





Value Of Farm, Second To Oil

The value of Texas' farm and ranch production is exceeded by only one other raw material, oil. The value of the state's total yearly agricultural production exceeds the payroll for manufacturing, or the total of construction awards or the payroll for retail trades, points out John McHaney, exension economist

Farm and ranch production each year has a total value of just under 2.5 billion dollars, but, explains McHaney, agriculture adds much more to our total economy than just income from the sale of products. Business firms which assemble, process, distribute, transport wholesale and retail the products of Texas' farms and ranches employ about 20 percent of the labor force of the state and add about 3.9 billion dollars to the agribusiness economy. Their primary concern is to get the agricultural products to the final consumer in the desired form and at the right place and time.

White-Wing Dove Season Is Closed

AUSTIN - Texas will not have a white-winged dove season this year. "And for very logical reasons," said Howard Dodgen, executive secretary for the Texas Game and Fish Commission, "the same reasons we closed the prong-horned antelope season many years back. For the same reasons, hunters couldn't take redheads and canvasback ducks last year.


"It's this department's responsibility to look after the game in this great State of ours. And, when our wildlife scientists conclude through research, observations, experience and concern that a species has been reduced to he danger point, it's our dut protect this species, even if it means closing a season."

This isn't the first time the whitewing hunt has been shut down. Back in the 50's the season remained closed for three years to give the birds a chance to build up their populations. Closing the season worked, and since 1956 hunters have enjoyed the thrills of trying their hunting skills against the darting dodging doves with the white slashed wings. "A drop of the season this year may mean open seasons for the next several years," said Dodgen. "A hunt this year could force us to drop the hunts for the next several years. The people in this State, including those in the Valley, realize this and very few are complaining. Texans know that guessing was not, and is not, one of the techniques the Commission uses for determining a season. Facts revealed through constant study resulted in the decision to withdraw the open season this year."

> The Texas Society of Pathologists had led the fight for a state-wide modern medical examiner system to insure uniformity. Without a statewide system, Texas, in effect, invites would-be murderers to operate across county lines, where the probability of discovery is little or none, the author has explained.

> The cost of a state-wide medical examiner system, would be a minute proportion of the millions spent annually in Texas for repression of crime.

Under the new law, seven of Texas' 254 counties are authorized to set up medical examiner systems through a vote of their respective Commissioners' Courts. The seven are El Paso, Hidalgo, Jefferson, Lubbock, McLennan, Nueces, and Travis counties. Total population of these counties, according to the 1960 federal census, is 1-1/2 million, or approximately 10 per cent of the entire state population.

The Legislature has opened the door. Now it is up to the people to decide if they want to continue an oxcart practice in the Jet Age.






