Science Teacher Hired For Forthcoming Term

Kenneth J. Norris, a 1963 spring graduate of Abilene Christian College, has been employed as a biology and general science teacher at Eastland High School for the coming school year.

Norris has a major in education with teaching preparation in the field of science, Supt. Wendell Siebert said, in announcing the new appointment.

Tentative plans are for Norris to teach chemistry in addition to the other two subjects in the 1964-65 school year.

Norris, who is single, plans to move to Eastland during the latter part of August.

A graduate of Aspermont High School, his parents now make their home at Aledo.

The science position was the only vacancy to be filled this year after Charles Horhdez resigned to enter the service. The system lost one other teacher when Mrs. Don Farnsworth resigned, but her position isn't being filled due to a drop in average daily attendance, the school lost one teacher.

The average daily attendance for the past term was 710.27 pupils per day, Siebert said, and the requirement for the extra teacher was approximately 713.

Condemnation Suit Postponed

A condemnation suit involving acreage west of Cisco, which was to have been tried in County Court Tuesday, was postponed until the latter part of September, because of the absence of one of the state's witnesses.

The State of Texas brought the suit against Mrs. E. C. Lloyd of Cisco after she failed to accept a price suggested by a recent condemnation commission. The tract of land involves some 15 or 20 acres for which the commission recommended about \$4,000.

A jury was called, but the case was continued after a land appraiser from Brownwood did not appear because of illness.

In addition to the credit granted by Central State College, one semester hour credit is offered by the University of Alaska.

Points to be visited include Wyoming; Yellowstone National Park, Calgary, Fairbanks, the University of Alaska, Anchorage, Juneau; Seattle, Washington; Twin Falls, Idaho; and Salt Lake City, Utah.

The trip is to be conducted under the direction of John Stroup, professor of geography.

Canvas Of Vote Thursday Date Of Sales Still Pending

Results of the Saturday Ranger wet election which carried by 46 votes, will be canvassed by the County Commissioners Court at a special meeting Thursday morning at 9:30.

The court is required by law to meet and canvass the vote within five days after the election.

Ranger dealers are expected to file applications for permits in the county clerk's office immediately after the canvass. Notice of application has to be advertised, and on-site inspection of facilities performed by the Texas Liquor Control Board, before permits can be issued in Austin.

The election Saturday was the fifth in 13 months, and

carried 658 for with 612 against. The vote legalized the sale in the corporate limits of the city of Ranger.

The Saturday turnout was only 41 votes below the record tally at the March election when 1,301 votes were counted.

In three earlier votes dry won by a small margin twice and by a large margin once. Liquor stores opened and began selling after the March election but were closed after the 91st District Court held that that election was null and void because the ballots had been "rubber stamped" rather than signed by the election judge.

BID OPENING AUGUST 29

School Construction Likely To Begin By Mid-September

Construction of Eastland's new elementary school building and physical education gymnasium will probably get under way about the middle of September, according to School Board President M. H. Perry.

The board gave final approval to plans at a special meeting Monday evening, and Architects Dan Boone and Bill Pope of Abilene are to prepare specifications this week.

Tentative date for opening of bids has been set for Thursday, August 29, Supt. Wendell Siebert said.

This date was agreed upon by board members and the architects, but confirmation is to come after the architects have had an opportunity to check to see if there are any other major bid lettings in this area on that date.

The Abilene firm is to advertise immediately in contractual publications, and still predict that the Eastland system will receive favorable bids at this time of year.

There are several alternates

included in the plans for utilization of the district's funds most expeditiously. (For instance, bids will be taken two ways on the gym ceiling — one for and another without insulation).

General contractor will probably be from without this immediate area, Siebert said, but use of sub-contractors will be

extensive, with a great deal of local labor used.

It is estimated that the job will take about eight or nine months, indicating that construction will be completed before the end of the forthcoming school term, and certainly in time for the opening of the next term, in September, 1964.

Dr. Durham Tells Of Work For Lions Club

Dr. Norman Durham, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Durham of Eastland, was speaker for the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday.

An Eastland graduate, Dr. Durham is currently a professor at Oklahoma State University at Stillwater, where he divides his time between instructing and research.

Dr. Durham discussed the areas in which he is assisting the research, and explained particularly the importance work with the structure and mutation of the individual cell.

He called his work basic research, and suggested that a great deal of correlation is necessary before this research can be applied to such specific areas as malignancy control.

As a microbiologist, he works in one of the seven colleges of the University, which is expecting an enrollment of some 12,000 this fall.

State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN — Gov. John Connally says Texas is making a lot of progress on civil rites without demonstrations and disturbances. He urged Texans to avoid the trouble which is plaguing other states.

Roy Evans, secretary of Texas State AFL-CIO, indicated mass demonstrations are needed in Lower Rio Grande Valley to improve working conditions of Mexican workers. Connally committed such statements are irresponsible and inflammatory.

Governor also rejected labor's appeal for a special session of the Legislature to abolish right-to-work law and enact state minimum wage, saying he saw "no need, emergency or desirability" for such a session.

