Plans Nearing Completion for 3rd Annual Lone Cedar Tourney

Winner of the consolation will get a \$40 golf bag and runner-up a box of six balls. Medalist will be awarded a pair of Foot-Joy golf shoes.

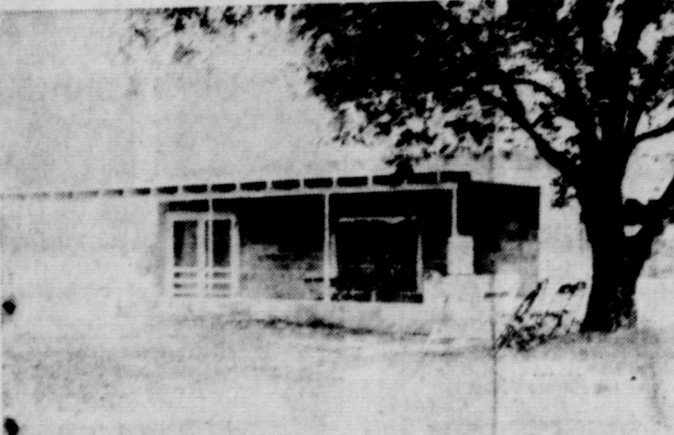
Lakeside Club Is Setting For Dance Friday

Browsing With Bev

Does your mattress meet the size requirements set up by bedding experts? If it does not, you may be robbing your family and yourself of necessary physical rest and mental relaxation. Bedding authorities report that a mattress should be 6 to 8 inches longer than the person who uses it. Since the average man is 5 feet 9 inches or over, many regular-length mattresses are not long enough for adequate restful sleep. Minimum width for adult sleeping comfort is 39 inches. As a result of these research findings — combined with the fact that the average height of Americans has increased one inch during the past 23 years — a growing interest has developed in longer and wider sleeping equipment. Supersize bedding and mattresses, 76 inches wide compared with the average 54 inches wide, can now be found in most stores and in many standard brands. The degree of firmness also is important. Research shows that you rest best on a mattress scientifically constructed to give firm support with the right amount of resiliency. A newly developed cotton batting promises an even more comfortable mattress in the near future. If your present mattress is between 10 and 15 years old, its probably time for a new one. Check for broken stitching, depressions and lumps, and sagging borders. Infants and children need the best bedding you can buy. A must for the homemaker who wants to protect mattresses against soil is a cotton mattress pad. Check to see that the mattress pads have been preshrunk, as they should be laundered periodically. There's more to selecting a dining room set than simply picking out an attractive grouping. If you intend to really use the furniture, the chairs should be comfortable. Since chairs are built for people of average height and weight — and few of us are truly "average" — there's only one way to judge a chair. That's to sit in it. Take off your coat and sit down just as you would at home. Pull the chair up to the table. Do your legs fit underneath? Does the chair support your body in a comfortable, relaxed position? Could you sit in it for a long time without feeling cramped? If the chair meets this test, chances are that it will prove comfortable. Of course, the chair should harmonize with other furnishings in the room.

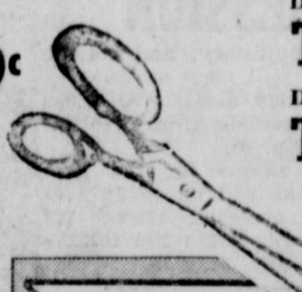

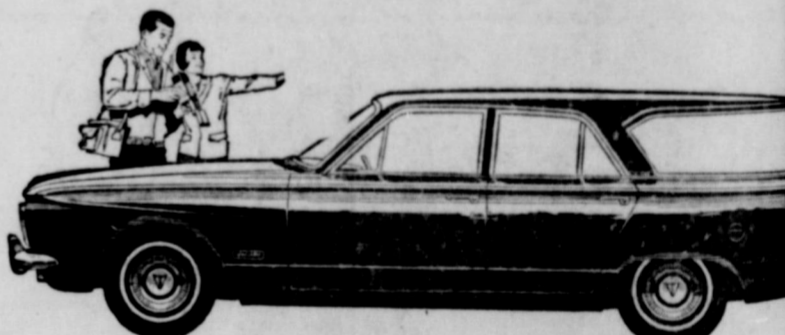

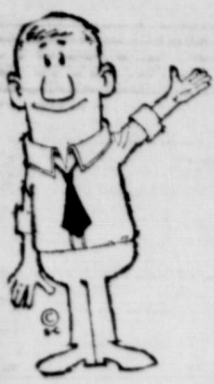

Notice to Long Distance Telephone Users

The following changes in the charges for long distance calls between points within the State of Texas will be made effective June 15, 1963:

Basic rates for station-to-station calls between 9 p.m. and 4:30 a.m. between points more than 82 miles apart will be reduced from 5 to 50 cents, with a maximum charge of 80 cents for a three-minute call, anywhere within the State of Texas.

Station-to-station rates remain unchanged on calls of less than 83 miles, and on calls made before 9 p.m. In Texas, the lower "after 9" rates will not apply on collect calls or on calls charged to a third telephone.

Person-to-person rates will not be changed on calls of 56 miles or less.

Basic rates for most person-to-person calls between points more than 56 miles apart will be increased five cents for both day and evening calls.
