Rev. Carroll will lead in a revival beginning at the First Baptist Church Sunday.

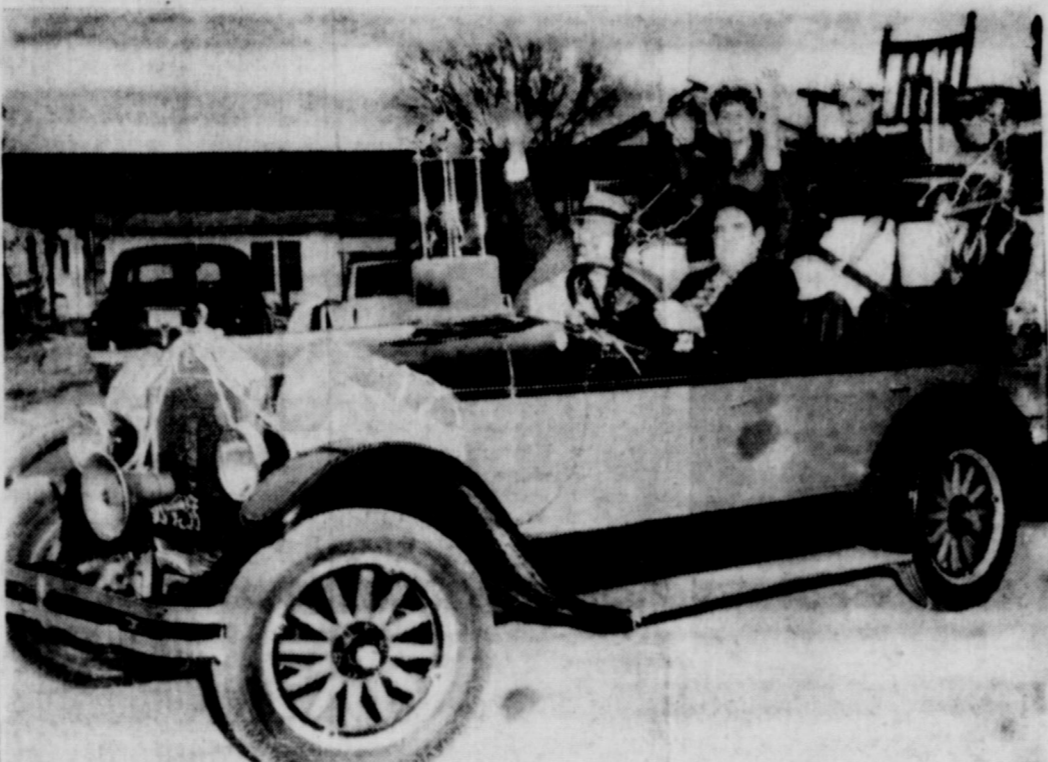
Dick Spalding of Abilene and formerly of Eastland, will direct the music for the services.

## Curry Capias Now on Book

Nathan Curry's name has been entered on the criminal docket of the 91st District Court, charging murder, and indicating that he has been formally served with a capias.

The capias was issued Feb. 20th, and is shown as having been returned Friday.

His parents were in Eastland Friday checking on the status of the case, and reported that Nathan is working in Lubbock. The family plans to move there, they said, and now have their home in Cisco up for sale.

They also indicated that they are seeking signatures of persons who shared their belief that Nathan could not get a fair trial in this county.

Other capias recorded include: Two counts of burning grassland against Gary Lynn Marsh of Cisco; Gus Orman of Cisco, is charged with sale of whiskey and reputation of the offense; and W. H. Bollinger, failure to return to the scene of an accident.

Still unrecorded are the names of the other indictees: two for robbery, one for negligent homicide and one for rape.

## Livestock Show Parades Top Animals, Exhibitors

Stock Show scored triumphs on every count in this year's edition, largest number of entries, largest number of spectators—and it didn't rain during the midst of the show for once.

Classifying and sifting of animals and judging of dairy cattle opened the two-day show Friday morning.

Johnny Williamson of Olden showed the first grand champion of the 1963 show when his Brown Swiss was selected as the top female in the dairy show. The reserve champion was exhibited by Larry Herrington of Ranger.

Two other Ranger youths, Willie Cantwell and Bobby Dempsey, took top honors in the Angora goat show. Cantwell had the champion buck and Dempsey the champion doe in the junior division.