Evans said labor's traditional role is to try to inflame people against injustice, and he intends to keep on trying to do that.

When the Legislature created the new job of deputy commissioner of the Health Department, Dr. Copeland resigned as chairman of the State Board of Health to accept the job of deputy commissioner. He had been Board Chairman for the past ten years.

As It Looks From Here

By Cong. Omar Burleson WASHINGTON, D.C. — British Guiana, lying between Venezuela and Dutch Guiana and bordered on the South by Brazil, could easily become the second Communist dominated regime in the Western Hemisphere.

At the present time, this territory, on the Northeast of South America, is under British control insofar as its defense and external affairs are concerned, but the Country is scheduled for independence.

The prime minister of British Guiana is Cheddi Jagan, an East Indian of the same race is about 50 per cent of the population. There is evidence that he is gearing the economy of the Country with the Soviet Bloc. It is known that cement, flour and petroleum products are coming in in quantities from the Soviet Union in exchange for rice, which is taken to Cuba and exchanged mainly for sugar.

Jagan said publicly only a short time ago that "The first Socialist State in the Hemisphere was Cuba; the first in South America will be the Republic of Guiana." He is known to be a leftist and a long time associate of Communists. His wife Janet, a native of Chicago, was a known Communist before losing her United States citizenship by having voted in a Guiana election. She is as much a leader in the country as is her husband and holds the official position of Minister of Home Affairs.

Should Guiana receive its complete independence from the British, it is believed that Jagan would institute a complete dictatorship and place his wife in control of police, and that Jagan himself would take complete control of the labor force.

The opposition is led by Forbes Burnham, a fiery leader of the Negro population, which constitutes about 35 per cent. Incidentally, the remaining population is 12 per cent mixed, 2 per cent Portuguese and 1 per cent Asiatic.

Those informed on the subject believe that the conflicts within British Guiana are not nearly so much on the basis of ideology as they are between the races. This difference is compounded by the fact that the East Indians are Hindus and Moslems and live mainly in the rural areas, while the Negroes are Christian and live mostly in the cities.

The fear is that the British will pull out, which they very much want to do, and wash their hands of a political and economic liability as soon as possible. The British, it seems, feel that the best they can do is leave behind a government with constitutional restrictions sufficient to contain Communism.

The United States, on the other hand, is fearful that the English will leave too soon and that the Communists will move in the vacuum.

Like Castro at the early stages of his take-over, Jagan does not admit to being an out-and-out Communist, but it is plain he is emmeshed already in the Soviet Bloc of nations.

Two situations would probably exist when and if the British grant full independence and move out. Either Jagan would immediately take over as a dictator or under the semblance of constitutional government hold elections which would place him in power under what would appear to be Democratic processes. Either of these results would definitely be advertised to the United States and all of Latin America.

Even if the English should be willing to take the risk of throwing Jagan out, safety is not guaranteed simply by such a delay. The Indian population is growing at a much faster rate than the more conservative Negro Majority.

Therefore, our policy should be to insist that the British suspend the Guianan constitution and put off final independence until after an election could be held, which might be approximately two years from now. In the meantime, it would be hoped that something could be done to diminish the power and break the grasp of Jagan to prevent the

MOTHER OF INVENTION

Necessity may be the mother of invention, but its Big Daddy is the patent. July 31 is the anniversary of the day when the first patent was issued in the United States. That was in 1790 — little more than a year after the new government began operating. It was only a process for "making pot and pearl ashes," otherwise known as potash, reports World Book Encyclopedia, but so important was the event that President Washington himself signed the patent awarded to Samuel Hopkins, of Vermont. Endorsing the document was the then Secretary of State Jefferson, whose inventions include the swivel chair and the dumb-waiter.

Why all the fuss about the patent? Statesmen before and after Washington have praised it as a spur to invention and hence, technological advance. And some observers have even credited it with the Western world's high standard of living.

A patent is simply a limited monopoly which secures to an inventor the fruits of his labor. For 17 years he has the exclusive right to make, sell, or use his invention. Of course, it may be a profitless 17 years...if some part of his invention has been patented by an earlier inventor who refuses to let him use it. But at the end of that period, the invention becomes accessible to the public at large and scientific knowledge is increased.

Women began making their contributions to scientific knowledge as early as 1809, when Mary Kies was granted a patent for a method of weaving straw with silk or thread. A few thousand patents later, a former Congressman from Illinois named Abraham Lincoln received one for "A Device for Buoying Vessels over Shoals." The device must have been a success, because Lincoln later declared appreciatively, "The Patent System added the fuel of interest to the fire of genius."

the blood pressure considered normal for the person involved — if the increase persists — may cause the walls of blood vessels to thicken, exactly as callouses are formed on hands by regular use of an axe or hoe. Research has shown that temporary increases in pressure do not really make much difference. In the most common type of high blood pressure, called "essential hypertension," the tiny branches of arteries which carry blood to all body tissues (called arterioles) begin to tighten up. Blood passageways become smaller and smaller, and the heart has to work harder to push the blood through. After a time the blood vessels lose their elasticity and the heart muscles thicken with the extra work load. Result: high blood pressure, and ultimately heart damage. What causes the arterioles to tighten and constrict? No one knows. High blood pressure sometimes goes up for a period of days or weeks — or even longer — and then drops back to normal. Sometimes it may jump from pure nervousness while your physician is examining you. Perhaps there is a connection between hypertension and the strain of modern life. People who work under constant stress, who worry too

