Mister X Will Visit Your Town Saturday

For your own protection, you need to know that a blindfolded man will be driving the streets in your town in the very near future.

Don't be alarmed though, because even with his eyes covered with layers and layers of solid material, a few powder puffs, a roll or so of adhesive tape and a solid bag over his head, "Mr. X" is able to steer and operate any vehicle. At least that's what he said, and he'll be demonstrating his rare talents in Eastland County Saturday, Sept. 7.

In fact, he'll be "driving" to just about every town in the county that day, so if you want to see the "Blindfolded man drive through your town" you'll want to be on hand. Tentative schedule is as follows:

Desdemona, 9:30 a. m.; Gorman, 10:30; Carbon, 11; Rising Star, 11:30; Cisco, 2 p. m.; Eastland, 3 p. m.; Ranger 4 p. m.; and if time permits, he plans to drive into Breckenridge about 5:30 p. m. To be blindfolded under the strictest security to make sure there's no trickery, County Sheriff Lee Horn and Highway Patrolman Jack Therwhanger will "administer" the "blindfold."

In fact Sheriff Horn will accompany Mister X on his tour of the county. The blindfold will consist of first, ladies' powder puff over each eye, a roll of adhesive tape to hold them in place, then yards and yards of dark material covering that, topped off with a black hood—resulting in total darkness for Mister X.

When he comes through your town, wave at him. He'll wave back, if he sees you.

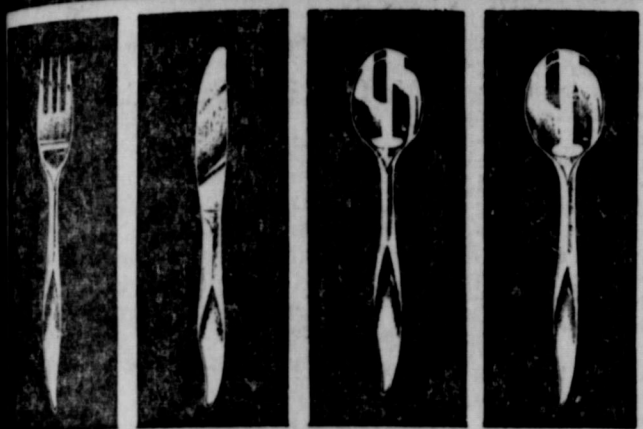

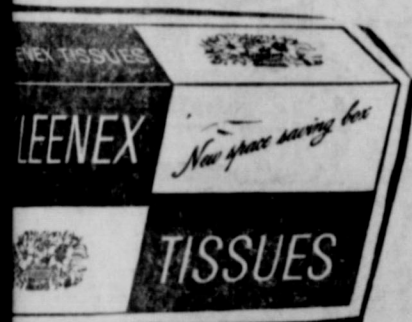

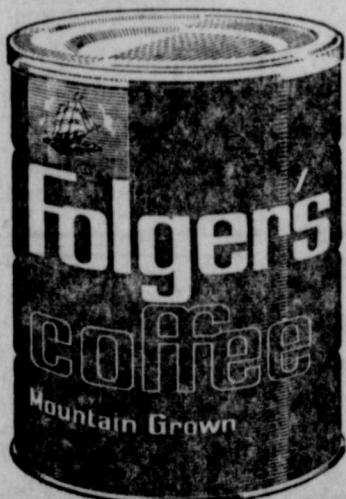

School registration completed Friday indicates that the beginning enrollment for the 1963-64 school year will be approximately the same as the closing enrollment last year.

At the close of registration Friday, the boundary lines listed below were set for the new year. Parents wishing to transfer students from one elementary school to the other may secure a transfer request form from the principal of the school Tuesday morning and file it with the principal by Wednesday at noon. Consideration will be given such requests when it will not lead to overcrowding in the other school or when apparent hardship cases exist.

The following first grade students will report to South Ward on Tuesday morning: all those living on Daugherty Street and east; all transfer students; and all bus students. All first graders living west of Daugherty Street will report to West Ward.

All second, third, fourth and fifth grade students should report to the school where they registered Friday.

Sixth, seventh and eighth grade groups will attend the Junior High School.

The first day of school Tuesday will be a full day of operation. Buses will make their usual runs beginning at 7 a. m. in order to deliver high school and junior high students by 8:15 a. m. and elementary students by 8:30 a. m.

School will begin at South and West Ward at 8:15 a. m. and dismiss at 3:15 p. m. except for the first grade which will be dismissed at 2:30 p. m. each day. High school and junior high schools will remain in session until 3:30 p. m. each day.

All school cafeterias will be in operation the first day of school, and prices for lunches will remain the same as last year. Students at West Ward and South Ward will be charged 25 cents per meal and junior high and high school students will pay 30 cents.

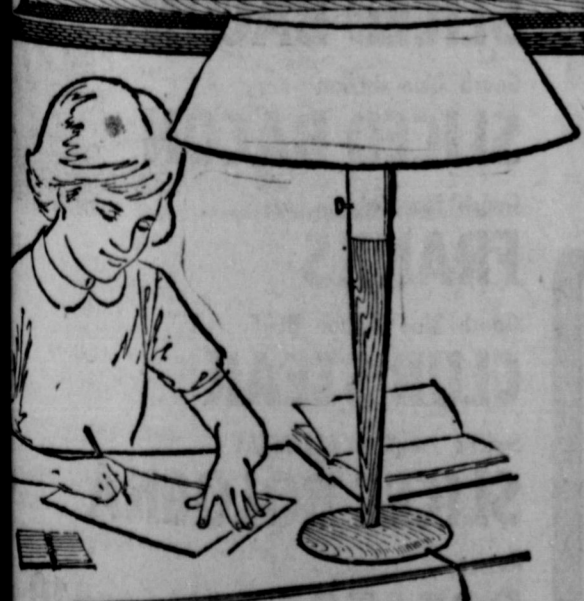

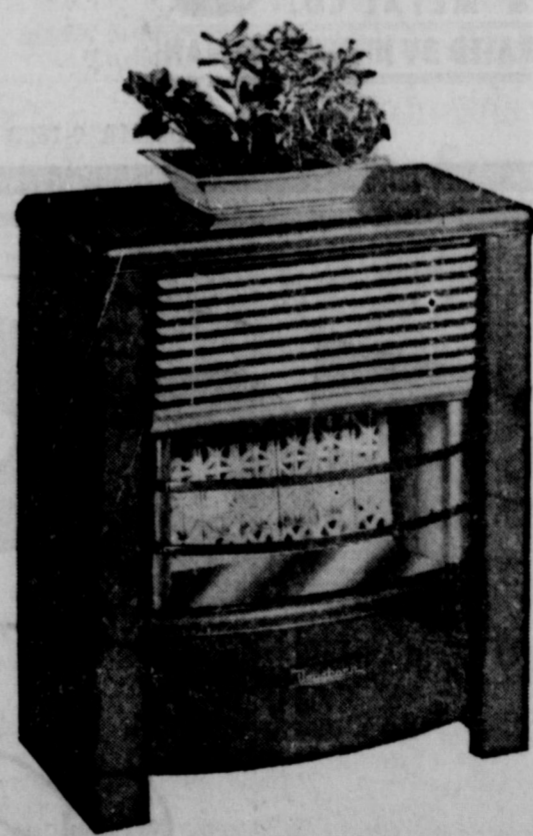

Homework is hard work for young eyes. Plenty of good light is needed for reading small type, seeing details in maps and charts and performing other close visual tasks. For easier seeing at the study table, a good table lamp with at least a 150 watt bulb or equivalent is recommended.