In the open goat show, Robert Joe Jackson, also of Ranger, captured both top prizes with his Angora buck and doe. Garland Coody, Breckenridge rancher, judged

goats.

The fine wool breeding sheep laurels went to Phillip Harrison of Eastland who took grand champion honors on both his ewe and ram.

A Hampshire ewe, bred by Sidney Boy of Baird and exhibited by Ivy Ferguson, Cisco 4-H girl, was named grand champion ewe of all other breeds, by C. T. Parker, Runnels Farm Agent, who judged breeding sheep.

The reserve champion was a Southdown ewe owned and exhibited by Jo Ann Baker, 10, Eastland 4-H club.

The grand champion ram of the junior breeding show, was exhibited by John Baker, Eastland 4-H, and Ivy Ferguson had the reserve champion. The 4-H members are under the supervision of County Agent J. M. Cooper and Assistant Roger Blackmon.

In the open show the champion ewe, a Corriedale, was exhibited by L. M. Cawley of Cisco and the champion ram

was shown by Buster Phay of Cisco.

The hottest competition Friday was in the fat barrow division. Dr. Ray Anderson of Fort Worth, who has judged the swine in several previous shows, said he was greatly impressed by the vast improvement he observed in the show.

He was especially complimentary of the finishing out of the barrows.

The Cisco FFA Chapter, of which VA teacher Charles McDonald is prime hog supervisor, showed both grand and reserve champion barrows.

Victor Plumbek, whose Hampshire was named grand champion last Saturday of the Cisco Stock Show, captured the top county barrow title with the same Hampshire.

The reserve champion barrow was a Poland China owned and exhibited by Boyce Donaway, Cisco-FFA. His Poland China was bred by L. D. Wyatt of Carbon.

## FOR SCHOOL 30-Acre Site Is Voters' Choice; Construction Could Begin Aug. 1

Eastland's new 16-classroom, air-conditioned elementary school building will be built on the 30-acre tract, now owned by the school.

Voters turned out heavier than expected Thursday and picked the larger site in a referendum election.

A total of 373 voters cast ballots—216 picked the 30-acre site and 157 preferred the 11-acre site.

The board met Thursday night, canvassed the vote and put the 30-acre site in the form of a formal motion, as the one on which the new school will be built.

The district made another step toward actual work on the new school facilities Thursday.

Thursday, March 14th, was the final day of the required 30-day litigation period and no

opposition to the Feb. bond issue election was filed during the period.

(Any charges of election irregularities which could have nullified the bond issue vote, had to be filed within the 30-day period.)

Architect Dan Boone met with the board this week and several minor floor-plan arrangements were changed. He said that work on the final plans is moving along nicely.

Final plans should be ready in from 60 to 90 days which would mean that bids could be advertised for about June 1 and the construction might begin about Aug. 1st.

## Credit Association Elects Directors; Increases Dues

Members of the Eastland Merchants Credit Association elected four new directors and voted to increase dues during their annual business meeting Thursday.

Earl Bender, E. W. Robertson and Frank Crowell were elected to two-year directorships and Bob Perkins to a one-year term.

President Tom Wilson presided, and during the financial report, gave the recommendation of the board of directors that dues be increased 50 cents per month, for minimum membership.

Wilson explained that the association, a non-profit organization, has for the past year, been operating about \$25 per month in the red, and that the directors felt that the 50 cent increase would erase this deficit.

One of the 26 members present suggested during the discussion that the dues be raised \$1 rather than 50 cents to take care of possible future deficits. This was seconded and passed unanimously.

Present membership of the organization is 47 members, Wilson reported.

Hold-over directors are Frank Deaton and Jack Muirhead. Retiring directors are J. T. Gregory, James Smith and Tom Wilson.

Smith, chairman of the nominating committee, read the

slate of director nominees.

Jim Horton and Earl Bender, both veteran Eastland businessmen, participated in a panel discussion during the program.

Horton explained that most collections are made at the time of the sale, when asked how he handles accounts which go over 30 days without being paid.

"Checking and making sure who you're dealing with at the time you sell the merchandise," he said, "is the best way."

Present laws in Texas don't help collectors much, he explained.

Bender described three types of credit customers during his brief talk.