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much, are often susceptible. Heredity is a probable factor, and the condition occurs most often in persons between 30 and 50. The thing which will count most in adding years to the life of hypertension sufferers is the willingness to change their living habits, following the rules of moderation in everything. By securing a doctor's care and following a few simple rules for moderate living, they can probably work and enjoy life as long or longer than their next-door neighbors without high blood pressure. There is nothing to gain from worry about your chances of developing hypertension. Just make it a point to have a physical examination at least once a year. And worry and argue as little as possible. Low blood pressure, on the other hand, seldom causes trouble. Afflicting relatively few people to a serious extent, the condition is usually a symptom of a specific disease which can frequently be treated successfully. A hookah is a Turkish, water-cooled pipe.

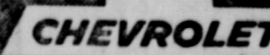
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A Tour of the Holy Land

PART TWO

 Our second day, we went to visit the Old City proper, going into the city by St. Stephen Gate, where tradition says Stephen was martyred for preaching the gospel, and where Saul of Tarsus, later Paul the evangelist stood by and gave consent. Not far from this gate is a part of the Palace of Pilate, which is now an orphanage, and the starting place for the via Dolorosa, or Way of the Cross.

We are convinced this is the real way of the cross as there does not seem to be any other way suitable due to the terrain, etc., of this hill. This is a very difficult hill to climb, some very steep cobble stone climbs, some steps, and you can readily see how our Lord could not climb here without assistance.

A point was shown us, where Simon Cyrene took up the cross, and carried it. We do not know if this point is correctly located but the Bible tells us, he did carry it. After reaching the place where, we were told, Jesus was crucified and buried, we were somewhat disappointed, as there is a church built by other faiths protecting this spot, but we must remember, we were in the vicinity of where Jesus was tried before the Sanhedrin, Pilate and Herod, where he was buried, and where the angel gave the glad news, "He is risen".

We seem to be going backward, somewhat, because we go now to Bethlehem, the place of our Lord's birth. Again tradition shows a place supposed to be his identical birth place. Bethlehem is a city now of about 20,000, many of whom are very poor. Beggars on every side, through most were pretty well dressed and in the fashion of the West. Many of the older people still wear their heads covered and men wear long, loose garments down to the feet. Not nearly so many wore sandals as you would expect.

On another day we went to Jericho. On the way down we passed through the "Judean Hills" which is the most desolate spot we saw. At Jericho, we were shown the site of 3 Jerichos. One of the time of Joshua, who marched around the city seven times, and on the seventh time, blew the trumpets and the walls fell down. Then the one of Jesus time, and a very modern and beautiful city. Near Jericho

and overlooking the city, is the Mount of Temptation where Jesus was tempted by the Devil after spending 40 days in the desert.

After leaving Jericho, we traveled on to the Dead Sea which is nearly 1,300 feet below sea level, the lowest spot on earth. We had a refreshing dip in the sea, which, we were told, is 20 times more salty than the ocean. Near the Dead Sea we visited some caves and ruins where some of the Dead Scrolls were found in recent years. In and around this section of the country, many camels are raised just as we have cattle in this country.

On a Sunday, after attending church, we visited Bethany, the home of Martha, Mary and Lazarus, some of the best friends of Jesus. We visited the traditional tomb of Lazarus. Some of our group walked over the way our Lord rode the donkey into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, or the Sunday before his death and resurrection.

One day we went to Hebron, which David used for his capital city at one time. On this road to Hebron there are pools built by Solomon, also there is a valley of Eschol where Joshua and Caleb found the great bunches of grapes, and returned to report on the country but the Israelites refused to believe and did not cross over Jordan for almost 40 years.

In this same locality they later crossed the Jordan River. The mountains were pointed out to us — Mt. Nebo, where Moses viewed

the Promised Land and others, in the land of Moab. It was in this same locality that Naomi and Ruth returned after leaving the land of Moab.

We made a trip out to Emmaus, on the way to Samaria. Samaria still has her enemies. They are a peculiar people. You cannot take pictures of anything around. It was at Sychar that Jesus talked to the woman at the well. The Samaritans still have what they say is Jacob's Well. It is a very deep well, and the water is very good. We had a nice drink from it on a hot dry day and found it to be very refreshing.

Near Samaria is the City of Sebastia, where Ahab and Omri once lived in a sumptuous fashion. It was at this place, we saw a threshing floor that was practically the same as in the days of Biblical times. The grain was scattered out on this floor and trampled by man or animals. We saw a cow and donkey pulling a board trampling the grain. They harvest their small patches of grain in the way of Bible times. The women cut handfuls and tie it in bundles, the men haul it to the threshing floor on the backs of donkeys.
