases," the Judge said.

"That district represented 55,123 total population, while this court served a population of only 19,526," Judge Collie said.

If Rep. Stollenwerck's HB 813 should become law, this court destination (91st) would be moved to Dallas, and Judge Truman Roberts of Hamilton would have to schedule his visits here to take care of the cases.

The district attorney of that court, who now lives in Gatesville, would likewise have to travel here to work on cases. The local district clerk's office would remain in tact.

"I first learned of the measure Sunday night," Judge Collie said, "when a friend, a judge from Corsicana, called to ask if I had heard about the proposed bill."

According to information released by Rep. Stollenwerck, court-load in Eastland was heavier than that of the three counties, with which he is proposing that it be joined, although the year for which the

figures apply was not given.

His comparison is as follows: Eastland County, 245 filings and 267 disposals (108 dismissals); Comanche, 127 and 186; Hamilton, 65 and 81; and Coryell, 176 and 165. (Bosque County would be taken out of the district under the new bill)

Another house bill, now in sub-committee, would move the 11th Court of Civil Appeals from Eastland to Abilene. That move was protested strongly by Eastland County attorneys, and is believed due for no-action.

"Just about every two years, we have these sieges of attacks on our courts," Judge Collie said, "and we need to keep aware of them and work together to see that Eastland County's interests are protected."

APPLICATIONS BEING TAKEN FOR LIONS CHILDRENS CAMP

Applications for eligible boys and girls are now being accepted for the Texas Lions Camp in Kerrville, according to local Lions Club. The camp is sponsored and owned by the Lions of Texas to provide a summer camp for the physically handicapped boys and girls of Texas.

Facilities at the Kerrville camp are equipped to handle 144 campers each two weeks and age limits are from seven through 16 years of age. Three camping periods for ages seven through 11, and two camping periods for boys and girls ages 12 through 16 are held each summer. The first period begins on Saturday, June 15.

Located east of Kerrville in the Texas hill country, the camp is situated on a 504 acre tract of land. Children attending the camp have the opportunity to observe wildlife such as deer, turkey, quail and other animals. A beautiful swimming pool with one counselor supervising each two swimmers is available in addition to facilities for leathercraft, ceramics, basket weaving and other handicrafts. Group activities and competitive sports such as archery, miniature golf and other games are available.

The local clubs in this area are anxious to sponsor eligible children from this area and urge that anyone knowing a girl or boy who would qualify to contact any member of the local Lions Club. The only requirements are that the child be between the ages of seven through 17 and physically handicapped.

Interested persons were asked to contact the presidents of the area Lions Clubs, Sutton Crofts of the Cisco club, Bill Walters of the Eastland club, and Dr. Ted Nicksick of the Ranger club.

Mr. McDonald, who had been an engineer for Texas Electric Service Company at Eastland for 37 years, had lived in Cisco at 1606 Avenue E for the past 16 years. He previously lived in Eastland.

A veteran of World War II, Mr. McDonald was a 32nd degree Mason and was a long time member of the Eastland lodge. He was a past master of the Snyder lodge and was a member of Moshiah Temple shrine at Fort Worth. He was born Oct. 21, 1900, at Temple.

Mr. McDonald was married August 14, 1947, to Zola Wheeler in Cisco. He was a long-time member of the First Methodist Church.

Surviving Mr. McDonald are his wife of Cisco; two daughters, Miss Martha Lee McDonald of Dallas and Mrs. Bill Pryor of Eastland; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John T. McDonald of Palestine; four sisters, Mrs. Maud Waugh of Dothan, Alabama, Mrs. W. C. Wylie of Palestine, Mrs. W. M. Rawley of Dallas, and Mrs. R. P. Gibbs of Lebanon, Tenn., and two grandchildren.