The first, he said, is made up of 90 per cent of the credit customers, and these you don't have to worry about. They go on your books, and they'll eventually pay.

The second group he called the marginal group. Some of them will pay, and some will never pay.

To deal with the third type—the ones you don't know anything about—you need agencies like the Merchants' Credit Association, Bender said.

"If you don't know the people," he said, "it sure is nice to be able to check them out."

## Perry Is Mis-Quoted

"The new elementary school will be built on the 30-acre tract," School Board President M. H. Perry said Friday.

He was quoted Friday morning in the Abilene Reporter-News as having said "Members of the board will not be bound by the outcome of the referendum Thursday."

I did not say that, he said, and it is not the feeling of the board. "We voted to leave it up to the people in Eastland and have bound ourselves to follow their wishes," he added.

Voters voted Thursday, in favor of the 30-acre tract and the board entered a formal motion Thursday evening to name that site as the site for the building.

In 1956 Dr. Fleming traveled extensively in Europe, also visiting the Holy Land. He was a delegate to the World Methodist Conference in Oslo, Norway (1961) and, with his family, toured Europe, the trip being a parting gift from members of St. Luke's Methodist Church in Houston.

Dr. and Mrs. Fleming, the former Lorton January of Dallas and Houston and an alumnus of Southern Methodist University, have three children, Jon Hugh, 21, a senior of Southern Methodist University, Pamela, 19, a sophomore at SMU, and Martha Ann (Marty), 18, a senior in Georgetown High School. Dr. Fleming is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. J. P. Fleming of Dallas.

Dr. Fleming is the 17th President of Southwestern University at its Georgetown location. The university was founded in 1870 and granted a charter as Rutersville College by the Republic of Texas. When the university was moved to Georgetown, the institution had its first session in 1873 under the name of Texas University. In 1875 the name was changed to its present form, Southwestern University, when the desire for a state university was manifested.

(Continued from page one) of Treasurer in 1959 he led in the establishment of a community center in the Magomeni section of Dar es Salaam. Even before construction was begun on the center's building, he won the hearts of neighborhood boys by providing a regulation ball to replace the tennis ball they had been using for soccer. Soon he had a program of recreation and Bible stories for boys and girls, which was expanded to include activities for all age groups.

A native of Bluefield, W. Va., Mr. Carroll received the bachelor of arts degree from Carson-Newman College, Jefferson City, Tenn., and the bachelor of divinity degree from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Tex.

Prior to mission appointment in 1956 he served churches in Tennessee and Texas and served as educational director of First Baptist Church, Bluefield. In 1947 he was a summer missionary in Hawaii for the Theological Student Union. "I had already heard God's call to be a foreign missionary, but no experience in Hawaii sealed that call in my heart," he says.

Mr. Carroll is married to the former Betty Lee Will, of Lakeland, Fla. They have a son, Timothy.

Mr. Carroll has a missionary brother, Daniel M. Carroll, Jr., who teaches in the Baptist theological seminary in Argentina.

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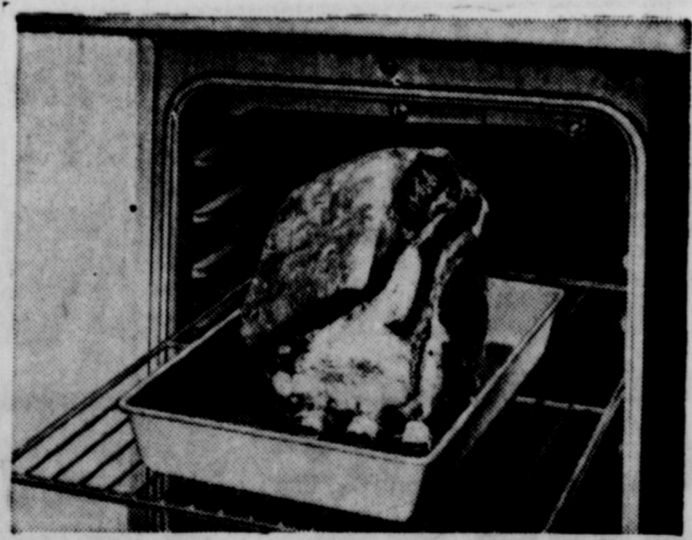
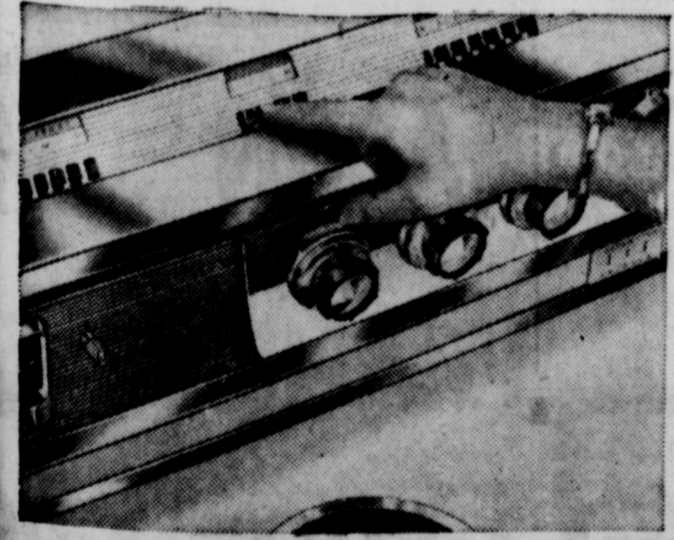

