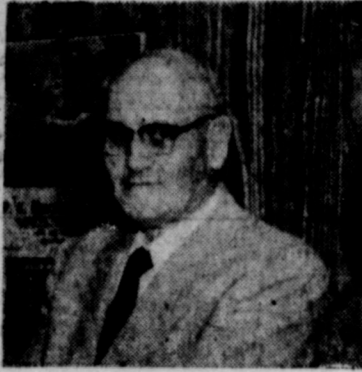


Grady Pipkin Again Director of WTCC

Oiler, Regular Project Gauged Near Eastland

Eastland County Regular Field has gained a new oiler and project. Completed four miles northeast of Eastland was Forster, Carr & Scott of Odessa No. 2 J. L. Dick, Warren Lyman Survey.

Daily pumping potential was 48.30 barrels of 40.2 gravity oil and 18 per cent water. Production is from six perforations per foot at 1,515-86 feet where the formation was ruptured. Casing is set at 1,558 feet.

Irish Drilling Co., Inc., of Eastland No. 1-A O. C. Holcomb was spotted as 1,850 feet rotary project.

Location is two miles northeast of Eastland, being 527 feet from the east and 1,980 feet from the north lines of John House Survey.

Number Enter Navy Program For Seniors

The Navy's high school graduate program is being taken advantage of by many of the high school seniors in this area. Chief Tompkins, Navy recruiter for the Eastland area announced today.

The high school program enables qualifying seniors to be guaranteed a trade school in the field of their choice. A total of 361 seniors will be accepted under the high school program from Central and West Texas during the months of July and August. In the Electronics field alone there are 191 openings to be filled by seniors, the rest is evenly divided between the High School Seaman Recruit, High School Airman Recruit and High School Hospitalman Recruit.

The Trade schools are located throughout the United States; high school graduates who qualify for these schools will be sent to school upon completion of recruit training. At the present time young men enlisting in the Navy may choose between San Diego, California, and Great Lakes, Illinois, for their recruit training.

Sayre Exhibits Big Howitzer to Lions

A 62,000-pound self propelled 155 mm Howitzer belonging to the National Guard's Howitzer Battery at Cisco, was exhibited to the Lions Club Tuesday at the noon luncheon at the First Methodist Church here. Guard Captain

Frank Sayre was speaker at the luncheon, giving some facts and figures about the National Guard and exhibiting the gun on the west side of the church building.

The artillery piece is one of the newest of modern ground weapons and is capable of hurling a 100-pound projectile nine miles. It's cost to the government is \$200,000.

Capt. Sayre pointed out that the National Guard was organized in 1636, years before there was even a nation. The Guard has served in all wars, and now has a total membership of some 450,000 men. There are two divisions of the Guard in Texas, the only state supporting more than one division.

Members of the guard from Eastland attend the Cisco unit, which, together with units from Ranger and Breckenridge, make up the 648th Field Artillery Battalion, which is a part of the 49th Armored Division.

He is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Frank Johnson of Cisco, and two brothers, Edward Duncan of Eastland and David Duncan of Ashland, Kentucky.

peanuts brought \$4.90 per bushel. Marvin C. Jones, Erath County farmer, had 71 acres in peanuts last year, 35 of which were irrigated. His dryland nuts made 13 bushels per acre and the irrigated peanuts averaged 43 bushels per acre.

Other factors may also affect the peanut grade. Growers are advised to avoid digging peanuts before they are mature.

S. E. Cloninger, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, Gorman, advises farmers to make sure combine or thresher is adjusted to keep foreign material and shelled kernels to a minimum. Too, he finds many farmers bring their peanuts to market with too much moisture. The grower may avoid this by taking a sample to the buyer and have moisture content checked to see if his crop is ready to market. Growers will find it pays to do everything possible to insure top-grade peanuts that will sell for top prices.