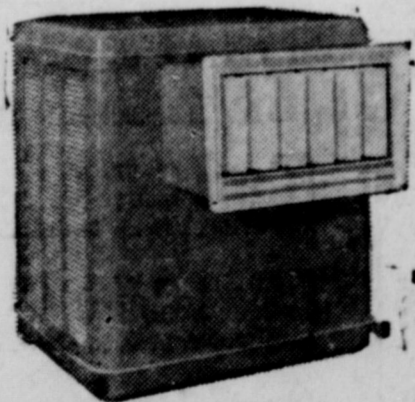

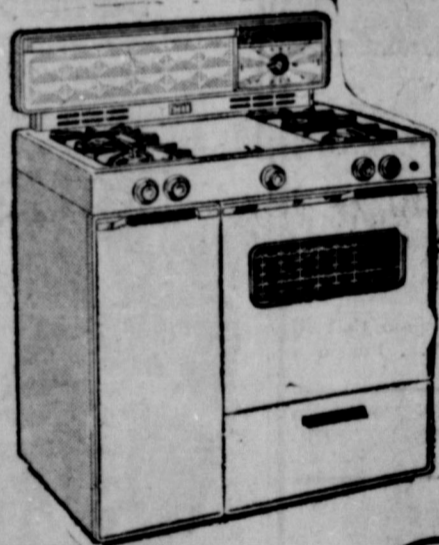

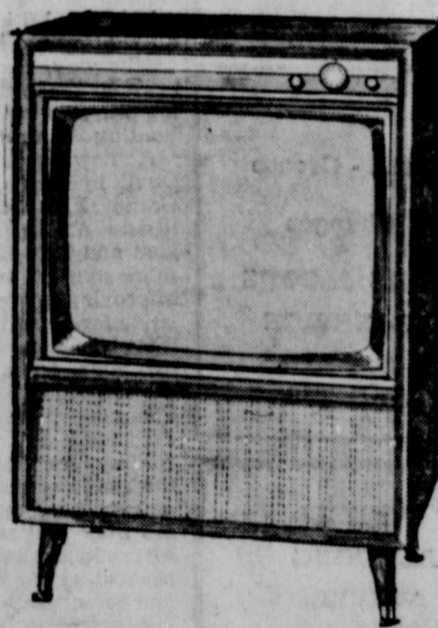

Warm Weather May Mean Time For Screwworm

Warmer weather and shearing time means that screwworm activity may not be too far in the future for this area. While officials of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program are hoping screwworms will not be found outside of the Rio Grande Valley this year, they urge livestockmen to take all precautions in working their livestock.

Angora goat shearing is well underway and sheep shearing will continue through April in

most Texas counties. Nicks and cuts caused by shearing are prime targets for the screwworm fly.

Nearly all of the sheep and goat counties should be free of screwworms at this time, since they are located in the area where winter was severe enough to prevent screwworm survival. In festation could come from the movement of infested animals into this region or through the normal migration of the insect from the overwintering area. If wounds are properly treated, the screwworm fly will have no place to lay its eggs and the life cycle can be stopped. By taking a little extra time and treating all wounds, cuts and scratches, producers

can prevent further development and migration of the pest. Most of the medicinal screwworm preparations on the market, when properly applied to a wound, will prevent it from becoming a source of infestation.

Screwworm cases are presently being located only in deep South Texas, where intensive treatment of steril fly release and livestock spraying is being conducted. Each case is being treated as an emergency, in an attempt to prevent screwworm-free areas from becoming infested. To do this, officials point out, they must have samples of all cases being detected.

The meeting was closed made so producers can collect eradication headquarters whenever an infestation

is found. Producers should collect a screwworm sample and have it ready to be picked up before they telephon. The number to call in Mission is Justice 5-1646.

Plan Ahead Of Time For Your Retirement Day

It is never too early to make plans for your future retirement, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene. He said the folks in the social security office will be glad to tell you what papers you will need when you file your claim for payments.

"You should make your claim for social security retirement payments two or three months before you actually retire," Tuley said. By doing this, you will get your payments on time when you retire.

Tuley warned older workers against waiting until after retirement to make their first visit to the social security office. Some often find that they could have gotten benefit payments even though still working. The best way to avoid this kind of loss is to check into social security before you retire.

If you are near age 62 and have never checked into your social security, do so today. Even if you are not ready to retire, you should check on your social security when you reach age 62, 65, and 72, Tuley advised. The social security office in Abilene is located at 203 Fannin Street.

Quail Raising Booklet Ready

WACO With the close of all hunting seasons and spring on the way, many quail hunters and landowners are seeking ways to better their quail hunting habitat.

A new booklet, Bobwhite Quail in Texas, authored by Game Fish Commission biologists A. S. Jackson, Clyde Holt and Dan Lay offer many management suggestions for improving pasture and farm lands for bobwhite production. The brochure, No. 101, is available from Game Fish Commission, Region II, 3725 Franklin, in Waco.

Printed in a pocket-sized edition, mention is made of the range of the birds, the requirements that the landowners may realize to be needed to produce quail, and depicts several types of weed seeds and farm grains that may be cultivated to produce cover and food.

Biologists feel that mistakes are often made in quail production that may be avoided and still not impair the function of the landowners utilization of farm acreage production. These mistakes are mentioned, and suggestions are made on types of cover and locations.