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**HEALTH TIP**

**Tuberculosis Is Needless!**

Tuberculosis has in recent years been cut down to a small fraction of its once widespread proportions through the use of modern drugs and treatment. The death rate is at an all time low. But, still, tuberculosis remains one of America's greatest killers among contagious diseases. The real tragedy of tuberculosis is that it is now possible to stamp it out completely. This could happen if every family assumed the responsibility of regular physical examinations and sought prompt treatment when symptoms are found. There is a simple skin test for tuberculosis. Many states now routinely use this test on school children, but others do not. The test is simple, quick and almost painless. It is inexpensive and highly reliable. A positive test does not necessarily mean active TB because those who have inactive or healed TB usually react positively. But a positive test is a quick signal of the need for further examination. A negative test is a very good indication that all is well.

Simple skin tests at regular intervals and early treatment can prevent many deaths and also can stop the spread of the disease to others.

In many communities the mobile chest X-ray units of the tuberculosis societies make regular visits to each neighborhood. A quick visit to the X-ray unit, or an X-ray arranged through your physician, also is a good means of checking for tuberculosis.

Tuberculosis is particularly dangerous to babies and young children. Often they are infected by a parent or grandparent who has the disease and doesn't know it. In fact, it is quite common to have tuberculosis and not know it until too late for treatment to be fully effective.

Treatment today is not the long, expensive and confining process that it once was. The new drugs are relatively inexpensive, easy to take, and work quickly. Facilities still are available for those with advanced TB who require more extensive therapy. Light cases often can be treated at home without going to a hospital at all.

Avoid needless tuberculosis by making certain that you and your family have regular examinations.

Sooner or later, everyone needs a family health record. Dr. J. E. Peavy, state health commissioner, suggests you start yours now if you aren't already keeping one. Keep accurate and current, it can be of permanent value for the children's school records, for insurance data, and for your family doctor's use, the health official says.

A school note and makes a good record book, but don't use it for anything else. And remember it has to be carefully kept if it is to be of full value.

You can start by jotting down the basic information you already have at hand concerning the injury and illness history of each member of your family.

Start it off with a brief listing of family history. Enter the date and place of birth of each person, and the place and date and cause of death of any deceased. Also enter pertinent information and the medical facts about each family member such as the presence of chronic illness or physical handicap.

Next, start a section for date of immunizations, being sure to provide space for each member of the family. Allow room for entering dates of immunization against whooping cough, polio, smallpox, diphtheria, tetanus, and typhoid fever. Don't forget to include the dates of booster shots.

In a section of general information, list such things as the type of blood each member of the family has, and the drug sensitivities or special allergies of each. If the RH factor is known to be present in anyone be sure to record it prominently.

The health record ought to include a check list of who in the family has had the more common diseases of childhood—chicken pox, measles, mumps, whooping cough, scarlet fever, diphtheria. Most of these are diseases of childhood, but sometimes an adult is exposed. German measles is a serious threat to expectant mothers, and a d mumps is a dangerous disease in any adult.

Dates of physical examinations, with a line or two for notes of special advice or instructions that followed the check-up should be noted in the health record. So also should illnesses
